

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Remembering Pfc. Floyd Lindstrom

Not every soldier who enlisted in the fight against World War II tyranny was a young man. Army Pfc. Floyd Lindstrom was 30 when he joined. His bravery and passion for the cause was infectious, and that helped earn him the Medal of Honor.

Lindstrom was born on June 21, 1912, in Holdredge, Nebraska. His family eventually moved to Colorado Springs, Colorado, where he was raised. He worked summers on a farm through much of his youth. As a young man, he supported his mother and sister by delivering fruit and produce between Colorado and California.

In June 1942, the day after his 30th birthday, Lindstrom enlisted in the Army and was trained as a machine gunner. By early 1943, he was sent to join the North Africa Campaign, where he earned the Silver Star for saving the life of a fellow soldier.

Several months later, Lindstrom and the rest of the Army's 2nd Battalion, 7th Infantry Regiment, 3rd

Infantry Division, found themselves in Italy. On Nov. 11, 1943, his platoon was supporting a rifle company that was attacking a hill near Mignano when the Germans counterattacked, forcing both groups to move into defensive positions.

Lindstrom knew his small section was alone and outnumbered five to one, but he pushed on regardless, quickly ordering the few remaining men into position to open fire. The enemy opened up as well with grenades, machine-gun and pistol fire.

Lindstrom couldn't take the enemy out from where he was, so he picked up his own heavy machine gun and staggered 15 yards up an open rocky hillside to another position only 10 yards from the enemy's machine gun nest, despite the hail of small arms fire landing all around him.

The enemies began firing back and forth, but Lindstrom quickly realized he couldn't hit most of the gunners because they were hidden behind a large rock. So he moved again, charging further uphill despite the constant stream of gunfire heading

his way. Lindstrom shot and killed both German gunners, then dragged their machine gun down to his men, who turned its fire back on the enemy.

Lindstrom wasn't done. He went back to where the enemy machine gunners had been positioned and grabbed two boxes of ammunition. He then returned to his men and continued to fire his own weapon.

The effort put forth from his bravery broke up the German counterattack. For his fearlessness, he was recommended for the Medal of Honor.

Unfortunately, he wouldn't live to see it. After the Mignano battle, Lindstrom was given the option of taking a safer assignment as a guard far from the front lines. He refused and chose to stay with his unit.

Less than three months later, on Feb. 3, 1944, he was killed during a German counterattack at Anzio, Italy. Lindstrom was 31. His body was brought home and buried in Evergreen Cemetery in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

On April 20, 1944, Lindstrom

received the Medal of Honor posthumously. He also earned the Purple Heart and two Italian military cross-

Lindstrom has continued to be honored over the decades that have passed. In 2013, the community-based outpatient clinic of the Department Veterans Affairs in Colorado Springs was designated the PFC Floyd K. Lindstrom Department Veterans Affairs Clinic. In May 2018, a monument was unveiled in the city that honored Lindstrom and two other local Medal of Honor recipients, Jesse Funk and Gerald Young.

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An era uniform and Medal of Honor were presented at a ceremony that named a Colorado Springs, Colo., health clinic after World War II Army Pfc. Floyd Lindstrom.

Marne Focus tests Raider Brigade's warfighting functions

The 3rd Infantry Division's 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team tested military command and control systems while integrating training and support from units across the installation during the division's annual exercise, Marne Focus, in November on Fort Stewart.

According to Soldiers participating in the exercise, the 1st ABCT, also known as the Raider Brigade, exercised all of its warfighting functions and enhanced its Soldiers' abilities to communicate effective command and control.

"This training is allowing us to build communication systems and processes we need to command and control a multi-battalion fight across a battle-field," said Maj. Thomas Allen, the primary staff officer in charge of the 1st ABCT's S6 section. "This command exercise allows us to understand processes and procedures within the command post at multiple

echelons."

Officer observer, coach, trainers assigned to this year's iteration of Marne Focus expanded on the exercise's training objectives.

"Through this training the brigade combat team demonstrates its ability to integrate intelligence, and to integrate the fires warfighting function to enable maneuver and sustainment," said Lt. Col. Thomas Putnam, the commander of 1st Battalion, 9th Field Artillery Regiment, 2nd ABCT, 3rd ID. "Also through this exercise, the brigade combat team demonstrates its ability to command and control all of its battalions in order to close with and kill the enemy and destroy his equipment to dominate on the battlefield."

