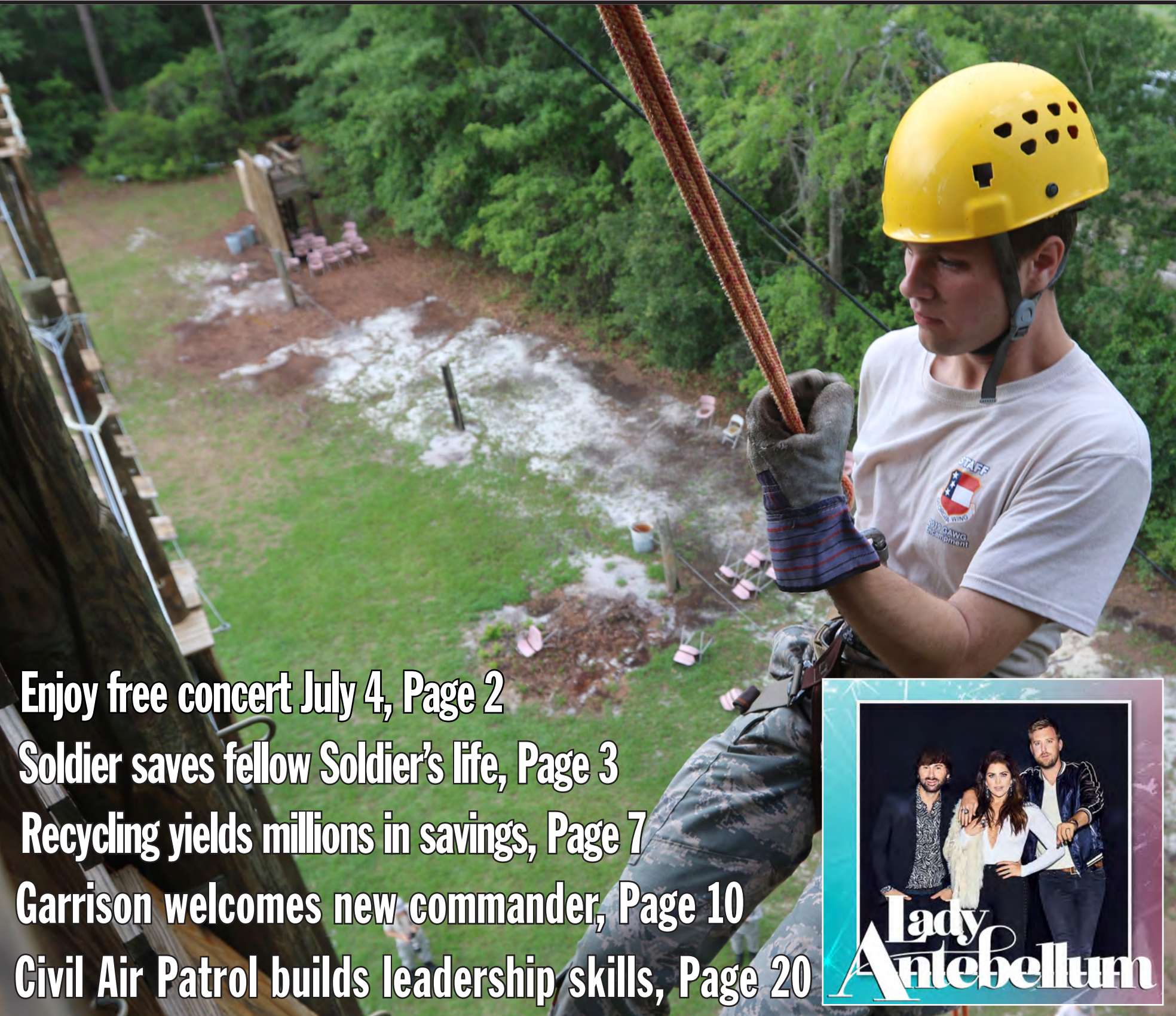

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Community celebrate Independence Day, July 3, 4

The Marne Independence Day Celebration starts July 3 with a 3rd Infantry Division run at 6:30 a.m. on Fort Stewart,

The Division run will cause traffic to be diverted from the south part of Hero Road, Gulick Avenue, West 6th Street, Bundy Avenue, the north side of 18th Street, Strong Avenue, Davis Avenue and Anderson Street. Commuters are encouraged to use alternate routes as Gate 1 will be closed to traffic from 6:30 to 8 a.m.

