Installation leadership takes action to address housing concerns

Installation leadership is taking action after on-post residents voiced concerns and issues during recent town halls.

Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield's Directorate of Public Works military housing office and Balfour Beatty Communities leadership gathered last week to discuss concerns, especially landscaping and trash pickup.

"Since the walking town halls, we've had several meetings regarding the grounds maintenance in the housing areas," Mike Dollins, BBC maintenance facility manager, said. "Since then, the contractor has brought in additional resources to ensure the grounds maintenance is better taken care of in a more frequent manner for our residents."

Additionally, BBC has now introduced weekly dry trash pick-up to the list of items their residents can now look forward to.

"In the past, when a resident has had a large item to be disposed of they would call our office and we would send a truck out to get it," Dollins said. "Residents can now place their large trash items on the curb with their trash cans on their designated trash day and we will make sure to dispose of the items for them."

Leaders also emphasized the importance of establishing clear lines of communication between their offices and the installation housing residents.

"I think it's good for the senior leadership to get out and walk the streets, look at the yards, and talk with the Families because when our residents see that their senior leadership is involved it really makes an impact," said Carl Smith, installation housing chief.

It is the team's hope that the involvement of 3rd

Infantry Division, garrison and unit leadership will also hold the residents more accountable.

"The best part about [the walking town halls] is that they give the residents the opportunity to meet people they've never met before, and, you know, possibly address any issues that have been ongoing in the homes that you don't give us the opportunity to go find out and look and dig in and try to get them resolved," Dollins said. "I think that's about the best part of is getting out there and getting to meet the people themselves, passing out those cards and now they have a lifeline for their current or future housing concerns."

DPW housing wants residents to know that while BBC should be their first line of communication

for housing concerns that their office is also there to assist if they feel they need an added layer of support.

Additionally, the team emphasized the importance of using the Balfour Beatty online work order system as the first step to addressing a concern with their home or neighborhood.

"We want our residents to know that their first step is to go to BBC management, and then if they feel like they're not being heard or that they are not getting anywhere that they have an alternative here with the installation housing office, or someone else to come to get their issue or concern addressed," said Ramona Welch, Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield Army housing manager.

"These housing town halls are important," Welch added. "It gives the residents and Families the opportunity to voice their concerns in person, and for us the opportunity to reassure them that they can also come to our office and we will make sure that their concerns get addressed and completed to their satisfaction."

Overall, the team wants to assure residents that their concerns are valid and are being heard.

"As a team, the Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield Housing Office and Balfour Beatty Communities have listened to our residents' concerns and we're taking action" Owens said. "We plan to continue to work together to keep the best interests of our residents at the forefront of all that we do."

"[The Army] has a lot to offer: school, stability, housing, security, independence from the climate of having more than one household income to pay rent," said Spc. Joya Jackson, a nodal network systems operator/maintainer with the 10th Brigade Engineer Battalion, 1st ABCT, 3rd ID. "The people make it worth it," said Jackson.

As a single mom, Jackson said she wants to guide her 10-year-old son to success by being successful herself.

The U.S. Army not only teaches Soldiers how to do their jobs proficiently, but Soldiers are also groomed to professionals in all aspects of life.

"I want to give my nieces and nephews someone to look up to," said Spc. Geoffrey Etkins, a signal support systems specialist assigned to 5th Squadron, 7th Cavalry Regiment, 1ABCT, 3ID. "I want to strive to be more fit and better myself as a whole."

Etkins said that while he is in the Army, he wants to get a degree in cyber security, become a commissioned officer or chief warrant officer and become a government contractor in cyber security after his time in the Army.

The Raider Brigade's retention program has consistently been the first in the 18th Airborne Corps to close out their mission during the past 26 months

GO1 updated; face masks required

Effective immediately, 3rd Infantry Division, Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield GO1 requires ALL individuals to wear a mask inside ANY on-post facility at Fort Stewart or Hunter Army Airfield. Service members are also required to wear a mask inside off-post public buildings/ facilities (i.e. barber shops, religious services, grocery stores, etc.). Mask mandate exceptions

Exceptions to the mask mandate can be made if an individual is alone in a walled office; if an individual is eating and drinking and is socially distant from a co-worker; masks may be required to be lowered for identification or security purposes or as an annotated and approved reasonable accommodation. Vehicle parking safety reminder

When parking a vehicle into a space, do not block the pedestrian walkway with your bumper or trailer hitch. If there is a sidewalk, or marked pedestrian pathway, ensure that it is not blocked by any portion of your vehicle when you park by it. A pedestrian walking past the vehicle may not notice a trailer hitch, and be severely injured by walking into it. Removing the hitch, and storing it inside the vehicle is the best way to ensure the safety of those walking close to your vehicle. For more information, please contact the Safety Office at 767-8442.

