Major, Carol Warren-Clark, as well as Maj. Shannon Renfrow, the physician who delivered the New Year's baby arrived to the hospital to help

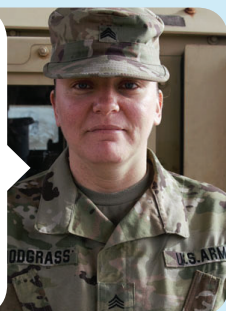
welcome baby Adalyn to the world. Specialist Bates said his wish for Adalyn is for her to be happy and healthy throughout her life.

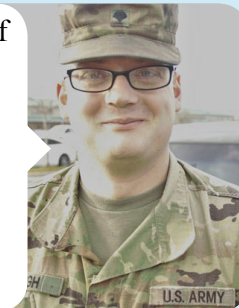

Troopers of 6th Squadron, 8th Cavalry Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, received their M3 Cavalry Fighting Vehicles Jan. 11, at Fort Stewart.

As the brigade's reconnaissance squadron, this gave 6-8 Cav. their first combat platforms to begin training. The cavalry fighting vehicles that entered their motorpool, marked the first combat vehicles fielded to the Spartan Brigade since the announcement that it would convert to the Army's 15th ABCT in late 2016.

The 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division held a casing of colors ceremony, Jan. 30 as they prepared for a nine-month deployment to the Republic of Korea.

The ceremony symbolized the start of the brigade's mission to Korea. Soldiers stood in formation as the commanders and command sergeants major cased the unit colors brigade and battalions.

The "Raider" brigade were the fifth brigade to deploy to the ROK as the rotational Armored Brigade Combat Team supporting the 2nd Infantry Division and will be replacing 2nd ABCT, 1st Cavalry Division based out of Fort Hood, Texas.

The deployment marked the return to Korea for the 3rd ID, who last had units in Korea during the Korean War. During the conflict, 3rd ID Soldiers earned

13 Medals of Honor and fought in eight campaigns beginning with the landing at Wonsan, November 1950 and ending with the armistice in 1953.

On Feb. 13, the Assistant Chief Staff for Installation Management recognized Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield among the winners of the 2018 Army Communities of Excellence program with a Bronze Award.

Other garrisons recognized were Fort Rucker, Alabama (Gold winner), Fort McCoy, Wisconsin (Silver winner), and Daegu, South Korea (Bronze winner). Fort Knox, Kentucky and Fort Wainwright, Alaska rounded out the awardees with an honorable mention award. Fort Stewart is ranked in the top five percent of all U.S. Army garrisons in both the continental United States (CONUS) and overseas (OCONUS) locations.

This recognition joins the long list of ACOE accolades including Gold awards in 2004, 2005, 2006, 2009, 2012, and 2015; Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield continues to preserve its vision "To be our Army's best installation for Soldiers and Families to train, deploy, and live."

Raiders assume responsibility

Camp Humphreys, South Korea – The 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division assumed responsibility as the rotational armored brigade combat team in the Republic of Korea during a transfer of authority ceremony Feb. 23.

The ceremony was presided over by Maj. Gen. Scott McKean, commander of the 2nd Infantry Division ROK-U.S. Combined Division.

The ceremony was the final step in the month-long transition between the brigades.

The deployment marked a historic return of 3rd ID Soldiers to South Korea. This is the first time Soldiers bearing the Marne Division patch have served on the

Korean Peninsula since the Korean War. During the war, 3rd ID had 13 Medal of Honor recipients, received eight Battle Stars and was awarded The Republic of Korea Presidential Unit Citation.

The 7th Infantry Regiment of 3rd ID recorded more combat time than any other infantry unit in South Korea.

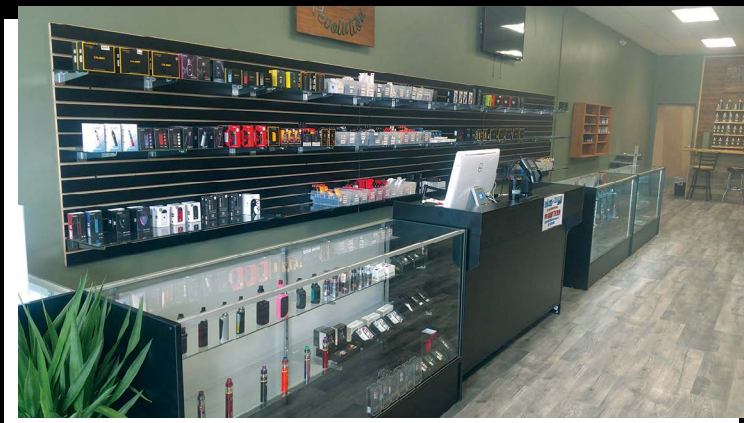

“Happy New Year!”

