Command teams, senior leaders, spouses explore Fort Stewart resources

The 3rd Infantry Division and garrison team welcomed newly arrived command team members, senior leaders and their spouses, Aug. 17, with an orientation and tour of Fort Stewart.

Those in attendance of the event learned of available post resources and participated in a tour of several facilities.

"This is a great opportunity for everybody to learn about our installation and to get to know new members of the team," said Maj. Gen. Lee Quintas, 3rd Infantry Division commanding general.

Command Sgt. Maj. Daniel Hendrex, 3rd ID command sergeant major, informed the new-comers and their Families of the Marne Division history and explained the significance of the term "Marne Express."

"I would just tell you to embrace it," Hendrex said. "The last time I was in the 3rd Infantry Division, I was a young sergeant. I came through here, and I thought it was the fastest place I had ever gone to. I literally got to the post and left. I find it interesting that my story of coming back to the 3rd ID with the Family is not much different today."

Hendrex encouraged the new Soldiers to visit the 3rd ID Museum, which reopened in 2017. He mentioned the history of decorated World War II veterans such as 2nd Lt. Audie Murphy and 1st Lt. Garlin Murl Conner.

"We have an incredible museum; there are 54 other incredible (Medal of Honor recipients) out there that you and your Soldiers can use as vignettes of 'this is what we put at the bar of excellence,' to include across almost every sin-

gle branch and (military occupational specialty) in the United States Army," Hendrex said.

Following the briefing, the spouses were led on a tour, and visited Winn Army Community Hospital; the Army Wellness Center; a child development center; Army Community Services campus and the education center, to learn what each had to offer their Soldiers and Families.

Command teams took a separate tour and visited the military police station; the rail marshalling area; the Training Aids, Devices, Simulators and Simulations; and range control.

They also visited Jordan Fitness Center and discussed incoming equipment to support Soldiers training for the new Army combat fitness test.

Quintas said the purpose of the tour was to arm the new command teams and their spouses with information; to introduce them to all the "action figures" who exist and get things done on post; to empower them as community leaders of the installation; and to remind

everybody why the 3rd ID is here.

"As leaders here at Fort Stewart, Hunter Army Airfield, I want to make sure that you have the information to know what the capabilities are, what the resources are and also what limitations exist here at Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield, and the local community," Quintas said. "You are empowered to make changes and get things done. It is not enough to identify a problem; community leaders solve problems."

Marne Places, Marne Faces

The long journey home Sustainment Soldier returns to roots in Afghanistan

A splash of green in the mountainous desert of Afghanistan marks Wardak province. A local boy runs up the hills of the Hindu Kush Mountains with his friends. Sgt. Hameedullah Qasimi, a future operations planner with Headquarters and Headquarters Company, Special Troops Battalion, 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade, recounts his life in his home village.

"Living in Wardak is the way it sounds, a third world country," said Qasimi. "A lot of stuff people have in the States we never had like hot water, showers, stuff like that. Sometimes we took showers in the river."

The province is not very populated and a lot of the villagers are uneducated, he said. Another aspect of living in the province was the threat of danger both past and present. Remnants of the Soviet invasion were all around, explosive devices buried beneath the earth could be triggered in the mountains that Qasimi played in as a child. He was no stranger to terrorism.

"My father passed away during the Soviet [invasion]," Qasimi said solemnly. "We used to get a lot of indirect fire, like we [did in Bagram]. He got shrapnel in his head and died on the spot."

Qasimi and his siblings were just children when they lost their father. He can't even recall how old he was at the time, having lost his father at such a young age.

"It was hard because we weren't able to work," he said. "My mother took over and had to become both parent figures."

Taliban insurgents would come to threaten villages in the country in later years. The terrorists would go to villages and force young boys into labor and if you were to refuse the villagers would be killed, Qasimi said. The danger gave him and his family little choice, they had to leave to save themselves.

Approximately 35 kilometers east of Wardak lies the capital of Afghanistan where Qasimi would begin his journey to the United States. It began with a job offering as a teacher.

"A friend referred me to people from the [United] States, Australia and Germany to teach them my language," Qasimi said, his slightly accented English an indicator of his heritage. "I made them a deal that if I was to teach them Dari that they would teach me English."

He then learned English and German from these individuals, but he didn't stop there. With his penchant for language, Qasimi learned Persian, Tajik, dialects of Dari, standard Arabic from school as well as Urdu, Punjabi, and Hindi from movies. His talent enabled him to acquire a job as a linguist as a local national contractor for the U.S. Army.