A free Family-day event will then be held for active-duty Soldiers and their Families, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Newman Fitness Center's field. Activities include a petting zoo, a working dog display, water slide and more. A free lunch for Soldiers and their Families will be hosted by the Hinesville Military Affairs Committee and their sponsors, 11:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. Other Directorate of Family Morale, Welfare and Recreation facilities are open 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. to include Corkan Recreation Center, Stewart Bowling Center, Corkan Outdoor Pool and the Splash Park.

The festivities continues on Hunter Army Airfield beginning at 7:30 p.m. as the 3rd ID Band performs a

free concert for the general public at the Family Day Field at 8:45 p.m. Fireworks follow around 9:30 p.m. The 3rd ID concert is open to the general public and coolers are welcome; however, pets are not allowed.

The next day, July 4, Lady Antebellum and special guest Caroline Jones take the stage at Donovan Field on Fort Stewart. The concert is free and open to the public. Admittance starts at 3 p.m., the show starts at 7 and fireworks following around 10 p.m. Gate 3 will be used for general admittance to the concert area and parking.

"This is a great opportunity for us to celebrate our nation," said Command Sgt. Maj. Rebecca Myers, the garrison's senior enlisted leader. "We receive so much support throughout the year from the wonderful community here in Coastal Georgia. This is just a small way that we can say 'thank you' for the support to our Soldiers and our Families."

The event feature family-friendly activities like a rock-climbing wall, quad jumper and multiple bounce houses with \$5 wristbands for all access. Food and beverages will be available for purchase from local food vendors.

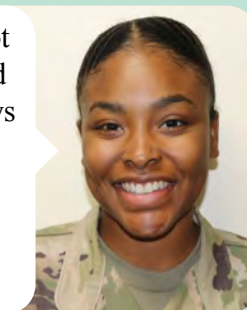

Soldier looks out for others, helps save a life

Spc. Alexander Small, a Soldier from the 3rd Battalion, 69th Armored Regiment, 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, was awarded the Army Commendation Medal, June 19 on Fort Stewart for saving a fellow Soldier's life.

Small was returning to the battalion's motor pool on June 18, when he walked by Pfc. Samuel Mabie, who was unconscious in his privately owned vehicle during his break from gate guard duty in the rear of the motor pool.

"When I came back from lunch, I saw him in his truck while it was running and thought he was just sleeping," said Small.

"I saw him sleeping and decided to wake him up because I didn't want him to get in trouble."

Small said he started knocking on the glass to try to wake him up, but Mabie was not reacting.

"I started yelling and shaking the truck and that's when I realized this might be a real issue because he was not responding," said Small.

Additionally, Small started to notice that Mabie's appearance was not normal.

"He didn't appear right and his skin was really pale, said Small. "His eyes were open, but they were twitching and rolling into the back of his head."

Small said his condition looked to be getting worse as the attempts to wake Mabie were not working.

"He started drooling and spitting," said Small. "It looked like he was trying to wake up, and originally I thought he was having a seizure."

With continued attempts to wake Mabie with other Soldiers by this time, the military police was called. Upon arrival, the MPs notified and dispatched emergency medical personnel. At this time, the MPs made the decision to break a window and gain access to Mabie.

"When they pulled him out he was limp and I thought he was suffering from heat exhaustion," said Small.

Mabie was taken to the hospital and treated, but not for heat exhaustion. While Small was filling out reports with the MPs, he was still concerned about

Mabie's condition.

"I was able to hear things over their radio so I asked one of the MPs about Mabie's condition, I wanted to know how he was," said Small. "That's when we found out he had carbon monoxide poisoning."

Small said about an hour after Mabie was taken to the hospital he gained consciousness. Mabie was treated and has recovered from the event.

"Honestly I'm not entirely sure how I feel, I'm just glad he's ok," said Small.

Thanks to this instincts and decisive actions, Small saved the life a fellow Soldier.

Small said since that day leaders are making sure Soldiers are continuing to check on each other.

Raider Brigade Soldier selected for Army Jack L. Clark Best Medic Competition

On June 13, Sgt. Mark Epps, a combat medic with the 5th Battalion, 7th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, was selected to compete in the Army Jack L. Clark Best Medic Competition in San Antonio, due to his success in the 3ID Best Medic Competition.

In order for competitors to qualify for the 3rd ID competition, they had to first possess either a combat medic badge or expert field medic badge along with being physically and mentally prepared.

