The roots of the Rock

The 3rd Infantry Division command team, Maj. Gen. Lee Quintas and Command Sgt. Maj. Daniel Hendrex, and 27 Soldiers selected from throughout the division took part in the World War I centennial commemoration in France, May 23-29.

The U.S. Center of Military History organized the centennial with the goal of honoring the Soldiers who participated in the war and marks 100 years since the nation's involvement in the conflict. The 1st, 2nd and 3rd infantry divisions participated in the remembrance. The units fought in campaigns in the French countryside.

The 3rd ID Soldiers received daily historical tours to learn the extensive and storied past of the division, visited the site of the division's first two Medal of Honor recipients. Most importantly, they also learned how the unit became known as the Marne Division.

"This week you will learn a lot about the unit's history and lineage and we ask you to keep an open mind and be respectful to the sacrifices those who came before us made," Hendrex said. "We are here to honor them."

Dr. Brian Newman with CMH was assigned as the division historian, and he shared his extensive knowledge of the 3rd ID efforts in the second Battle of the Marne.

Celebrating Heritage through song and dance

BAGRAM AIRFIELD, Afghanistan - Service members and civilians hosted an Asian American Pacific Islander Heritage Month observance celebrating the history, heritage and contributions of Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders to the U.S. military on Bagram Airfield, Afghanistan, May 23. The event featured performances highlighting songs and dances from Samoa, the Philippines, Laos and Thailand that have significance in these cultures.

Sgt. Jessica Munivong, technical support desk noncommissioned officer, and Staff Sgt. Hilda Burt, career counselor, both of Special Troops Battalion, 3rd Infantry Division Resolute Support Sustainment Brigade, performed a traditional Laotian dance for the event.

"If we depart from our homeland and flee far away from her/ we will always have you as our true friend/ as long as we live." This line from the song "Oh! Duang Champa," also known as "The Plumeria Flower," signifies the importance of heritage and home for Soldiers from Laos and Thailand.

"The plumeria is the national flower of Laos and the song is about the love and remembrance of Laos," said Munivong. "Oh! Duang Champa" is to Laotians and Thai what 'America the Beautiful' is to Americans."

Starting off the event was the first of four dances by a group of Samoan Soldiers and civilians. The dancers were high in energy, with whooping and vocalizing from the performers making the dances all the livelier. They sang about their culture in

their native tongue.

"The music itself, it's everything about Samoa, everything about how we live," said Staff Sgt. Bingham Leiataua, the noncommissioned officer in charge of supply for the Joint Network Operations Security Center - Afghanistan, United States Forces - Afghanistan. "A lot of it is from the way we live, prepare meals, take care of our families, the environment, the beauty of Samoa, that was captured in [all of the songs]."

All of the performers were able to teach the people who attended the event a bit about their heritages.

"I think it's important for all of our Soldiers here, it's cultural awareness," said Sgt. Florence Tuetasi, a movement sergeant with the 304th Movement Control Team, 165th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion, 3rd Inf. Div. RSSB. "For us, being Samoan and being from a tiny place in the middle of the ocean on the other side of the world, it means a lot that we can share a piece of us all the way out here."

No matter what part of the world these Soldiers are stationed, they carry their heritage with them. The observance month brought their cultures to the forefront and was a celebration of their personal histories and the history of their fellow brothers- and sisters-in-arms.

"My heritage molds me and forms me as a person because it represents who I am, there are not a lot of Thai in the Army and we're a very tight knit community," said Burt. "It makes me proud of who I am and I try to represent that in everything that I do, and anyone that wants to know more about Thai culture and Thai food I try to bring that to them."

The weeklong events started with a historical terrain walk and guided tour—the guide was personally selected by Newman--to better tell the story of the division's actions during World War I.

First stop was the city of Chateau-Thierry where the Soldiers visited the American Monument, the 3rd ID monument, walked along the Marne River, and visited some of the defensive positions of the 7th Machine Gun Battalion responsible for securing the bridges crossing over the Marne River.

"I wanted to orient the Soldiers to the area and show the defense of Chateau-Thierry by the 7th Machine Gun Battalion as we walked along the north side of the Marne River," Newman said.

After a walking tour through the city of Chateau-Thierry, the next stop was the city of Fossoy. The Soldiers were brought to an expansive field with lush green grass and several farms. To their backs were hills overlooking the meadow below. With a map of the area and the view, Newman talked the Soldiers through the multiple defensive lines of the division.

"I chose this location to show the Soldiers the unit's location south of the Marne, and the defensive system they will implement," said Newman. "I wanted to set the stage for the next location."