Lt. Col. Arthur L. McGrue III, the commander of 3rd Battalion, 15th Infantry Regiment, 2nd ABCT, 3rd ID, said, "This is a culminating exercise that allows the brigade to exercise its systems and its ability to move at the tactical level. This exercise prepares the brigade for Fort Irwin [National Training Center]."

Through this exercise and others like it, leaders of the Raider Brigade and the 3rd ID place emphasis in developing competent, professional Soldiers within their organizations in order to increase success. According to Putnam, experienced professionals know there are always opportunities to learn new processes and techniques to improve a military organization and its people.

"Having talented and knowledgeable individuals within an organization enables the mission to succeed, and part of our professionalism as Soldiers is identifying where we need help," said Putnam. "Every engagement we've had here, our people have been very receptive, and wanting to improve, so it's an indicator of the type of talent we have within the organization. It shows that desire to want to be better."

The primary goal for this year's Marne Focus was to test the Raider Brigade's command and staff element in communicating with itself, the commands of sister brigades and higher echelon elements, along with the command teams and staffs of its subordinate battalions. Soldiers and units throughout the 3rd ID, including the 2nd ABCT, the 3rd ID Artillery, and the 3rd Sustainment Brigade, provided support to the Raider Brigade, which aided the division in gaining some secondary training opportunities.

Upon completion of Marne Focus, the commanding general of the 3rd ID, Maj. Gen. Antonio Aguto, is expected to validate a higher state of readiness for the Raider Brigade, which will indicate the brigade is ready to take part in a rotation at the National Training Center, a U.S. Army maneuver Combat Training Center located on Fort Irwin, California.

Marne Air assumes mission during TOA ceremony

STORCK BARRACKS, Illesheim, Germany - After a nine month rotation, the 1st Combat Aviation Brigade, 1st Infantry Division officially

transferred authority to the 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division on Nov. 1.

The cold November morning marked the 5th iteration of the Rotational Air Forces mission for Atlantic Resolve. Since April 2014, U.S. Army Europe has led the Department of Defense's Atlantic Resolve land efforts by bringing units based in the U.S. to Europe for nine month rotations. The mission allows U.S. Army units to train and integrate with European counterparts across the continent, while also deterring adversarial aggression.

Distinguished guests from across Germany and Eastern Europe were in attendance as the 1st Combat Aviation Brigade lowered its colors. Simultaneously, the 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade raised their unit colors signifying the assumption of the Atlantic Resolve mission.

Throughout the rotation, the 1st CAB succeeded in strengthening existing partnerships and building new ones across the continent. "We participated in nine major exercises across Europe, while supporting 21 different nations. We flew over 14,000 hours, drove 144,000 miles, and transported 8,000 people on our aircraft, including congressional delegations, senior U.S. military leaders and top level officials from our NATO allies," said

Col. Bryan Chivers, commander of the 1st Combat Aviation Brigade, 1st Infantry Division. "Although the measurable impacts are great, the non-quantifiable impacts are even greater... a lasting peace and stability throughout Europe."

Chivers added that 1st CAB Soldiers' hard work and dedication made for a successful mission and contributed to long lasting partnerships between the U.S. and NATO allies. "I am extremely proud of all they have done for this mission, and all they have done for the United States of America, and the NATO alliance."

In addition to all of the training, the 1st CAB supported the historic D-Day 75 events in France. Chivers called it a "truly humbling experience," as soldiers from the brigade were able to participate in ceremonies and interact with World War II veterans.

With 1st CAB's list of distinguished European accomplishments, 3rd CAB arrives ready to carry on the historic mission. "3rd Combat Aviation Brigade has trained hard and long in preparation for this operation," said Col. Michael McFadden, commander of the 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division. "The Marne Air team stands ready to assure our allies, deter aggression, build allied and partnered interoperability, and continue to build readiness of the 3rd CAB."

As the 1st Combat Aviation Brigade departs, the 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade begins another chapter in the Marne Division's European story... a story that began nearly 100 years ago on the fields of France.

This new restriction was put in place per change 1 to DoDI 1341.13, Post-9/11 GI Bill, dated Friday. As a result of this change, Army National Guard Soldiers are highly encouraged to transfer their Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits as soon as they become eligible (not flagged, have six or more years of service, and at least one eligible dependent in DEERS) to avoid missing out on this extremely generous family benefit. 

