

Marne Air Soldiers from 2nd Battalion, 3rd Aviation Regiment, 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade held a three-day convoy live-fire exercise to sustain readiness in preparation for future combat operations, July 9-11 on Fort Stewart.

"It's imperative that Soldiers get proper convoy live-fire training," said 2nd Lt. Kevin Davies, an automated logistical specialist with 2-3 Avn., 3rd CAB, 3rd ID. "Soldiers will acquire muscle memory the more they train in these exercises and they will be able to successfully execute in stressful environments."

The CLFX training ensures that Soldiers are well familiarized with mounted weapons systems and how to properly fire on a moving vehicle. Soldiers performed the mounted gunnery exercise using the .50 cal. machinegun.

Despite the rain; Soldiers

pressed on with the convoy livefire, upholding the well-known Army motto, "If it's not raining, we're not training."

The three-day CLFX began with a drive through of the gunnery range to familiarize Soldiers with the terrain.

The second day Soldiers executed a day and night blank-fire to properly establish and correct any deficiencies the Soldier might have with the weapons system, leading into a day and night live-fire on the final day.

The key tasks in the CLFX was to conduct tactical convoy and react to contact while mounted in the stationary and moving positions.

"This training is beneficial no matter what military occupational specialty you are," said Sgt. Jonathan Cardec, an aviation operations specialist with 2-3 Avn., 3rd CAB. "In my opinion, the convoy live-fire ended very successfully."

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One World Terrain allows Soldiers to train anywhere

LOS ANGELES -- Carrying only a backpack and a drone, Soldiers could capture and eventually re-create entire sections of forests and steep mountains.

They can map 3D data from the rough, dry wasteland of the Mohave Desert, the dense rainforests of Hawaii or the rocky, hilly landscape of woodlands. They can even replicate the detail of a bustling metropolis.

And with this data, they can capture intricate details down to the species of trees. That data will be optimized and aggregated with data from other geospatial sensors to build a digital environment Soldiers could use to train for war or duplicate an operational battlefield.

A tedious process that once took weeks can now be achieved in three hours: within that time, Soldiers can fly a drone within a one-square kilometer area and visualize the environment in 3D run-time.

Wherever Soldiers wish to hone skills or where commanders choose to send them, Soldiers will soon have the capability to simulate that environment at their home stations.

"One of the things we identified early on was the existing systems often require that you bring several Soldiers to a central location to get training," said Col. Marcus Varnadore, project manager for the Synthetic Training Environment Cross-Functional Team. "So what we've challenged industry with is creating systems that can actually go to the point of need; go to where the Soldier is actually training, potentially at their home-station location or even a deployed location."

One World Terrain, a pillar of the Army's synthetic training environment, will give Soldiers a tool that could improve readiness by providing training in an accurate, realistic representations of theater environments. It would help achieve the vision of Army Chief of Staff Gen. Mark A. Milley and then-Secretary of the Army Mark T. Esper to build a more lethal force, by providing Soldiers skills at a more frenetic pace.

"It's rapidly expediting the capability of being able to capture the terrain and creating the terrain environment," said Kyle McCullough, lead researcher at the Institute for Creative Technologies at the University of Southern California. The ICT works in conjunction with the Combat Capabilities Development Command Soldier Center to research and develop immersive technology advancing realistic, synthetic human experiences.

The capability is being developed at an opportune time in the Army, as the service prepares for possible large-scale ground-combat in environments that contrast starkly with the close quarter counter-insurgency operations in the Middle East. Soldiers soon must prepare to battle in forested areas and massive urban centers.

The technology will also be used to eventually help Soldiers on the front lines map terrain on the battlefield. While connected to command and control systems on

the battlefield, they will be able to receive rapid updates provided by the OWT program.

"You won't have to rely on pre-existing data or possibly data,' older McCullough said. "You can get brand new data when vou're actually in a deployed environment, and so a commander would have access to the latest state of a battlespace."

The Army expects to reach initial operating capability for fiscal year 2021 and

full operational capability in fiscal 2023. Earlier this month, the Army awarded a contract to build an OWT prototype to Virginia-based developer Vricon.

The cross-functional team assigned to develop the technology has CFT members collocated with the Program Executive Office for Simulation, Training and Instrumentation in its home base at the University of Central Florida in Orlando, at the Aberdeen Proving Ground in Maryland and here in the ICT.

Tucked in a budding technology park in western Los Angeles, Army ICT researchers have been working on the finer points of the program, including how to transmit the data over a secure connection efficiently.

DIGITAL ENVIRONMENTS: IN FIVE STEPS

OWT data collection and processing can be broken into phases.