The tour pressed on to the town of Moulins, which was the zone of the 38th Infantry Regiment commanded by Col. Ulysses Grant McAlexander, and a hike up Moulins Ridge.

Newman said Moulins Ridge is considered the "Rock of the Marne." McAlexander's decision to hold his defensive position and not withdraw earned him the reference to the rock, which the division eventually adapted at its motto.

"When I heard we where hiking to the 'Rock of the Marne' I was excited," said Staff Sgt. Trevor Crust,

small group leader assigned to Fort Stewart's Non-commissioned Officer Academy. "The hike up the ridge was a surreal experience. To think I'm walking the same path Soldiers 100 years before I did was humbling."

At the Rock of the Marne, the Soldiers gathered around a map depicting the unit's defensive lines, while overlooking the scene below. Newman explained the 38th IR actions on the ridge and significant advantage in battle the position offered.

"I was so inspired at the 'Rock of the Marne,'" Crust said. "Sometime as Soldiers we can lose site of why we do this and the sacrifices others have made before us and it really put everything into perspective. The CG and sergeant major being there gave me a real appreciation for the unit and its heritage."

The 3rd ID conducted an historic event while at the "Rock of the Marne;" three of the recent winners of the Sullivan Cup were promoted there. The cup recognizes the world's best tank crew.

"I don't think they will ever forget the day they got promoted on the actual Rock of the Marne," Hendrex said.


Cpl. Justin Harris, gunner, was promoted to sergeant; and Pvt. Brandon Zacher, loader, and Pvt. Dekken Sanders, driver, were promoted to private first class by the division command team. All are with the 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team.

"I'm happy to be here and serve with my crew," Zacher said. "I want to thank my parents for always pushing me to strive for my best."

Before leaving the historic site and adding to the day's significant events, Quintas wrote the date, his call sign and his name on his own subdued 3rd ID patch and placed it under a rock found at the top of the ridge.

MARNE FACES, MARNE PLACES

Retiring Marne SGM expresses passion in NCO corps

Born and raised in New Iberia, Louisiana, Sgt. Maj. Ryan W. Willis enlisted in the United States Army in 1992 as an automated logistical specialist at the ripe age of 17. His first assignment was with the 3rd Infantry Division at Fort Stewart.

Over two decades later, his career has come full circle. He is retiring this year after 26 years of service as the Marne Division's supply sergeant major.

In between his assignments at Fort Stewart, he has had an impressive career which includes multiple deployments to the Middle East, two tours in the Republic of Korea, an array of unique assignments and a host of key development leadership positions.

For Willis, one thing is abundantly clear – he is markedly passionate about the non-commissioned officer corps.

“As NCOs, we have to make sure we have our seat at the table,” said Willis. “We have to be more than just someone who gets orders and executes. It's imperative that we are a part of the decision making process.”

Willis used the example of military experts that are usually seen on television interviews. He expressed that most of the time he found them to be high-ranking officers.

“You rarely see NCOs or enlisted personnel speaking on behalf of the Army on a national level,” said Willis. “Maybe it's a matter of rebranding the corps and having people get a better understanding of what it is that NCOs bring to the fight.”

Willis noted former Sgt. Maj. of the Army Raymond F. Chandler as an enlisted Soldier who proved how capable and imperative NCOs are to organizations.

“The U.S. Army Sergeants Major Academy always had colonels in the position of commandant,” said Willis. “Until Sergeant Major of the Army Chandler became the first enlisted commandant and successfully held that position for several years.”

“That just goes to show you that we have the opportunities to step up and make things happen and get things accomplished at the same level as our commissioned counterparts,” said Willis.

Willis said instilling greater pride in the NCO corps may inspire young junior Soldiers to stay enlisted and make a career out of it.

“You always hear, ‘Hey Soldier, you're high-speed, why don't you go warrant officer’ or ‘you should go green to gold’,” said Willis. “No! We keep pulling from our greatest. What message does that send?” asked Willis.

Willis said the curriculum for the USASMA is a collegiate-level course, equipped with master degree-level papers and education requirements. He encourages young Soldiers to take advantage of tuition assistance and make time for their civilian education in the infancy of their careers to set themselves up for success.

“It's more than just to set yourself up for after the Army, although that is just as important,” said Willis. “But when you are in a battle-buddy team with an officer who has been to college and then the captain's career course, you'll have a better understanding of the mechanics of the planning process.”

As for life after the Army, Willis plans to use the experience he has gained throughout his tenure, coupled with his zeal for the NCO corps, to trademark the corps in a more positive light. He hopes to inject a better understanding of the corps and their function to those who may not be familiar with an NCO and what they do.

