

# Raider Soldiers raise their hands, continue the legacy

Twenty eight Soldiers from the 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division reenlisted together under the American flag which was hoisted by two M1 Abrams tanks, May 16 on Fort Stewart.

Col. Mike Adams, commander of the 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, served as the reenlisting officer for the ceremony in the 3rd Battalion, 69th Armored Regiment's motor pool.

Less than 1% of Americans volunteer to serve their country, and even less volunteer to continue their service.

Sgt. 1st Class Jose Pineroso, an operations sergeant from the 10th Brigade Engineer Battalion, 3rd ID, took part in the mass reenlistment and chose to enlist indefinitely. This means it is the last enlistment of his career and he has committed himself to serve for at least a total of 20 years in the U. S. Army.

"To be part of the few who choose to stay in makes me feel proud," Pineroso said. "I planned to make the Army my career since the day I joined."

"The best thing about the Army is once you're in, you become family," he added.

Pineroso plans to become a command sergeant

major and make a positive impact on the Army until he retires.

Soldiers all across the Army choose to reenlist for many different reasons. The Army offers opportunities to some Soldiers for reenlisting with options like choosing the next duty station or the option to attend Army schools.

For Sgt. Ryan Skinner, an indirect fire infantryman from New Jersey attached to Troop C, 5th Battalion, 7th Cavalry Regiment, it was a little of both, however that was not the sole reason he chose to serve another term.

"I chose to reenlist for airborne school in route to Italy," said Skinner. "I definitely got lucky. But the overall reason why I reenlisted was to continue the path that I'm on"

"To me, all of this means I can other people happy and make my parents proud," he added.

Skinner personally thanked his leadership at Comanche Troop for stepping up and helping him get where he is today. He plans to be a section leader at his unit in Italy and eventually become a commissioned officer to build off of his bachelor's degree.

These 28 Raider Soldiers made the commitment to serve their nation once. Their decision to continue serving, knowing now what it takes, bares true character and cements what it means to be an American Soldier.

Are you ready to move? The peak Permanent Change of Station season is here, and more than 60,000 Soldiers, Family members and civilians across the Army will change locations between May 15 and Aug. 31.

This peak season will also affect the surrounding areas, as more than 490 Soldiers and Family members assigned to the 3rd Infantry Division will begin their relocation and transition to other duty stations this summer.

"My report date was changed from August to October due to the large number of Soldiers PCSing," said Spc. Ryan Mclaughlin, 27, a wheeled vehicle mechanic assigned to Company B, 3rd Brigade Support Battalion, 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd ID and native of Orlando, Florida.

Mclaughlin, on orders to Germany, has been in the Army for three years and this will be his first time PCSing. Mclaughlin, like many Soldiers, regardless of the number of moves, has concerns with the Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield PCS process.

"One of my concerns is housing and living in the barracks," said Mclaughlin. "I am not as concerned about my finances because I am financially conscious about everything I do."

Finance, transportation, and housing are some of the top concerns for Soldiers and their Families, regardless if they are moving stateside or out of the country.

"I think about how long it will take my household goods to get from here to Germany," said Mclaughlin. "I know transportation will take some time, but I don't want to buy items that I packed but may need before my transportation/ household goods arrive."

Like Mclaughlin, all Soldiers should consider the following options when planning their move upon receipt of their PCS orders.

## PLANNING THE MOVE

After receiving PCS orders, each Soldier should create an account, or login to the Defense Personal Property System at *www.move.mil*, to begin the transportation shipment application for their move. The Soldier can then contact the transportation office to finalize shipment paperwork and schedule dates for packing and shipment of HHG.

Scheduling a move to a foreign country? Soldiers on orders outside of the U.S. must schedule an appointment with the transportation office to receive their transportation counseling and review entitlements for HHG movement overseas.

into in how much weight a Soldier is allowed for HHG. This information will be determined when each Soldier logs into DPPS and/or visits the local transportation office. Pro-gear, which consists

of items like professional books and equipment will be calculated separately.

Many Soldiers will have the option to conduct a Personally Procured Move, also known as Do-It Yourself move. This means that the Soldier will either completely move or partially move their belongings to the new location. Soldiers may receive financial incentives for moving their belongings.

