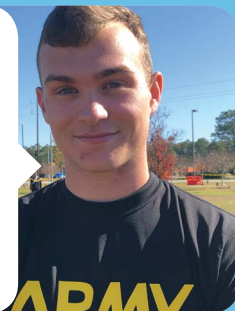

Raiders uncase colors after Korea rotation

Soldiers from the 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division returned home throughout October and marked their official return to Fort Stewart with an uncasing ceremony, Nov. 30 at Marne Gardens here.

The 1ABCT Commander, Col. Mike Adams and 1ABCT Senior Enlisted Leader, Command Sgt. Maj. Robert Leimer, uncased the Raider Brigade colors signifying the completion of the nine-month rotation supporting the 2nd Infantry Division in the Republic of Korea.

This rotation marked the return of the 3rd Infantry Division patch to the Korean Peninsula for the first time since the Korean War in 1953.

Maj. Gen. Leopoldo Quintas, commander, 3rd ID opened his remarks by saying he was honored and excited to welcome home the "Raider" brigade after a rotation that began during the peak political tensions with North Korea.

"Given the situation and as the Army's most forward deployed armored brigade combat team, the first brigade had to arrive fully manned, trained and equipped for this most challenging mission," Quintas said. "Through an intense, action packed train-up both here and at the National Training Center, the Raider Brigade built an unmatched war fighting capability and formed into an amazing team of combat leaders."

After Quintas' remarks, the battalions remained in formation as the Raider brigade commander gives his closing remarks to Soldiers and families.

"We arrived to the ROK in a period of high tensions," Adams said. "The Department of Defense and the Army were singularly focused on ensuring the Korean theater of operations was more ready than it has been since 1953 for all contingencies."

Adams specifically thanked the Families and the rear detachment Soldiers for a first class reintegration and preparing the facilities while returning home.

The Raider Brigade was replaced in Korea by the 3rd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 1st Armored Division and the last redeployment flight arrived on Halloween.

"I was glad to be a part of the deployment with the Rock of the Marne," said Sgt. Clarence Cutliff, 3rd Brigade Support Battalion. "We accomplished the

mission and now I am glad to be back home with Family."

Raider Soldiers arrived in Korea in February as the fifth rotational tank brigade to serve the mission since the Army began rotating brigades in 2015.

"We are proud to have been part of the latest chapter in the unshakable alliance between The Republic of Korea and the United States," Adams said. "Raider Brigade Soldiers upheld the reputation of excellence expected of our Dog Faced Soldiers, and we are proud to have written a new chapter in the history of the Marne Division on the Korean Peninsula."

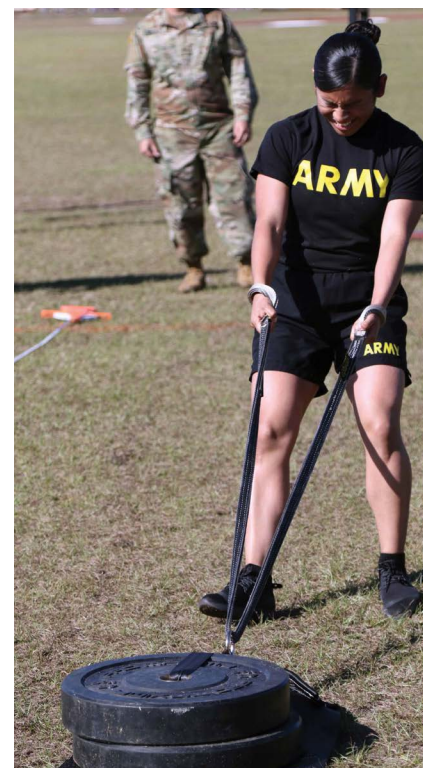

CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

The discipline of thinking

As a father, it's important for me to recognize the influence I have over those in my home. I often discover the need to discipline my thoughts and passions regarding the world around me. The power my words and actions have on others reminds me of the life of David in **1 Samuel 27**. By this time in the narrative, David carries with him the anointing of Samuel, the victory over Goliath, and a healthy fear of King Saul and his army. His best friend (Jonathan) and wife are no longer by his side and David is feeling alone.

