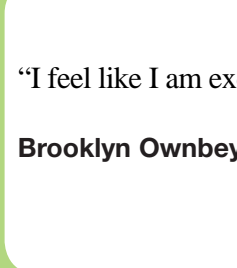
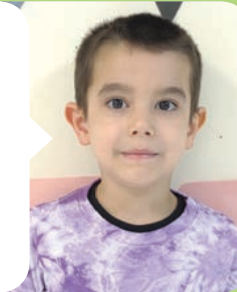

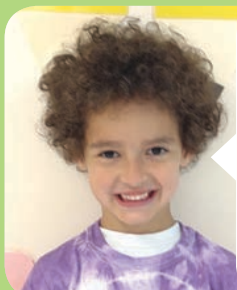

Installation leaders visit Georgia State Capitol, legislators thank 3ID for service to Georgia, nation

ATLANTA- Senior leaders from the 3rd Infantry Division, Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield visited the Georgia State Capitol for 3rd ID Day, March 29.

Georgia legislators established 3rd ID Day in 2017 with House Resolution 490 to honor the historic division and its Soldiers. Attendees this year included Maj. Gen. Charles D. Costanza, the 3rd ID commander, Command Sgt. Maj. Quentin V. Fenderson, 3rd ID senior enlisted advisor, Col. Manuel F. Ramirez, Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield commander, and Lt. Col. Stephan R. Bolton, Hunter Army Airfield commander.

"This is a way to say thank you and give everyone an opportunity to fellowship and meet some people," said Representative Al Williams, a Vietnam War veteran and the state representative for Georgia District 168, which includes Fort Stewart.

Williams said 3rd ID Day is import-

ant because most people usually don't get to see Soldiers and talk to them, and this event gave attendees that opportunity. He also said the legislators have supported the military and veterans by passing over 60 bills that support them in the last seven years.

Allen Brown, the mayor of Hinesville, Georgia, one of the cities surrounding Fort Stewart, said his city has a proud history of supporting Soldiers, families and civilians who work or live on the base. Surrounding communities have a direct impact on

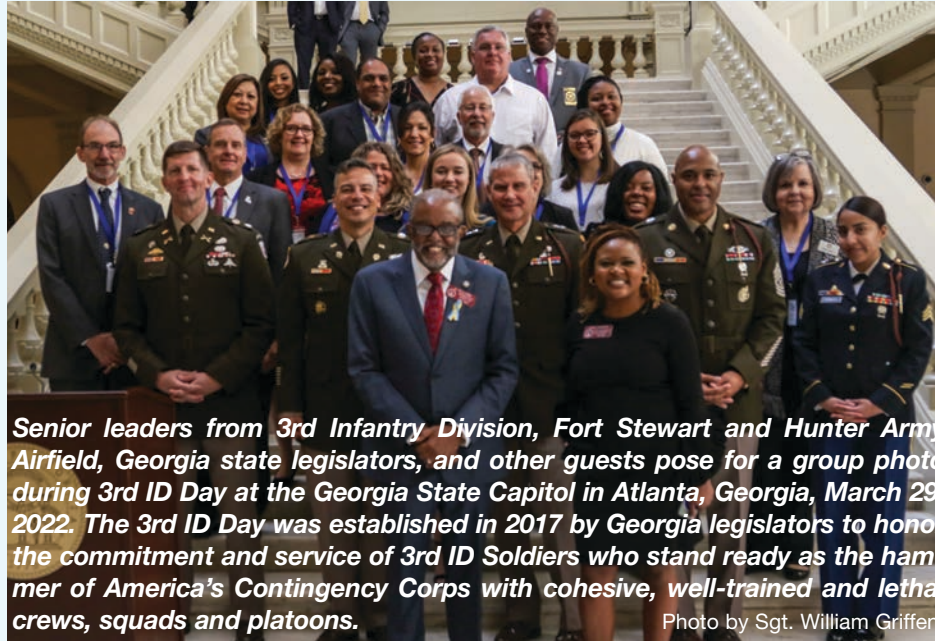
Soldiers' lives and family members who live in the local area with stores, restaurants, medical facilities and many other resources.

In February and March, over 3,800 3rd ID Soldiers deployed to Europe to assure NATO allies, deter further aggression against NATO member states and train with host-nation forces.

"We're sensitive about the deployments like we're experiencing now, because we want the families to feel total support," Brown said.

Throughout the visit to the state capitol, legislators took time to converse with, thank and lead tours of the building with the guests. Costanza thanked the legislators for their ongoing support as his division continues to modernize and train to deploy worldwide.

