New gate hours scheduled at Stewart-Hunter

Based on increased Department of the Army Security Guard capacity and increased traffic on both Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield, the Directorate of Emergency Services working in conjunction with the Fort Stewart/Hunter Army Airfield Garrisons announce the following new access control point hours that take effect beginning Oct. 29.

ACP hours at Fort Stewart:

ACP 1 is the main gate at Gulick Avenue and Bultman Ave., Monday through Sunday, is open 24 hours daily.

ACP 2 is located at Bultman Ave. and East 4th Street, Monday through Friday, 5 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

ACP 3 is the Southern Oaks gate is located at Old Sunbury Road and Harmon Ave., Monday through Friday, 5 a.m. to 9 p.m. For weekends and training holidays, 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.

ACP 4 is the 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team gate on Georgia Highway 144 and Vanguard Rd., is open Monday through Sunday, 24/7.

ACP 4C is the 2ABCT tactical vehicle/commercial gate, on GA144 and Old Sunburry Rd., Monday

through Friday, 5 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

ACP 5 is the back gate on GA Hwy 144 and GA Hwy 119, open daily, 24/7.

ACP 7 is the west gate at West 15th St. and West 6th St., Monday through Friday, 5 a.m. to 9 p.m.

ACP 7C is the commercial gate on West 15th St. It is open Monday through Friday, 5 a.m. to 5 p.m.

ACP 8 is on Veterans Parkway and is open Monday through Friday, 5 a.m. to 9 p.m. and on weekends and training holidays 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.

ACP 9 at Wright Army Airfield is open daily, 24/7. The Visitor Control Center is located by ACP1 and is open 5 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday, and on Sunday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

ACP hours at Hunter Army Airfield

Montgomery Street Gate is open 24 hours daily. Wilson Gate is open 5 a.m. to 9 p.m. weekdays, and 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. on weekends and training holidays. Rio Gate is open 24 hours daily

3CAB prepares response force mission

"We are engaged in Blackhawk and Chinook load out as part of our emergency deployment readiness exercise," said Sgt. 1st Class Josue Perez-Perez, a platoon sergeant for Company B, 603rd Aviation Support Battalion. "This training prepares us for any mission to include the DCRF mission."

Perez trained about 39 Soldiers in the emergency deployment readiness exercise and received positive feedback from the Soldiers about the training.

"They actually loved it, for some Soldiers it was their first time on a military airplane as they took off with the aircraft which they loaded on the C-17s themselves," said Perez. "For them it felt like they were doing a mission in real time."

Spc. Austin Rutherford, a CH-47 Chinook mechanic for Company B, 603rd Aviation Support Battalion, has been in his unit for two years and even though he has done the training before he still continued to learn.

"This is my second time conducting this training," said Rutherford. "I was able to get good hands on training and was able to see every step taken from the most senior in the training down to the junior level."

Rutherford continues to train and remain ready.

"I get a lot out of the training," said Rutherford. "I will be able to help out a lot more with the knowledge I get from this session alone allowing me to be mission ready."

Raider Brigade completes mission in Korea

The 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division officially handed over the mission as the rotational armored brigade combat team in Korea to the 3rd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 1st Armored Division, during a ceremony at Camp Humphreys, Korea, Oct. 22.

The ceremony, between Raider and Bulldog brigades, was the conclusion of a deliberate and detailed month long transition designed to maintain the "Fight Tonight" capability of the rotational force. During the nine-month rotation, Raiders served as the only armored force on the Peninsula.

"The armored brigade combat team is the most lethal formation in our Army," said Maj. Gen. D. Scott McKean, commander, 2nd Infantry Division / ROK – U.S. Combined Division. "Bringing fire, maneuver, shock effects to dominate any battlefield it may encounter."

McKean said that the Raider Soldiers arrived during a time when the clouds of war were looming and performed at a high level during their nine-month mission deterring North Korean aggression and maintaining the U.S. – Republic of Korea alliance.

"The Raiders came in with a combat focus and they were ready to fight," said McKean. "Each battalion throughout their tour maximized readiness and remained steady and ready as directed by our commander General Brooks."

Col. Mike Adams, commander of the Raider Brigade, opened his remarks by thanking the local community and Republic of Korean Army partners before reflecting on the nine-month rotation.

"We arrived in February during a time of heightened tensions and have witnessed historic developments during our time here supporting the Second Infantry Division," said Adams, "Through it all we maintained a focus on training and mastering our fundamental warfighting skills and being ready for any mission."

