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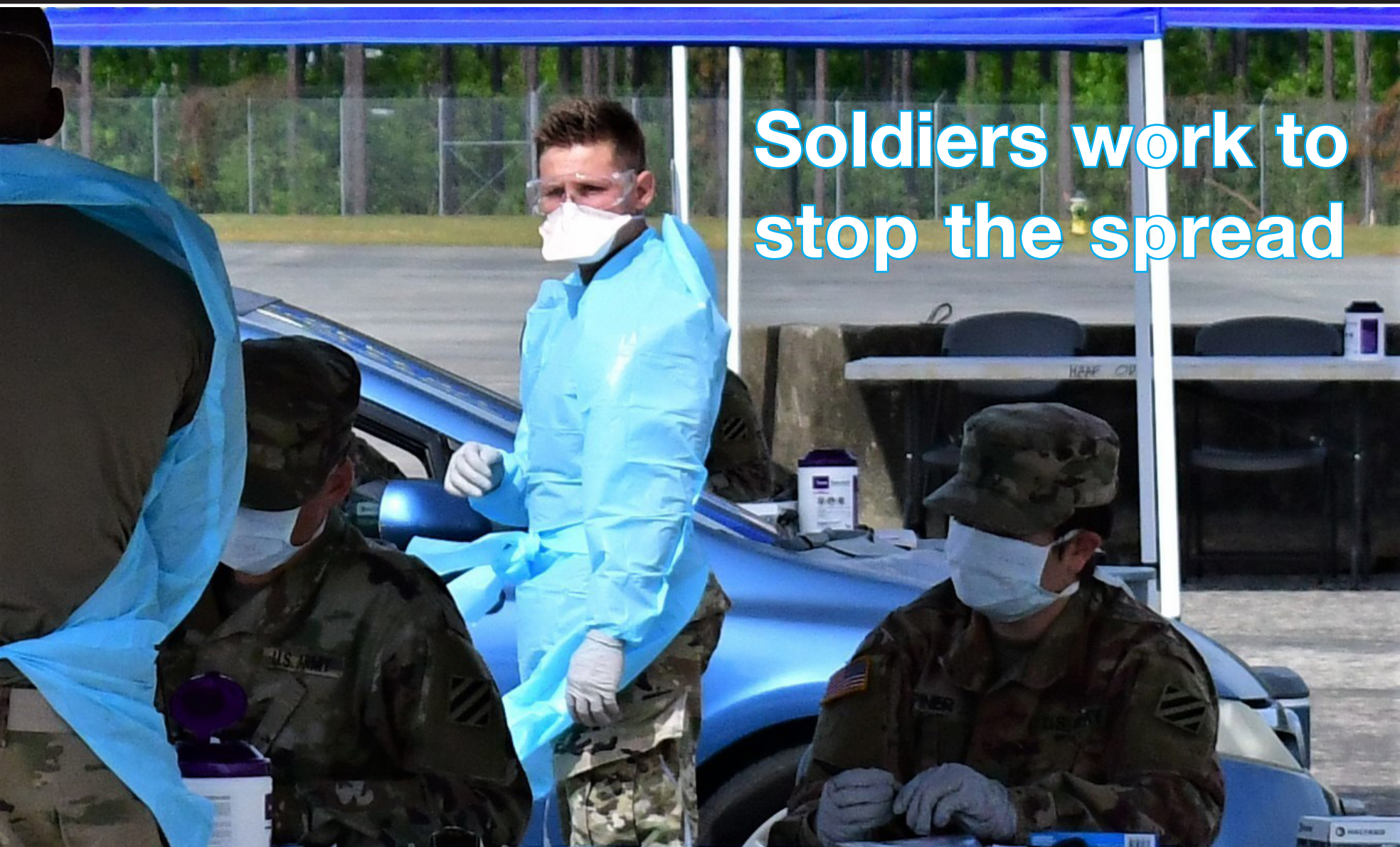

CID warns of COVID-19 related fraud, scams

QUANTICO, Va. – The U.S. Army Criminal Investigation Command continues its commitment to ensuring the health and safety of the Army Family and recommends being suspicious of anyone offering unsolicited advice on prevention, protection or recovery during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Opportunistic scammers continue to find creative ways to obtain and use someone's personal and financial information. From fake stimulus checks to Medicare fraud, cybercriminals will undertake extreme measures to separate individuals from their money.