“I had to refine the skills I have as a medic in preparation for this competition,” said Epps. “I’m pretty proficient at many things, but there is always going to be things you don’t know.”

The 3rd ID Best Medic Competition was a three-day event that started bright and early on Donovan Field with an Army Combat Fitness Test, June 11.

“I was definitely shaky when we first started,” said Epps. “Although I maxed the run, I ended second to last in terms of points.”

Following the ACFT, Epps moved on to a stress shoot that same day. This event required him to complete seven physically demanding tasks while wearing his protective mask and completing qualifications with an M9 pistol and M4 carbine.

“The stress shoot was really well done and as terrible as I thought it would be,” said Epps. “It was very physically demanding, but it was very fun and definitely the hardest event for me.”

Epps said he moved onto land navigation that same day, but the event was cut short due to safety concerns regarding lightning. The next day Epps moved onto the medical assessment lanes and a mystery event which included setting up his Army issued tent in full his full chemical, biological, radioactive, nuclear protective suit and mask in under 20 minutes.

“I was pretty solid in my ability to perform trauma assessments as a combat medic and an emergency medical technician,” said Epps. “The mystery event ended up being pretty good because I noticed the tent on the packing list and made sure I knew how to assemble it.”

The final day involved a six-mile ruck march that ended at the obstacle course, which was the final event.

“The ruck march wasn’t too bad because I ruck pretty regularly,” said Epps. “After the ruck we went straight into the good old obstacle course which was fun, but I was also really tired.”

At the end of the competition, Epps finished in second place over all. This qualified him to move on to the Army Jack L. Clark Best Medic Competition, but he says there is still more work to do. He says he will be focusing on strength training and prolonged field care for casualties.

Effective 12 July 2019, all actively serving members of the armed forces who have 16 or more years of service will no longer be able to transfer their Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits to their dependents. This new restriction was put in place per change 1 to DoDI 1341.13, Post-9/11 GI Bill, dated July 12, 2018. As a result of this change, ARNG Soldiers are highly encouraged to transfer their Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits as soon as they become eligible (not flagged, have six or more years of service, and at least one eligible dependent in DEERS) to avoid missing out on this extremely generous family benefit. Recycling saves installation millions annually

\$2.6 million – that is how much money recycling saves Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield.

Recycling is one of the cost saving measures the installation uses to help reduce cost and extend the lifecycle of the installation landfill.

Last year, Stewart-Hunter residents recycled 2 million lbs. of cardboard, 1 million lbs. of scrap metal, 440,000 lbs. of paper, 88,000 lbs. of plastic and 54,000 lbs. of glass. That's 3.5 million lbs. of rubbish that was diverted from landfills to recycling centers, which can be packaged and sold for industrial use.

Stewart-Hunter Recycling program tries to divert 50% of collected recyclables. Last year, the installation diverted 59%!

So, let's keep it up! Blue recycling dumpsters are located in various locations throughout the installation.

Johnny Davis, Qualified Recycling Program Manager at the installation's Directorate of Public Works said recycling is important. But precautions need to be taken.

"You need to be careful about what you put in your dumpsters," Davis said, adding the workers have to hand pick through the recyclables.

You can also take your recycling to the 24-hour convenience centers. Stewart center is located off McFarland Ave. The Hunter Recycling center is

behind the AAFES Exchange.

What to recycle

- Items you can bag-up and drop in the recycling bins.
- Paper Items such as junk mail, newspapers, and magazines. (These can go in a bag by themselves.)
- Glass such as bottles
- Cans (food or beverage cans)
- All plastic, jugs, grocery bags, shrink wrap, and dinnerware (cups, plates, utensils).
- All Styrofoam such as egg cartons and cups
- Cardboard boxes such as shoe boxes and food boxes. (Break these down to flatten.)

Items that need to go to the scrap metal yard (Italy Street on Stewart, Westley Street on Hunter Army Airfield, open 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday. Ink cartridges

- Computers
- Printers
- Keyboards
- Telephones

Army approves JLTV full-rate production

WASHINGTON -- Dr. Bruce Jette, Assistant Secretary of the Army for Acquisition, Logistics and Technology, approved the Joint Light Tactical Vehicle program's transition into Full-Rate Production yesterday.

The approval follows an Army decision in December 2018 to begin fielding the new platform with the Army's 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division on Fort Stewart.