Adams went on to highlight the achievements of the brigade which had battalions stationed at multiple installations south and north of Seoul. During the tour, Raider Soldiers dominated the 2nd ID and Eighth Army Best Warrior Competitions, earned the expert field medical badge, represented the division at the Sullivan Cup, competed in the military intelligence and best medic competitions, ran on the installation ten miler teams, graduated hundreds of future sergeants from the Whitman Non-Commissioned Officer Academy, and qualified their tank and Bradley crews.

"All these individual and team achievements don't happen in a vacuum," said Adams. "They are the results of officer led, NCO ran, professional organization."

The Raider Brigade was the fifth rotational brigade in Korea since the permanently stationed armored brigade was deactivated in 2015. The rotation also marked the first time since the Korean War that units from the 3rd ID have been assigned to Korea.

The RIP / TOA also marked the first exchange of equipment between rotational forces. The legacy equipment from the permanently stationed ABCT had been used until the Bulldog Brigade brought their vehicles from Fort Bliss, Texas.

According to an Eighth Army press release, the exchange of equipment allows for proper maintenance and service of the old equipment and aligns our deployed forces with current Army-wide modernization and readiness efforts.

Hunter Army Airfield will host their annual Trunk or Treat on Tuesday from 6-8 p.m. at Saber Hall on South Perimeter Road.



Beware of 'hijacked' webcam scams

QUANTICO, VA. - U.S. Army Criminal Investigation Command is warning individuals to be on the lookout for cybercriminals who are attempting to blackmail victims with compromising videos.

According to Special Agents with CID's Computer Crime Investigative Unit (CCIU), the scam involves criminals claiming to have remotely accessed victim's personal computers, hijacked their webcam, and captured compromising videos of the victims and even their families. The criminals threaten to release the videos if they don't receive a "ransom."

"This scam relies on shock value and exploits our innate human forgetfulness thus allowing cybercriminals to exploit their victim's conscience," said CCIU Director Special Agent Daniel T. Andrews. "It also capitalizes on people's fear of public embarrassment and the even more frightening prospect of ruined professional standing in the community and with employers."

Andrews further explained that the cybercriminals threaten to send the compromising video to your spouse, relatives, friends, and/or your employer; however, in exchange for a payment, the criminal will offer to destroy the video and tell no one.

"This is a scam. Do not send any payment to the blackmailer even if you receive an email specifically addressed to you," Andrews said. "Sometimes the email includes one or more of your real usernames and seems to directly target you."

Although this may be alarming, keep in mind that it's not difficult to figure out your username – as it might be part of your email address. This blackmail scam may even seem convincing when it includes one of your current or former passwords, according to agents.

CCIU agents suggest that individuals take the necessary precautions by covering the device's webcam, updating the software and hardware with the latest version, running automatic updates, turning on a firewall and using another device to change passwords.

Something as simple as covering your webcam lens with something you can't see through will prevent the camera from capturing anything but it should not be the only thing you do. Some other basic security practices are to invest in strong security software, be careful of opening links or attachments sent via email or through social media networks, use and enable two-factor authentication, and backup your data in the event you need to restore your device to its original settings.

Additionally, protect your sensitive data, log out of your profile, and never leave your device unattended.

"Always remember that everyone is a target to hackers. Remain vigilant and protect yourself," said Christopher Grey, CID's spokesman. "If you believe you are at risk or the threat is genuine, contact your local law enforcement agency or report the incident to the Internet Crime Complaint Center at *https://www.ic3.gov/default.aspx*."

Seasonal challenges with autumn driving

Fall began Sept. 23 as the leaves begin to turn, and bring on changes in weather and the end of daylight saving times, Nov. 4. It will get darker sooner and leaves on the streets and roadways, may cause slippery driving conditions.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration offers tips at *www. nhtsa.gov*. Some basic advice includes:

- Stay Alert: The end of the daylight saving time results in reduced visibility, which can create unfamiliar driving conditions. Even on familiar roads, it's important to use additional precautions and adjust driving to the weather conditions. Watch for pedestrians, cyclists and construction workers or emergency personal who could be less visible, especially during the morning.
- Check tire pressure: With frequent weather and temperature changes, tires can expand and contract causing them to lose air pressure. Always ensure tires are properly inflated and have plenty of tread in accordance with manufacturer directions.