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Passion for K-9s makes for successful MWD teams

Canines assigned to the 93rd Military Working Dog Detachment, 385th Military Police Battalion, 16th Military Police Brigade, have several duties on Fort Stewart and in theater while deployed. It is through the drive and special care by their handlers they are capable of fulfilling those duties.

"Military Working Dogs are one of the greatest psychological deterrents in the war on terror and protect our military and civilian population on a daily basis," said Staff Sgt. Ryan Borjas, kennel master, 93d MWD Det.

Canines assigned to the 93d MWD Det., such as Sgt. Laco and Sgt. Riki, are capable of performing their duties thanks to Spc. Anthony Jordan and Spc. Connor Pszenny, who are just two of several handlers who come to work every day with passion for what they do.

"I feel truly, the Soldiers here at the Fort Stewart kennels do come to work every day, work hard, have a passion for the job and are good Soldiers," Borjas said.

Several military working dogs call the kennel at Fort Stewart– a U.S. Army Forces Command medium-sized kennel – home.

The MWDs – typically Belgian Malinois – come from a puppy program, from which they are fostered from birth until they are old enough to begin training for their jobs as MWDs.

They receive their names at birth and start initial training between 1 and 1-and-a-half-years old, Borjas said. The dogs come from Joint Base San Antonio-Lackland Air Force Base, or occasionally are bought by MWD han-

dlers from other vendors – typically Czech, Dutch or German shepherds. All Fort Stewart MWDs are trained at JBSA-LAK on basic obedience, basic detection, and basic patrol work (bite work), Borjas said.

Service members from the U.S. Navy, Marine Corps, Army and Air Force conduct training with these dogs destined for military careers, and Borjas said these trainers are chosen based on a recommendation from their kennel

"We have all of – typically – the better dog trainers from all of the branches there at Lackland Air Force Base," Borjas said.

They begin training on capabilities of finding any and all explosives and narcot-

ics and patrol work, including scouting - finding people injured or hiding in buildings, at JBSA-LAK, Borjas said. Then, they are progressed at their duty station.

Each dog is seen regularly by the Fort Stewart Veterinary Clinic on post and treated accordingly for their medical issues. They are fed and exercised daily as well as worked five days a week on the duties required of them.

MWDs assigned to work on Fort Stewart will remain on Fort Stewart for the duration of their military careers, with the exception of special missions and deployments. The dogs do not change duty stations with their handlers, Borjas said. Instead, the dogs adapt and learn to bond with new handlers as permanent change of duty station situations occur. In addition, each MWD outranks their handler by one rank.

Dogs trained through the Patrol Explosive Detection Dog-Enhanced have advanced capabilities and are taught at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri. Borjas said these dogs do PCS with their handlers, except for in rare cases.

Spc. Brady Stanger, MWD handler, 93d MWD Det., has been working with Sgt. Bundas, a 7-year-old, long-haired German Shepherd, for three-and-a-half years, and said training the MWD is all about consistency. Stanger said it took about six months for Bundas to bond with him.

"He is super loyal; he'll do anything to protect his handler," Stanger said. "He was a little bit more stubborn until he realized I was (his handler) now."

Stanger said he grew up training hunting dogs with his father in Minnesota. He said he always wanted to work as a policeman, but knew when he joined the military that he wanted his career to involve dogs.

"When I trained dogs with my dad, we trained the dog and they went out and did their own thing based on their training," Stanger said. "With the training here, it is very much the handler and working dog working as a team. Me and Bundas go through literally every day together; from sunup to sundown, we're together."

Bundas got protective of Stanger as he approached a belligerent person on post, and that was the moment Stanger knew they had bonded as handler and MWD.

"That was when I thought, 'Okay, this is actually real now; he actually cares,'" Stanger said.

Every dog team that is certified could possibly deploy, Borjas said.

Borjas said one of the most important things in the military occupation specialty -31K – is to have passion for the job, to be consistent with that passion and to consistently come to work every day with that passion.

Pzenny was seeking a unique job within the military when he decided on 31K. He has been working with 2-year-old Sgt. Riki for about four months.

"Riki is an extremely high-intensity, high-strung dog, and I've had to adapt to him because I'm not as high strung," Pzenny said. "You have to work with the dog to get him to like you."

Passion for animals and the work those animals do is key, but just as important is the bond the handler has with the MWD to ultimately form a MWD team, Borjas said. That bond can be strengthened in many ways, depending on the individual dog. Borjas said just grooming, walks and being positive builds rapport within the team.

