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Fort Stewart hosts housing town hall

Fort Stewart leadership held a Housing town hall at the installation's main post chapel May 22 to share information regarding actions taken since Stewart's initial town hall Feb. 28.

3rd Infantry Division Commander, Maj. Gen. Lee Quintas said town halls were part of a process to address since the housing crisis surfaced in February, when Secretary of the Army Mark Esper and Sergeant Major of the Army Daniel Dailey, were interviewed by CBS Evening News by Chip Reid, regarding housing conditions on military installations. During that interview, Esper apologized about the condition of thousands of military houses, which are maintained by private contractors. Which was followed by Esper called for a Bill of Rights for housing residents and installation leaders to help address issues on the respective installations.

Since then, Quintas and the installation leadership initiated a system to identify the extent of the community issues, to track and resolve the issues and provide a quality assurance to customers.

Quintas and unit leaders have since held town halls on both Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield to provide community members an opportunity to have an active voice in the process and develop a continuous process to address the issues, with a focus on quality assurance and customer satisfaction.

Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield Garrison Commander, Col. Jason Wolter, elaborated on what has been done since the first town hall, starting with unit leadership and government housing teams visiting every home to perform an assessment with residents' consent, which included 2,706 residences on Fort Stewart and 698 on Hunter Army Airfield.

Wolter said more than 1,000 work orders were submitted and completed from those assessments. Adding the installation performed more than 100 follow-ups regarding customers concerns voiced at Stewart's previous town hall. Wolter explained the process has helped increase the work order throughput completion rate by 13%.

Cheryl Sutton, Balfour Beatty's Community Manager for Fort Stewart was also on-hand to help explain BBC actions, which included hiring five additional staff members including maintenance technicians and quality control specialist as well as a resident engagement specialist.

BBC began renovations of 38 buildings in the North and South Bryan Village and has scheduled the demolition of 136 older homes in Isenhower Village to be completed in 2019 and are in the process of conducting a housing market analysis for Stewart and Hunter. They've also expanded self-help, with the resources available there tracked on the installation website at *https://home.army.mil/stewart/* *application/files/2015/5671/7478/ FreeHousingSupplies.pdf.* The website also has a newsletter. BBC also adopted a web application, called Resident Café, which can be used to pay bills, initiate and track work orders and view planned community events. The can be downloaded from Google and iTunes.

Community members can also call in their work orders using their three-part quality control process. Once you identify an issue you can call 912-408-2467 or for maintenance at 408-2466. For Marne Point, 408-2501. If the issue isn't resolved or you aren't satisfied, call the BBC Cares helpline at 877-253-6988. For step 3, if the issue is unsolved, call the housing office at 767-7852. But if you feel you need to talk to someone, the command has created a hotline at 767-5770. The email hotline is usarmy.stewart.usag.mbx. fsga-haaf-housing-support@mail.mil.

Before closing out the town hall a question and answer session was offered, identifying additional concerns by community members that ranged from on-post speeding, parking, yard maintenance and child supervision. Quintas said he appreciated the feedback.

"The foundation to all this, is safety," Quintas said, adding the process in making things better benefited from community members sharing their insight.

Installation, first responders test emergency response

Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield held active-shooter response exercise May 16 as part of an on-going evaluation of the installation crisis management plan; which culminates with the annual Stewart Guardian Exercise in August.

Directorate of Plans, Training, Mobilization and Security's Plans Chief Roy Lintz, said the overarching concept for the crisis management plan was to ensure the installation was ready for any contingency. Throughout the year, the installation, runs exercises to evaluates available resources, training, and staff coordination on-post and with community partners.

Other training events throughout the year included an installation barrier exercise in January, an energy resilience readiness exercise in March, a hurricane table-top exercise in April and several community planning sessions with community partners.

But the day's exercise was an active shooter scenario held at a former elementary school.

"If you look at the news, active-shooter scenarios are a tragic reality around the world," said Lintz. He said they can happen anywhere, in homes, shopping plazas, churches or even schools. He said using the old Brittin Elementary School on Fort Stewart offered first responders an exceptional challenge with more than 85,000 square-feet of space to help secure, search and clear and coordinate assistance.