The government will also pay for the transport of one privately owned vehicle to the new overseas location.

Additional information about transportation and HHG can be found at *www.move.mil*.

Once the move is complete, each Soldier will receive a customer satisfaction survey, which will be available at the DPPS website landing page, accessed via *www.move.mil*.

## FINANCIAL ENTITLEMENTS

Soldiers who PCS maybe entitled

to financial compensation, such as per diem, dislocation allowance, and/or temporary lodging expenses for transitioning to their new duty station. Each Soldier in the Army is required to have a Government Travel Card. Paperwork to activate a GTC for PCS moves must be completed and turned into the Battalion financial management/budget section.

"Government Travel Cards can be used for any travel related expenses associated with the PCS move," said Sgt. 1st Class Kelvin Banks, the sustainment

charged to the GTC as long as it does not excess the allotted per diem amount."

Daily authorized per diem depends on length of time for travel, location, and dependent status.

Most Soldiers are entitled to dislocation allowance. This allowance is to partially reimburse Soldiers for the transition expenses incurred while relocating their household due to a PCS move.

Each Soldier is limited to a specific amount of days of Temporary Lodging Allowance/Temporary Lodging Expenses. These allowances are to compensate Soldiers for lodging/meal expenses for themselves and their dependent(s) while living in temporary lodging during a PCS move.

## **OCONUS TRAVEL**

Soldiers traveling outside of the U.S.

will need to complete blood work, to include updated immunization, at their troop medical center on Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield or the medical section in the Soldier Service Center, Building 253 on Fort Stewart. Blood work has to be completed within 60-days from their report date and will take seven working days to process.

Upon receipt of PCS orders, Soldiers with dependents and who are PCSing to locations other than Hawaii and Alaska, must complete all passport requirement. Authorized dependents must be listed on PCS orders.

Families with pets must ensure they research and understand the airport policies and country requirement for their pet breed.

Theater specific training must be completed prior to signing out of the installation and may be required for authorized dependent children, 14-years-old or older.

Soldiers with dependents enrolled in the Exceptional Family Member Program must complete the EFMP overseas screening process.

## **FINAL STEPS**

Soldiers should contact their battalion's human resources section (S1) 20 calendar days prior to the start of their PCS leave's start date, to conduct pre-clearance paperwork.

Ten-days prior to the leave start date, Soldiers can clear the unit and installation organizations, including but not limited to Central Issuing Facility, Post Exchange, finance, and housing.

Once the installation clearance is complete, the Soldier must return all paperwork to the battalion S1 and in order to be signed out on leave.

Each Soldier must report and sign into their gaining unit on the last day of leave or by the report date listed in their orders. Additional information can be found on the installation website, online at *https://home.army.mil/stewart/index.php*.

# Installation focuses on eliminating illicit drugs

Illicit drug use is slowly creeping up on Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield, with about 50 cases alone at Hunter in 2018. Altogether, the installation had 120 cases last year.

To combat the issue, the installation is cracking down on drug use and committing to an environment free of illicit drugs that is safe to live and work. The end state is to preserve the Army's values and culture, said Lt. Col. Martin Schmidt, commander of the 385th Military Police Battalion and director of the installation's emergency services.

"The use of illicit drugs degrades our combat readiness and our ability to answer our nation's call to fight and win in a time of war," Schmidt said.

Stewart-Hunter's law enforcement, command teams, and drug counseling services are committed to eliminating drugs from the installation.

"We are really ramping up our measures (against) illicit drug use," Schmidt said. "We're working with the units heavily to get the health and welfare checks in the barracks to mitigate and combat some of the issues we have here. We also do education with the units."


The installation is taking active measures to stop the threat of drugs, including increased random drug testing; health and welfare checks in barracks; and random checks of vehicles at access control points.

"One of our key assets is our military working dog section, comprised of the most professional and best trained handlers and dogs," Schmidt said. "So if anyone decides to press their luck, this is the team of professionals they will meet."

# Hunter hosts housing town hall

3rd Infantry Division Commander, Maj. Gen. Lee Quintas, led the Hunter Army Airfield Housing Town at the post chapel, May 21 on Hunter Army Airfield, to provide an opportunity for community members to learn about follow-up actions since the initial event, Feb. 27.