New bicycle law now in effect

As of July 1, the operator of a motor vehicle approaching a bicycle shall approach the bicycle with due caution and shall proceed as follows. The new 3-Feet-Law is outlined in § 40-6-56.

- Make a lane change into a lane not adjacent to the bicycle if possible in the existing road and traffic conditions
- If a lane change under paragraph (1) of this subsection would be impossible, prohibited by law, or unsafe, reduce the speed of the motor vehicle to a reasonable and proper speed for the existing road and traffic conditions, which speed shall be at least ten miles per hour less than the posted speed limit or 25 miles per hour, whichever is more, and proceed around the bicycle with at least three feet between such vehicle and the bicycle at all times.

Soldiers and Marne community members are invited to participate in the Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield 9-11 Remembrance Run at 6 a.m. Sept. 10 to honor those fallen first responders lost 20 years ago in the four coordinated terrorist attacks carried out by al-Qaeda.

"Our 9-11 memorial run is one of the events that means so much to me to be able to bring to our community," said Cara Bates, Directorate of Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation special events coordinator. "FMWR and the Directorate of Emergency Services team has worked so hard to ensure we are doing our part to recognize all of the sacrifices made on 9-11. We have planned so many small details that people can see on race day that we feel are going to be so impactful and truly bringing home how much we as a nation lost that day, and how far we have come."

The event is open to anyone who has a valid veteran or military identification, and has access to Hunter Army Airfield and Fort Stewart military posts.

The route will begin at Trent Field on Fort Stewart and at Saber Hall on Hunter Army Airfield.

"Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield Fire Emergency Services and the MWR are honored and humbled to put together this event for our community," said Jay McGraw, Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield Fire Emergency Services chief. "Sept. 11 means many things to every one of us but one thing is certain - It's a time that we should hold dear to our hearts."

Runners and walkers will be advised to stay six-feet apart from one another to mitigate the risk of contracting COVID-19.

Units are highly encouraged to wear their unit colors and memorial bibs will be issued at both Newman and Tominac fitness centers on Sept. 9.

The event is free and open to ruckers, walkers, and runners of all ages. All participants will receive a finisher's medal.





See something, say something: Army observes Antiterrorism Awareness

WASHINGTON — Terrorism continues to be a persistent threat, as violent extremist organizations and individuals with radicalized ideologies are still a known danger to Army installations and personnel, an antiterrorism expert said Tuesday.

August is Antiterrorism Awareness Month and an opportunity for all Soldiers, civilians, and family members to increase their understanding about extremism, terrorism, insider threats, and cybersecurity vulnerabilities, said James Crumley, the antiterrorism deputy division chief for the Office of the Provost Marshal General.

"Each member of the Army community should be actively involved in combatting against these threats through sustained vigilance and prevention," Crumley said. "These efforts support the Army's top priorities of people and readiness."

The threat to national security is becoming increasingly more dynamic and complex, Secretary of the Army Christine E. Wormuth wrote in a letter to the force to highlight the 12th annual monthlong observance and call to action.

The Army's protection efforts and personnel must evolve to match the ever-changing threat, Wormuth added.

Army leaders must commit to eradicating extremist activity across the force and apply deterrence efforts, all while empowering personnel to speak up and report a potential risk, Crumley said.

"Lessons learned from past terrorist and extremist attacks have revealed at least one bystander that had observed a pre-attack indicator and failed to report. If you see something, say something," Crumley added.

Crumley said that timely reporting is critical to the

investigation process and allows military and civilian law enforcement a chance to verify a potential threat.