- Avoid sun glare: With the change in time you may need to adjust to the different morning or late afternoon glare from the sun. The glare can cause reflections off car windows and hoods and decrease your visibility. Have a good pair of sunglasses readily available to counter daytime glare, and consider lenses with anti-reflective coating at night. Clean the inside of you windows, as well as the outside.
- Plan ahead for wet conditions: Autumn often brings rain, which can decrease visibility and cause hydroplaning. Make sure your windshield wipers are in good working condition; clear any leaves from them before driving. If driving on a road with standing water, slow down and avoid sudden movement of the steering wheel or brake pedal. If you feel like your floating on the road, don't panic. Steer straight and gently release the gas pedal until you feel the tires make contact with the roadway again. In a heavy downpour you may want to pull off the road until it's safe to continue. It is far better to arrive a few minutes late, than not at all.





VA aids vets at Georgia Pride event

ATLANTA - The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs hosted a booth during the Atlanta Pride Festival, Oct. 12-14 in Piedmont Park to inform veterans about the resources provided to the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender communities.

The VA displayed a banner advertising the crisis support hotline for Veterans and active-duty Soldiers who attended. VA representatives provided pamphlets and magnets noting information and resources for their use.

"A lot of our military Veterans and active-duty Soldiers are LGBT," said Otema Ansong, a VA volunteer. "It's important to continue to show our support, not just at Pride events, but abroad and overseas."

The event ended with a parade and this year the festival attracted more than 100,000 people according to CBS46 news. It was unclear how many Veterans and Soldiers attended.

"Pride is important because it's about being open and able to be yourself," said CJ, a 3ID Soldier who identifies as gay who attended the festival, but asked to remain anonymous due to his perceptions regarding the climate between the community and military.

In Oct. 2016, the Army changed its policy on who may serve based on sexual orientation. Transgender Soldiers are now allowed to serve openly according to Army Directive 2016-35.

The VA is especially concerned about transgender Soldiers and Veterans, noting transgender Soldiers and veterans exhibit higher suicide rates than their heterosexual counterparts.

According to a study from the American Journal of Public Health, at *https://ajph.aphapublications.org/doi/full/10.2105/AJPH.2013.301507*, the rate of suicide-related events among Gender Identity Disorder-diagnosed Veterans Health Administration Veterans was more than 20 times higher than were rates for the general VHA population.

A determined mind knows no excuses

A Virginia Beach, Virginia native, Sgt. Matthew Bates of Troop A, 6th Squadron, 8th Cavalry Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division faced two significant challenges on July 7, 2017, during his Ranger pre-qualification course experience. The course required then-Pfc. Bates to lead a team of random Soldiers during the pre-qualification course.

Bates felt extreme pain in his foot while conducting a ruck march and suspected that it was broke. He knew the injury could affect his teammate's capabilities to pass the course.

"Ranger pre-qualification is all about the team," said Bates. "You can't worry about yourself. You have to make sure everyone is okay. If I left to get my foot checked out, my teammates would have had to carry my weight in addition to their own. I would only be making their day worse."

Ranger pre-qualification course was not an easy task to complete. Completing the course with a significant injury takes that difficulty to another level.

"I couldn't tell that my foot was broke during that exact moment because I was so exhausted and hungry while walking," said Bates. "I couldn't walk anymore because of the pain. I tried to sleep it off for 30 minutes, and when I woke up my foot was swollen."

Bates feared medical removal from the course; however, he felt a responsibility to his teammates.

Soldiers who volunteered for training faced sleep deprivation and limited rations for the duration of the course, spent 60 to 90 days honing their tactical skills in the field, and ruck marched through the swamps of Georgia and Florida with gear weighing between 60-120lbs. All of the austere conditions are designed to filter out the weak. Only the best pass and move on to Ranger School.

Bates knew he needed to see a doctor, but hid his injury from the medics, so he would not be recycled. He didn't want that to happen, so he tightened the lace on his boot and didn't change his sock for a week and a half to complete the final phase.

Bates successfully completed the course, but before heading back to Fort Benning for the graduation ceremony, he went to the emergency room.

"A medical doctor at Eglin Air Force base confirmed I broke my foot in three places with x-rays during the Florida Phase," said Bates.

"Sgt. Bates has the heart of a lion and pushes himself beyond his limitations continuously," said Spc. Brayan Hincapie, Headquarters, and Headquarters Troop, 6-8 CAV, 2ABCT. "I'm not surprised that he completed school with a broken foot. I remember our land navigation course, he carried the M240 weapon. When the team asked him to hand it off, he didn't give it to anyone. He just kept on trucking."