Hunter Garrison Commander, Lt. Col. Kenneth Dwyer, and his staff hosted the event, supported by the Balfour Beatty Communities and the Fort Stewart Garrison command team. The event included a live discussion and a Facebook tie-in for individuals who couldn't make the town hall. Dwyer said the installation wanted to provide an opportunity for Soldiers and Families to actively voice issues and concerns and gather the community's feedback.

Quintas said the intent was to report back to the community on what actions have been taken since the last town hall, further educate the community on the work-order process and to hear feedback from participants.

Quintas briefed the installation conducted in-home assessments of each unit and government housing, with more than 100 work orders being submitted.

He said a system was developed to track the 105 concerns initiated since the previous town hall, tracking their status, completion and customer feedback, with an emphasis on customer satisfaction. Since the first town hall, the throughput completion rate has increased by 13%. Additional progress included the plan to install 170 metal roofs in Hunter's Wilson Acres by May 2020.

Representatives from BBC followed the commander and explained their efforts to improve the work-order process and customer service. BBC representatives noted part of that was through use of the BBC housing app, Rent Café, which was modified so community members can either pay their bill, initiate or check on an existing work orders, or learn more about upcoming housing events.

Hunter's BBC housing manager, J.D. Miller said individuals who still need assistance can either call or use the app. The app is available on the installation housing website at *http:// home.army.mil/stewart/index.php/ housing*. But said for housing emergencies (That have a 30 minute response time for life, health and safety issues) like gas leaks - they should call. The hotline phone number is 767-5770. The email hotline is usarmy. stewart.usag.mbx.fsga-haaf-housingsupport@mail.mil.

Before closing out the evening, Fort Stewart Garrison Commander, Col. Jason Wolter, let attendees know feedback from the housing town halls would be posted to the installation's housing website.

The 414th Signal Company conducted an emergency deployment readiness exercise, May 14, from Fort Stewart's Wright Army Airfield, loading vehicles and equipment onto a U.S. Air Force C-17.

The exercise, the first EDRE conducted at the installation's airfield, highlights the ability to deploy combat forces directly from Fort Stewart to anywhere in the world. Fort Stewart is a power projection platform for the Department of Defense.

Capt. Tyran Askew, commander of 414th Signal Company, observed as his Soldiers carefully backed a Humvee with a trailered signal dish and light medium tactical vehicle onto the cargo plane out of Charleston. The signal company is part of the 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade, and the exercise validates the rapid-response capability of the unit. "We're loading our equipment on to the bird, and we're going to take off as if we were going to fly into theater," Askew said. "In the event we got the call 'we need you to be here, tonight', in 72 hours we would be ready to go."

The company-sized element provides a brigade-sized unit with communications capability. Deploying this or other forces from directly at Fort Stewart is amazing, said Askew.

"It shows that this platform, from a strategic perspective, how quick the United States military can project combat power," he said.

Wright Army Airfield shares its runways with MidCoast Regional Airport, the municipal airport for Hinesville and Liberty County. The airport completed a runway expansion project last year, increasing the runway's capability to handle additional types of civilian and military aircraft.



# Taking action to help America breathe easier

Each year, the Asthma and Allergy Foundation of America declares May to be "National Asthma and Allergy Awareness Month."

Asthma is a lung disease, affecting over 24 million people living in the United States, including more than six million children. It causes three in five people living with asthma to limit their physical activity or miss days at school and work. Asthma is also expensive, costing the nation \$56 billion each year. It's a peak season for asthma and allergy sufferers, and a perfect time to educate patients, family, friends, co-workers and others about this condition.

According to the Centers for Disease Control, the nature of asthma exacerbations are brought on by triggers, and those triggers can be experienced where you live, learn, work, or play. In the state of Georgia, currently there are about 567,000 adults and 227,000 children diagnosed with asthma. High volume emergency room visits and hospitalizations are also high indicators of the many people living with asthma.

Potential asthma triggers include: tobacco smoke; dust mites; mold; outdoor air pollution and pet dander smoke from burning wood or grass.