"An actively involved community is key to preventing a terrorist or extremist attack or an insider threat," the secretary wrote. "Please take time during Antiterrorism Awareness Month to review your protection plans and empower your communities. Every person is a sensor in our protective network."

Cybersecurity awareness

Cyber threats are constantly changing in both complexity and scale. Adversaries continue to develop and employ a range of methods to try and bypass cybersecurity systems to gain access to the Army's networks, Crumley said.

To stem this growing risk, the Army has implemented an array of cybersecurity measures, coupled with proper and sufficient training, to thwart off attacks on the Army's networks, he added.

"Whether we are on in our workspace or teleworking, the Army community still has to protect their cyber-related information from the enemy. We cannot afford to have this critical information compromised," Crumley said.

While online, personnel should be watchful and avoid links or attachments from unknown or unsolicited sources. Individuals should only use trusted websites and inspect all web addresses before selecting them on their internet browser, he said.

Adversaries also employ various tactics through social media and other websites to try to misinform or disinform the Army community, he added. Individuals are reminded to check the facts and sources of all materials and verify information with multiple legitimate sources when possible.

"You don't want to take action on something and cause harm or damage to yourself or the Army

because you acted on misinformation," he added. "If it sounds outlandish, then you probably need to check if the information is valid."

Insider threat

Insider threats pose a risk to the Army's resources and personnel. Actions by an individual or a group could include espionage, terrorism, unauthorized disclosure of information, and the loss or degradation of assets and capabilities, the letter read.

Early identification and intervention measures help protect the Army's people, information and critical assets, Crumley said. Personnel who have any information about an insider threat should report it immediately to their chain of command or law enforcement officials.

Crumley acknowledged the complexity behind identifying and reporting an insider threat. In some cases, these individuals could be co-workers, leaders, peers, or friends, he said.

"Allow the chain of command or other leadership to do what is necessary to verify [an insider threat]. At the end of the day, you may be saving lives or protecting critical Army information and assets," he said.

Terrorism, extremism, or insider threat reporting can be completed through the Army's iSALUTE, iWATCH, or Criminal Investigation Command websites.

The Army's iWATCH program includes antiterrorism awareness resources to help service members and their families identify and report potential activity. The iSALUTE site allows personnel to report threat incidents, extremist behavioral indicators, and other counterintelligence matters.

Individuals can also report a crime or submit a crime tip through the Army CID website, or on a smartphone using the CID Crime Tips mobile application.

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

ScriptCenter Express prescription pickup comes to Stewart-Hunter

Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield continues to evolve services as resources shift in the fight against the coronavirus global pandemic.

Winn Army Community Hospital began offering another service to support beneficiaries needing after-hour pharmacy services when the For Stewart ScriptCenter went live, 7:30 a.m. Aug. 17 following a short ribbon cutting ceremony.

"We are excited to offer our beneficiaries 24/7 access to refill medications at the new ScriptCenter on Fort Stewart," said Winn ACH Commander Col. Julie Freeman. "This technology provides a convenient and secure access to refill most prescriptions."

Co-located at Winn ACH's emergency room lobby, the ScriptCenter is an automated pharmacy kiosk and locker system that provides a safe and secure pick-up of prescriptions and healthcare products 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Winn ACH Chief of Pharmacy Maj. Raquel Giunta also expressed her feelings regarding the ScriptCenter opening.

"The Pharmacy team and I are very excited to offer this additional point of service to our patients," Giunta said. "It is a quick and easy option for patients so they don't have to go to the pharmacy or for those needing prescriptions after hours."

The service allows individuals to call in their prescription refills; which will be available for pick-up after three duty days. The prescription will remain available there for up to 10 days – and will return back to the pharmacy if not picked up in that time.

Patients can retrieve the prescription from the lock box by providing a quick scan of their military ID card - after inputting their date of birth or fingerprints. If you forget your login or PIN, you can press "Forgot ID" or "Forgot Pin" to recover them. Controlled substances or prescriptions that require refrigeration still have to be picked up at the pharmacy's window.

The ScriptCenter is available to all active duty military, dependents, retirees, and authorized Department of Defense ID holders who register for the service. Individuals can register at the kiosk by bringing one of their prescriptions that they need to activate using their account and the prescription number. If you don't have a current prescription to activate, you can call 435-5221 and leave a message. Or call the number listed on the ScriptCenter at 944-535-9989.

