French Brig. Gen. Hubert Cottereau approved for 3rd Infantry Division

French Brig. Gen. Hubert Cottereau arrived at Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Arifield as part of an initial visit prior to becoming a deputy commanding general for the 3rd Infantry Division.

The Department of the Army approved Cottereau as the first reciprocal general officer military exchange with France, April 19.

The exchange is part of the U.S. Army's Military Personnel Exchange Program.

The program is designed to strengthen bonds of friendship, understanding, and interoperability between the countries and their respective military organizations.

U.S. Army Brig. Gen. Todd Wasmund and Cottereau of France's Land Forces were selected to participate in this first Army reciprocal general officer exchange between the two countries.

Wasmund's assignment will be as the Deputy Commanding General of France's 3rd Armoured

Division, headquartered in Marseilles. The assignment will begin early 2020. Currently, Wasmund is the deputy commanding general for support of the U.S. 1st Infantry Division.

Cottereau begin his assignment as DCG for readiness of the 3rd ID, here on Fort Stewart, later this

Typically, MPEP assignments are from two to three years in length.

This MPEP with the French Army is only the second such reciprocal, general officer for general officer, exchange the U.S. Army currently has in place. The U.S. Army established its first reciprocal general officer MPEP exchange with the United Kingdom in September 2015.

The MPEP program directly supports the Secretary of the Army priority "Allies and Partners." The goal of this priority is to optimize the Army's interoperability with our allies and partners to strengthen alliances and deliver more effective coalition operations.

Raiders provide feedback for JLTV improvements

Raider Brigade recently became the first Army unit equipped with the new Joint Light Tactical Vehicle and spent several days in late April testing and giving feedback on new features as part of the "Big 4" Soldier touchpoint event.

The "Big 4" refers to the new capability added to the truck with these enhancements - increased situational awareness (roughly 250% larger rear windows and the Forward Facing Camera), added muffler, troop seat kit, and the JLTV-trailer. Soldiers took part in the test as drivers, truck commanders, rear seat and troop seat passengers.

The muffler was added to reduce engine noise and make it easier for the crew to communicate, a front facing camera helps ensure operators can better see terrain near the vehicle, especially going over embankments, and the troop seat kit and trailer add to the personnel and cargo carrying capacity and give Soldiers a trailer capable of handling the same increased speed over rough terrain as the JLTV itself.

During the test, Soldiers spent a day going through

convoy operations in the vehicles without the upgrades and then went through the same lanes in vehicles with the upgraded features. Pfc. Allan Muraira said the larger windows were crucial to being able to scan for Improvised Explosive Devices or other hazards during tactical halts.

"My eyes didn't hurt as much because I wasn't straining," said Muraira. "It's hard to see out the smaller window which made it hard to do your fives and 25s without opening the door."

Soldiers also mentioned how the reduced engine noise from the new mufflers made it easier to communicate inside the vehicle.

The most popular feature for the drivers and truck commanders is the front facing camera. Sgt. Daniel Kledzinski said that on the first day of the testing they took the trucks to the wash racks where they were able to drive up the ramps with better visibility to elevate the front of the vehicle and contrast what is seen through the front window and what the camera adds.

It made a world of difference because with the camera you can actually see what you are about to drive over," said Kledzinski.

Kledzinski also said that the noise dampening improved comfort and was less fatiguing, both factors that would be magnified on long convoys or mission.

Two JLTV trailers were used during the testing and in addition to providing feedback on the towing performance, Soldiers were evaluated on how long it took to couple and uncouple the trailers.

Maj. Erika Hanson, Assistant Production Manager for JLTV Systems Integration, said that the decision has already been made to install all JLTVs with the larger windows, camera, and mufflers while the troop seat kit and JLTV trailer are still in the test phase. Raider Soldiers are the first in the Army to field the JLTV and their input is part of an ongoing process in the JLTV fielding program.

"This event is to get Soldier feedback which will be provided to Army Senior Leadership in conjunction with developmental testing at Aberdeen Test Center," said Hanson.

1ABCT Soldiers have fielded a total of over 320 JLTVs since January and have already integrated them into their daily operations. The brigade is currently training up for a January 2020 decisive action rotation to the National Training Center on Fort Irwin, California.

Celebrate Archaeology Month at Stewart

Humans have lived in the area now known as Georgia for more than 12,000 years. Through archaeology, we are able to learn about the lives and achievements of most of them.

Much of what we have learned about history comes from artifacts unearthed through archaeological investigations. In fact, there are 4,200 archaeological sites on Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield.

