

Installation earns Commander in Chief's award

Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield is a winner of the 2019 Commander in Chief's Annual Award for Installation Excellence.

The Department of Defense announced the recipients today. The Commander in Chief's Annual Award for Installation Excellence recognizes the outstanding and innovative efforts of the people who operate and maintain U.S. military installations. The installation's status as 2019 Army Communities of Excellence gold winner was a prerequisite to compete for the DoD award.

Stewart-Hunter garrison commander Col. Jason Wolter said the support of the southeast Georgia communities helped secure both wins. He thanked the communities for their support at an ACOE ceremony hosted by Maj. Gen. Lee Quintas, the 3rd Infantry Division commander and installation senior commander, on May 28.

"Without your commitments, we could not be where we are today," Wolter said. "You're an outstanding community that exhibits the support necessary to meet the unmatched readiness of your Army today. There's no place other than Fort Stewart

or Hunter Army Airfield our Soldiers would rather call home. We could be here all night talking about the things you do for Soldiers without asking for recognition."

To win the Commander in Chief's award, installations compete on how well they achieve the department's objectives in several areas of installation management, including mission support, energy conservation, quality of life and unit morale, environmental stewardship, real property management, safety, health and security, communications and public relations.

Excellent installations enable better mission performance and enhance the working and living conditions for military men and women, DOD civilians and their families. Each of the winning installations succeeded at being the best in achieving excellence in performing installation management within their military service and the Defense Logistics Agency.

Each winning installation will receive a commemorative trophy and flag and a congratulatory letter from the president.

Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield has won the Army Communities of Excellence gold seven times, in 2004, 2005, 2006, 2009, 2012, 2015 and 2019.



Quintas farewells community at ACOE ceremony

Maj. Gen. Leopoldo A. Qunitas, commander of the 3rd Infantry Division and senior commander of Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield, farewelled the community during the Army Communities of Excellence award ceremony, May 28 at Club Stewart on Fort Stewart.

The Department of the Army named Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield as the winner for the 2019 Army Communities of Excellence award earlier this year, making it the seventh time the installation won the award.

"To be recognized for the seventh time is really a true mark of excellence," said Quintas. "We are very proud of this achievement. It is a comprehensive look and is truly a great achievement to be recognized as the best."

Quintas and key leaders accepted the ACOE award and thanked the community for their long-standing partnership to the Soldiers and Families who work on the installation.

"All the communities around here have been strong supporters of Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield for decades," said William Cathcart, Civilian Assistant to the Secretary of the Army. "This award is important from the standpoint of the Army, like all military services, they want to station their people and add missions where they are wanted, accepted and supported by the community."

Cathcart stated that the community support from Hinesville to Savannah is universally strong and committed to partnership and excellence.

"This great award enhances the pride that community residences feel for Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield," Cathcart said.

Ouintas said the relationship with the community has

never been better.

"In my 33 years in the U.S. Army, I have never seen it better, than what we have seen here at Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield," Qunitas said. "There is no better community to be part of than the coastal Georgia community."

Quintas who changed command earlier this week, served three tours at Fort Stewart and considers the coastal Georgia area home.

"This has been the greatest professional honor of my 33-year career," said Quintas. "To have been able to serve as commanding general of the 3rd Infantry Division and the senior commander of Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield, it has been an honor."

Quintas, who deployed the division headquarters to Afghanistan in the summer of 2017, said it was one of the most memorable moments as a commander.

"It was an honor to be able to deploy a good part of the division to Afghanistan and conduct operations there on behalf of the nation," said Qunitas. "It has also been an honor to partner with the Georgia National Guard and promote this idea of the Total Force Integration, which prepared them for their mission to deploy to Afghanistan."

Every brigade under his leadership has deployed in support of contingency operations and redeployed back to Stewart-Hunter.

"Some of the most important things I will always remember, was preparing our Soldiers to go into harm's way," Quintas said. "We took them through very difficult training to make sure they were fully prepared. And we prepared their Families for the deployment too. I also made it a point to be at every flight departing to deploy into harm's way. I wanted to look every Soldier in the eye, shake their hands and wish them the very best."

Seeing the Soldiers off to deploy is one thing. But Quintas also made it a point to be at every welcome home ceremony for units redeploying back to Stewart.

"Another important moment for me is when I shake their [Soldiers] hands as they come off of the plane," said Quintas. "I think success on the battlefield is about mastering the fundamentals. It's not about echelons of planning and maneuver, it's about fundamentals things like marksmanship, first aid, and communication. If you focus on lethality, being a Soldier and providing good sound leadership, it gives us the competitive edge on the battlefield."