"Community members can help in the ongoing fight against COVID-19 and the recent surge due to the Delta variant by wearing a mask, washing hands, social distancing and avoiding large crowds," said Col. Tamara Funari, deputy commander for nursing and patient services.

A ScriptCenter was opened on Hunter Army Airfield March 31, located in the Hunter Exchange lobby, 130 Haley Drive Building 6020. The Hunter Kiosk hours of operation are 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and 10:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday.



Finding the beauty of ministry while deployed

One week ago, none of the Soldiers in front of me knew each other. They were complete strangers. I look at the patches they wear. They indicate that these Soldiers are from different Task Forces, different compos and different points within their deployment. Yet, here they are - singing with abandon, lifting their voices in harmony in honor of the God they love. The holy of this moment is overwhelming. It transforms the reality that we are sitting in an abandoned old chapel recently restored with borrowed furniture and heavily used instruments. The Soldiers sing as one, carrying the new song that God has placed on their hearts. I savor this moment. This display of faithfulness and beauty humbles the heart and centers the soul. I cannot believe that my God and my Country afford me this sacred opportunity to share in moments like the one before me.

Ministry on deployment is different. It is special. It is simpler in expression and, vet, more challenging to create. For example, as a chaplain, I walk into the AO and face the reality that there will be more "unknowns" than "knowns". What type of space can we use to hold the holy tension of faith? Who are the faces that will come seeking worship? When will the various battle rhythms even afford an opportunity for Sabbath and worship? Where will the songs that God has placed on the hearts of Soldiers come from? Admittedly, these questions spark a bit of anxiety.


however. They are not even unique to military chaplains over the years of war, deployments and rotations. I find solace in the fact that these are similar questions that the Disciples asked of themselves when they were creating their faith communities after the ascension of Christ. What does it mean to be a follower of Christ when Christ is not physically present? What should our communities of faith look like? Where will we meet? What will we do when we gather? How can we assure our souls that the uncertain future can be overcome with the power of our praise and the courage of our ministry? Ministry on deployment is sacred because of the fragility of this moment before me. I know that when the singing ends that it is quite possible these Soldiers will never meet again. They may succumb to the loneliness or frustration of deployment and skip their day of Sabbath. So many things affect the possibility of faith. The Disciples experienced this. And so like the Disciples, I pray a prayer of gratitude for the faithfulness before me, knowing that the power of the Gospel is present within the voices and melodies even in the most distant places and among the most

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Southern Sudan native beats odds; reaches goals as U.S. Army Soldier

CAMP AS SAYLIYAH, Qatar—A Southern Sudan-born Iowa National Guardsman serving with the Knoxville based 3654th Support Maintenance Company here, remembers his struggle to reach America as he works to earn his commission as a U.S. Army clinical social worker.

"We didn't have food, water or nowhere to hide, praying was the only hope to survive" said Spc. Fourtytwo Yet, a U.S. Army unit supply specialist, or 92 Yankee.

Yet moved with one of his sisters and her four children from war-torn Southern Sudan to the Dadaab refugee camp when he was seven years old.

"I have two brothers, six sisters and a mother and father," said Yet. "My father passed away during an ambush, my mother passed away because of sickness and only one of my siblings was able to come along with me to the refugee camp."

Yet was born in 1989 in the small village of Waa Ttown, but he grew up in Kenya, which is one of the many poorest countries in Africa.

"Growing up in my village was not easy, it was not safe at all," he said. "My father died by a 42-machine gun, and in memory of my father, my mother named me Fourtytwo." The 42-machine gun, or Mauser general-purpose machine gun is a German-made weapon in use by the German Army since 1942.

Yet said unlike America, which has religious freedom enshrined in the Constitution, his native land is engulfed in sectarian conflicts, where the freedom of religion Americans enjoy is unknown.

The Northerners in Sudan practice Islam and the Southerners practice Christianity; the feud between the two caused a religious war that went on for many years...

"The Northerners wanted everyone to only practice their religion," he said. "So the country split and created different tribes that had their own practice of religion."

According to Yet, there were three large tribes in his village and he was a member of the Nuer tribe. His tribe went to war with the Dinka tribe to fight for control of their village.