“With the passing of the nearly \$2 trillion dollar stimulus bill, cybercriminals around the world are already looking at ways to exploit it,” said Edward Labarge, director of CID's Major Cybercrime Unit. “During tax season, we see a massive uptick in the amount of tax-related fraud schemes. With the new stimulus bill, we might see a massive uptick in the amount of stimulus and debt relief scams circulating on the internet.”

CID officials remind the Army community that stimulus checks will come directly from the Internal Revenue Service and servicemembers should deal only with the IRS. Reliable COVID-19 stimulus information is available on the IRS website.

Labarge encourages people to, “ignore all phone calls, emails, and text messages of anyone asking you for personal information to receive stimulus aid.” The U.S. Government will not ask you for your private information. If you believe you've been a victim of a scam, contact your nearest CID office.

In addition, the Criminal Investigation Command's Major Cybercrime Unit continues to warn the Army community of ongoing COVID-19 themed phishing attacks impersonating organizations with the end goal of stealing information and delivering malware. “Cybercriminals are innovative and will take advantage of current browsing trends to conduct social engineering attacks,” said Labarge. “We have already seen this with malware infected COVID-19 maps and phishing emails related to the pandemic.”

Labarge said the Major Cybercrime Unit continues to “aggressively pursue cybercriminals both domestic and abroad who target our Soldier's and their Families in their online campaigns.”

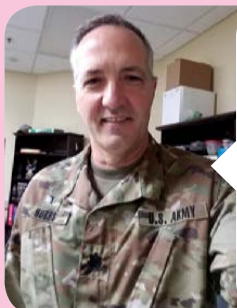

Fort Stewart, Hunter open up COVID-19 screening stations

Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield is now operating drive-thru screening locations on both installations. The service is open to all TRICARE beneficiaries.

Last week, in a partnership with Garrison leadership at each installation, Winn Army Community Hospital and the 3rd Infantry Division, conducted trial runs of drive-thru screening sites where personnel could get screened for COVID-19, and tested for the virus if they were deemed moderate to high risk or symptomatic for COVID-19.

"We are all in this together, and we will continue to protect the force and our people," said Winn Army Community Hospital Commander Col. Michelle Munroe.

After a successful trial at both installations, the service will now be regularly conducted from 10 am to 3 pm. Tuesday through Saturday, and those who use the service never have to leave their vehicle.

We ask personnel to call 435-6633, where they will be pre-screened by a nurse at Winn ACH.

When personnel arrive on site at either screening location they will again be screened by a trained medical professional, and once deemed moderate

to high risk or symptomatic for COVID-19, they will be tested.

Test results are expected in about 10 days and those tested should continue to isolate themselves per CDC guidelines.

Everyone who comes through, regardless of whether or not a test for COVID-19 is administered, will receive the most up-to-date information and education available on COVID-19.

The screening site on Fort Stewart can be accessed from Gate 7, off of Airport Road, or via 6th Street, while the screening site on Hunter Army Airfield can be accessed from Rio Gate or via Perimeter Road.

TRICARE beneficiaries who feel they may be moderate to high risk or symptomatic for COVID-19 can still use the established Fever Clinics on both locations; at Winn or LSA Sparta on Fort Stewart or Tuttle Army Health Clinic on Hunter Army Airfield.

The TRICARE Nurse Advice Line is available 24/7 to answer questions, at 1-800-874-2273 (select option 1 and follow the instructions), and the Army Public Health Center hotline is 1-800-984-8523.

