IMCOM welcomes new CG

Lt. Gen. Bradley A. Becker took command of United States Army Installation Management Command in ceremonies Sept. 5 at Joint Base San Antonio-Fort Sam Houston.

Becker was promoted to lieutenant general immediately before the ceremony by Gen. Mark A. Milley, Chief of Staff of the U.S. Army.

Becker replaces Lt. Gen. Kenneth R. Dahl, who had served IMCOM since November 2015.

During Becker's promotion ceremony, Milley said the new IMCOM commander was talented and humble, a man who "is not afraid to speak truth to power. We want servant-leaders in our generals."

At the change of command ceremony, Milley praised IMCOM and its employees, thanking them for generating Army readiness by supporting Soldiers, their families and civilians. "Readiness is much more than manning, equipping and training. Soldiers can't focus exclusively on their combat mission if they think their family is in lousy housing, or has inadequate medical care, or unsafe schools for their children," he said.

Of the Army's 1.1 million Soldiers, 60 percent are married and most have at least two children, Milley said. Under Dahl's leadership, IMCOM reduced 1,000 positions "which allowed us to apply those resources to build an SFAB (Security Force Assistance Brigade) which is in Afghanistan today," Milley said.

"Every base and installation is important, both in CONUS and overseas," Milley said. "Every single Solder in the Army passes through IMCOM at some point, and IMCOM is responsible for the readiness of today's Army."

Dahl was the first commanding general of IMCOM who was not dual-hatted as the Army's Assistant Chief of Staff for Installation Management. During his remarks at the ceremony, Dahl thanked the command's 50,000 employees for their role in providing continuity in the Army's 75 installations.

Despite budget cuts and doubling down on multiple jobs, IMCOM employees are dedicated professionals who keep the dayto-day operations going, providing facilities, utilities, security and recreational opportunities, he said.

"IMCOM provides platforms for readiness, so our Soldiers are fit, trained and ready for combat," said Dahl, who will be retiring from active service later this month.

Becker thanked family and friends for their support and said Dahl built a great team at IMCOM.



Hounds hold first tank competition at Sparta

Elements of 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team held the first Excellence in Armor Competition since the brigade converted to a tank-focused force Aug. 30 – Sept. 7, at Fort Stewart.

"We were challenged by the battalion commander to create and proof a working Excellence in Armor program here in 3-67 Armor. It will be the model in which other companies will use moving forward and will be shared across the brigade," said Capt. Jason B. Boswell, Company A, 3rd Battalion, 67th Armor Regiment.

The program identifies, recognizes and honors tankers and scout Soldiers in the ranks of private through sergeant who have demonstrated outstanding performance and possess leadership potential, while also achieving excellence in their respective occupational specialties.

"Our tankers endured a grueling test of their physical toughness and mental aptitude showing the level of proficiency and excellence in which we are transitioning as a unit," Boswell said.

Throughout the week, Soldiers were tested on a variety of warrior tasks and drills which included a 4-mile run in less than 36 minutes, a 12-mile foot march with a 35-pound rucksack in less than three hours, day and night land navigation courses, weapons systems tasks and armored vehicle related tasks.

Soldiers also performed tasks focused specifically on

the M1 Abrams Tank. Those tasks included bore sighting, preventive maintenance checks and services procedures, and loading ammunition, all within time restraints.

Once the EIA qualification concludes, "Spartan Brigade" Soldiers who meet the Office of the Chief of Armor at Fort Benning standards will set themselves apart from their peers as their careers progress.

"The Soldiers who met all qualifications will be formally inducted into the EIA Program by the armor branch," said Staff Sgt. Gregory Adelman a tank commander with "Aries" Company, 3-67 Armor. "They will be identified for accelerated promotion and maintain key positions within the unit so we can benefit from their potential as leaders."

After successfully completing the qualification course, the EIA will be added to their military records so their accomplishment will follow them for the rest of their military careers.

records validates that you have obtained excellence in your career field; it's not easy to obtain due to the rarity at which the event is offered," said Adelman. "I have only seen the event conducted one other time in my career."

Participants who failed to achieve the Excellence in Armor Award will continue their day-to-day service and will have another chance to earn it next year.

Hunter Soldiers pay respects to 9/11 victims

People around the country took time Sept. 11 to remember the thousands who died in the terror attacks on Sept. 11, 2001.

At the National 9/11 Memorial and Museum in downtown New York City, people looked at the names of the victims engraved above the recessed pools where the Twin Towers once

In Shankesville, Pennsylvania, Americans looked at the names on the wall at the Flight 93 National Memorial, which is the site where United Airlines Flight 93 crashed after it was hijacked by terrorists who were then overtaken by the plane's passengers, which prevented the hijackers from reaching their target - either the Pentagon or the White House.