"The Dinka tribe was the largest in South Sudan, so they wanted their people to be in control of everyone," he said. "It got to the point that we were outnumbered and our people could not win that battle." South Sudan is the name of the new country split from the larger Sudan.

After years of fighting an endless war, Yet and hundreds of others decided to leave for a safe haven refugee camp in Kenya.

"We marched on foot for many miles to try to make it to the refugee camp, still battling diseases, wild animals and the enemy," he said. "Everyone did not make it. The journey to the camp was not easy, but it was worth it."

The carnage he witnessed will stay with him the rest of his life, he said.

"We were walking through the jungle and the wilderness," Yet said. "We would step over deceased bodies and

see bodies falling as we marched."

Once they made it to the camp, things improved for his sisters, his nieces and himself, but they were still being mistreated when the U.S. government officials were not there.

"Sometimes they would beat us or even take away some of our food," he said. "Regardless of that, it was still better than being in Southern Sudan."

The Iowa National Guardsman said that he felt like he is one of the lucky ones to make it to the camp.

"Every year, there was a process called settlement. That is when the American government officials would come and gather a few of us to go to the United States," Yet said. "I waited 10 years after being at the camp to get selected to go to America."

The specialist came to the United States in 2013. He worked at small jobs to get his new life started in America.

"My first job in America, I worked night shift as a janitor," he said. "I did not know any English or anyone when I first came."

Yet learned English and some of the basic phrases and words that most Americans use by watching Pink Panther movies and Johnny Bravo cartoons.

"It didn't feel real when I arrived. I thought that I was dreaming," he said. "I prayed many nights to get the chance that I got now."

Yet enlisted in the Army National Guard June 06, 2016 and he has been serving as a supply specialist for six years in the state of Iowa.

"I felt like I owed the U.S. for giving me this amazing opportunity," Yet said. "Joining the Army was a way that I could show my pride and gratitude for my freedom."

Shortly after joining the National Guard, he discovered the educational benefits that the military offers, which he took full advantage of going on to earn his associate degree in human services, a bachelor's in social work and a master's in social work.

"I have had a lot of sleepless nights trying to achieve my educational goals because I knew what I wanted and refused to give up," he said. "Back home, we had no schools, so I take my education very seriously. I want to be able to return home and teach the children in the village how to read and write."

After receiving his bachelor's degree, the specialist decided that he wanted to be an Army officer and serve as a clinical social worker or even a chaplain or behavior health officer.

The 3rd Division Sustainment Brigade behavioral health care provider Capt. Katherine Lunsford, a clinical psychologist, 73 Bravo, says she is happy to help the Southern Sudan native reach his goals.

"I was impressed by his eagerness, kind heart and willingness to go above and beyond with any task that he is given," Lunsford said. "As an Army leader and the behavioral health provider, I understand where Specialist Yet came from and I feel like it is my responsibility to help all Soldiers reach their full potential."

Lunsford contacted a surgeon general consultant for

social work to get the requirements that Yet will need to commission and be selected for a social work position in the Army.

"With him having the amount of education that he has, I think that he will definitely be a great competitor in the process of getting selected," the captain said. "I've only known him for a short amount of time, but his attitude and work ethic is something that you don't see often."

During his July 26 battlefield circulation here, Maj. Gen. Michel M. Russell Sr., the 1st Theater Sustainment Command commanding general, met Yet and said he was so impressed with him that he gave the specialist his commander's coin.

The general said he was so personally moved by his story and his ambition to be an Army officer helping other Soldiers, that he turned to 3rd Division Sustainment Brigade Command Sgt. Maj. Denise Malave and told her, "When his packet is done, get it to me and I will sign it."

Yet said meeting the general was a thrill.

"I was nervous, excited and honored at the same time when I met the commanding general. He was very understanding and easy to talk to," he said. "This was my first time meeting someone with so much rank, I was glad that my hard work was recognized. It's always a great feeling to get a pat on your back."

Yet said he never gave up hope, no matter what situation he found himself in and he wants to share that hope with others.

"The joy that the Army brings me feels unreal, but I am not done yet," he said. "I still want to be able to take care of my family and give back to my village. I feel like coming to America and joining the Army has put me in the right direction to make all of that possible."