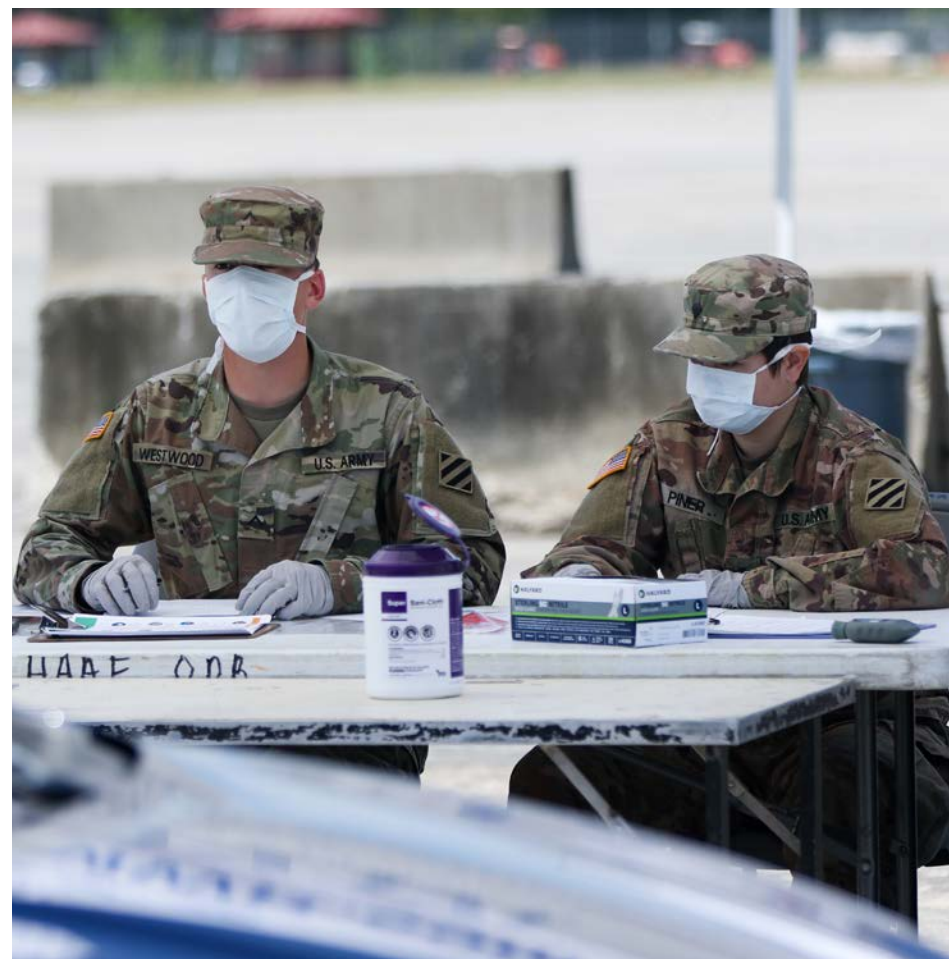

Gold Star wife driven to shape policy, give back

Ursula Palmer's life-changing call came on Jan. 2, 2008.

An improvised explosive device left her husband, Sgt. 1st Class Collin Bowen, deployed in support of Operation Enduring Freedom in Khost Province, Afghanistan, with severe burns on over half his body, including his face, head and extremities, Ursula said.

Weeks turned into months, and Ursula took note of the medications her husband would need to be on if his condition were to get worse. Days before March 14, he received one last procedure in an attempt to save his life.

"They told me he could be the first one to survive this surgery," Ursula said. A few days after his surgery, "I went to look at the medicines hanging from the IV. There were three out of the four medicines the nurse told me to look out for -- that's when I said, 'well, this is it.'"

After some deliberation with the medical staff, the family made the final decision to take Collin off life support and start him on morphine for the pain. Then, on March 14th at 1:03 a.m. he was gone.

A new path

Ursula was alone to raise their then-3-year-old daughter, Gabriela. While it was difficult to lose him as a husband, missing him as a father was the hardest thing to accept, she said.

"You could see that [Gabriela] felt an absence," Ursula said. "Whenever one of Collin's friends would come to visit, she would immediately go and sit on their lap. It was her way to express that she was missing her father. It was heart-wrenching for me to see her reach to others ... just to feel his presence."

Ursula found support through various Gold Star wives nonprofits and support groups, she said. That is around the time she crossed paths with Vivianne Wersel during an event

in Washington, D.C. They instantly became friends.

Vivianne had lost her husband, Marine Corps Lt. Col. Richard Wersel Jr. on Feb. 4, 2005, just one week after returning from Iraq. She had two younger children at the time of his death. The wars in Iraq and Afghanistan resulted in many "younger" widows to be left behind, Vivianne said.

"The Gold Star Wives of America was an avenue to connect with other widows; however, the average age was from the Vietnam-war era. Their day-to-day activities were not the same as ours," Vivianne said.

The national organization was founded in 1945 by Marie Jordan Spear and became federally chartered by Eleanor Roosevelt, who was one of the original members, Vivianne said.

"It is so imperative to keep this organization going for what it stands for -- helping other military widows and their children," she said.

"We realized we could not attend their monthly meetings as our children had scheduled activities, or it was too far to drive. Moreover, we did not have much in common, except [for being] military widows," Vivianne added.

Recognizing a need, Ursula, Vivianne, and Lisa Doring, a Marine Corps widow, started laying the groundwork for the Arlington chapter, which was later approved by the national organization in 2012.