In April, the 1ABCT, 3rd ID, became the Army's first unit equipped with JLTVs in April 2019, after receiving more than 300 vehicles.

Fieldings to the Ordnance School, Fort Lee, Virginia, the 84th Training Command, Fort McCoy, Wisconsin, the Marine Corps' School of Infantry-West at Camp Pendleton, California, as well as the School of Infantry-East, Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, have also been completed.

"Thanks to tremendous teamwork

across two services on requirements, resources, program management, testing, and other areas, this is a great modernization success story. JLTV shows how teams focused on stable requirements, mature technologies and the right incentives can deliver meaningful capability advancements in a cost-conscious way," said Jeffrey White, Jette's principal deputy.

The JLTV family of vehicles is designed to restore payload and performance that were traded from light tactical vehicles to add protection in recent conflict, giving commanders an improved protected mobility solution and the first vehicle purpose-built for modern battlefield networks.

"Getting an improved capability into the hands of Soldiers and Marines has been our team's driving focus throughout this program, said Michael Sprang, Project Manager, Joint Program Office, Joint Light Tactical Vehicles. They are why we do what we do, and I'm so proud of the

hard-working team that brought us to this point.

"We are also grateful for Soldier feedback on new features and enhancements," he continued. "The Soldiers of the 1stABCT, 3rd Infantry Division provided valuable input on enhancements such as increased situational awareness, reduction of system noise, a troop seat kit, and a companion JLTV trailer. Their assessments helped bring us all to a successful Full-Rate Production decision."

The JLTV program remains on schedule and on budget to replace a significant portion of the Army's High Mobility Multipurpose Wheeled Vehicle fleet. The JLTV comes in two variants and four mission package configurations: General Purpose, Close Combat Weapons Carrier, Heavy Guns Carrier, and a Utility vehicle. The U.S. Navy and Air Force also plan to field JLTVs in much smaller quantities.

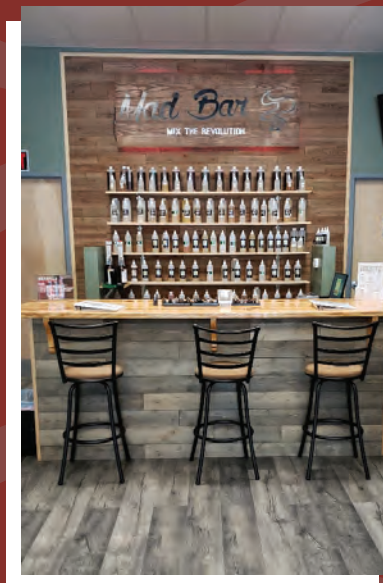
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Men's Health Month: Making smart choices

Ask your provider about the following

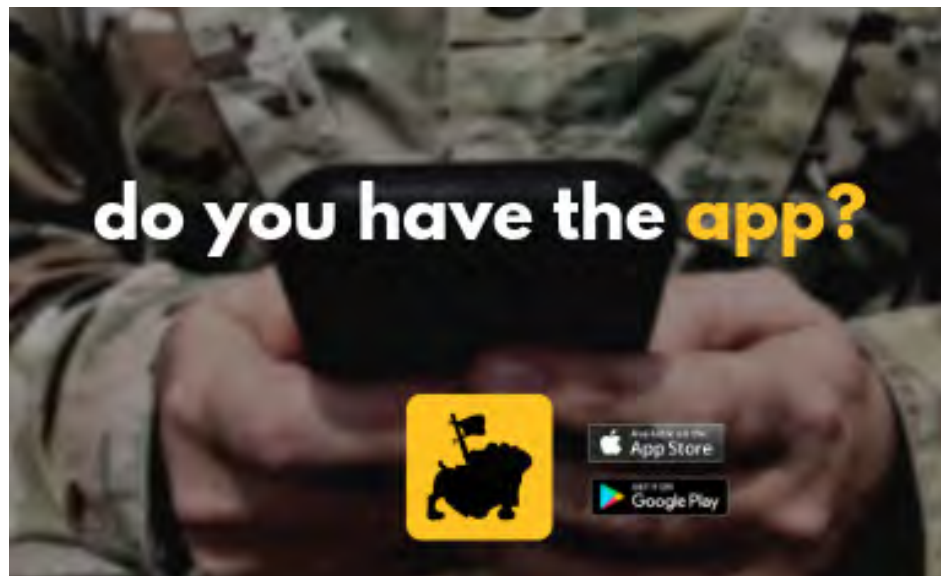
health screening tests:

Electronics eligible for back-to-school Layaway

Back-to-school shopping doesn't have to break the bank.