Signs and Symptoms of an asthma attack are: coughing; chest tightness; wheezing; and trouble breathing. Georgia is one of 36 states that receive funding and technical support from the CDC and Prevention's National Asthma Control Program. This partnership focuses on communities with the greatest needs.

The task force reaches out by increasing asthma awareness, educating people on how to avoid environmental asthma triggers, partnering with the local stakeholders, and also help residents manage their own health. Statistics are showing their efforts are paying off.

You can control your asthma by knowing the warning signs of an asthma attack, staying away triggers, following the advice of your healthcare provider, and knowing the details of your asthma action plan. To find out more about asthma go to *www.cdc.gov/asthma*.

## As summer fun starts, think of your commissary to save on water, sports drinks

**FORT LEE, Virginia**. – Whether hiking your favorite nature trail or soaking up some rays pool-side, one important thing to remember is that you have to stay hydrated.

No matter the summer activity, your commissary can help you stay hydrated with its wide selection of thirst-quenching products, including Freedom's Choice water, sports drinks and water flavoring. And staying hydrated begins with paying attention to thirst.

"If you are feeling thirsty, you are already dehydrated," said Joanna Ward-Brown, who directs the Army Wellness Center at Fort Lee, Virginia. "I always advise my clients to carry water with them to remind them to stay hydrated."

Some signs of dehydration include muscle cramps, headaches, excess sweating and a feeling of hunger which can be mistaken for thirst. If you develop any of these symptoms, seek shade, stop exercising, drink water or a sports drink and seek medical attention as soon as possible. Heat illness is an inherent risk when exercising in hot conditions and can affect even the best-conditioned athletes, according to an article from the American College of Sports Medicine.

By the way, you don't have to be a gym rat or a workout warrior to pay attention to staying hydrated.

Considering that the body is mostly water, it is imperative that you replenish that water throughout the day to stay healthy. Even if you are just relaxing on the beach, you are still losing water and need to remember to hydrate.

The recommended amount of water the average person needs daily is eight, eight-ounce glasses, Ward-Brown added.

When being extremely active during the summer months, sometimes your body will shed more vitamins, minerals and electrolytes than water alone can replenish.


For activity lasting more than an hour, Ward-Brown recommends supplementing your water intake with a sports drink. They are designed to replace crucial electrolytes and carbohydrates while hydrating at the same time. For those who don't drink as much water as recommended because it is bland, there are products that can flavor your water and make it more appealing. Just

remember to read the label to be aware of sugar content and other ingredients as some contain caffeine.

Finally, try to stay away from beer and alcohol while enjoying the summer heat. If you do indulge in them, drink no more than one an hour and supplement with plenty of water in between.

Summer time is fun, and with a little planning and a trip to your commissary you can stock up on water and your favorite

## Don't let hypertension sneak up on you

May is national high blood pressure education month. Are you aware that hypertension is often called the "silent killer," and for good reason. The condition provides little evidence that it exists, until it provokes a major cardiovascular event, like a heart attack or stroke.

According to the National Institute of Health, high blood pressure is the leading controllable contributor to heart disease, heart failure, stroke, and end-stage renal disease, and contributes significantly to the morbidity and mortality of people with diabetes.

A blood pressure chart reflects categories defined by the American Heart Association. Blood pressure ranges are associated by the systolic (upper) and diastolic (lower) measurements. Normal blood pressure is less than 120 over 80; prehypertension is 120-139 over 80-89; high blood pressure is defined in stages. Stage one is 140-159 over 90-99; stage two is 160 or higher over 100 or higher.

Those who suffer with hypertensive crisis is higher than 180 over 110 and should seek medical care immediately.

Most often, there are no signs of hypertension at all. Typically people

find out they have high blood pressure by accident. They will go to the doctor to get a physical, have back pain checked out, or a cough or cold diagnosed, and are surprised to find out that they have high blood pressure.

It is a rare occurrence that a person will have signs of hypertension, and visit the doctor specifically to get a high blood pressure diagnosis.

High blood pressure symptoms can appear when the condition becomes severe for an extended period of time.