The event logistics' coordinator, Tony Barry, added realism with role players provided by the 3rd Brigade Support Battalion, 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team and 1st Battalion, 64th Armored Regiment, 1st ABCT. As well as the active-shooter, portrayed by DPTMS employee Alvin Thompson. Rob Floyd from the installation's training Support Center also enhanced the realism by operating a 120 decibel gunfire-simulator.

During the exercise military police from the 549th Military Police Company and emergency responders from the Directorate of Emergency Services and emergency medical services at Winn Army Community Hospital, were able to secure the facility, remove the threat, and help coordinate medical assistance provided by Winn Army Community Hospital's Emergency Medical Services.

DoDEA Americas Southeast District Maintains AdvancED Accreditation

ALEXANDRIA, VIRGINIA - An external accreditation team of 22 highly skilled educators from AdvancED recently confirmed the Department of Defense Education Activity Americas Southeast District's accreditation during recent school visits February 24 - March 8.

AdvancED is an accrediting organization that conducts rigorous, on-site external reviews of Pre-K-12 schools to ensure that all learners realize their full potential. Using a set of rigorous research-based standards, the accreditation process examines the whole school district -programs, cultural context, and the community stakeholders to determine how well the parts work together to meet the needs of the students.

They reviewed the evidence and conducted over 700 classroom observations and facilitated interviews with over 1,700 participants to include administrators, faculty, staff, students, parents, and command groups in the Southeast District.

"This was our first System Accreditation

Review as a Southeast District, where we were rated against very high and rigorous AdvancED Performance Standards," said Dr. Christy Huddleston, DoDEA Americas Southeast District Superintendent. "The results of this report are through the collective efforts of our employees, students, parents, and community stakeholders. I am very proud of our teachers, support staff, and school administrators who provide high-quality education to our military-connected students, as evidenced by the results of our external Engagement Review. I am particularly proud that the results from the classroom observations revealed that our students experience an equitable learning environment and a digital learning environment at a rate higher than the AdvancED Improvement Network averages."

Through a comprehensive review of evidence and information, the AdvancED Engagement Review Team gains a broad understanding of the school system's quality. AdvancED provides the Index of Quality as a holistic measure of overall performance based on a comprehensive set of standards and review criteria. Collectively, the Southeast District Office and schools were rated 'Meets and Exceeds Expectations' in 25 out of 31 AdvancED Performance Standards. As a result, the Index Educational Quality (IEQ) Score earned by the district and schools is 355.48 as compared to the AdvancED Institutional Network five-year average - 283.33.

The accreditation process involves three ongoing components: (1) meeting high-quality standards; (2) implementing a continuous process of improvement; and (3) engaging in quality assurance through internal and external review.

The district's accreditation is for a fiveyear term with regular monitoring of progress and reporting occurring during the term.

"In addition to recognizing areas of excellence, the AdvancED team also identified areas for potential growth, particularly in the engagement of parents and community stakeholders," said Dr. Huddleston. "This summer at the Southeast Summer Leadership Conference, we are evaluating our district and community plans to incorporate the recommendations from the report." The Southeast District includes 25 schools located at Fort Benning, Georgia; Fort Campbell, Kentucky; Fort Jackson, South Carolina, Fort Knox, Kentucky; Fort Rucker, Alabama; Fort Stewart, Georgia, Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama; and Marine Corps Air Station Beaufort, South Carolina.

The Southeast community superintendents for Georgia/Alabama, Dr. Lisa B. Coleman; Dr. Youlanda Washington for Kentucky, and Kathleen Reiss for South Carolina-Fort Jackson and Fort Stewart are committed to continuous improvement by collaboratively implementing processes to ensure opportunities for every learner to realize their full potential.

CID warns community about social media impersonation of Soldier accounts

QUANTICO, Virginia – U.S. Army Criminal Investigation Command's Computer Crime Investigative Unit is once again warning Soldiers and the Army community to be on the lookout for "social media scams" where cybercriminals impersonate service members by using actual and fictitious information, not just for "trustbased relationship scams," also known as romance scams, but for other impersonation crimes such as sales schemes and advance fee schemes.

"By monitoring your social media identity, you can protect your Army family and your reputation," said Special Agent Marc Martin, deputy director of operations for CCIU. "The criminals will use factual data from official websites and Soldiers' personal social media sites, then prey on vulnerable people's trusting nature and willingness to help the Soldier."