To help military Families stay on budget while preparing for the school year, the Army & Air Force Exchange Service is expanding its layaway program to include computers, tablets and more from July 1 to Aug. 31.

Laptops, desktops, iPads, notebook computers, tablets and other electronics that support educational excellence are not usually eligible for the Exchange layaway program, but Soldiers and their families can enjoy the expanded program before the school year.

"There can be a lot of costs that hit all at once when preparing for the start of school,"

said General Manager Hollie N. Morales. "The extended layaway gives Fort Stewart-Hunter families more flexibility to plan their back-to-school budget."

A \$3 service fee and a 15% deposit are required to place these and other items on layaway, and the items must be picked up by Aug. 31. Shoppers can visit the Fort Stewart-Hunter Exchange for more information.

Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield held a garrison change of command ceremony, June 20, on Fort Stewart between outgoing commanders, Col. Jason Wolter and incoming commander, Col. Bryan L. Logan.

Brenda Lee McCullough, director for Installation Command – Readiness, was on-hand to officiate at the ceremony and serve as guest speaker. She spoke of the Wolter's achievements and her appreciation to the Wolter Family for supporting the mission and supporting Soldiers and their Families. She also expressed her confidence in Logan and thanked his Family for their future efforts.

Some of the highlights she noted regarding Wolter's tour as garrison commander between 2017 and 2019 included Fort Stewart earning the Army Communities of Excellence Program Award, Bronze in 2018 and Gold in 2019. McCullough, lauded his fiscal management abilities and exceptional handling of the installation during Hurricane Michael and Irma, where Wolter supervised the evacuation of Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield without the loss of life or significant damage. She also expressed her appreciation of his efforts to support the Army Soldier for Life program along with the community partners.

McCullough said installations were no longer just the Army's home, but strategic training centers and power projection platforms so our Army can deploy, fight, and win our Nation's wars. She said she knew Col. Bryan Logan was a proven leader. Who she had

the utmost confidence in. She used a baseball metaphor, noting she knew Logan would always bring his glove to every game and get on base, no matter what it took.

Logan thanked McCullough for the opportunity to command, Wolter for easing the transition and the community for their continued support.

Logan, a native of Houston, was commissioned as an armor officer in 1997 after graduating from Louisiana State University. He has served on Fort Stewart before.

He served in several positions with the 3rd Infantry Division including the Deputy Chief of Operations, 3rd ID, the squadron operations officer and squadron executive officer for the 3rd Squadron, 7th Cavalry Regiment and the brigade operations officer for the 2nd Brigade 3rd ID.

He said returning to Stewart was like coming home.

For Wolter, the day's ceremony provided an opportunity to reflect.

"There is no way I can explain what it has meant to wear the cloth of our Nation to serve here, with this team – focused on the here and now, amongst this tremendous group of leaders. "

"I think it is true, the strength of our Nation is the Army, the strength of the Army is our Soldiers and the strength of our Soldiers is our Families," Wolter said. But added he also believe our Civilian workforce was part of that strength, adding a tremendous capacity. He explained of the civilian workforce here at Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield were employees with more than 11,014 years of prior military services – including 106 individuals who served in the rank of Sergeant Major or above. He said the workforce had more than 10,700 years of total civilian service, with more than 21,715 military and civilian time combined. In fact, he noted, that workforce has provided more than 13,770 years of service here at Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield. He said among their educational pedigrees were eight people with doctorates, 13 with masters, 333 with bachelors and another 143 with associates degrees.

"They are the mortar and bedrock that will continue to provide the continuity required to ensure the success of our Army," Wolter said. "I want to personally thank them for showing me, what Soldier for Life, truly means."

Creating stronger teams through 'Femtorship'

Female leaders in the 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade attended a Women's Mentorship Conference June 19 in Ludowici.

The conference featured seminars covering various topics from goal planning, nutrition, and finances.

Shedding their uniform and donning business casual clothes, Soldiers from the rank of sergeant through colonel gathered at the event to hear from senior leadership in the division and civilian subject matter experts who support Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield.

Mary Britton, the senior spouse in the sustainment brigade, coordinated the conference to strengthen bonds through female mentorship, otherwise known as 'femtorship.'