“Words have meaning,” said Willis. “You have officer, you have warrant officers and then you have noncommissioned officer. ‘Non’ before any word in some ways brings about a negative connotation. So someone who doesn't know much about our rank structure might wonder if there's something less than about the enlisted side.”

Willis said one way to combat that is to possibly have an enlisted corps – with privates and specialists, but with junior NCOs being called junior enlisted advisors and senior NCOs having the title of senior enlisted advisor.

Willis is opting out of a traditional Army retirement ceremony, and instead is going on a retirement tour to personally thank those who have made an impact throughout his career.

Garrison chief optimistic for new unit

Fort Stewart garrison commander Col. Jason Wolter thinks growth is likely coming to Fort Stewart.

During last week's Progress Through People Luncheon he said he just returned from Washington, DC, where Fort Stewart was recognized as one of the Army's Communities of Excellence and credited community leaders in attendance for making the post special for the residents and Soldiers.

Wolter said as they look toward next year, Stewart is poised to grow.

“As the Army focuses on readiness and as your Army grows our number one priority is power projection and mobilization,” the colonel said. “And that plays out in deployments as they go out to serve their missions and also in training. There is no place better, definitely east of the Mississippi, than Fort Stewart and its 300,000 acres of training space.”

He said Stewart's location, close to the Savannah Port and having access to the railroad system, means the Army can easily bring in new tanks and training equipment and, possibly, an

additional brigade.

“We are having the conversations about adding a 16th armored brigade combat team,” Wolter said. “Fort Stewart is being considered for the 16th armored brigade combat team... adding a third armored brigade combat team is a phenomenal resource, adding increased capacity and capability for your Army.”

He said community leaders are pushing for the additional brigade and noted Stewart is ready and being considered.

He also said the First Brigade, which has been in Korea, should be back by November. The Combat Aviation and Sustainment Brigade are expected to be home by the Fourth of July.

Wolter also said garrison officials are working on making the post more accessible at each gate.

“It is our focus and intent to make sure that the fence line that is up between us and the community, for security, is not a barrier.”

He said they are bringing back a Fourth of July celebration, which will include a concert featuring 3 Doors Down, games, bounce houses, food and fireworks.

Thursday's luncheon was sponsored by GeoVista Credit Union and hosted by the Liberty County Chamber of commerce.

Seeking specialty care with TRICARE

At some point, you may need specialty care that your primary care manager (PCM) or general physician can't provide. He or she may refer you to a specialty provider, like a cardiologist, dermatologist or obstetrician. Under some TRICARE programs, you may need a referral or prior authorization from your PCM to seek care from a specialty provider.

A referral is when your PCM or provider sends you to another provider for care. You may also need pre-approval, or prior authorization, for coverage of certain care. Prior authorization is a review of a requested health care service by your regional contractor to see if TRICARE will cover it.

Under TRICARE Prime, your PCM provides your routine care. When specialty care is needed, you'll generally need to coordinate with your PCM (or other care coordinator) to see a specialty provider. Under the new rules for TRICARE Prime, your PCM may refer you to a network specialist without approval from your regional contractor. For clinical preventive services, TRICARE Prime beneficiaries can see any network provider within their region. You don't need a referral or authorization.

Without a referral from your PCM, you can get care from any TRICARE-authorized provider. An authorized provider is any individual, institution/organization, or supplier that is licensed by a state, accredited by national organization, or meets other standards of the medical community, and is certified to provide benefits under TRICARE. There are two types of TRICARE-authorized providers: network and non-network., but you'll pay more out of pocket. Your claim will be subject to the point-of-service (POS) option deductible and cost-share (50 percent of the

TRICARE-allowable charge. The maximum amount TRICARE pays for each procedure or service. This is tied by law to Medicare's allowable charges.). POS doesn't apply to active duty service members (ADSMs). POS doesn't apply to clinical preventive care you get from a TRICARE network provider in your region.

ADSMs must get referrals for civilian care. This includes mental health care, specialty care and more. ADSMs also need prior authorizations for all inpatient and outpatient specialty services.

If you have TRICARE Prime and you live within a one-hour drive of a military hospital or clinic, your provider may refer you for specialty care at that facility. You may get travel reimbursement if referred for specialty care more than 100 miles away from your provider's office.

There is no referral requirement for urgent care visits, except for ADSMs enrolled to a military hospital or clinic. POS deductibles and cost-shares don't apply when you get urgent care from a TRICARE network provider or a TRICARE-authorized (network or non-network) urgent care center or convenience clinic. Referrals aren't required for most services under TRICARE Select.