Symptoms associated with severe high blood pressure are feeling confused or other neurological symptoms; nosebleeds; fatigue; blurred vision; chest pain and or abnormal heartbeat.

Empower yourself concerning your health. Know what your normal blood pressure number is by getting regular blood pressure screenings, avoid highrisk behaviors like smoking and overeating, and seek medical attention promptly if your blood pressure number is higher than normal or you experience headaches, dizziness, visual changes, or your heart beat feels stronger or faster.

Army Public Health Nursing encourages you to see your healthcare provider on a regular basis for your health assessment.

# Memorial Day thoughts

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us..."

## Hebrews 12:1

"Therefore" is a causation word. In the Bible it often connects something which is true with something else which should be true. The first truth in this case is this - "We are surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses." The writer has just concluded his classic litany of Biblical heroes; Noah, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, Gideon, David, Samuel, and several unnamed persons with whom he apparently expects his readers to be familiar. Then he calls us to imagine these heroes of the faith are now watching us. It's as if we are athletes in the stadium and they are in the stands cheering us on. They are interested in knowing whether we are carrying on the tradition they established of faithfulness, sacrifice, and bearing witness to the truth.

We who serve in the Army can also imagine being surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses composed of all who have ever laid down their lives to defend the constitution of the United Sates and preserve the blessings of liberty for their fellow citizens. Leaders change, uniforms change, certain policies change, the enemy changes – but the tradition never changes even as the cloud of witnesses expands. We are now the "surrounded" ones, those currently in the arena – that is the first truth.

Therefore – something else needs to be true. We are given a two part imperative. First, we are to "lay aside every weight and sin that clings so closely."

In the New Testament "laying aside" almost always means discarding wicked practices which are incongruent with the life of a disciple. For our purposes the weights to be laid aside are likely the all too common negative attitudes which run contrary to our core values. Second, we are called to run. The writer likens faith unto a distance race.

## Give thought, understanding to Mental health awareness month

According to Mental Health America, approximately one in five adults have a mental health condition and over 56% do not receive treatment.

Youth depression rates have increased to more than 11% and 8.8% of those have received insufficient or no treatment.

May is Mental Health Awareness month. Mental health is essential to the overall health and well being of individuals and Families. The 3rd Infantry Division is dedicated to placing an equal amount of importance on mental health as they do physical health and fitness.

"Mental health is the basis of a happy and satisfied life," said Teri Oglesbee, a child youth behavior-military and family life counselor. "It affects your perspective, your views, your attitude and your daily flow of life."

Common mental health illnesses include attention deficit/hyperactivity disorder, depression, anxiety, post-traumatic stress disorder and adjustment disor-

## der.

"Each mental illness has its own symptoms, but common signs of mental illness in adults and children include but are not limited to excessive worrying or fear, feeling extremely sad or down, or problems concentrating and learning," said Oglesbee.

Mental Health Awareness Month gives the opportunity to talk about a taboo subject, said Oglesbee. Although the stigma of mental health conditions are viewed as a restriction that can negatively impact a Soldier's career, such as security clearances or certain schools, the behavioral health specialists keep information strictly confidential.

"Many people fear the process of getting help because they are under the impression that seeing a behavioral health specialist will ruin your career, which is not true," said Capt. Katherine Lunsford, a clinical psychologist at the Marne Embedded Behavioral Health Clinic. "The only reasons chain of command would be notified is if the person is showing signs of harm to self or others, child abuse, domestic violence or substance abuse."

Behavioral Health can offer mental health evaluations to help assess if a person is suffering from a mental disorder and will offer a variety of support. Brigades have their own behavioral health clinics and Military and Family Life Counselor programs. Soldiers can also use their Military One Source.

According to militaryonesource.mil, they can provide free, short-term, confidential non-medical counseling services for a wide range of issues from marital conflicts and stress management to coping with grief and deployment adjustments.

"Heath is an all-encompassing matter and we must take care of our minds just as much as we take care of our bodies," said Lunsford.

If you or someone you know is struggling with a mental illness, you can contact the child youth behavior-military and family life counselor at 432-8980 or the Marne Embedded Behavioral Health Clinic at 767-2335. You can also contact your units' chaplain.