"I made up my mind that if, one day, I'd made it to the

U.S. I would join the Army," he said.

Through his connections as a contractor, Qasimi came to America in 2014. He was 29 when he began a new life in the U.S.

"I stayed my first night in the States in a homeless shelter," Qasimi said, chuckling at the memory. "My sponsor, who had to pick me up at the airport, fell asleep. I didn't have a number, I had nothing so the police took me to a homeless shelter."

Despite this initial setback, Qasimi's new life didn't slow down. Once he was settled in to lodging provided through the International Organization for Migration, he started working to rebuild his life in his new home.

Qasimi said it was difficult to start from scratch, working part-time at a restaurant while also going to school to get his G.E.D.

"I was confident that the opportunities were there," he said. "I just needed to put my nose to the grindstone," he said.

Qasimi decided he needed a change to help his financial situation and, in 2015, just one year after arriving in America, he joined the Army as a motor transport operator with the 396th Composite Truck Co., 87th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion, 3rd IDSB.

After being in the U.S. for only three years, Qasimi volunteered to deploy to Afghanistan. He hoped to be doing something similar to what he did as a local national, he said, going on patrols rather than sitting back in the rear

In 2017, the 3rd IDSB deployed to Bagram Airfield, Afghanistan. Qasimi was back in his home country, standing sentry at the U.S. Forces - Afghanistan compound as a member of the brigade's force protection platoon.

Along with his job as force protection, Qasimi utilized his linguistic skills by working with the brigade's legal office.

"I helped the legal office when they ran claims missions as a permanent part of their team by acting as a translator," Qasimi said. "I was more comfortable with this, it's what I was expecting to be doing when I joined the Army."

Now that he was back in his native country, the possibility of Qasimi being able to see his family again was tantalizingly close. His mother and one of his brothers still lived in Afghanistan, only a couple of hours away from Bagram Airfield. But unlike in the U.S., a simple family visit was out of the question.

"My family can't come [to Bagram] because that would make them a target for the enemies," Qasimi said, a hint of frustration in his voice betraying his stoic demeanor. "So I still considered myself away from my family."

Family is a large part of his culture, Qasimi said. Despite the physical distance of living in the U.S. and now the forced distance due to threat, Qasimi's connec-

tion with his family remains a huge part of his inspiration. He encouraged his fellow security platoon members with that thought in mind.

"I tell Soldiers to keep doing what they're doing and they will go back to their families," he said. "If I was able to see my family here again it would be a dream come true."

Despite his journey from home to the far reaches of the globe, Qasimi's heart is still with his family. His cultural and historical ties to the land stay with him in America and still are a large part of his life on his deployment.

The brigade returned from the tour on July 3, and Qasimi once again left his country of origin. He returned to his new home and the family he created for himself in the U.S.

"I am from Afghanistan, but when the plane landed it was a different feeling," Qasimi said. "Like they say 'home is where your heart is.' My son and my wife were here, so coming back [to the States] gave me the feeling of coming back home."

Army CID announces new crime Tips system

QUANTICO, VA -- The Army community and American public now have the ability to use their computers and smartphones to submit tips about crimes, suspicious activity or threats to the U.S. Army's Criminal Investigation Command via a new digital crime tips system.

The CID crime tips system recently transitioned to a web-based and smartphone app submission method. The public can access the system via any Internet-connected device by visiting, http://www.cid.army.mil/. In addition to the web interface, the app is for submission of tips and is available for free download from the Apple Store and Google Play at http://www.p3tips.com/app.aspx?ID=325.

According to CID's implementation project manager, Special Agent Christopher L. Adams, the new system provides users a safe, secure and anonymous method to report criminal activity and security threats without concerns of retaliation or fear. He explained that whenever a person submits a tip online, the completed form is securely transferred directly to Army CID through a Secure Sockets Layer connection, which means that the tips are encrypted, entirely confidential and completely anonymous. Users can also attach images, videos and documents with their tips.

"This new system is the ideal solution for 'tipsters' to report criminal activities or suspicious activity anonymously. Tips received will be seamlessly assigned to various units for further investigation. Additionally, persons providing anonymous tips will have the ability to communicate with the CID Agents," Adams said. "After submitting a tip, a tip reference/ID number is created that allows the tipster to create a password to check the status of the submitted tip or check on the status of a reward – if applicable. So do not misplace your ID number, as it will be needed to check on the status of your tip."