"I thought that this female mentorship program would be a great place to start so that we could bring our female Soldiers together and talk about the concerns that they have that maybe their [male] counterparts don't," she said.

While the brigade has the majority of female servicemembers within the division, according to Britton, in the active U.S. Army women make up just 18% of the population.

By coming together as a group, these Soldiers were able to share their experiences and challenges

unique to their gender and their perspective as a Soldier, leader, woman or mother.

"I've seen many struggles throughout my 14-year career that has helped me grow as an individual and a professional," said Maj. Michelle Updike, the officer in charge of operations for the brigade.

Col. Michelle Munroe, commander of the U.S. Army Medical Department Activity at Fort Stewart and the highest ranking female in the division, also shared her story on how she got to where she is today.

"My philosophy is family first, mission always," she said. She cited her work ethic and getting her name out there as a key reason for her success.

The program was initially established by the brigade's previous senior enlisted advisor, Command Sgt. Maj. Shontina Edwards, to expand opportunities for growth as an individual and professional for female service members regardless of rank or military occupational specialty. Britton wanted to

continue providing this space for future generations of Soldiers.

"I wanted it to be a bridge between what has been done and where I thought we could take this," Britton said. "I believe knowledge is power and the more you share it the more powerful we can be."

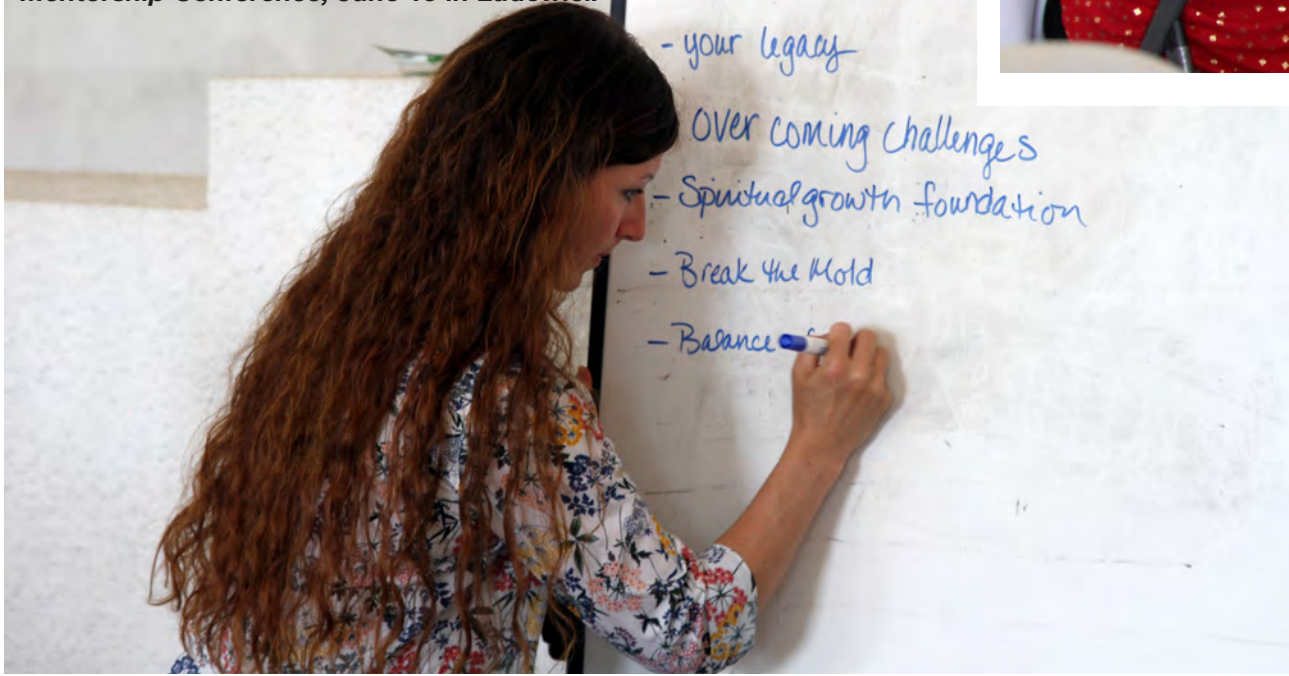

June is National Safety Month: Help ensure 'No 1 Gets Hurt'

Many injuries and deaths that occur each year are preventable. During the month of June, National Safety Month, it is an opportunity to highlight some important roles we all have, not only for our own safety but for our Family, friends, and colleagues. This year's theme, "No 1 Gets Hurt," expresses this idea in a big way. Each of us can play a part in helping to prevent unnecessary injuries and deaths at work, on the roads, in our homes and communities.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health, and the National Safety Council are combining efforts to help spread the word about safety. These efforts are to encourage discussion and participation over the month of June and with hopes of a continued ongoing dialogue amongst each other.