The Installation's Cultural Resources Management Program manages the Installation's cultural resources, which include archaeological sites, cemeteries and historic buildings. CRM coordinates with trainers, planners, and land managers in protecting significant historic properties, while supporting the Army's mission.

The installation's archeology effort can be divided into two broad categories, prehistoric and historic. Prehistoric sites date from when the first Native Americans settled the area more than 12,000 years ago and extend to when the first Europeans arrived in the new world in the 1500s.

Perhaps one of the most important prehistoric sites on Fort Stewart is the Lewis Mound, a small, unassuming mound of earth nestled in a forest of oak and hickory trees. It is the final resting place of a respected of a Native American leader or possibly a chief. He is believed to have been buried around 1200 AD. Most of the prehistoric pottery at Lewis Mound dates to 1200-1300 and the mound construction dates to that time-period. The Lewis Mound indicates the area was the chief, or his families, permanent residence; with the surrounding areas serving as a seasonal home for his people from the late spring to the fall. No pottery has been found at Lewis Mound that postdates 1425 AD, so the site was almost certainly abandoned at that point. It is unknown what caused the population to abandon the area, although many archaeologists theorize it may have been caused by warfare.

One of the most significant historic sites on Fort Stewart is Fort Argyle, an English military outpost established by General James Oglethorpe in 1733 as a defensive outpost for Savannah against Spanish incursions from Florida or Native American raids from the south and west. Fort Argyle was the first European settlement in the Fort Stewart area. The Fort was used off and on until 1767. Archaeology at Fort Argyle has told us much about the architecture of the fort, its evolution over time, and day-to-day life there.

But the Fort is only part of the early settlements of the area.

On a small bluff overlooking the marsh at Hunter, lies the McNish Cemetery, an early nineteenth century cemetery marking the site of the Hermitage Plantation. Burials at that cemetery date from the 1820s but based on archaeological and historical evidence, the settlement lasted from the 1750s to the 1870s. The plantation originated during the British colonial period and ended shortly after the Civil War. Historical research and archaeological investigation of the site have helped shed some light on the social and economic changes which occurred during this time. The demise of the plantation mirrored the South's declining economic fortunes following the Civil War.

Through proper management, the Installation seeks to understand its rich, wonderful past and responsibly manage its archaeological sites while enabling continuous and necessary combat training for our Soldiers. However, the people who live and work on Stewart-Hunter, are the first line of defense in protecting our installation's numerous archaeological sites

Protecting cultural resources and archaeological sites on the installation is everyone's responsibility.

Way to help.

- Call before digging. Digging, excavation, or any other ground disturbance must be coordinated with range control 435-8154 and the Directorate of Public Work's Environmental Division 767-2010.
- Never disturb artifacts or remove artifacts from their location. You will be in violation of federal law and will be subject to fines and/or jail time.
- If you find artifacts on the installation, notify range control so that they may contact the environmental division. If possible, mark the site and/or take GPS coor-

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Tax center saves more than \$1.2 million in fees with innovative concept

Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield garrison commander, Col. Jason A. Wolter applauded an innovative concept during an award ceremony held at the 3rd Infantry Division Museum April 25, on Fort Stewart.

Developed by the 3rd Infantry Division's Staff Judge Advocate's Office, traditional tax preparation services were expanded to include self-help kiosks with Internal Revenue Service trained tax assistants, to help Soldiers, retirees and their families fill out their own taxes.

"Our focus was not just helping Soldiers prepare their taxes this year," said 3rd ID Staff Judge Advocate, Col. Steven M. Ranieri. "But helping them learn how the process works. Helping them gain confidence. So, in the future, they would feel comfortable doing their own taxes. Overall, it is good financial readiness."

The tax centers opened in early January and closed April 18. During that time, the officer in charge of the tax centers, Capt.

Laura S. Hernandez, said they served 3,176 clients, providing nearly \$4 million in refunds and a cost avoidance of more than \$1.2 million in preparation fees.

The IRS took notice of the success of the Marne Tax Center and the education opportunity offered with the kiosks - supported by tax assistants. Hernandez said the IRS said the Marne Tax centers were among the best in the nation.

"The kiosks provide a unique opportunity to educate and empower the community, while assisting with financial planning," Hernandez said.

Wolter said if you look at the interactive customer evaluations comments that were submitted for this year's tax centers, you would realize the effort the tax center staff put forth to make it a success.

He explained it was great the IRS was considering making the center a best practice and sharing the concept - as imitation is the best form of flattery. But more, he said, the tax center staff should be proud for making a difference and helping the greater community.