Scripture states, 'David said to himself, *"Now I will perish one day by the hand of Saul. There is nothing better for me than to escape into the land of the Philistines. Saul then will despair of searching for me anymore in all the territory of Israel, and I will escape from his hand."*

David is caught up in a conversation with himself. This self-talk has a way of haunting the best of us. What is self-talk? This is a psychological term describing how inner voice carries on conversations that evaluate our decisions, words, and actions. These conversations speak to the value and values we place on ourselves and the world around us. Self-talk demonstrates where we are along the journey of our faith. David shows us three real dangers to be aware of as we experience self-talk.

First, self-talk is a natural part of all of us. Each of us can recall moments where we paused to evaluate our lives. As we coach our children through hard times we provide the best we have to offer, only to wonder if our tone, words and counsel will lead them into a better place. The danger is that self-talk flows naturally. Every

believer is called out of darkness and into Christ's marvelous light. Thinking super-naturally requires as much discipline as toning the body or strengthening one's cardio. It is important to note that David is not praying during this season of his life. David is literally talking to himself without any divine insight.

Second, self-talk can lead us into dark places. David said, *"Now I will perish one day by the hand of Saul."* This comment totally ignores God's promise to make David king of Israel and contradicts God's plan for David's life. It is amazing how faith instills unlimited courage and determination to face the impossible, while a lack of faith emboldens the natural man and robs all confidence of God's presence or hope. The natural response is that man must fix his own dilemma. David believes that housing with the enemy is his best choice. It is here we recognize how self-talk can spiral downward into self-centered thinking.

Finally, self-centered thinking ignores the fact that God had just recently used Saul, Jonathan, and Abigail to assure David he would serve as Israel's next king. His decision would place his family and all who follow him into harm's way. We are all susceptible to falling into self-centered thinking.

The cure is to practice faith-centered thinking. It requires discipline. Like the countless hours spent stretching, running and medicating the body for a race; the harder you work to improve your stride, the easier it is to make good decisions regarding diet, sleep, and exercise. The spiritual life is created for hard work. We thrive spiritually as we exercise, meditate, and work out life in the presence of our Lord. As we discipline our spirits, we will discover that we are not left to fix life on our own.

Holiday safety tips

It's the Christmas season - a time for friends and family to come together, celebrate and have fun. Perhaps decorate the tree and the house - inside and out. Here are some simple safety tips to help keep family traditions going, safely.

- When using a live tree make sure it's fresh. It should be green and the needles should not easily fall off.

- Never place your tree within three feet of a heat source such as a fireplace, space heaters or candles. It will dry out faster and could start a fire.

- If using an artificial tree make sure it's fire resistance and has the UL mark.

- Check Christmas lights, cords and sockets for frays, breaks or bare wires.

- If you need to use a ladder to hang your decorations, inspect it before use.

- Always turn off all lights when leaving the house or going to bed.

- When you open presents clean up the wrapping paper right away; it could end up resting on a hot Christmas light bulb or near another heat source and catch on fire.

- Don't hang ornaments or lights low where a child could reach them; they could swallow them or get burned.

- If you go to a party secure a designated driver, cab or a place to spend the night before you begin drinking.

The threat of winter fires is real, statistics to help citizens understand the severity and prevalence of winter fires.

- According to National Fire in Residential Buildings, 890 people die in winter home fires each year.
- Winter home fires account

for only 8 percent of the total number of fires in the U.S., but result in 30 percent of all fire deaths.

- Cooking is the leading cause of all winter home fires.

- Heating was the second leading cause of home fires.

- Confined fires — fires confined to chimneys, flues or fuel burners — accounted for 75 percent of home heating fires.

- Twenty-nine percent of the nonconfined home heating fires — fires that spread past the object of origin — happened because the heat source (like a space heater or fire place) was too close to things that can burn.