In Savannah, a group of 32 runners with the Savannah Chapter of Team Red, White and Blue unfurled a flag at Fort Screven on Tybee Island and ran with it 23 miles through downtown Savannah to Hunter Army Airfield where it was presented to the Hunter Army Airfield Command Team of Lt. Col. Ken Dwyer and Command Sgt. Maj. Levander Wilkerson.

"For many, the anniversary of 9/11 is a day of service to help transform the tragic events of 9/11 into a day of unity to demonstrate a positive tribute to those lost and injured on 9/11 and the many who rose in service in response to the attacks," said Dwyer on the steps of the garrison headquarters to the members of Team RWB and law enforcement and fire personnel from the installation.

"We ran from Tybee Island through the streets of downtown Savannah to Hunter Army Airfield with the American flag changing hands along the way from service members to firefighters to military veterans," said Chris Lancia, 9/11 Old Glory Relay organizer and a Soldier with the 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade. "Our goal was to elevate awareness on this 17th anniversary of 9/11"

The runners took turns running the 23 miles. Along the way, the American flag was carried by Soldiers, firefighters and military veterans.

This is the fifth year Team RWB has conducted a run on the 9/11 anniversary. This year, they're running coastto-coast ... from Boston to San Diego. This is the first year the Savannah

3rd CAB Soldiers honor the fallen in Savannah run

Soldiers from 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division participated in the 2018 Tunnels to Towers 5K Run and Walk Sept. 8 at Orleans Square in Sayannah.

The Tunnels to Tower 5K Run and Walk is held annually across the country in order to recognize the first responders who made the ultimate sacrifice during 9/11.

The event was inspired by Stephen Siller, a firefighter who ran through the tunnels of New York City on 9/11 to reach the Twin Towers and save others before losing his own life in the attacks.

This is the seventh time the Tunnels to Tower 5K has been held in Savannah, and it was widely supported by both the civilian and military community.

"We have over 2,000 people who are participating in today's run," said Jane Grismer, race director for the 5K in Savannah. Of those 2,000 participants, approximately 800 were service members and their families.

In addition to commemorating those who lost their lives on 9/11, the race honored four FDNY firefighters who lost their lives in the past year due to illnesses attributed to responding on 9/11: Michael Curry, Mark Hummeldorf, Jimmy Perez and Mike McFadden. The race also honored Sgt. 1st Class Christopher Celiz, from 1st Ranger Battalion, 75th Ranger Regiment. Celiz was killed in action in Afghanistan July 12 this year.

Capt. Justin Gill, commander for Company C, 3rd Squadron, 17th Calvary Regiment, 3rd CAB, 3rd ID is a Soldier originally from New York who participated in the event on Sept. 8. The events of 9/11 left a lasting impression on him.

"I was in high school," said Gill. "I could see the smoke from the World Trade Center from my hometown, and that is when I decided that I wanted to be in the military."

Shortly after high school, Gill spent time as a volunteer firefighter before joining the military.

"Firefighting is in my blood. My grandfather is an ex-chief of Lynbrook fire department," said Gill. "I think the run is a great way to drive home everything that I try to instill into the Soldiers about being a team and having a great bond with one another in the troop."

Gill and his troop honored the fallen firefighters of the FDNY by flying a retired national flag on an AH-64 Apache Helicopter and running with it fully extended during the 5K.

Liz Curtis, director of the Stephen Siller Tunnels to Towers foundation and director of the national 5K run and climb series, explained that the 5K is more than just a race.





You can call for help. But if you need to see a doctor, remember:

- * You must follow the rules of your other health insurance first. If this apply referencing Non-Active Duty with TRICARE Prime.
 - * Your OHI is the primary payer
- * If we help you find a doctor, make sure they're in your other plan's network or your care may not be covered.

Note: The NAL number is a good contact for Active Duty Service Members when on leave or pass and needing Urgent Care when there is no military treatment facility present.

For Urgent or Non-Emergent Care the ADSM must have an approved referral when seen by a civilian facility/provider off post. Without an approved referral the service member is responsible for payment. The Urgent Care program do not apply.

Retiring from active duty? Take action, make an enrollment choice

When you retire from active duty, your TRICARE plan options will change. Retiring from active duty is a Qualifying Life Event. A QLE allows you to enroll in a new TRICARE plan or change your coverage options within 90 days of the life event. As a retiree, you'll need to take action to enroll in a TRICARE plan if you want to continue to receive coverage for civilian care.

What actions do you need to take to continue TRICARE coverage?

First, update your information in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System. The next steps depend on which TRICARE plans you are eligible to use.