Frequently, CID receives notifications from individuals stating they were scammed online by someone claiming to be a Soldier, but in reality it was an online scammer who has used an unsuspected Soldier's name and available social media photos to commit a crime.

No one is immune from becoming a victim. Scammers steal the identity of senior officers, enlisted personnel, contractors and civilians. Scammers, using this infor-

mation from legitimate profiles, will capitalize on the trustworthy reputation of individuals associated with the Army.

According to Martin, CCIU has seen a resurgence of scammers using fake Common Access Cards, a "smart" card that is the standard identification for active duty personnel, Selected Reserve, DOD civilian employees, and eligible contractor personnel. Scammers use the cards to give their ruse a greater level of legitimacy.

"Using a fake CAC is not a new tactic," said Martin. "At first glance it could look almost legitimate, but if you look closely you will notice errors such as incorrect pay grades and other inaccurate markings."

Another recent scam that is gaining steam begins when a Soldier receives a letter in the mail demanding money or embarrassing information about him/her will be released to their spouse. The letter purports to be from someone who knows the Soldier and the sender claims to have information that if released to their spouse, will be very humiliating. The sender does not identify any specific misconduct or crime in the letter and demands large payments in Bitcoin or they will expose the alleged secret to the Soldier's spouse, family and friends.

Mitigating fraudulent social media accounts can simply start with searching for your name on various social media platforms. Since scammers may use your photo but change the name, you should also conduct an image search of your social media profile pictures.

If you find yourself or a Family member being impersonated online, CID warns that you should take immediate steps to have the fraudulent sites removed. Victims should immediately contact the social media platform (company) and report the false profile.

Keep in mind that criminals create impersonation accounts to look just like the real account of a service member by using very similarly spelled names and replacing characters with dashes, spaces, and/or homoglyph characters. Be on the lookout for simple changes such as zeros (0) used instead of the letter "O" or a number one (1) instead of the letter "l."

"Always remember that effectively searching yourself requires creativity because of the misspelled names and other identifying information slightly different to disguise the criminal activity or just because the scammer doesn't have command of the English language," CID officials said. "Criminals will hijack photographs found on the Soldiers official and personal social media page and create a similar or identical biography."

Officials also warned that impersonations can be classified as confidence based/romance relationship, sales schemes or advance fee schemes.

Task Force 1-28 supports West Point cadet training

WEST POINT, New York -- The barracks have been cleaned, the equipment has been delivered and the Soldiers from Task Force 1-28th Infantry, 3rd Infantry Division have officially arrived to lead Cadet Summer Training at the U.S. Military Academy.

The task force is based out of Fort Benning, Georgia, but to meet the needs of summer training Soldiers have also come from Forts Bragg, Campbell and Stewart.

At the peak parts of the summer, 1,200 Soldiers will be based at Camp Natural Bridge to support summer training.

The task force received its official orders in January and the last five months have been spent planning to move more than a thousand Soldiers and their equipment to West Point. Multiple tanks, Humvees, artillery cannons and other vehicles had to be shipped to New York for the summer.

They have also had to work to validate their own skills in order to be prepared to train cadets throughout the summer and will go through one more West Point-led validation before starting training.

"Whatever task they have been tasked to instruct, their knowledge base, because they have to know so much in order to teach it, has expanded," Sgt. Maj. Travis Quade, Task Force 1-28 Infantry operations sergeant major, said of preparing the Soldiers

to lead training. "The guys who are doing marksmanship are head and shoulders above a normal E-5 sergeant in the Army for their knowledge of weapons systems."

The task force Soldiers will be spending the summer leading all parts of summer training including the marksmanship ranges, land navigation courses and more. There will also be Soldiers walking each of the training lanes evaluating and grading the cadets. One of the companies within the task force will be spending the summer working as the opposition force the cadets will be battling against throughout the summer exercises.

While their main job is to train the cadets, the time spent in the field also serves as training for the Soldiers themselves and a chance to hone skills and improve their knowledge as they teach the cadets.

"The opposition force company is going to be out there doing squad tactics the entire summer," Quade said. "They are going to be the best trained squads in the Army at the end of the summer. The squad is the basic maneuver element in the Army. If you have good squads, a good platoon or company is easy after that."