Sgt. 1st Class Patrick Finn, Bates' platoon sergeant, echoed Hincapie's sentiments, saying he was impressed with Bates' sheer determination to complete the course with an injury.

"Sgt. Bates is mentally and physically tough and takes charge [to] assist everyone in the platoon on physical fitness," Finn said. "When he called and informed me of his broken foot, I thought he would need some time to recover, but he continued on. I'm impressed."

Up next for Bates is a permanent change of station to Hawaii later this month. He intends to apply to the Special Forces after processing into his new unit.

Marne Air shelter aircraft from Hurricane Michael

Soldiers from 4th Battalion, 3rd Aviation Regiment, 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division sheltered their aircraft Oct. 10, at Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield.

Marne Air Soldiers sheltered their aircraft in hangars in preparation for Hurricane Michael, which is the second hurricane 3rd CAB prepared for.

"We are sheltering our aircraft in hangars in preparation for Hurricane Michael to ensure the safety of the aircraft, making sure no damages occur due to flying debris from tropical storm force winds or higher," said Chief Warrant Officer 4 Cody Grow, a production control officer for 4th Battalion, 3rd Aviation Regiment.

Grow has 14 years of experience in flying UH-60 Blackhawks. He expressed the importance of sheltering the aircraft.

"There is always a possibility to do follow-on missions to help Americans that might be affected by the hurricane," Grow said. "It is good for us to keep our aircraft sheltered and safe sowe are ready to do these mission."

Marne Air Soldiers sheltered their aircraft prior to assume the Army's Defense Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear and Explosive Response Force mission Nov. 1.

Approximately 75 aircraft have been sheltered in hangars for safety which can take some time.

"The process of sheltering aircraft, is to get the aircraft into a hangar as close as possible to each other without doing damage to the aircraft while moving them in place," said Grow. "In order to do this, we have a seven-man team which consist of six people guiding and securing the aircraft and the seventh person typically a leader who takes charge of the movement to ensure the safety protocols are followed."

Marne Air Soldiers have built in muscle memory when it comes to hurricanes and always remain ready.

"So, we actually sheltered the aircraft on numerous occasions over the passed three years," Grow said. "The Soldiers are very prepared for it. They know to take their time and not rush the process to ensure safety is forefront."

The process of sheltering an aircraft inside a hangar can take 15 to 20 minutes and with 75 or more aircraft the 3CAB still makes it look easy.

"We are sheltering our aircraft. We prioritizing the aircraft that are mission ready and able to go out in case of follow-on missions," said Spc. Rachel Ramey, an UH-60 Blackhawk mechanic for 4th Battalion,. "The process is going pretty smooth, to the common eye it looks chaotic but that is just the everyday life.

Marne Air Soldiers conduct air MEDEVAC training

Marne Air Soldiers prepare to assume the Army's Defense Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear and Explosive Response Force mission Nov. 1. The Soldiers will respond and act as first responders in times of natural disasters by providing aide and alleviate human suffrage.

"We conducted hoist operations on our UH-60M, medical Blackhawk, in a simulated flooded urban environment at the training center," said Capt. Jillian O'Hara, a platoon leader for Company C, 2-3 Avn. "This training that we conducted has helped prepare us for the upcoming DCRF mission."

Marne Air Soldiers sprung into action after they conducted an aerial survey of the flooded urban area. Homes were severely flooded and cars were submerged to the point where only the top of the roofs were visible.

"Two of our UH-60 went right into hoist operation, they got their stable hover of 100ft and above over the city," said O'Hara. "They identified the patient, then the crew chief and the medic called out to pilots where to position the helicopter. The crew chief lowers the medic down to pick up the patient."

The helicopter teams were able to rescue 30 simulated patients from the flooded urban area keeping safety in the forefront of their minds.

"Overall the training went well, every patient was saved and every Soldier was safe during the training," said O'Hara. "I think the training definitely opened our eyes of what to potentially expect while assuming this DCRF mission, this also allow us to build future training plans around the training we conducted."

The Army provides realistic and demanding training opportunities for units and Soldiers to become proficient in military operations.

"The training was tough and challenging, it pushed the envelope of comfort for both pilots and medics, performing the rescue, and crew chief, who is operating the hoist," said Sgt. 1st Class Billy Raines, a flight medic for Co. C. "This training has built confidence in their individual skills and this training has reinforced their skills to be mission ready.