The top four safety topics identified by the joint organizations include the following:

- **Emergency Preparedness** – Disasters won't wait. Emergencies can happen at any time. Create an emergency kit for both your home and car. Take action now to create your emergency plan.

- **Wellness** – Seventy million Americans suffer from a sleep disorder. Do you? Missing out on the

recommended seven to nine hours of sleep each day, could place you in a high risk category for injury and the negative effects of fatigue on your health. Take steps to obtain the needed sleep your body requires to function at its optimal level.

- **Falls** – The third leading cause of unintentional injury-related deaths for all ages and the number one cause of death for those 65 and older are falls. Even more alarming are injuries occurring to those who are distracted while walking and talking on cell phones. Distracted cell phone usage has caused more than 10,000 serious injuries over a 10-year period, according to the Journal of Safety Research.

- **Driving** – Human error has been found to be the cause of 94 percent of motor vehicle crashes. Exercising good-driver behavior can help you, and others stay safe on the road. Seat belts saved nearly 15,000 lives in 2016. Buckle up on every ride.

Additional safety topics to discuss with your Family, friends, and colleagues include: Boating and water safety, proper grilling and food handling, use of helmets with bicycle or motorcycle riders, skin protection from sun exposure, proper handling of fireworks, and an awareness of stinging insects and poisonous plants. In my neighborhood there have been a lot of moving trucks at different houses. After all, it is peak moving season for Army personnel and their Families. It's par for the course. I look forward to the next season myself - the one I will be part of. So, it goes without saying I am anxious to get that request for orders, so the process will begin for me.

I don't know if any of you have this problem, but I find that I have a very difficult time trusting the process. Of course this is a direct result of a simple issue we all have. One I find myself talking about on multiple occasions. We are human and in our humanity we think we always have the answer, We always want to direct how things go, to be masters of our own destiny. Research is ongoing to learn and discover more about this condition that disrupts the lives of so many making it difficult to carry out normal daily activities. According to the CDC, there is probably not one single cause. Current findings suggest the following:

- Symptoms can appear after age 60
- The number of people living with Alzheimer's doubles every five years after

age 65

- Less common in the younger people
- Family history, genetics may play a role in the development
- Brain changes can occur years before symptoms first appear
- Heart disease, high blood pressure and stroke may increase the risk

The National Institute on Aging has identified the following symptoms associated with Alzheimer's disease:

- Getting lost in familiar places
- Trouble handling money or paying bills
- Decreased or poor judgement
- Unable to complete familiar tasks
- Changes in personality, mood, or behavior patterns.

Persons living with Alzheimer's will need multiple supportive measures, as well as those who are caring for love ones affected by this disease.

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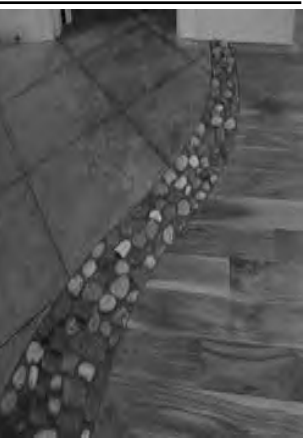

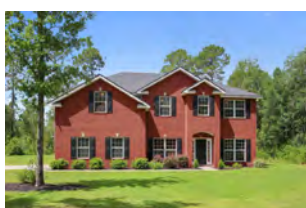

Louisville District furnishes DoDEA schools around the globe

For the past five years, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Louisville District has been partnered with the Department of Defense Education Activity providing furniture and equipment for schools around the world.

DoDEA is a federally-operated school system, and according to their website, is responsible for planning, directing, coordinating, and managing prekindergarten through 12th grade educational programs on behalf of the Department of Defense.

"We did our first project with DoDEA in 2014," said Brian Cash, Louisville District program manager.