- Space heaters are the type of equipment most often involved in home heating equipment fires, figuring in just over two of every five fires (43 percent). Significantly, the fires involving space heaters accounted for 85 percent of the civilian deaths and 78 percent of civilian injuries in home fires caused by heating equipment, as well as over half (53 percent) of direct property damage.

- The leading factor contributing to ignition for home heating fire deaths (53 percent) was heating equipment too close to things that can burn, such as upholstered furniture, clothing, mattress, or bedding.

- The leading factor contributing to home heating fires (28 percent) was failure to clean, principally from solid-fueled heating equipment, primarily chimneys

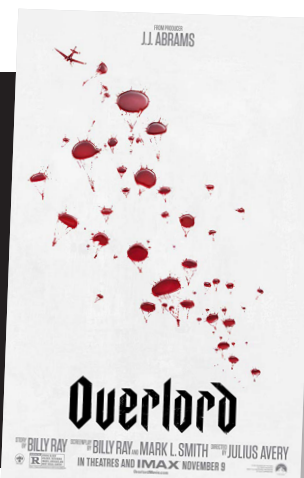

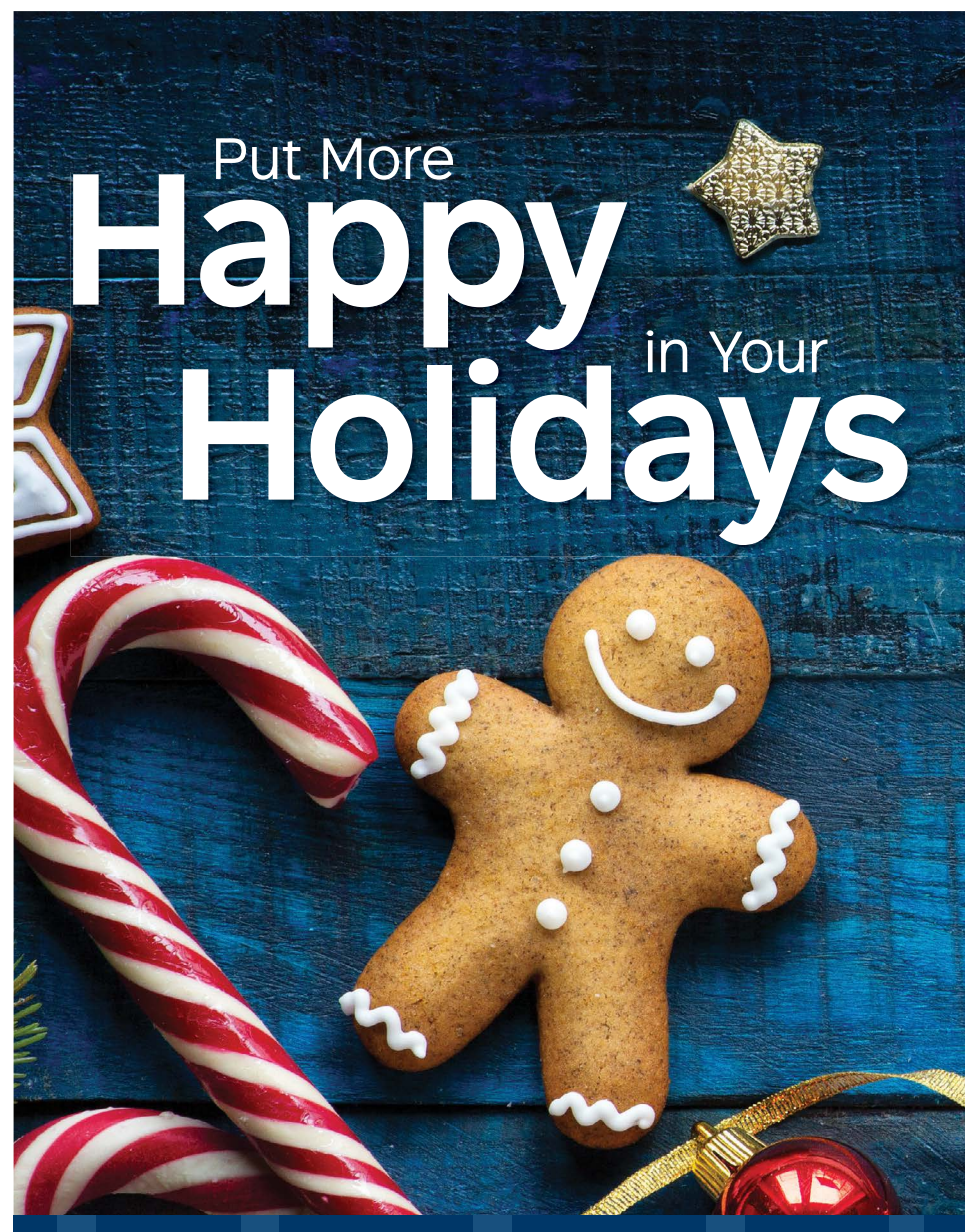

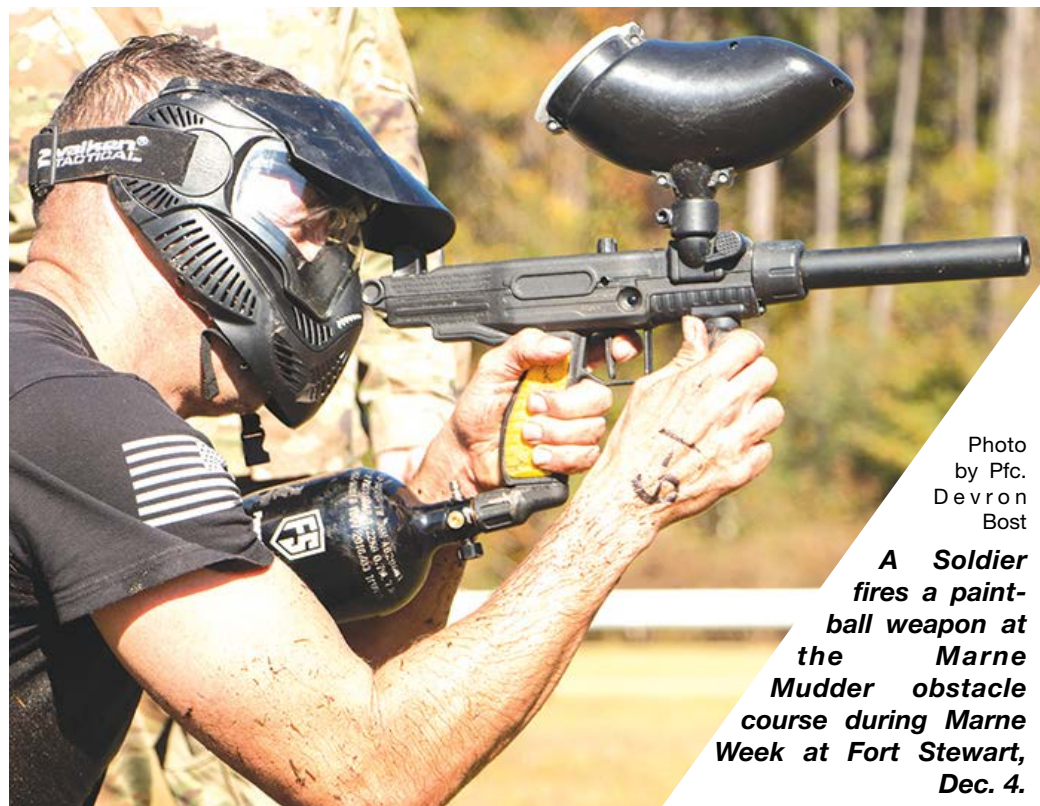

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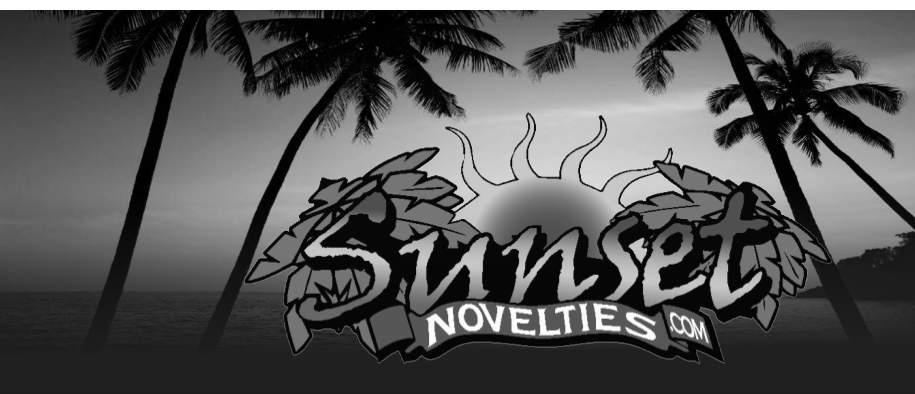

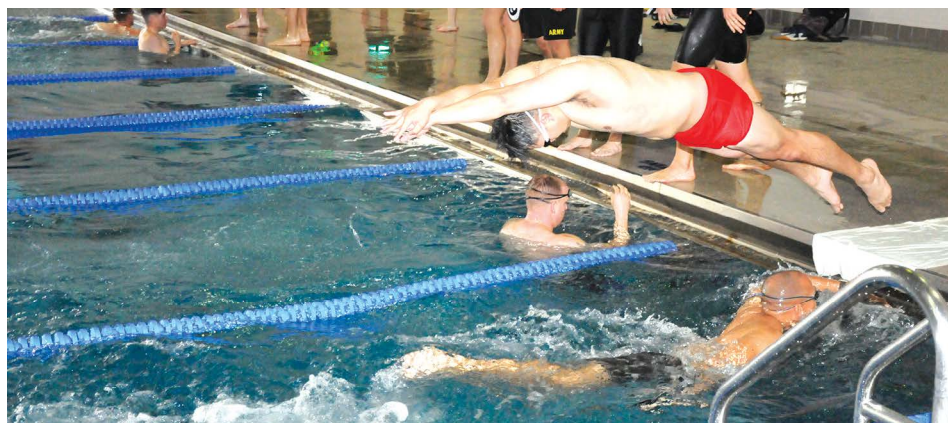

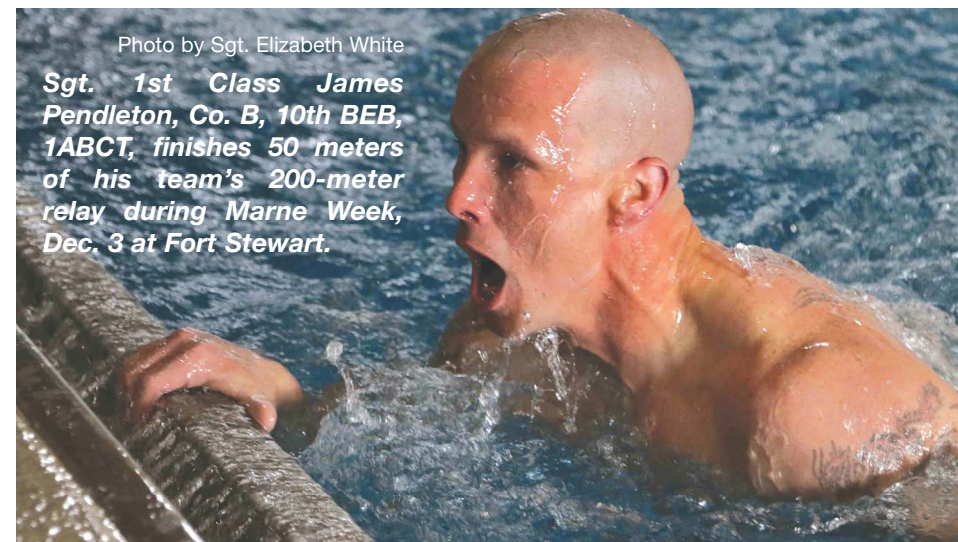