There is also the multi-language feature for global use that allows tips to be auto-converted into English on the backend regardless of what language they were submitted. Tips will be responded to in English and auto-translated back to their source language during the two-way dialog process.

According to Christopher Grey, CID's spokesman, the previous methods of reporting a crime to CID will remain in effect until the new Crime Tips System is fully implemented.

"It is critical for people to say something when

they see something and it literally can mean the difference between someone receiving the justice they deserve or victimizing another innocent person," Grey said. "Although we prefer people with information to use the new digital Crime Tips system, they can still report a crime through our current methods until these methods are phased out within the next 60 days: contact your local CID office, contact 1-844-ARMY-CID (844-276-9243) or email CID at *Army.CID.Crime.Tips@mail.mi*l."



SAFETY SPOTLIGHT:

Help available for carseat

If you a new parent or it's been a couple of years since you had to install a child's car seat it can be frustrating.

There are many different types and styles. Many are installed differently. Make sure it is installed correctly. The Fort Stewart Fire Department, 767-7006, located at 1164 West 15th street can help.

They have two certified instructors Inspector Wayne Reinhardt and Inspector Michael Gaitten. They will install it while you are watching, then remove it and have you install it to make sure you understand how to properly install it.

You will need to bring the following in order for them to show you how to properly install your car seat.

- · Vehicle manual.
- Car seat instructions.

Child car seats do have an expiration date, so if you get an child car seat at a garage sale or someone is nice and gives you their old one it could be expired and not in good working condition. They also recommend you register your child's car seat online with the manufacture so you will get notices if there is a recall for a safety defect.

Your child is your greatest gift, so take the time to ensure the car seat is properly installed. You can also contact Winn Army Community hospital for help with child car seat installation.

Deployments is word that most military members understand, and some dread. Together with reintegration, they indicate a process, which can be stressful for everyone involved.

Prior to deployments, Soldiers must prepare for the overseas challenges; mentally and physically. Both the Soldier and their loved one must adapt to a new environment, in dealing with their absence.

Whether the deployment is to National Training Center in California, Iraq, Afghanistan, Korea or any place Soldier to create a separation for an extended period, the Mobilization and Deployment Program is structured to provide essential information to increase understanding of what is going on. Johnson said a common misconception about deployments and reintegration is "I already know my loved one, I do not need help." He said with ability to communicate with anyone at your fingertips, the distance of deployments may not seem as far as it once did; it can seem like a non-issue. However, Johnson advises it is better to maintain a proactive position. Mobilization and Deployment is a free program. They offer training, forums and more. Getting away from sitting in a classroom. Some of these include disco through deployment; rocking reintegration; the Amazing Race. They can provide information booths with information regarding the deployment and reintegration. They have information about welcome home ceremonies, locations and lessons learned feedback from other Families too. Johnson said training and forums can be tailored special, realizing training is not a one-size fits all.

TRICARE has catastrophic cap

When it comes to staying healthy, some years are better than others. Perhaps you or your family faced a bumpy road this year. There may have been extensive medical tests or procedures, lengthy hospital stays, or weekly doctor visits. You may have reached — or are close to reaching — your catastrophic cap. A catastrophic cap is the most you pay out of pocket for covered services each year. This protects you because it limits the amount of out-ofpocket expenses a Family pays for TRICARE covered medical services.

Your catastrophic cap amount depends on who you are.

For active duty family members or families using TRICARE Reserve select, the cap is \$1,000 per family, per year. Those in a retiree category have a catastrophic cap of either \$3,000 or \$3,500, depending on your beneficiary group: Group A If you or your sponsor's initial enlistment or appointment occurred before January 1 you are in Group A. or Group B If you or your sponsor's initial enlistment or appointment occurs on or after January 1, 2018, are in Group

The catastrophic cap applies to all covered services. This includes annual deductibles, pharmacy copayments, and other cost-shares based on TRICARE-allowable charges. The catastrophic cap doesn't apply to:

- Services not covered by TRICARE
- •Any amount that non-participating providers may charge above the TRICARE-allowable charge. The maximum amount TRICARE pays for each procedure or service. This is tied by law to Medicare's allowable charges.

