Dogface Soldiers celebrate Marne Week

For many of the 3rd Infantry Division Soldiers on Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield, Marne Week is the most anticipated week of the year.

"Marne Week has taken on a much more special meaning this year than it has in the past," said Maj. Gen. Antonio Aguto, commanding general of the 3rd Infantry Division. "Marne week has always been a way for us to connect the Soldiers of today with the heroes that served before us in this Division. It is a way for us to stop, and celebrate each other through healthy competition, social events and also celebrate our past."

Instead of the typical Division run, this year's opening ceremony was followed by a Bed Race.

Units from Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield built their own beds on wheels, which were manned by five people in total- four pushers and one rider. The first-ever winners of the bed race were the Soldiers from 1st Battalion, 9th Field Artillery Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team.

The day was followed by the start of many other sporting and competition events. Competition events are a test of grit and toughness, foster readiness and esprit de corps, and are a fundamental part of the Division's Marne Week celebration.

The Twilight Tattoo, held annually during Marne Week, featured a concert provided by the 3rd Infantry Division

It also included 103 soldiers reenlisting and reaffirming their commitment to the United States Army, as well as six recruits from the Hinesville Recruiting Center reciting their oath of enlistment into the military. During the ceremony many volunteers were also recognized for their service to the Division.

The Family Day event brought together currently serving Dogface Soldiers, Veterans, Family members, and the community to celebrate the Division's legacy Attendees played various outdoor games and units of the Division provided static displays of the many different tactical vehicles.

On the morning of May 20, the Division dedicated their garden for special ceremonies to Sgt. 1st Class Alwyn Cashe. The ceremony was attended by Family members of the Silver Star Medal recipient, Maj. Gen. Aguto, Command Sgt. Maj. Quentin Fenderson, the 3rd ID senior enlisted advisor, and many other Soldiers from throughout the Division.

The closing ceremony concluded the celebrations and recognized the event winners from throughout the week. This year, the winners of the Marne Cup and owners of bragging rights as the best brigade were the Spartan Soldiers of the 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team. Finally, the Society of the 3rd Infantry Division hosted a military ball for Soldiers and Family members at the Jekyll Island Convention Center. The guest of honor was retired Lt. Gen. James E. Rainey.

Marne Week kicks off with Bed Race

The 3rd Infantry Division kicked off Marne Week with its first ever bed race, May 17. Every year on Fort Stewart, the 3rd ID celebrates Marne Week.

Marne Week is usually celebrated on the third week of November to commemorate the division's birthday. The 3rd ID founded their reputation as the "Rock," as the division held the Marne River against ferocious German attacks while other allies were forced to retreat. Marne Week showcases the "Rock of the Marne" division, honoring past and present Dogface Soldiers, Family members, and communities.

All of these events build team cohesion and promote friendly com-

petition. Overall the division's goal is to bring together currently serving Dogface Soldiers, Veterans, Family members, and the community to celebrate the division's legacy.

The division usually kicks off Marne Week with a division run, but due to the current pandemic, 3rd ID came up with a new event to begin the week of camaraderie and esprit de corps.

"It's something different," said commanding general of the 3rd ID Antonio Aguto. "I think we had a great time and this is just the beginning."

The 3rd ID bed race tasked each battalion to build a bed on wheels. These beds were manned by teams of four pushers and one bed rider. The teams raced down a mile-long track stretching from Gulick Avenue to 18th Street. Teams earned points on a number of categories including: best bed, best theme, and best time.

As each battalion raced to the finish, the first three to cross the finish line were 1st Battalion, 9th Field Artillery Regiment; 6th Squadron, 8th Cavalry Regiment; and 3rd Battalion, 15th Infantry Regiment. All three top finishers were from the 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team.

After crossing the finish line, Sgt. Clayton Gibson, a competitor from the 1-9 FA team said, "Our theme was Hawaiian, because 1-9 was founded in Schofield Barracks in Hawaii." Gibson's team took the most points overall for the Bed Race.

The 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade's 3rd Squadron, 17th Cavalry Regiment took the most points for most creative and best overall theme.



Cashe Garden dedication

The 3rd Infantry Division honors its many heroes in memorials throughout Fort Stewart - Hunter Army Airfield. Fort Stewart's most prominent memorial garden was officially renamed May 20, to honor the selfless sacrifice of a leader killed in Iraq.

Marne Garden, located just outside the division headquarters, was renamed and dedicated to Sgt. 1st Class Alwyn C. Cashe, in a ceremony that highlighted the division's Marne Week.

"Marne Week has always been a way for us to connect Soldiers of today with the heroes who served before us in this division," said Maj. Gen. Antonio Aguto, 3rd ID commanding general. "We are very excited to do this; the Cashe Garden dedication is absolutely the most important thing we will do during Marne Week. More importantly, we are very excited that his Family, friends, and Soldiers with whom he served could join us to help celebrate and honor him."

Command Sgt. Maj. Quentin Fenderson, 3rd ID command sergeant major, deployed with Cashe, and said he knew him to be a selfless leader who always put the needs of his Soldiers above his own.

"For the many of us who knew and served with Sgt. 1st Class Cashe, we know he wouldn't want any of this - he didn't need anything named for him," Fenderson said. "He believed the only acknowledgement he needed was that his boys were safe."

On October 17, 2005, Cashe, a platoon sergeant assigned to 1st Battalion, 15th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade, 3rd ID, extracted six Soldiers and an Iraqi interpreter from a burning Bradley Fighting Vehicle in Salah Ad Din Province, Iraq. Cashe's platoon had been tasked to clear a route for a resupply convoy when a roadside bomb exploded beneath their vehicle, causing it to quickly become engulfed in flames. Cashe returned to the burning BFV multiple times to remove his team and move them to safety. All of the Soldiers on that vehicle, including Cashe, sustained significant burn injuries and were evacuated to Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio, Texas. Ultimately, four of the Soldiers perished from their wounds; Cashe was the last to die, succumbing to

injuries November 8, 2005.

"This memorial garden is where we do all our important events, like promotions and ceremonies," Fenderson said. "Whenever our Soldiers come here in the future, they will think of the heroism of one of our own Dogface Soldiers."

Kasinal Cashe White, Alwyn's sister, spoke on behalf of the Cashe Family, who were greeted and honored with applause.

"To me, he was known as Al, my baby brother," recalled White. "He was a country boy from Florida, loved the outdoors and loved his Family. Not only his blood Family, but the Army Family he gained while serving the Nation."

Cashe, who grew up in Oviedo, Florida, deployed in support of the Gulf War in 1991, participated in the 2003 invasion of Iraq, and returned to Iraq in 2005. He was posthumously awarded the Silver Star Medal for his brave and heroic actions, the third highest award exclusively for military operations involving conflict.

"When we looked at recognizing Sgt. 1st Class Cashe and his service and his heroism, we wanted to find a spot that everybody knows, everybody comes to, and is truly at the heart of our organization," Aguto said.

For Cashe's Family, the 3rd ID has become a special part of their lives. The Family travels to Fort Stewart every year to remember Cashe and share his story with others.

"We're honored that you have chosen a happy place for Soldiers to remember our Al, and we hope that his story inspires 3rd Infantry Division Soldiers for years