Under TRICARE Prime and TRICARE Select, certain services need prior authorization. Some providers may contact your regional contractor to get you prior authorization. Prior authorizations apply to services like:

- Hospice care
- Home health care services
- Extended Care Health Option covered services
- Applied behavior analysis for autism spectrum disorder

Your PCM will work with your regional contractor for referrals and prior authorizations as needed. For more information, visit your regional contractor's website and the referrals and authorization page on the TRICARE website.

CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

We celebrate Memorial Day

A memorial is something designed to preserve the memory of a person or event. Monday was Memorial Day. We honor men and women who died while serving in the U.S. military. Originally known as Decoration Day, it originated in the years following the Civil War and became an official federal holiday in 1971. While I was deployed to Iraq in 2010-2011, our unit lost two Soldiers. Each year as those tragic days have gone by on the calendar, I have naturally remembered those Soldiers with sincere contemplation and deep respect.

We celebrate Memorial Day lest we forget our fallen Soldier's ultimate sacrifices for our freedom. I once volunteered to speak at a high school's JROTC class. I wore my Class A's and spoke with them about being a chaplain in the U.S. Army. In the Q and A portion of my talk, a young man asked me if I was scared when I went to Iraq. I answered him that I'm sure I was, but I didn't really think about it because I had a job to do - take care of my Soldiers' spiritual needs. No doubt, military service men and women who paid the

ultimate price had a strong sense of love and duty for the United States of America.

Appropriate here is the reading of the Gettysburg Address written by President Abraham Lincoln in November 1863. It honors the fallen who "gave the last full measure of devotion" at the Battle of Gettysburg several months earlier. This speech is engraved in stone at the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C., and is arguably the best speech ever written in American history. Note its pointedness, honesty and clarity:

"Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent, a new nation, conceived in Liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal. Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation, or any nation so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure. We are met on a great battle-field of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field, as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting

and proper that we should do this.

But, in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate -- we cannot consecrate -- we cannot hallow -- this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it, far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note, nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us -- that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion -- that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain -- that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom -- and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

Let us pray for all of our fellow Soldiers that are deployed throughout the world and honor the memory and sacrifice of those who have gone before us.

Barbeque Safety

With Memorial Day weekend just passed, a lot of people will be doing an American favorite, barbequing chicken, hotdogs, steaks and vegetables, and don't forget the s'mores. Friends and family will gather and play outside while someone is grilling up a feast.

As much fun as it is, an accident could ruin it all. A football thrown too close to the grill could accidentally hit the cook or grill and send the hot coals flying onto the ground or on someone. So to keep those memories happy please follow the tips below.

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep children and pets away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- Never leave your grill unattended.

Before you use your grill, make sure you do the following:

Check the major connection points between the gas (propane) tank hose and the regulator and cylinder, and where the hose connects to the burners. Tighten if loose.

Check the gas (propane) tank hose for the potential (gas) leaks. To do that:

- Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose using a brush or spray bottle.
- Turn the propane tank on. If there is a gas leak, the propane will release bubbles around the hose (big enough to see).
- If there are no bubbles, your grill is safe to use.
- If there are bubbles, turn off the tank and check connections, then have your grill serviced by a professional before using it again.
- If the leak doesn't stop, call the fire department immediately.

When the grill is on:

- As you are cooking, if you smell gas, turn off the gas tank and burners.
- If the leak stops immediately, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it

again.

- If the smell continues, move away from the grill and call the fire department immediately. Do not move the grill.