Commissaries among best stores

FORT LEE, Virgina – Commissary patrons know the value of their benefit so much so that those who participated in a recent magazine survey rated commissaries among the best grocery stores in the U.S.

In the April 16 edition of Consumer Reports, the Defense Commissary Agency's stores were ranked 12th out of 96 grocery chains rated in a readership survey, a result that confirms the value of the benefit, said retired Rear Adm. Robert J. Bianchi, DOD special assistant for commissary operations.

"It's no secret among our patrons that their commissaries deliver a valuable benefit, especially when it comes to product pricing," Bianchi said. "I'm quite proud of the DeCA team for achieving these results."

DeCA received a score of 86, the same score received by Publix, Costco, Crest, Fareway Stores, and New Seasons Market. The top scores went to Central Market (Texas) with a 91 and Wegmans at 90. Heinen's (Ohio and Chicago) scored 89, and Gelson's (Southern California), Trader Joes and Market Basket (Northeast) were rated at 87.

Commissaries received stellar marks for competitiveness of prices, store cleanliness and variety of international products. They were also noted for checkout speed, meat and poultry quality and store brand quality.

In Consumer Reports' summary description of its top grocery retailers they applauded commissaries for offering "competitive prices for the astounding 38,000 items they sell. Prices here are generally good year-round."

More than 75,000 readers responded to the Consumer Reports survey, which

included their average scoring on stores' cleanliness, competitiveness of pricing, fresh-store prepared foods, staff courtesy, checkout speed, produce quality and variety, meats/poultry quality, store brand quality, selection of healthy options, prices of organic options, duced products, and available variety of international and multicultural products.

Bianchi said the survey validates DeCA's core mission of offering an average of nearly 24 percent savings compared to commercial stores. He also highlighted the following initiatives commissaries are rolling out to ensure the commissary benefit is relevant for its patrons now and in the future:

- Commissary store brands more than 700 items that offer national brand quality at private label prices
- Your Everyday Savings! a program that offers consistent, year-round savings on the items customers buy the most.
- CLICK2GO the ongoing deployment of the commissary's new online ordering, curbside pickup program.
- Health and wellness DeCA's Nutrition Guide Program, an initiative designed in collaboration with dietitians throughout the Department of Defense, identifying nutritious foods with color-coded shelf tags and a thumbs-up icon that indicates high nutrition quality and high performance food.
- Meal solutions meal kits that offer more prepared food options.
- Emerging technologies the ongoing roll out of DeCA's new business system is offering state-of-the art options for digital coupons and will eventually offer electronic receipts and scan-pay-and-go mobile shopping.

"Although we enjoy the publicity from this survey, we are not standing still on our merits," Bianchi said. "Commissaries will continue to improve and evolve so that they can deliver the best possible benefit for our patrons. That's why we exist."



More options for consistent savings

FORT LEE, Virgina - It would be simple for commissaries to slap a savings tag on its items and ignore the marketplace off the installation.

However, through its Your Everyday Savings! (YES!) program, the Defense Commissary Agency is discarding the easy route to ensure its patrons have even more options to save, said Army Command Sgt. Maj. Tomeka N. O'Neal, DeCA's senior enlisted advisor to the agency director.

"With YES! we're providing low prices yearround to help defeat any notion that the commissary benefit isn't the best value for our patrons,"

O'Neal said.

Since the program began in June 2018, YES! has steadily expanded to nearly 800 of the most popular items bought by stateside commissary patrons. Variable pricing makes the program possible, allowing the agency to lower prices on trending items that retailers often reduce temporarily as "loss leaders" to attract customers into their stores hoping they'll buy their higher-priced prod-

Bright orange shelf labels and signs highlight these products on store shelves. These items include popular brands of flavored iced teas, pasta, macaroni and cheese, Spam, vogurt, cereal, oatmeal, baby food, nutritional shakes,

potato chips and other selected snack foods, apple juice, vegetable juice, coffee creamer, coffee, energy drinks, soup, bananas, oranges, tomatoes, avocados, paper towels, toilet tissue, bottled water, dish soap, fabric softener and pet food.

Through the end of March, commissary patrons have embraced the program in a big way with nearly 30 percent of all transactions coming from the YES! inventory.

"This program isn't just a snapshot in time," said Hector Granado, DeCA's marketing director. "We are making YES! prices and savings more consistent for our patrons." He added that the prices for these items can also dip even lower during promotional periods.

It took both teams a while to find their rhythm and team chemistry. Action was slow in the first half but they started to muster some shots on goal and the scoring came sporadically.