During his tenure as the division commander, the division, brigades, and battalions completed complex multi-echelon training exercises to include three Warfighter exercises, rotations at the National Training Center and the Joint Readiness Training Center, several emergency deployment readiness exercises, hurricane and chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear defense response missions and southwest border security.

"This division is born out of a legacy of grit and determination which makes a difference," said Quintas. "Having come from a division that has been focused on building warfighting readiness that has deployed a brigade to Korea and the division headquarters, sustainment and combat aviation brigade to Afghanistan, I come with an element of experience and perspective that will help the Forces Command commander," Quintas said.

After commanding the 3rd ID for two years, Quintas relinquished his role as commander to Maj. Gen. Antonio A. Aguto. (See related story on Page 10.)

Quintas will continue to serve the country as the deputy commanding general for U.S. Army Forces Command at Fort Bragg, N.C.

396th Composite Truck Company supports Romanian school trip

Constanta, Romania -- A school field trip took place outside Mihail Kogalniceanu Air Base throughout the week of May 27-31 with volunteers from the Romanian, Italian, and U.S. Armed forces.

Each armed force brought equipment to show the children, giving them the opportunity to explore inside UH-60 helicopters, a military police vehicle, fire trucks, and an M1070 Heavy Equipment Transport system.

"The importance of this is the community rela-

tions," said Staff Sgt. Jeffery Laird, with the 396th Composite Truck Company, 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division, from Fort Stewart, Georgia. "We are out here building bonds and a stable relationship with the community."

From the local community, roughly four thousand students have come to the event hosted by Constanta's international airport.

"I've seen a lot of excitement out here, and I think the children like the Blackhawk helicopter the most," he said. "But once they get up in the truck and see how high they are, put the [Army combat helmet] on and get behind the wheel, I think they like that a lot too."

Laird was in charge of the M1070 Heavy Equipment Transport system. He and his team helped children walk over the catwalk and safely dismount the vehicle. Children tried on different gear, such as fire protection jackets and helmets. They also got to trigger the siren and speak into the megaphone in the military police vehicle, which was also on display.

"We have been introducing them into what we do and our presence here," said Spc. Sinaed Engleman, with Army Reserves unit 313th MP Detachment, a native of Fairbanks, Alaska. "[We are] out here just interacting with these kids so they are comfortable when they see us."

While the kids got to explore the inside and outside of the various vehicles, they were also fascinated by many of the uniforms and personal equipment used by the service members.

The volunteers could tell the children were excited to be there and probably had never done anything like this before. Most of the kids at the event were elementary to middle school ages.

The event was not only fun for the children but also for the Soldiers attending. Many of the Soldiers were reminded of their own children during their time volunteering.

"Reminds me of home a little bit, which is why I enjoy it," Laird said.

The interoperability between allied nations was extended to more than just the military this week, and the community showed their support by coming to see the multinational forces at the airfield.

"We're here as a peaceful mission to interact with the children, Laird said. "I know they like getting in the equipment, meeting us, and taking their little selfies, and I believe the children are really enjoying this. And I am having a good time out here doing this myself."



2018 Water Quality Report

Where does my water come from?

Fort Stewart's main water supply comes from six municipal groundwater wells that are no less than 500 feet deep, while Hunter Army Airfield residents are serviced by four 500-foot deep wells and one 1100-foot deep well. Groundwater is stored in permeable rock layers called aquifers, which are like underground lakes. Our groundwater is supplied by the *Floridan Aquifer*. Before the water is distributed, the water is chlorinated to kill disease-causing organisms and fluoridated to promote dental health.

Georgia Water Restrictions

Georgia has received significant rainfall over the past year. However, the state still restricts outdoor water use to conserve our water resources. Homes and businesses with odd-numbered addresses may water on Sundays, Tuesdays and Thursdays and even numbered or unnumbered addresses water on Mondays, Wednesdays and Saturdays from 12 midnight to 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. to midnight. All outdoor water use is prohibited on Fridays.

Source Water Assessment


A source water assessment has been performed on the source of your drinking water (the *Floridan Aquifer*). The wellhead protection plans on Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield were developed to determine the susceptibility of contaminants entering our drinking water supply and to better identify ways for protecting our water source. For further information, a copy of these wellhead protection plans may be reviewed at the Fort Stewart Environmental Office, 1550 Veterans Parkway at building 1137 on Fort Stewart. Vulnerability

Both the U.S. Army Medical Department Activity Preventive Medicine and the Directorate of Public Works on Fort Stewart, continually monitor the drinking water for contaminants. Our water is safe to drink; however, some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immunocompromised persons such as those with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. The Environmental Protection Agency and Center for Disease Control guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 800-426-4791.