The initial Soldiers arrived nearly a month ago and spent their time preparing Camp Natural Bridge for the summer after it was shut down for nine months, receiving their equipment deliveries and making sure everything was ready for training. The rest of the Soldiers arrived last week, and they will

undergo their final validations this week before the first batch of cadets moves out to Camp Buckner within the next few days.

"It is a very unique opportunity for us. The cadets we will train are the future leaders in the Army," Capt. Travis Howard, S3 plans officer-in-charge for Task Force 1-28 Infantry, said. "The cadets don't get a lot of interaction with enlisted Soldiers. For our Soldiers, they get to understand how their interaction with cadets will influence their future officers of what the enlisted were like that they worked with, what the experience was like and the level of development they get to put into these future leaders."

The majority of the Soldiers will be at West Point through the end of training in August, but a small detachment will stay through Branch Week in September before leaving.

CHAPLAIN'S CORNER Step up to the plate, swing

"For God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power and of love and of a sound mind." **2 Timothy 1:7**

While arguments abound regarding who the greatest of all time is in other sports, anyone who denies that George Herman Ruth is the G.O.A.T. of baseball is simply ignoring the statistical facts. The Babe ranks number one in career slugging and OPS. He is second only to Ted Williams in OBP, and ranks in the top ten in batting average. He is the only player in history for whom more than 25% of his trips to the plate resulted in a run being scored. He single handedly changed the way the game was played offensively. But, the fact that seals the argument for Ruth as the greatest player of all time is that his career earned run average, 2.28, would also rank him in the top 8% of all pitchers in the Hall of Fame as well.

Babe took his last at bat eighty-four years ago this week in a Boston Braves uniform. When he broke into the Majors as a left-handed pitcher with the Boston Red Sox, the single season record for homeruns was sixteen. Ruth nearly quadrupled it thirteen years later when he hit sixty. Another legendary player, Ty Cobb, theorized that Ruth was able to become baseball's first great homerun hitter in large part because he started out as a pitcher. Cobb reasoned that in those days respectable hitters, fearful of striking out, tended to cut down on their swing in order to make sure they put the ball in play. Because the Babe was a pitch-

er, he had less reason to fear striking out. So, he went to the plate swinging hard and, much to Ty Cobb's disgust, created a fascination with the long ball which would alter the game forever.

If Ty Cobb is correct, then the career of Babe Ruth illustrates a truth that can be applied in many areas of life. Fear, while often providing a motivation for compliance, is actually a hindrance in the pursuit of greatness. Leaders in the Army would do well to keep this in mind. When one creates a culture in which individuals are primarily motivated to avoid failure, the result is that most people will play it safe. Creative thinking is discouraged in these environments because risk is almost always higher when one tries something new. A religious devotion develops toward remaining within the box, and the quest for excellence is sacrificed on the altar of perpetual mediocrity.

A similar situation exists within the spiritual realm. St Paul's words to Timothy remind us of this. I often hear people make remarks such as, "I am not a very religious person." Usually they are people who believe in God; they have simply chosen to not give God an important place in their lives. I wonder if they are afraid to fail. Thinking they don't have what it takes to be a saint, they have decided not even to try to fulfill God's purpose for them. That's too bad. It's like stepping to the plate fearful of striking out. I think Jesus would say, "Don't worry about it. Swing hard. If you strike out, God is gracious. But when I give you strength, you might just hit a home run!"

New initiatives to cut cost, time for spouses to continue careers

FORT MEADE, Maryland -- The Army recently issued a directive to reduce the financial burden for spouses who wish to continue their professional careers after they move to a new duty station.

The policy allows spouses to be reimbursed up to \$500 for qualified relicensing costs that result from a permanent change of station or assignment to a different state.

"Our spouses are lawyers, nurses, teachers, cosmetologists and real estate agents," said Dee Geise, who works in the Office of the Assistant Secretary of the Army for Manpower and Reserve Affairs. "It eases part of the stress of the cost associated with relicensing after a PCS move."

Instructions on how to apply for reimbursement can be found in the all Army activities, or ALARACT, message 036/2019 and will eventually be on the Military OneSource website.