In the collection phase, a Soldier uses a backpack kit that contains a tablet that runs on special software. Soldiers must simply find the area of environment where they wish to train. The kits have been distributed to 200 Marine Corps units, and some units within the Army and Navy.

Once they define the area they wish to train, they use the tablet to draw an extension point on a map. The drone will automatically hover over the area and begin the data collection process. Army units can collect data not just for training but for intel purposes and battlefield planning.

"Whether it's an area that they want to train on, an area that they want to plan on, an area that they just want better ... cognizant awareness of, it can apply to anything like that," McCullough said.

> The user collects data from multiple sources including still images and underwater topography.

> Then the users begin the data processing phase, where they transform the collected data into information that can be used in a simulation. The process includes dividing the data into categories such as road surfaces, structures and vegetation.

> In the third phase, data must be stored securely in a repository and then optimized for distribution to locations where Soldiers require the data -- at a forward-deployed location or at their home installation.

> In the fourth phase the developers have run into a difficult obstacle, as rapid delivery of data has proven to be challenging. Soldiers in deployed locations often do not have access to a reliable internet connection, which could further delay the data transfer.

> "We're able to process very efficiently, fully-automated with very little human intervention," McCullough said. "Some of that data can be gigs to tens of gigs in size. The biggest hurdle that we're facing actually getting this into a higher level of operability, is actually figuring out how to distribute that data efficiently."

> In the fifth and final phase the Soldiers apply and use the data in their training using lightweight virtual reality goggles that transmit the live 3D map allowing them to interact with the simulated 3D environment.

> "It's one thing to have a whole bunch of data," said David Krumb, associate director of the ICT's mixed reality laboratory. "It's another thing to be able to understand what that data means and employ it in a simulation."

> The data has already been used by units at the National Training Center, Fort Irwin, California. The NTC offers Soldiers a wealth of data collection from its desert environments to unique independent facilities.

500 military children earn students grants for 2019-2020 school year

FORT LEE, Virginia – Thanks to the Scholarships for Military Children program, 500 students from military families were each awarded a \$2000 scholarship grant for the upcoming 2019-2020 school year.

The program, created in 2001, recognizes the contributions of military families to the readiness of the fighting force and celebrates the commissaries' role in enhancing military quality of life. It's administered by the Fisher House Foundation, a nonprofit organization that helps service members and their families.

"This was the first year of an entirely paperless online application process, and it was a complete success," said Jim Weiskopf, Fisher House Foundation vice president and scholarship program administrator. "Not only did applications increase by nearly 25%, but we eliminated the need for commissaries to log in and account for each application, bundle them up and send them to the evaluators after the closing date."

The reduced overhead allowed commissaries to dedicate more time to promoting the program, said Marye Dobson, the Defense Commissary Agency's scholarships program liaison. "The management at the commissary stores did a great job getting the word out about the online process as well as hosting in-store ceremonies honoring the recipients at their local commissary, which helps bring attention to the availability of these scholarships."

Scholarship applicants submit their official transcript indicating a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0 or above on a 4.0 scale for high school applicants, or indicating a cumulative minimum GPA of 2.5 or above on a 4.0 scale for students already enrolled in college; and an essay of 500 words or less, no longer than two pages.

Eligibility is determined using the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System database. Applicants must ensure that they, as well as their sponsor, are enrolled in the DEERS database and have a current military dependent ID card. The applicant must also be planning to attend or already be attending an accredited college or university, full time, in the fall of 2019 or be enrolled in a program of studies designed to transfer directly into a four-year program.

Applicants who are awarded a full scholarship to attend a college or university or receive an appointment to one of the military academies or affiliated preparatory schools are not eligible to receive funds from this program. A full scholarship is usually defined as one that provides for payment of tuition, books, lab fees and other expenses.

All rules and requirements for the program, as well as links to frequently asked questions are available at the Scholarships for Military children website, as is the full list of this year's winners.

Fisher House also recently added a custom scholarship search engine to the site, tailored to military families, called "Scholarships for Service." It's free, easy to use, and available on mobile devices or computers at militaryscholar.org.

"The window to apply for the 2019-2020 Fisher House Scholarships for Military Children should open in December and close in February, but the exact dates have not been determined yet," said Dobson. "Be sure to check the scholarship page in mid-December for the opening of the program."

Fisher House Foundation is ranked a Four Star Charity by Charity Navigator.



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Florida World War II veteran celebrates 100 years

Florida WWII veteran Paul Cloud and his wife, Dorothy, have been married for 71 years.

By resolution of the Okaloosa Board of County Commissioners, Paul Cloud's 100th birthday is proclaimed Paul Vincent Cloud Day. The family had been planning a celebration, and the commission's resolution came as a happy surprise.