- •TRICARE Prime point-of-service charges
- •Enrollment fees for TRICARE Prime and TRICARE Select
- •Monthly premiums for TRS, TRICARE Retired Reserve or TRICARE Young Adult

What happens when you reach your catastrophic cap in a calendar year? You don't pay any more of the TRICAREallowable charge for covered services. But you'll have to pay for services that don't fall under the catastrophic cap protection. These include amounts billed by non-participating providers (up to 15 percent above the allowable charge), point-of-service charges, and all costs for non-covered services.

If you're an active duty member who retires mid-year, don't worry. The full deductible and cost-shares credited towards the previous family cap will be credited to the new cap.



CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

Abide in constant contact with God

"Blessed [with spiritual security] is the one who believes, trusts in, and relies on the Lord and whose hope and confident expectation is the Lord." Jeremiah 17:7 (AMP).

Jeremiah 17:1-8 is God's message through the words of the prophet Jeremiah. It is a warning for us to not lose sight of living each day in an awareness of being in dependence on God.

In general, it contains the truth that there are only two types of people: those who depend on human strength and those who depend on the living God. He makes it clear that we cannot look to both as our supreme basis of trust. We will either put our hope in the failing promises and finite power of people, or we will look with faith beyond human capability to the Sovereign person and satisfying promises of God.

We are sustained alone by God's providence and grace. Yes, we may expect help from others, so far as God enables them to help us, but we must rest our total trust and confidence in God alone.

When we make humanity the basis of our confidence, we will experience rejection and disappointment again and again. We also fracture our relationship with God. But when God becomes the ultimate source of our confidence, we are never let down.

There are three brief observations about the truths from this text.

In verse five, a person who depends on human strength and possesses no spiritual accountability to God is "cursed" or, also translated, "miserable." This person places attributes reserved only for God and puts them onto mankind. His or her confidence is in the wisdom, power, and faithfulness of humanity instead of God.

In verse six, a person who does possess individual,

spiritual faith in God yet trusts in their own righteousness and strength, is like a shrub in a parched desert. This person looks the part on the outside, but is devoid of spiritual life and vitality on the inside.

They are spiritually dry and think they can do well enough on their own, without the regular abiding grace of Christ. This person does not, in fact, depend on God. They lack the spiritual stamina to weather the storms of life.

In verse seven, a third person, one blessed with spiritual security, is the person who not only believes, but trusts in and relies on the Lord. This person's abiding hope and confident expectation is the Lord. This person flourishes in the drought.

When the heat of life gets hot, this person remains cool and calm. This person is not anxious, but is fixed in God's peace throughout the course of the trial. This person's soul is watered by constant contact and devotion to God.

So now to ask the difficult question: Which person am I?

Too many times, we find ourselves depending on ourselves – our own thoughts, our own interpretations or reactions, our own feelings or "gut instinct." We ought to want to always be the tree planted and living by the water.

In the NewTestament, Jesus called His disciples to this same way of living in *John 15*. It is the way of abiding!

Jesus describes abiding as remaining connected to Him as a branch of grapes connects to the vine. The fruit is utterly dependent upon the nutrients passed through the vine via a constant and steadfast connection.

Abiding is the same as the tree planted next to the water. Its leaves always stay green because of the deep roots and constant contact with the life-giving water.

So, how well are you abiding today?

293rd MPs hold active shooter training

Soldiers with 293rd Military Police Company, 385th MP Battalion, held active shooter response training at Fort Stewart, Aug. 17.

The training allows MPs to rehearse reacting to various scenarios of an active shooter.

"Training was done in four phases -- crawl, walk, run, and test," said Sgt. Mackenzie Myers, an MP with 293rd MP Co.

On day one, they learned how to clear rooms and hallways when searching for an active shooter and what to do if they came across a closed door, Myers said.

They also conducted "glass house training" which allowed them to operate in an open environment.

The duration of training was held in the shoot house with simulated paint rounds to make the training as realistic as possible, said Myers.

"We train as we fight so we always gear up the same as we would if we actually showed up on the scene," she said. "Practicing in full gear and following all the procedures in real-time makes the training feel realistic."

"Short of shooting each other with real bullets, this is the most realistic training that we could come up with to prepare our MPs as much as possible," said 2nd Lt. Alex Reimer, platoon leader, 293rd MP Co.


Reimer added that he and all of the instructors were impressed with the level of proficiency they saw.

Myers said she thought the training was beneficial especially since this was her first experience in a shoot house.

"This training is important stateside because of the world we live in today," Myers said. "There are more and more active shooters out there, not only in schools but in hospitals as well. If there were ever an active shooter on a military installation, we would be prepared."