Reimbursement is available to spouses of Soldiers in all three components and will be retroactive to Dec. 12, 2017, when the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2018 was signed into law.

Qualified costs include exam and registration fees required by the state, where the new duty station is located, for a license or certification for the same profession a spouse had before moving.

"So if your new real estate license in North Carolina is \$250, then the Army will reimburse up to the \$250 cost," Geise said.

For spouses who work at Army childcare centers, the service is developing another initiative that aims to retain their training, pay and ensure a job is waiting for them when they move to a new installation.

"If they're working in a childcare center at Fort Belvoir [in Virginia] and PCS to Fort Hood [in Texas], they should move right into a job without going through the reapplication process," she said.

At a family forum in February, Army

Secretary Mark T. Esper said he also supported the idea for more spouses to run childcare businesses from home, which could even shorten waitlists at the main centers.

When he came onboard last year, Esper said it took the Army an average of 134 days for a civilian to be hired. His goal is lower that to 60 days.

"You can see the challenge," he said. "No one is going to wait 134 days or by the time you do another opportunity has come before you or it's time to [move] again."

Spouses who are teachers also experience a lengthy re-hiring process. While some just have to wait a month to move into a new job, others wait six months or even the next school year to start, Geise said.

"We have so many wonderful spouse teachers that should be able to quickly move into a teaching job when they move," she said. "It is expensive and it is time consuming."

The Defense State Liaison Office, she noted, is doing a lot of work toward state reciprocity to speed up re-licensing and re-certification efforts for military spouses.

"They've made some gains there," she said. "They're doing a really great job helping states understand the stresses on a spouse when he or she moves to another state and gaining employment."

A "spouse licensure map" showing progress of interstate compacts that support license portability can be found on the Military OneSource website.

Spouses who want to pursue their first license, credential or associate degree may check out the Military Spouse Career Advancement Accounts Program. The program offers up to \$4,000 in scholarships to spouses of Soldiers in paygrades E-1 to E-5, W-1 and W-2, and O-1 and O-2.

Financial assistance can only be used for approved portable careers found on the Military OneSource website, which include jobs in aerospace, education, energy, health, hospitality, legal and skilled trades, among others.

Raider Brigade hosts Asian American and Pacific Islander Observance

Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division hosted the Asian American Pacific Islander Heritage Observance Ceremony at Club Stewart, May 22, on Fort Stewart.

This year's theme was *Unite Our Mission by Engaging Each Other.*

Command Sgt. Maj. Thinh T. Huynh, the senior enlisted advisor of the 1st Battalion, 504th Parachute Infantry Regiment, 1st Brigade Combat Team, 82nd Airborne Division, was the keynote speaker. Huynh was born in Vietnam, but fled the country in 1986 without permission. After spending 13 days adrift at sea and two and half years in refugee camps between Malaysia and the Philippines, he arrived in America in 1989 at the age of 12. He later enlisted in the U.S. Army as an airborne infantryman in 1997.

"I couldn't think of a better theme since there are more than 50 countries and many more cultures that make up Asian Pacific Islanders," said Huynh. "Just like America, the Army is comprised of all different ethnicities, cultures and nationalities; but together we are the U.S. Army."

Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month started with Congress in 1977. A bill, known as House Joint Resolution 540, proclaimed the first 10 days in May to be Pacific/Asian American Heritage week.

The observance was expanded to the entire month of May when Congress passed Public Law 102-450 in 1992.

Col. Mike Adams, commander of the 1ABCT, 3rd ID, introduced Huynh after demonstrations of martial arts, traditional Pacific dances, and video and pictures of Asian American and Pacific Islander contributions to the military.


"Asian American Pacific Islander Heritage month is a chance for us to celebrate the important contributions of Asian and Pacific Islander Soldiers," said Adams. "It reminds us of the strength the Army has gained and will gain through a high-quality, diverse and all-volunteer force."

May was chosen to celebrate this observance to honor the first Japanese people that immigrated to the U.S. on May 7, 1843, and to recognize the Chinese immigrants who laid tracks for the transcontinental railroad which was completed on May 10, 1869. Now, people from all Asian and Pacific Islander backgrounds are celebrated for their contributions to the U.S. Army. At the end of the ceremony, Adams presented a token of appreciation for the support Hyunh provided in sharing his story.