If eligible, you can reenroll yourself and eligible family members in TRICARE Prime or TRICARE Select. Depending on the plan you choose, you'll pay the single or family enrollment fee. There is no TRICARE Select enrollment fee for Group A retirees.

Depending on your eligibility, there may be other TRICARE plans for you and your family after retirement. Visit the TRICARE Plan Finder to learn about your options. For dental or vision coverage, you may also be eligible to enroll in the Federal Employees Dental and Vision Insurance Program beginning in 2019.

When do you need to reenroll in TRICARE coverage?

If you want to keep TRICARE Prime or TRICARE Select with no break in coverage, you must enroll within 90 days after your retirement date. If you don't enroll in TRICARE Prime or TRICARE Select within 90 days of retirement, you'll only be eligible for care in a military hospital or clinic on a space-available basis. The effective date of coverage will be your retirement date.

If you enroll in a TRICARE plan more than 90 days after your retirement, your request will be considered a new enrollment. If you have a break in TRICARE coverage, you and your eligible family members can only receive care at a military hospital or clinic on a space-available basis until you have TRICARE Prime or TRICARE Select coverage again.

Active duty service members pay nothing out of pocket and their family's costs are minimal. However, depending on their TRICARE plan, retirees may see an increase in their enrollment fees, copayments, cost-shares, and other fees.

How do you reenroll in TRICARE coverage?

- Use the Beneficiary Web Enrollment website (not available overseas).
- Call your regional contractor.
- Mail your enrollment form. Go to "Forms and Claims" on the TRICARE website to download forms.

If you have a couple of meals today then consider yourself so deeply blessed. There are 1.2 billion people who live on less than a dollar a day. Thirty-two to 40 million people live in some form of slavery. 865 million people don't have access to clean water. We have enough reasons to have joy and gratitude with what we already have.

Second: stop constantly comparing yourselves with others: siblings, classmates, superiors or peers. Globalization, social technology and social media make the problem worse. Comparing ourselves with everything and everybody will rob us of joy and contentment, and allow the seeds of envy, jealousy, and covetousness to take root in our hearts.

There is phrase, "The grass is greener on the other side." It says, "Someone's marriage is greener! Someone's relationships are greener! Someone's church is greener! Someone's environment is greener! Someone's parents are greener! Someone's children's are greener! Someone's job situation is greener." When you feel the grass is greener on the other side, pour water on the grass you are standing

Lastly, do not become a slave to circumstances. In life, there will be hardships, struggles and disrespect in our relationships. We often complain about our circumstances instead of cultivating our situation to grow better circumstances in life.

Pastor and theologian Henri Nouwen spoke about joy: "Joy does not simply happen to us. We have to choose joy and keep choosing it every day." There is a story of ten Samaritan lepers in book of Luke 17:11-19. Messiah had a great passion for people, performing a lot of miracles to heal people. However, the Messiah did one thing rapidly that is so beautiful and confounding. In the culture of his time, lepers were considered outcasts and ostracized - not because they had a contagious skin disease, but because they were thought to be cursed by God. The Messiah healed these ten lepers, as they believed that He could heal them.

Yet, only one of ten men came back to thank Messiah. The one who returned did so with joy and gratitude for a new life. There may have been no other reason for him to have joy and gratitude in life, but this man chose joy and gratitude. We should live a life of joy and gratitude, just like the one leper who returned to give thanks to Jesus.

Football season has started. A lot of people will be out watching or playing the game. It is a fun and challenging activity, which can be a great workout

But whether playing on a school team or with friends, it can also be dangerous if you don't wear the proper protective equipment.

Always wear the correct size equipment such as a helmet, shoulder pads, gloves, and proper footwear, and thigh and knee pads. And stay hydrated.

For spectators, many sport fans will be going to the stadiums to watch their favorite team play. Some will be participating in tailgate parties. So whether your cooking hot dogs, chili, hamburgers or chicken, please remember to keep perishable food cold. This an important part of avoiding food-borne ill-

When you transport raw meat and poultry and other perishable foods to your tailgate party, store them in a cooler with ice or frozen gel packs.

At the end of the tailgate, pack leftovers in clean containers and pack them in a cooler with ice before heading to the game, to ensure they stay fresh. Below is a small list to help get you started.

- Paper towels
- •Moist towelettes and/or hand sanitizer
- •Two coolers, one for food and one for beverages
- •Ice
- •Frozen gel packs
- •Two sets of cooking utensils
- •Paper plates and disposable silverware
- •Food thermometer
- •Clean containers for leftovers

You can find other tailgating safety tips at food safety.gov and other sites on the Internet. And remember, if you plan on drinking, have a designated driver.