Charcoal grills

- There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

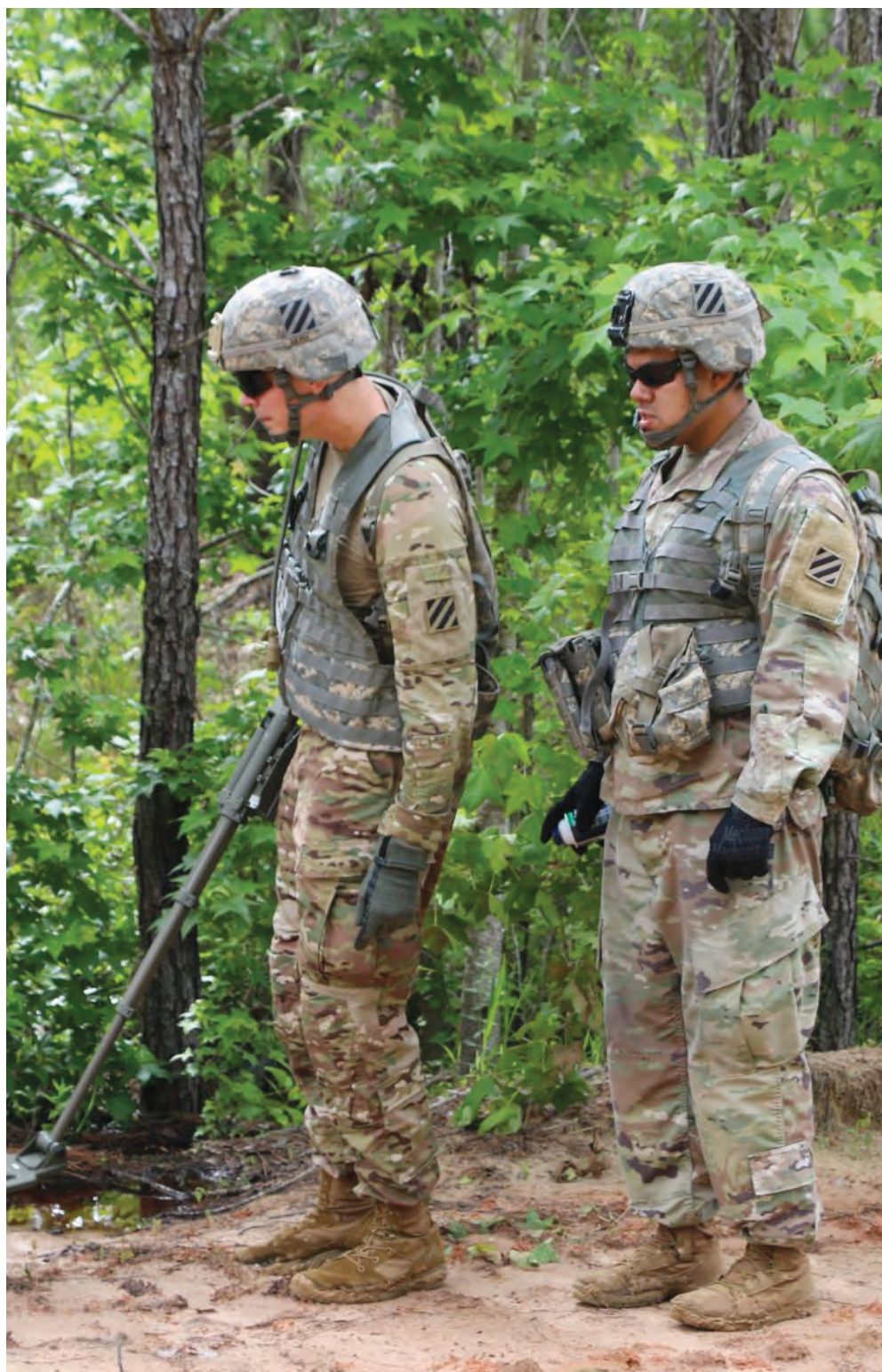

With the NBA Finals kicking off on May 31 and the league allowing teams to sell ad space on uniforms as of 2017, estimated to generate \$100 million to \$150 million in yearly revenue, the personal-finance website WalletHub today released its report on 2018's Best & Worst Cities for Basketball Fans. To find the best cities for professional- and college-basketball fans, WalletHub compared more than 290 of the largest cities across 21 key metrics, ranging from the performance level of each city's NBA and NCAA Division 1 basketball teams to ticket prices to stadium accessibility. **Best vs. Worst** New Orleans has the lowest average ticket price for an NBA game, \$30.20, which is 3.2 times less expensive than in New York, the city with the highest at \$97.77. lowest at 16.87 percent. Miami, Fla., has the highest fan engagement for NBA teams, 47.08, which is 34.1 times higher than in New York, the city with the lowest at 1.38. Summer safety

Water safety - To prevent drowning, avoid alcohol when swimming or boating. Wear a lifejacket whenever you are on a boat. Make sure young children are supervised at all times when near the beach, on a boat, or by a pool or hot tub. Don't swim alone or in bad weather. Learn to swim and teach your children to swim. We also recommend that you learn CPR in case of an emergency.

Sun safety - Protect against sunburn and heat stroke. Wear sunscreen with at least a sun protection factor 15 or higher and apply it generously throughout the day. Wear a hat outdoors and a good pair of sunglasses to protect your eyes. Drink plenty of water, especially when in the sun or if you are sweating heavily. If you feel faint or nauseous, get into a cool place immediately.

Travel safety - Do not drink and drive or travel with anyone who has been drinking. Take along a first aid kit to help you be prepared for common emergencies. Wear your seatbelt at all times. Make sure your vehicle has been properly serviced and is in good working shape before a long road trip. Familiarize yourself with your surroundings if you are in an unfamiliar place and know where the nearest emergency room is. Also, avoid talking or texting on a cell phone while driving.