## Aviation boosts Coast Guard partnership with buoy project

Soldiers from 2nd Battalion, 3rd Aviation Regiment, 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division, supported sling load operations with the U.S. Coast Guard at Tybee Island, May 15.

This training was a collaborative effort for Soldiers and the Coast Guards near Fort Pulaski National Park, to retrieve a buoy from a jetty wall in the Savannah River.

"We conducted external load training with the U.S. Coast Guard Aid to Navigation Team Tybee, stationed near Fort Pulaski," said Chief Warrant Office 3 Christopher Daniel Rucker, a safety officer of Company B, 2-3 Avn. "We assisted them with moving a six-by-20 buoy from Cockspur Island."

The buoy was lifted in the external load weighing

approximately 6,500lbs. The original location of the buoy resided in the deep channels of the Savannah River to aid ships coming into the port.

"During the training, the buoy ended up in a position where the Coast Guard could not retrieve it with a boat. The only way they were able to retrieve it was by utilizing a helicopter. We got to use our individual skills as Army Aviators," said Rucker. "We also got the opportunity to build a rapport and network with individuals in the near future we may be task to operate with in a disaster relief effort."

Soldiers started developing a relationship with the local Coast Guard team since September when they were holding a separate sling load training event.

"Across the spectrum of military service, we find ourselves conducting more joint operations training and it is only natural that we interact with the Coast Guard," said Rucker. "The Coast Guard is the subject matter expert when it comes to anything in or the water, and rivers."

An executive petty officer, Petty Officer 1st Class Daniel Scott, explained what it took to make this training a success.

"The national park service authorizing us to remove the buoy with a CH-47 Chinook and place it on the park grounds for shipment," said Scott. "Some of the park staff coming in on their off day to make this all possible as well."

The training was a great opportunity to build relationship with the community and Soldiers and the Coast Guard.

"It was a great training event for both of us as far as the proficiency," said Rucker. "They were able to see how we operate and we were able to see how the Coast Guard operate.

## Supply company trains to save lives at Guardian Response 19

Soldiers from 226th Composite Supply Company, Special Troops Battalion, 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade, returned May 7 from Guardian Response 19, a 10-day exercise held at Camp Atterbury, Indiana.

Guardian Response is an annual joint- and multi-component training event designed to validate units on their readiness for responding to domestic chemical, biological, radiological or nuclear attacks.

On April 27, the exercise began with a bang as news of a simulated nuclear attack in Detroit reached the Soldiers. "Detroit" was actually Muscatatuck Urban Training Center, a highly realistic training area designed to look like a recently attacked major American city, including simulated wounded civilians.

226th Soldiers immediately sprang into action, setting up multiple fuel retail points as well as a tactical water purification site. In the case of a CBRN attack or a natural disaster, 226th CSC's water platoon has the ability to decontaminate and purify 120,000 gallons of water per day using their four Tactical Water Purification Systems. The fuel platoon acted as the primary distributors of fuel throughout the area of operations ensuring ambulances and other life-saving capabilities were operational.

Within the first 12 hours, they began fuel and water distribution throughout the entire training area. Water treatment specialists set up a water purification point as close to the impact zone as safely as possible, and decontaminated and distributed over 150,000 gallons of drinkable water. In an emergency, this is a capability that can save countless lives.

"It really felt like we were in an actual city," said Sgt. Carlos Antonio, a fuel supply noncommissioned officer with 226th CSC, who ran multiple fuel distribution missions to the impact zone. "Operating in a training environment that looks so much like an American city really drove home just how important this training and ultimately our mission is."

On June 1, 226th CSC assumes both Defense CBRN Response Force and Defense in Support of Civil Authorities missions.

For the next year, these Soldiers must be ready to deploy within 24 hours to support organizations such as the Federal Emergency Management Agency, local law enforcement, or the State Department in case of either a CBRN attack or a natural disaster.

Typically, active duty Soldiers train to fight enemies outside of the United States, and Guardian Response presented Soldiers with an entirely new and unique challenge: supporting the American people within our own borders.

According to the 226th company commander, Capt. Dexter Harris, "This exercise vividly illustrated the importance of mastering the fundamentals and maximizing readiness while at home."