"I feel pretty good, really," Cloud said of the milestone birthday, "but I never really thought I'd reach 100."

Longevity has been problematic for Cloud's family. His mother died in her 50s after a stroke, his father died in his 70s from lung cancer, and his sister died in childbirth at the age of 38.

Still, Cloud said, "it feels great" to be honored on his 100th birthday.

The county's resolution also recognizes Cloud's service with the Army's 3rd Infantry Division in World War II. Cloud participated in the liberation of North Africa, and went on to battles across Italy, serving as a rifleman and working in supply, a job that kept him close to the action.

"I wasn't somebody way behind the lines," Cloud said. "We kept the front-line troops supplied with ammunition, food, everything we could get up there with."

Supply work was done mostly under cover of darkness, but that didn't mean Cloud and his fellow supply troops didn't attract the attention of German adversaries.

"We had casualties in my unit," Cloud said. "We got strafed, and we were always within artillery range."

Among the awards that Cloud brought home from the war were the European, African and Middle Eastern service ribbons. He's also entitled to a French medal for his role in the North Africa campaign. Cloud initially entered service through the peacetime draft initiated in 1940, expecting to serve just a year. But the Dec. 7, 1941 Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor changed those plans, and Cloud eventually would serve more than four years in the Army.

After repeated bouts of malaria, Cloud wound up his military service at Fort Lee, Virginia, where he trained nurses in a variety of skills, including the use of gas masks.

A native of Falling Waters, West Virginia, Cloud says that tough memories of the war stick with him even now, more than 70 years after his 1945 discharge.

"It's something I never will forget entirely," he said, "but it's not on my mind like it was for maybe the first 10 or 20 years after the war."

Cloud candidly admits that memories of the war haunted his sleep for some years afterward, before the realities of post-traumatic stress truly were recognized.

"But I dealt with it myself," he said. "It's something that I didn't feel like I wanted to rehash. I was trying to forget."

Happily enough, World War II also helped create a positive legacy in Cloud's life.

"I had the GI Bill," he said, "and that was my first thought."

With his GI Bill education benefits, Cloud attended George Washington and Benjamin Franklin universities. Through an acquaintance, he also managed to get a job with the Veterans Administration at the same time. Cloud would later go to work for the Internal Revenue Service, also in Washington, D.C.

Within a couple of years of returning to the United States, Cloud would meet and marry Dorothy Anderson, who had come to Washington, D.C., from St. Louis, after



successfully applying for a secretarial job with the federal government.

Sitting with her husband of 71 years in their comfortable living room, Dorothy remembered their courtship with a bit of dry humor.

"We lived together before it was fashionable," she deadpanned, before explaining that they met at a Washington, D.C. boarding house where women occupied one floor and men were restricted to another floor.

Residents did share meals, though, and the couple met over the dining room table.

"She was easy to get along with," Paul remembered. "She liked just about everything I did. She liked to travel, liked to have a good time, liked sports. So we got along pretty good."

The couple married on Thanksgiving in 1947, because the federal government holiday gave them time to make the trip to St. Louis. In the ensuing years, the Clouds would raise two daughters.

They retired from their accounting jobs — both worked for the same tax firm in the latter years of their working

lives — in 1975, and then spent time traveling. They have been at Bluewater Bay since 2013, moving to Florida to be closer to family members.

Their travels included visits to some of the places where Paul Cloud had served in World War II, although he admits he "didn't recognize too much."

But for Cloud, the places where American troops did their work aren't necessarily the most important legacy of World War II.

That legacy, he said, is contained in "the way the people (American soldiers and civilians) got behind the war effort. It was amazing."

Amazing, maybe — but for Cloud, like other World War II veterans, it was also a simple question of doing what was expected of them.

"I just always felt I had done my duty," he said.

Tetrahydrocannabinol, more commonly referred to as THC, is the psychoactive component found in marijuana. THC can have an array of effects on the brain, which affects receptors that are found throughout the central nervous system. It affects memory, learning, attention, decision making, coordination, emotions, and reaction time.

THC can cause permanent loss of intelligence and has been linked to delirium, psychotic disorders, anxiety disorders, and sleep disorders.

There are places selling products, particularly vape oils, which may contain varying levels of THC or other unknown substances. What many people aren't aware of is that the people making and selling these illegal products aren't scientists or medical professionals. The result is unregulated products with varying levels of THC. Even in the same products, some batches may have little effect, and some could result in the consumer's death.

Some signs of cannabis intoxication include conjunctival injection (eye redness), increased appetite, dry mouth, and tachycardia (rapid heartbeat). Consumption of synthetic forms of THC may show in the form of impaired mobility, slurred or incoherent speech, irrational behavior, sudden and extreme episodes ranging from hyperactivity to lethargy and mood swings to name a few.