"Thank you to the cities of Hinesville and Savannah, Liberty County, all of coastal Georgia and the state of Georgia, for your fantastic support for Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield," Costanza said.

Each passport activity asks that the child complete an element that makes the world a better place in one or more of the following areas: 1) Recycling, 2) Composting, 3) Reusing a grocery bag or 4) Planting

- **Passports** can be downloaded at <https://shop.commissaries.com/militarychild> and parents, teachers or other adult can verify completion of those activities by signing and dating the activity. Participants with one or more completed elements can visit their commissary to receive a Certificate of Participation from their commissary representative

- **Timeline.** Photos must be uploaded no later than 5 p.m., EST, April 29, 2022

- **Eligibility.** Only children of authorized commissary patrons in grades K – 12 – one entry per household – can participate in the contest. DeCA employees and family members are not eligible

- **Certificate of Participation.** Parents showing a completed passport can obtain a Certificate of Participation from store personnel

- **Deadline.** Winners will be notified by email no later than May 31, and gift cards will be mailed to the winner's address

Army's 2023 budget focuses on deterrence, people

WASHINGTON — The new Army fiscal year 2023 budget focuses on enabling integrated deterrence, executing global campaigning, and building enduring advantages. The \$178 billion budget, released on Monday, is an increase of \$2.8 billion from fiscal 2022.

“The FY23 budget is a positive one for the Army, because it really lets us do two things simultaneously,” said Army Undersecretary Gabe Camarillo. “First, we maintain a high level of readiness. Second, it enables continued transformation of the Army of 2030 as we strategically pivot from two decades of focus on counterterrorism to an Army adapted to meet our top pacing challenge in China and the acute threat of Russian aggression.”

The Army is focusing the new budget on deterrence by continuing its modernization efforts. The budget includes the next steps in the development of its Mobile Protected Firepower Light Tank System, or MPF and the Next Generation Squad Weapon, or NGSW. The NGSW is a prototype program that aims to replace the M4 rifle, M249 Squad Automatic Weapon and M240 machine gun.

“The Army’s continued transformation is done by maintaining momentum,” Camarillo said. “In this budget on our modernization programs, we’re including the fielding of our mobile protected firepower and the next generation squad weapon and continuing our investment in people—in talent management, and building a positive command climate at scale, as well as cutting edge formations.”

The Army is maintaining momentum by continuing to invest in capabilities like long-range hypersonic weapons, mid-range capability missiles, and precision strike missiles. It is also adding onto the force structure by adding a third multi-domain task force as well as continuing experimentation and exercises in Project Convergence, the Army’s joint, multi-domain series of war games.

As part of the plan for bringing the force into the future, the total Soldier end strength has been decreased in an effort to focus on quality over quantity.

“For the Army to keep momentum on our modernization programs, and to transform to the Army of 2030, it’s absolutely important that we maintain our emphasis on high quality talent we need for our cutting-edge formations,” Camarillo said. “As we field new capabilities...we did not want to lower our standards in FY 23 to address any gaps in our recruiting projections. So, we proactively made the decision to temporarily reduce our end strength from 485,000 Soldiers to 476,000 in FY 22 and 473,000 in FY 23.”

Camarillo said that the end strength goals serves as the overall guide to focus on recruiting for high quality talent instead of recruiting to fulfill a number. The overall number only effects active duty, not the National Guard or Reserves.

“I would just want to emphasize that this is not a budget-driven decision,” he added. “It’s about maintaining high quality of our talent and our recruiting, and we will look to build back up our end strength over the course of the fight.”

The Army will continue to take part in and hold exercises, like Pacific Pathways in the Indo-Pacific region and Defender in Europe, to provide critical capabilities that enable operational support to the Joint Force.

“Our continued funding for Pacific Pathway exercises and Defender Europe obviously continue to build on the great work being done there in those two theaters,” Camarillo said.

Along with continued training and improvements, the Army will also use part of the budget to improve some of the training elsewhere. Part of the funds will enable 1,235 Full Spectrum miles and increase flying hours to 11.1.

The funds will also resource 22 combat training center rotations, invests in operational and installation climate resilience and funds facility sustainment at 85% and base operations at 93%.

“People are by far our greatest asset, and talent is our greatest advantage. So, we have investments to build positive command climate at scale,” Camarillo said.

Part of improving command climate is further funding the Independent Review Commission and Fort Hood Independent Review Commission, Camarillo said.

The IRC establishes the prevention workforce, restructures the Army’s Sexual Harassment/Assault Response and Prevention program and allows for criminal justice reform.