Conserving our Water Supply

Everyday throughout the world, nations are facing water problems in terms of both quantity and quality. Between 1950 and 1970, global water demand tripled and is expected to double within 35 years. Although 75% of the earth is covered by water, only 1% is available as renewable fresh water, and only about one-third of all precipitation that falls on the land goes back to the oceans by rivers and runoff. We are a nation whose water needs are rapidly rising while available supplies are shrinking; regional water crises are becoming increasingly frequent as water tables are falling and stream flow is decreasing. We can no longer take our drinking water for granted. This means that individuals, municipalities, industries, and governments must be proactive in conserving and protecting our water supplies. The consequences of recurring long duration droughts are far-reaching, affecting wildlife, vegetation, and humans. Additionally, drought impacts on society are often exacerbated by the demand that people place on the water supply. Water is one of the most precious commodities we have on this planet; we ought not to treat it as if it were an unlimited resource. By shifting our priorities for water usage, we can prevent water scarcity. The well has run dry in many places—let's not make our community next!



Protecting your Water Source

DPW is pleased to present Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield's Annual Water Quality Report (Water System Identification CG1790024 and CG0510107, respectively). Our water is safe to drink. This report provides you with a detailed account of all water monitoring and testing results gathered in 2018 confirming the Installation's good water quality. As always, we've met our goal to provide our patrons with safe and dependable drinking water. Additional copies of this report are available at the Installation's Environmental Offices: Fort Stewart, building 1137 and Hunter Army Airfield at building 615.

The sources of drinking water (both tap and bottled) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the land or through the ground, it can dissolve naturally-occurring minerals. Therefore, water can pick up substances as by-products from both the presence of animals and human activities. Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria that may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial and domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, or mining and farming activities.
- Pesticides or herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban runoff, and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals (VOCs), which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and they can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be either naturally-occurring or the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which provide the same public health protection. Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. Our personnel take water samples from numerous locations throughout the distribution system and residential taps; samples are then delivered to an accredited laboratory where water quality analyses are performed. EMS: Answering the call on your worst day

Nestled between the Army Wellness Clinic and the Level 4 trauma designated Winn Army Community Hospital, the U. S. Army Medical Department Activity-Fort Stewart ambulance office and shelter sits.

Just inside its doors are a few of Fort Stewart's 24 first responders, who after completing a 24-hour shift greet the next shift of emergency medical technicians, paramedics and combat medic Soldiers.

"In this job nobody ever calls 911 on their best day," said MEDDAC Paramedic, Jim Luck.

A few minutes later, a call from the radio cut through the silence, "Assault with injuries." At once, MEDDAC AOS emergency medical services technicians and paramedics methodically prepare to answer the plea for help.

The proud wail of two ambulance sirens and blazoned strobe lights help the first responders maneuver through the on-post traffic. This call is one in approximately seven they receive each day.

Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield women and men first responders remain ready to provide the highest quality of healthcare to Soldiers, Family Members and those in the surrounding communities.

Vito Powers, a paramedic and retired Soldier with more than 24 years' experience in the medical services field as a flight paramedic, said his role at AOS is a "most noble" profession, one of which he takes

"You are afforded the opportunity to save lives in the defense of our nation and in the face of our enemies," Powers lamented.

Uniquely, the medical services section has the opportunity to partner with Stewart-Hunter combat medic Soldiers on a 90-day rotational basis. This collaboration gives the Soldiers additional readiness training, while helping fill empty positions.

Spc. Paul Abante, a 1st Armor Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division Soldier was at the end of his three-month training and commented on the differenc-

"On the line we are just taking care of our guys," Abante said about serving in his unit, "and they are completely different from civilians. The biggest difference to me was being able to actually see what we do in the back of an ambulance ... I got to actually put all my skills to use. We want to see how well we can deliver under pressure and doing that here, was amazing."

Art Rinconnes, an emergency medical technician with more than a combined 40 vears of military and civilian service under his belt, said mentorship is an important aspect of his career.

"They [Soldiers] get the chance to see the other side of EMS and hospital care," Rinconnes explained. "A lot of them have said they would like to go on, continue on with medical care, even possibly going into EMS."

Luck said the chance of seeing people's lives impacted in a "horribly negative way," is high, and a strong support system is important for longevity.