By the time you read this article you’ve probably heard or spoken those words a few dozen times. At some point during the past few days, however, I found myself thinking, “What exactly are we wishing each other when we utter this traditional January greeting?” The immediate answer is probably that we are simply following convention with little thought behind the words, just as when we ask, “How are you doing?” We may not desire to listen to an answer. If we are sincere in wishing someone a happy new year, we might want to ponder what constitutes real happiness.

For some, happiness is more or less synonymous with pleasure. Wishing someone a happy new year in this case means hoping that the next twelve

months of life will be filled with experiences deemed pleasant and void of those which might cause pain. While this might be a kind sentiment, it is ultimately somewhat shallow. Those who consistently seek to avoid pain and pursue pleasure inevitably ignore entirely the question of purpose. Eventually pleasure becomes more and more difficult to find while pain becomes a constant companion.

Take the example of exercise versus eating. While I have heard myths regarding a “runner’s high”, I have never experienced it. Running can be painful, yet I find a sense of satisfaction when I have completed a race. On the other hand, my wife’s Christmas cookies are always a source of immediate pleasure for me.

However, when 2019 began and I found my ASUs fitting a bit more snugly than I remember, I realized that pleasure had come at a cost. If this is indeed to be a year of happiness for me, it cannot consist

exclusively in pleasurable experiences.

The great philosopher Aristotle taught that happiness is the highest good, because it is the only thing one seeks as an end in itself. Unlike hedonists, he did not equate happiness with pleasure. Instead, he saw it as connected to excellence in living a virtuous life. Just as an athlete or musician finds happiness in performing with skills which have been acquired through much work and even pain, all of us find happiness through perfecting the art of being a good person.

While certain circumstances may make our journey easier, happiness is not ultimately contingent upon external rewards but upon what is developed within.

In the scriptures, we find another important perspective. Affirming that he had discovered how to be content in all circumstances, St Paul exhorted believers at Philippi, “*Rejoice in the Lord always.*

Again I will say, rejoice!” (Philippians 4:4, 11). Not only had Paul developed the disciplines of virtuous living, but he possessed the inner testimony of God’s Spirit which gave meaning to his life even during the most excruciating ordeals. Happiness for Paul, we might say, was not just in living a life consistent with who he was, but also whose he was.

None of us can know what 2019 will bring. Good fortune might await us, but so might heartbreak or tragedy. What we do know is that we can choose to pursue a happiness which exists independently of our circumstances. We can choose to develop a life of virtue.

We can choose to live what we believe. We can also choose to open our spirits to the presence of God who accepts us no matter who else may reject us. We can, in fact, choose to be happy.

NCOA holds change of command

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Noncommissioned officers of the Fort Stewart Noncommissioned Officer Academy held a change of command Jan. 4, 2019. Command Sgt. Maj. Bryan S. Kernen relinquished command to Command Sgt. Maj. Jamie K. Price. Col. Jason A. Wolter, U.S. Army Garrison Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield was the reviewing officer.

Kernen was the 19th commandant of the Fort Stewart NCOA.

He said the job has been a great opportunity to have a profound effect in the training and development of first level leaders.

"It has been my honor and privilege to be part of their training during this pivotal stage in their development as first level leaders," Kernen said.

Kernen took over the struggling operation in Nov. 2015 that faced shutting down. In six months he brought the failing academy up to a TRADOC "academy of excellence." He increased academy capacity by 40 percent. He developed a new physical readiness training program that increased PRT scores by 20 points in just three weeks in every

class for three years. He trained and qualified more than 150 small group leaders – certifying 50 of them with the instructor badge. He planned, equipped and manned the academy to conduct the Master Leadership Course, the first class held in August 2017. Nearly six thousand soldiers were trained under his command here in just over three years. He and his family enter retirement after serving the Army for 29 years.

"Command Sergeant Major Kernen you have left a tremendous legacy that will be carried throughout backbone of the Army," Wolter said.

Price comes to Fort Stewart from the 101st Airborne (Air Assault) Division where he served as the headquarters and headquarters battalion command sergeant major.

"Cmd. Sgt. Maj. Price you have lead and trained Soldiers for nearly 25 years. You are the right man to lead the Army's future leaders in a more lethal tomorrow," Wolter said.

"For me and my experience this is the best job I can have at this point in my career to be able to put a fingerprint on future leaders of the Army," Price said. "I'm able to give back what I've received all these years."