Soldiers are strictly prohibited from consuming any illegal substances to include CBD oil -regardless of the situation. The latest testing equipment will test for CBD oil and if consumed, will show up as an illicit drug positive. If a Soldier is concerned about substance use, he/ she should speak with the Substance Use Disorder Clinical Care office located in the Liberty Wing of Winn

Army Hospital 435-3542 or Tuttle Army Health Clinic 315-6430.

Many Soldiers may not come forward out of concern for their careers. While understandable, substance abuse typically gets worse, not better. Unfortunately, it can be a career- and a relationship-ender. The earlier you seek help, the better.

Just as a tree draws its strength from an underground water source, we also draw our identity from things that are unseen. Let me suggest that our identity has been drawn from the wrong underground water source.



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Soldiers to operate armed robotic vehicles from upgraded Bradleys

AUSTIN, Texas -- Soldiers are slated to fire at targets next year using a platoon of robotic combat vehicles they will control from the back of modified Bradley Fighting Vehicles.

The monthlong operational test is scheduled to begin in March at Fort Carson, Colorado, and will provide input to the Combat Capabilities Development Command's Ground Vehicle Systems Center on where to go next with autonomous vehicles.

The upgraded Bradleys, called Mission Enabler Technologies-Demonstrators, or MET-Ds, have cutting-edge features such as a remote turret for the 25 mm main gun, 360-degree situational awareness cameras and enhanced crew stations with touchscreens.

Initial testing will include two MET-Ds and four robotic combat vehicles on M113 surrogate platforms. Each MET-D will have a driver and gunner as well as four Soldiers in its rear, who will conduct platoon-level maneuvers with two surrogate vehicles that fire 7.62 mm machine guns.

"We've never had Soldiers operate MET-Ds before," said David Centeno Jr., chief of the center's Emerging Capabilities Office. "We're asking them to utilize the vehicles in a way that's never been done before."

After the tests, the center and Next-Generation Combat Vehicle Cross-Functional Team, both part of Army Futures Command, will then use Soldier feedback to improve the vehicles for future test phases.

"You learn a lot," Centeno said at the International Armored Vehicles USA conference on June 26. "You learn how they use it. They may end up using it in ways we never even thought of."

The vehicles are experimental prototypes and are not meant to be fielded, but could influence other programs of record by demonstrating technology derived from ongoing development efforts.

"This technology is not only to remain in the RCV portfolio, but also legacy efforts as well," said Maj. Cory Wallace, robotic combat vehicle lead for the NGCV CFT.

One goal for the autonomous vehicles is to discover how to penetrate an adversary's anti-access/aerial denial capabilities without putting Soldiers in danger.

The vehicles, Centeno said, will eventually have third-generation forward-looking infrared kits with a target range of at least 14 kilometers.

"You're exposing forces to enemy fire, whether that be artillery, direct fire," he said. "So, we have to find ways

to penetrate that bubble, attrit their systems and allow for freedom of air and ground maneuver. These platforms buy us some of that, by giving us standoff."

PHASE II, III

In late fiscal year 2021, Soldiers will again play a role in Phase II testing as the vehicles conduct company-level maneuvers.

This time, experiments are slated to incorporate six MET-Ds and the same four M113 surrogates, in addition to four light and four medium surrogate robotic combat vehicles, which industry will provide.

Before these tests, a light infantry unit plans to experiment with the RCV light surrogate vehicles in Eastern Europe next May.

"The intent of this is to see how an RCV light integrates into a light infantry formation and performs reconnaissance and security tasks as well as supports dismounted infantry operations," Wallace said at the conference.

Soldier testing for Phase III is slated to take place mid-fiscal 2023 with the same number of MET-Ds and

M113 surrogate vehicles, but will instead have four medium and four heavy purpose-built RCVs.

"This is the first demonstration which we will be out of the surrogate realm and fielding purpose builts," Wallace said, adding the vehicles will conduct a combined arms breach.

The major said he was impressed with how quickly Soldiers learned to control the RCVs during the Robotic Combined Arms Breach Demonstration in May at the Yakima Training Center in Washington.

"Soldiers have demonstrated an intuitive ability to master controlling RCVs much faster than what we thought," he said. "The feedback from the Soldiers was that after two days they felt comfortable operating the system."

There are still ongoing efforts to offload some tasks in operating RVCs to artificial intelligence in order to reduce the cognitive burden on Soldiers.

"This is not how we're used to fighting," Centeno said. "We're asking a lot. We're putting a lot of sensors, putting