Murray Elementary School at Fort Stewart in Georgia was the furniture team's first project, and the completion of that project helped build the relationship with DoDEA.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is DoDEA's construction contracting agent, and Louisville District's Brian Cash and Jared Korfhage are the primary project managers who oversee contract execution and furniture delivery. The DoDEA

Furniture team also includes Budget Analyst Annette Mode who provides budget support for the program. Louisville District's interior designers primarily include Liche Sastro and Colleen Crum, and they provide Furniture, Fixtures and Equipment, also known as FF&E, with the attributes required for the 21st Century style of learning.

"We started with just procuring furniture but the program has grown into much more. For example, now we provided anything from broadcast and physical fitness equipment to security cameras," Korfhage said. "Whatever DoDEA and the school needs, we are there to support."

The furniture process includes the review of products, layouts and design colors. The team is also responsible for the contracting process, including shipping, installation, punch inspection and a post-occupancy visit to ensure quality assurance. The district team collaborates with the school's principal and teachers on the type of furniture they desire in the classrooms, kitchenette, storage space, group rooms, administration suites, health unit and common areas. Additional

spaces that may need furniture and equipment could include an occupational and physical therapy room, computer lab, and gymnasium. The team orders anything from typical furniture like tables and chairs to audio visual, pallet jack, scissor lift, physical fitness equipment, fire extinguishers, AEDs, evacuation chairs and more.

"We enjoy working with DoDEA and take a lot of pride in what we do," Korfhage said. "To see the end product and students using what we've helped put together is very rewarding."

In addition to working with the schools, the Louisville District DoDEA Furniture team works diligently with DoDEA and conducts site visits at different phases throughout the project to include a closing furniture punch inspection at the end to ensure everything required has been received. The team also provides guidance and direction to each vendor so they understand the requirements and expectations during the shipping and installation phase.

"Since 2014, we have helped with approximately 30 schools and are currently working on 11 more that will open

between now and August 2020," Cash said. "In addition, there are 45 school projects that have been identified in the next 10 years."

DoDEA's schools are divided into three areas: Europe, Pacific and the Americas, and the Louisville District DoDEA furniture team assists in all three areas.

"We have projects in the United States, Korea, Japan, Germany, Spain and future projects in Italy, United Kingdom and Brussels," Cash said.

In Fiscal Year 2018, the DoDEA furniture program awarded \$13.5 million in contracts involving 19 schools, completed installs on eight schools and was officially assigned the Outfitting program in February 2018. The outfitting program is made up of a team leading the 21st Century educational facility project. The team in outfitting identifies stake holders and key players who are critical to the success of a new school opening.

"I have really enjoyed growing the program and working with the schools," Cash said. "The team has worked diligently to put ourselves in position to execute for several years to come."

Youth recognized at U.S. Bowling Congress banquet

The league season is September through April and practices are every Saturday at Marne Lanes.

Practice consist of a ten-minute warm up and three games broken down into teams by age and skill level. So practice always keeps them on their toes for competition. The winning team is calculated by the overall scores of each team's three games.

Members have multiple opportunities to compete in both Georgia and the Carolinas giving them chances to win

Scholarship money. Just the state of Georgia alone gives away 400,000 in Scholarship's to the USBC every year. It truly is incredible to have the opportunity to start earning money for college at age three.

Eastlake said the league isn't just about learning a skill or getting youth to unplug, it's about creating moments that last a lifetime with new friends that become like family.

The event was an annual week-long training for cadets to build their Civil Air Patrol experience. The age range for the event was 12 to 18 years olds.

The cadets participated in several different events including leadership skills, customs and courtesies, aerospace, character development, team building exercises, an obstacle course and a rappelling course.

“My favorite part of this summer encampment was taking on a leadership role,” said Katie Goins, a cadet from Atlanta, Ga. “It was good for the younger cadets to learn about leadership, aerospace and how to apply it to the Civil Air Patrol.”

“We do disaster relief and we went to Florida after hurricane Michael hit in 2018,” said Ethan Berg, assistant Public Affairs Officer, Georgia Wing Civil Air Patrol. “Our team was 90% of the search and rescue team and we saved over 95 lives.”

U.S. citizens over the age of 12 are eligible to join CAP. At the age of 18, they move to the senior cadet ranks then eventually become leaders and received the rank of an officer. The CAP programs are opportunities for the cadets that want to join the military regardless of branch.

“Civil Air Patrol is important because it builds the next generation of leaders” said Goins. “It prepares cadets for real life situations, regardless of whether they join the military or not and opens new opportunities for self-growth.”