Georgia EPD, Fort Stewart DPW encourages water conservation

According to officials of the Georgia Environmental Protection Division, consumers can cut water use by an additional 15% with very little difficulty or discomfort by using voluntary water conservation practices in the home and garden. Please consider utilizing some of these great water-saving tips below that are not only inexpensive, but also simple to execute. Everyone is encouraged to do his or her part.

Kitchen and laundry

Eliminate leaks by turning faucets off completely and, as needed, replace old gaskets. A single dripping faucet can waste as much as 3,600 gallons a year.

- Don't rinse dirty dishes before loading into dishwater; scrape clean and let the machine do the rest.
 - Don't use a garbage disposal.
- Use the "water-saver" setting or make sure your machine is set for the most efficient use.
- Only wash full loads of dishes or clothes.

Bathroom

• If you hear running water in your toilet tank, adjust the leaky float valve or replace the faulty hardware. Check for leaks by dropping a small amount of food coloring in the upper tank. If color appears in the bowl, you have a leak.

- Flush only when necessary. Install a water-filled plastic jug in your toilet tank to reduce the water used per flush, without disturbing the flushing mechanism.
- Don't use your toilet as a trash can (not only does it use excess water, it requires additional energy to separate from the waste stream and can potentially clog pipes).
- Take fewer and shorter showers and consider taking a Navy-style shower: wet down, turn water off, lather then rinse.
- Don't leave the water running while rinsing, shaving, or brushing teeth.
- Reuse bath water or excess water as you await water temperatures to adjust for other uses such as watering plants in or near the house, to soak clothes, etc.

Lawn and Garden

- Hold your garden hose close to the roots of plants so that there's little waste and evaporative loss. Soaker hoses are even more efficient.
- Water slowly so that the soil soaks up all the water you use. To avoid the possibility of disease due to promotion of fungi growth and minimize evaporation, the best time to water is very early morning hours between dawn and 9 a.m. Avoid watering on windy days, which increases evaporation.
- Position sprinklers so that they do not water the pavement. Do not over water, allowing streams to run down the street. Note: Did you know turf grasses survive on as little as a half inch of water per week.

- Never let water run unnecessarily. Installing a spray handle helps. Allow your grass to grow to approximately three inches before cutting.
- Don't let children play with the hose or sprinkler. Take advantage of the many local swimming pools.
- Limit car washing. Use a bucket and a hose with spray attachment for rinsing and, if possible, reuse water capture from inside the home from other uses,
- Don't use the hose to clean driveways and sidewalks, instead use a broom, which will provide more exercise.

NCAA basketball teams host Fort Stewart in exhibition games

Pvt. Joseph Womack was so new to the Fort Stewart men's basketball team he didn't yet have his own jersey. He had to borrow one from a teammate, which led to the University of West Florida's play-by-play broadcaster announcing the wrong name more times than that of any other player.

The Fort Stewart Bulldogs men's basketball team traveled to Pensacola, Florida Nov. 3 for an exhibition game against UWF, and Savannah State University, Nov. 8.

Womack, an aviation operations specialist assigned to 224th Military Intelligence Battalion, 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade, led all scoring in both games, with 24 points and 15 rebounds against UWF, and 40 points, 23 rebounds against SSU.

For the two NCAA Division II teams, it was a valuable tune up for their upcoming 2019-2020 seasons. For the service members of the Fort Stewart squad, not only was it a tune up for their regular season, it was a unique opportunity to play against collegiate-level athletes.

The Argonauts of UWF, sporting camouflage-patterned uniforms in honor of their military opponents, ran out to an 8-0 lead before Fort Stewart's Sgt. Dustin Schrock got his team on the board with a 3-pointer, sparking a 17-7 run of their own. The Bulldogs climbed back to within 2 points of the Argonauts halfway through the first half, before UWF netted 10 unanswered buckets to

take a 42-28 lead to close the half.

The second half was much closer as the Argonauts only outscored Fort Stewart by 2 points. Womack hit three consecutive baskets to start the second-half scoring for Fort Stewart. The Bulldogs managed to get within 11 points late in the half, but UWF held on for an 80-64 win.

Top scorers for Fort Stewart were: Womack with 24 points, 15 rebounds; Thomas Gallomore, 12 points; Dustin Schrock, 9 points; and Mark Christmas, 8 points.