"The ability to deal with that [witnessing traumas], to process that is extremely important for long-term mental health," Luck said. "So we try to develop a group where they would feel free to talk to each other and reach out to each other, but it's still a struggle."

Luck said the camaraderie between him and his coworkers is second to

"The reality is that anything that we go through individually in our daily lives, the other guys are always reaching out and saying 'hey, how are you, what's going on, how did it go'...not with just negative things, but with positive things and that's extremely beneficial," Luck said.

So the next time red flashing lights are in the rear-view mirror, pull over, because no matter the call, the Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield EMS team is ready to answer on your worst day.

CHAPLAIN'S CORNER: REMEMBERING D-DAY

"We do not look at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen. For the things which are seen are temporary, but the things which are not seen are eternal." 2 Corinthians 4:18

This week marks the 75th anniversary of the allied invasion of Normandy in the largest amphibious military operation in history. Almost 7000 vessels deployed across the English Channel, carrying over 280,000 personnel. The amount of planning involved and the man-hours invested in coordinating Operation Neptune was immense.

While most of us are familiar with D-day as a turning point in World War II, fewer know the actual carrying out of the mission rested on one critical decision by General Dwight Eisenhower.

The success of operation was contingent upon several natural conditions. Lunar visibility, reasonably calm waters, and the weather had to be favorable. Postponing the launch would mean a delay of close to two weeks. This would increase the odds of the enemy discovering the plan. Eisenhower had set a tentative date of June for the assault.

Early in the morning of June 4, it appeared as if it would be impossible to execute the plan. However, late that same evening with a storm still visibly raging outside, Scottish meteorologist James Stagg informed Eisenhower that a thirty-six hour window would open up the next night. Stagg was confident of it, but Eisenhower's

top advisors were divided. Knowing that the outcome of the entire war possibly rested upon this decision but seeing the driving rain still pouring, Eisenhower trusted Stagg's forecast. D-day was a go.

As I think of the critical moments leading up to the launch of Operation Neptune, I realize that few if any of us will ever be faced with such a colossally important military decision. But the situation General Eisenhower faced is a reminder to us of a decision we do all encounter. The immediate evidence on the night of June 4 suggested that the mission should be canceled. Eisenhower had to put his trust in what he himself could not see, the calm weather promised by Stagg. This is very essence of what is required to be a person of faith.

I have often witnessed or experienced situations that could have prompted me to doubt whether God cares about me or humanity in general. The immediate evidence does not lend support to my belief in a loving, omnipotent God. However, as a Christian I have a chorus of voices reminding me, just like James Stagg reminded Eisenhower, that a better day is ahead. One of those voices, St. Paul, shared this thought with the believers at Corinth, "We do not look at the things which are seen." The most important voice is Jesus himself who, before he faced the darkest day of all, encouraged his followers, "Let not your hearts be troubled... I go and prepare a place for you."

So, I make the decision to remain a believer and bet my life on the hope that despite all the times when evil seems to have the upper hand, the love of God will have the final word.



TRICARE available for students, young adults

"Going to college is a big transition," said Debra Fisher, TRICARE Policy and Benefits Office at the Defense Health Agency. "It's also a TRICARE Qualifying Life Event, which may open new enrollment opportunities for your student and other Family members."

Your student's health care options depend on the location of the college, the sponsor status, and a family's individual preferences.

If a child is enrolled in TRICARE Prime and is attending college in the same region as the sponsor, he or she may keep the same coverage using the sponsor's address. Enrollment may also be transferred to the school address.

"TRICARE Prime isn't available everywhere," said Fisher, who will speak at the webinar. "TRICARE Prime must be available in the new location, and the student must

maintain coverage."

Use the TRICARE Plan Finder to see what health plans may be available in the location of your child's college. You can also call your TRICARE regional contractor.

What if your student attends college in a different TRICARE region? If your student studies overseas? Will coverage change for children studying in the U.S. with TRICARE Select, TRICARE Prime Remote, or US Family Health Plan? Join the webinar to learn about TRICARE in these situations.

Children who graduate from college or turn age 21 are no longer eligible for regular TRICARE. But they have other health care options, including TRICARE. Young Adult.

"After graduating college, your child may have the option to purchase TRICARE Young Adult," said Shane Pham, a webinar presenter



Providers teach, coach, mentor local football team

When the business day is done, parts have been ordered and the last wrench has been turned, most Soldiers hang up their hat, go home and relax. But two Soldiers in the 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade go above and beyond to teach and inspire young athletes in their community.