The Army also plans on investing in programs, facilities and talent in the future as a way to invest in its people as part of its “People First” focus.

“Quality of life investments in Soldier barracks, housing and child development centers are all really important to

make sure that we are investing in our people and their resiliency,” Camarillo said. “The Army led the way in issuing the first climate strategy within the Department of Defense among the services, and that includes funding and investments in this budget for installation resilience.”

Additionally, the budget requested a 4.6% increase to basic pay for Soldiers as well as 3.9% increase to basic allowance for housing and 3.4% basic allowance for subsistence. This budget also provides a 4.6% raise for Army civilians.

There is also a \$1.8 billion set aside for special pay incentives to recruit and retain talent into the Army.

69.1% of the budget was requested to go toward military personnel, which is a 4.9% increase.

All the efforts outlined in the 2023 budget follow the Army’s main three priorities of people, readiness and modernization, Camarillo said.

The budget also synchronizes modernization efforts with the Regionally Aligned Readiness and Modernization Model, or ReARMM. ReARMM provides Army units with a structure to regionally align units to augment the Joint Force.

The funds also allows for a 3rd Multi-Domain Task Force and works to shore up cyber vulnerabilities across Army installations.

“This budget puts us on a sustainable strategic path to get to the Army of 2030,” Camarillo said. “It enables our ability to maintain that high level of readiness ... [and] invests in key capabilities to support Soldiers and their families. And that, of course, maintains continuity on the modernization of our warfighting capabilities.”

24th Ordnance Company builds proficiency Arming the Rock

Soldiers assigned to the 24th Ordnance Company, 87th Division Sustainment Support Battalion, 3rd Division Sustainment Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division, conducted a three-day exercise to train on the construction of Field Ammunition Supply Points (FASP) March 28-30 on Fort Stewart.

"The purpose of this training is to validate our proficiency within one of our mission essential tasks for the 24th Ordnance Company which is to establish and support an ammunition support area," said Capt. Joshua Moore the commander of 24th. "This training requires synchronization of ammunition support and horizontal engineer operations in order to be successful."

Along with validating proficiency, the training demonstrated the unit's capabilities in supporting the Division through the proper containment and distribution of ammunition at a FASP.

"The training is to show our capabilities and what we can do internally to support the Division because we are a Division asset even though we're an ordnance

company," said 1st Sgt. Steven Choat, the senior enlisted advisor of 24th. "We're supposed to be able to expediently set up FASPs and be able to execute. That comes with setting up the berms to standard and the different stations for customers or units to drive through to pick up ammo."

The 24th builds and maintains their proficiency through the application of realistic training goals intended to ensure the Soldiers are prepared to conduct their mission.

"The last time we conducted this training was June of last year," said Moore. "Generally we maintain our proficiency through sets, reps and NTC (National Training Center). This year we weren't tasked with an NTC rotation so, that coupled with the fact that we needed to get some training on the 'dozer' for our engineers led us to start this training."

A unique part of the training consisted of the 24th Soldiers utilizing equipment they typically don't use.

"We were able to execute several individual tasks that are generally overlooked for instance, clearing the area of explosive hazards," said Capt. Moore. "We have mine detectors that the Soldiers are supposed to be proficient with so, we were actually able to do that once we occupied this area. We cleared the

suspected mine field using our mine detectors and then the construction of the berms."

The training also allowed two separate military occupational specialties to work together toward a common goal.

"It's giving our 89 Bravos (ammunition specialists) the ability to see how it's supposed to look in real time but it's also giving the engineers the ability to assist in building the berm and the field ASP while also giving them additional training as well because this is how it should look if we were to go to an austere environment," said Choat.

Being in the field environment not only gave the Soldiers ability to get a feel of what their job might be like in an austere environment, but it also gave the Soldiers a chance to train on how their job translates in a deployed environment and what the importance of their job is.

"A lot of times we feel as if we do not get enough time to actually do our MOS (military occupational specialty) especially the newer Soldiers just coming in that haven't experienced anything like this," said Sgt. Pedro Moore an ammunition specialist assigned to 24th.

For those Soldiers who recently completed Advanced Individual Training (AIT), the

training also gave them additional opportunities to apply skills they learned in a classroom setting in a hands-on mission.

"This is my first time doing this," said Pfc. Xavier Carroll an ammunition specialist assigned to 24th. "I feel that this training is important to help keep our ammo safe so that it won't sustain any collateral damage if a fire breaks out. In AIT, we were taught certain ways to build a berm and set up wire fences, but the training today is more hands-on with teaching us how to execute in a faster more efficient way."