Against Savannah State, both teams put up triple-digits, combining for 242 points after 60 minutes of play. SSU took a 79-52 lead into halftime, and widened their lead to 33 points in the second half. Fort Stewart fought back and narrowed the home

team's lead to 11 with just over 2 minutes left in the game, but SSU responded with a 10-5 run to finish the game. Despite Stewart's outscoring SSU 61-50 in the second half, SSU's dominance of the first half kept them on top with the final score, 129-113.

Athletically, Fort Stewart matched up quite well against the Tigers. In fact, Fort Stewart held a 6% advantage over their opponents in field goals; 49% to 41%. Both teams made 44 baskets, but of those baskets made, SSU sunk an incredible 27 3-pointers on 69 attempts. SSU also carried an advantage at the free-throwline with a 70 percent average.

Top scorers for Fort Stewart were: Womack with 40 points, 23 rebounds; Lashawn Moore, 21 points, 6 rebounds; Tyronne Beale, 14 points, 6 rebounds; Dustin Schrock, 10 points, 7 rebounds; and Mark Christmas, 10 points, 2 rebounds.

"It was a privilege to play against Division II competition to better prepare us for our season, starting mid-month against MacDill AFB," said Head Coach Chief Warrant Officer 3 Aaron Bryant, a senior petroleum system technician at the 590th Quartermaster Detachment, 3rd Special Troops Battalion, 3rd Sustainment Brigade, 3rd ID. "Despite the loss, we gained so much confidence and the will to pick ourselves up and try again."

Womack played a year of basketball at Enterprise State Community College in Enterprise, Alabama, before joining the Army with hopes to tryout for the All-Army team. People affiliated with All-Army basketball steered him to the Fort Stewart team when Womack mentioned he was on orders to the base. Womack said he hopes to play basketball at the collegiate level after he completes his Army contract, become an officer and play for the All-Army team.

As for now, Womack said he is happy to be playing as a member of the Fort Stewart Bulldogs.

"We all have different backgrounds," Womack said of his teammates. "We all bring something different to the table that can be useful toward the team's success. We have good chemistry."

Womack expects to have a jersey with his name on the back within a week.

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Helping quitters win

As nicotine related illnesses and deaths climb throughout the country, U.S. Army Medical Department Activity-Winn Army Community Hospital, Fort Stewart continues in its effort to educate Soldiers, Family members, DoD Civilians and Soldiers for Life, on the various programs in place to help those who use nicotine products, a way out.

Vernon Harris a substance use provider, clinical care counselor at Winn ACH, took a moment to discuss the importance of kicking the habit of using nicotine products such as in vapes, cigarettes, chewing tobacco and the like, through a free cessation program here.

"If you are ready to quit, we are ready to help," Harris said. "It is never too soon and never too late to quit."

Harris said many people have expressed the desire to quit, but find difficulty in having the support to do so.

"We want to make the process as simple and easy, because it's not easy to quit," Harris said.

What the research has shown is, using group support and medications and getting information on quitting is more effective than just going "cold turkey."

There are numerous benefits to guit the use of nicotine products. Once a smoker quits smoking, research has found results are recognized after the first fours. If no other know physical limitations are pres-

ent, blood pressure levels return to normal. There are also the monetary benefits involved. A pack-a-day smoker spends an estimated \$2,000 a year to placate their habit, therefore some may turn to vaping to "quit" the habit of smoking.

"You may have heard in the news, there is a lot of injuries, lung problems that's come up from people vaping," Harris said. "Right now the research is not conclusive on the safety of e-cigarettes or vape products and plus there is some medical issues coming up with that, and besides even the nicotine products are still addictive."

Harris expressed his excitement for the new four-week nicotine cessation program kicking off at Winn soon. He said when someone wants to quit, be they active duty or a beneficiary, for the patient's convenience we have three locations available for the program, Tuttle Army Health Clinic on Thursdays from 10-11 a.m. at Hunter Army Airfield; Richmond Hill Medical Home from Thursdays from 10-11 a.m.; and here at Winn ACH on Tuesdays from 10-11 a.m. or Wednesdays from 3-4 p.m.

To get into the program patients can visit their primary care provider or call the MEDDAC appointment line to schedule to be seen at one of the aforementioned locations. The process for getting into the program is as easy as calling 435-6633. The program is four weeks long and follow-up is available for continued support.