To prepare for the training, the 24th Soldiers conducted several classes to ensure Soldiers were proficient with the fundamentals of the operation prior to taking it to a field environment.

"The Army is a valuable organization, but the Army cannot move without ammo because regardless of where they're at or what they're doing the Soldiers are going to need ammo," said Sgt. Moore. So, all in all we're the meat and the potatoes and the 24th Ordnance Company is the best company on Fort Stewart."

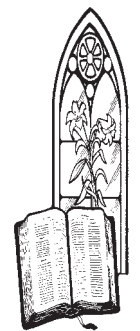

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Female Soldiers encouraged by growing opportunities for women

WASHINGTON --Latosha Ravenell remembers being the only female standing in formations comprised entirely of men.

She said she did not see as many opportunities for women when she enlisted in the Army in 1994.

"I got so accustomed to being the only [female]" said Ravenell, now the command sergeant major of the Army Marketing and Engagement Brigade at Fort Knox, Kentucky.

Ravenell spoke about the progress of female Soldiers with a group of female leaders and pioneers Thursday night including Lt. Gen. Donna Martin, the Army's first African-American female inspector general.

The Charleston, South Carolina native said that early in her career, some of her mentors told her to conform instead of actively pursuing her career goals. She said she spent months listening to others before she changed her attitude, eventually becoming an accomplished recruiter and later a first sergeant.

"So for me to see this panel, it's powerful," she said. "But I don't think we have seen anything yet. We still have room for improvement."

In the last decade, the Army has seen opportunities for women become more prevalent. To date, the Army has graduated 100 females from its famed Ranger School at Fort Benning, Georgia, after first opening the training to women in 2015.

Martin said that female Soldiers continue to shatter stereotypes by taking leadership roles. In addition to Martin's milestones as a black female officer, Capt. Catherine Grizzle, another panelist, became the second woman to serve as a battery commander of A Battery, 2nd Battalion, 2nd Field Artillery at Fort Sill, Oklahoma.

Grizzle achieved another milestone after getting selected as one of the first women to serve as a gunnery instructor at the Army's Field Artillery School in Lawton. Grizzle, a Filipino-American in her 8th year in the Army, has deployed in support of Operation Inherent

Resolve in Iraq and also to Kuwait.

"In regards to stereotypes, these attitudes and beliefs ... really threaten the integrity of the armed forces," Grizzle said. "One oversimplified idea is that women lead with their emotions; that women are too compassionate to lead service members in combat. This stereotype presents a fundamental barrier to women who may want to join any male dominated field."

Grizzle said stereotypes coerce women to believing that they have limits in their career progression as leaders.

male also made a comment about her race.

"So not only did he tell me that he wasn't going to do what I told him to do, he flat out refused," Martin said. "So that's the kind of adversity you could face in the military, and I don't know that it is as pervasive as it is back then."

Fortunately, Martin had a company commander who did not condone such behavior. Instead of letting the Soldier's words shatter her confidence, Martin used it as motivation.

ments she heard while taking the Army Physical Fitness Test a few years ago.

Male Soldiers quipped that she would pass her test because she "was on the female standard." Her male peers also asked her if she would run with the slowest group.

The panelists agreed that female Soldiers still face adversity in the military, but that such behavior has become less prevalent as female Soldiers shatter stereotypes such as ones that question their ability to engage in strenuous physical activity.

"Being able to surpass those tropes and those stereotypes ... and kind of shattering that surprises people," said Fox, an executive officer at headquarters support company 404th Aviation Support Battalion, 4th Combat Aviation Brigade, Fort Carson, Colorado. "And it's kind of fun to surprise people."

Fox, who originally enlisted as a linguist in the Pennsylvania National Guard, recently earned her Expert Soldier Badge and received the 2021 4th Infantry Division Junior Officer of the Year award.

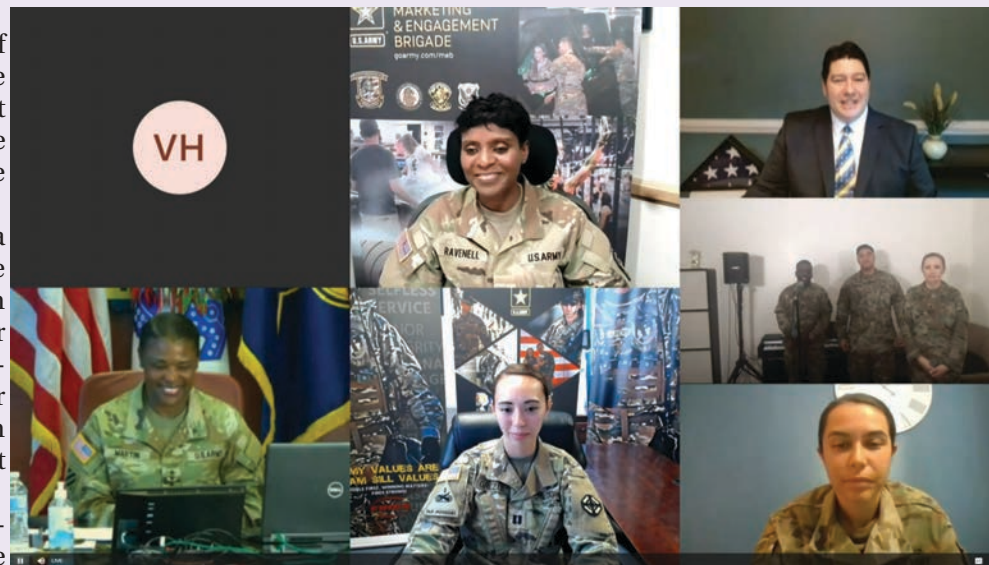
An enlisted Soldier became the first woman to graduate from the Army's Sniper School in November and 1st Lt. Amber English, a member of the service's World Class Athlete Program, earned a gold medal at the Summer Olympics in women's skeet shooting.

Finally, the panelists addressed the recently modified standards of the Army's Combat Fitness Test, which has shifted to having reduced standards for females and older Soldiers. Originally the Army had planned to use the same fitness standards for all Soldiers regardless of gender or age.

The Army based the change on age and gender performance scales through analysis by the Rand Corporation, performance data and Soldier feedback, Martin said.

"The adjustment in the scoring scale more accurately reflects a distribution of performance across all elements of the Army," she said. "And it ensures a fair transition to a new fitness test of record."

Martin said the standards remain rigorous and will allow the Army to strengthen its culture of physical fitness and improve overall unit readiness.

She added that no single leadership style has dominion over other leadership styles and that the Army has mentors that steer female Soldiers to success regardless of their gender.

Proving doubters wrong

As a young lieutenant stationed at Germany in the late 1980s, Martin had an encounter with a Soldier that could have broken her early in her military career.

Martin anticipated taking more leadership responsibilities as the company's executive officer when a male Soldier's words shook her. Martin had just welcomed the new lieutenant to the unit and explained to him his duties.

Then the male Soldier abruptly turned to her.

"You're kidding if you think I'm ever going to listen to a woman in uniform," Martin recalled the Soldier saying. The

"If I had listened to that as a young lieutenant that someone wasn't going to listen to me because of my sex and my race, I would have gotten out of the Army," she said. "But I had leaders that pulled me up."

"You can either let it define you, or you can prove it wrong."

Martin applauded the Army's current diversity, equity and inclusion efforts today, which includes the People Strategy and Project Inclusion, a five-year effort where Army leaders promote greater opportunities for Soldiers of all races and backgrounds.

More than three decades later, Martin led a restructuring of the Army Criminal Investigation Command rose to become the first Black woman to become commandant of the Army's Military Police School at Fort Leonard Wood.

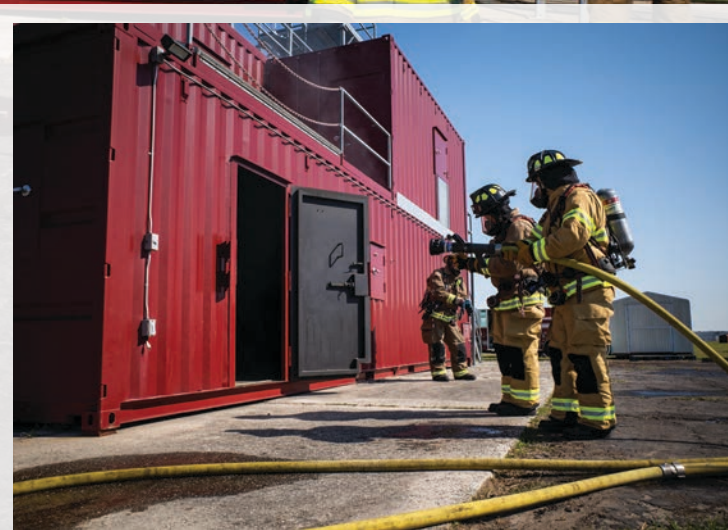