The Arlington chapter would leverage technology and appeal to the post 9/11 military widows who lost a loved one while on active duty, or in the result of a service-connected disability with no distinction of death versus killed, said Vivianne, the chapter's president.

"Community is important," Ursula said. "We all share loss -- we all share this feeling of being left behind, either by ourselves or with children. It is easier to simply sit down next to another Gold Star wife. You don't even have to say anything, and you feel understood."

The virtual chapter provided a sense

of connection and family, Ursula said. Through the chapter's private Facebook group, spouses can ask questions or request support.

"Many of our fallen are buried in [Arlington National Cemetery] but their families do not live in the area," Ursula said. "Anniversaries and other special days come, but they are not able to go out and put a couple of flowers in their [loved one's] grave. It is simple to do that for them, and we try to help in any way that we can."

Whether it is grieving over the loss of a loved one or dealing with another hardship, having a community is important, Ursula emphasized. People should always reach out for help during a time of need.

"There are so many, so many organizations out there," she said. "Without many of these communities and people, I wouldn't have been able to do it. If you just reach out, someone will be there to help."

Fighting for others

Along with finding new love, Ursula felt compelled to do more to support the military, veteran, and military spouse communities, she said. With

the Gold Star Arlington chapter in full swing, she found another opportunity with HillVets, a nonprofit group dedicated to bipartisan veterans and supporters, interested in engaging in policy, politics, or government.

After completing the organization's leadership course last year, Ursula found a placement in Capitol Hill. She started working on a policy to bolster entitlements for Gold Star spouses, along with implementing changes to military spousal employment.

"In my case, I have two master's degrees, and I cannot find a job that matches my qualifications," Ursula said. As a widow, "the moment I remarried, I lost my preference as a Gold Star spouse. Why wouldn't I still have this preference?"

Ursula acknowledged the many initiatives within the military and civilian sectors that provide support to the veteran and spouse communities. However, she feels that many of them fall short when it comes to supporting spouses and veterans with higher educations.

"I want to work for the entire veteran community," she said. "All I want is to continue to serve."

Army hospitals ready in New York, Seattle

WASHINGTON – Army medical professionals began treating patients at the Javits Convention Center in New York City last week and an Army hospital unit deployed to Seattle began receiving patients April 3.

The 627th Hospital Center from Fort Carson, Colorado, has set up 250 beds at CenturyLink Field Event Center in Seattle, next to the home of Seahawks football. The hospital unit has also established two emergency rooms, two operating rooms, a pharmacy and an x-ray department there.

It's one of the most capable hospitals in the Army, said Lt. Gen. Laura Richardson, commander of U.S. Army North, headquartered in San Antonio, Texas. She spoke by teleconference at a Pentagon press conference.

ARNORTH has now been designated as the Joint Force Land Component Command to control all military ground forces supporting the COVID-19 response effort, she explained.

About 3,600 Soldiers, including those assigned to the 63rd Expeditionary Signal Battalion, 35th Signal Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division, as well as Airmen and Marines are now deployed to New York and Washington state to support the Federal Emergency Management Agency and local officials, she said.

In total, about 5,600 military under U.S. Northern Command are "laser-focused" to support the COVID-19 response, said Gen. Terrence O'Shaughnessy, NORTHCOM commander. He said more troops are prepared to deploy when needed.

"We're approaching it as a large-scale military campaign," he said, later adding "the scope of our response is unprecedented."

Three staging areas for equipment have been set up, he said, one at Joint Base Lewis-McChord, Washington, another at Travis Air Force Base,

California, and a third at Dover Air Force Base, Delaware.

In the New York area, the 531st Hospital Center from Fort Campbell, Kentucky, and the 9th Hospital Center from Fort Hood, Texas, first deployed to Lakehurst, New Jersey. From there, the medical personnel are now staffing 750 of the 1,000 beds in the Javits Center, Richardson said.

Currently, non-COVID-19 "lower-acuity" patients are being treated at the Javits Center to take the pressure off other New York hospitals, she said. However, officials are talking about raising the capability of the medical station to treat higher-acuity patients, she added.

"We are working non-stop day and night," she said.

The U.S. Navy hospital ship Comfort also arrived in New York City and the hospital ship Mercy is in Los Angeles.

"We're sending our teams into the hottest spots in America," O'Shaughnessy said. "We're taking a very aggressive posture" to practice protective measures so that the military remains healthy to support the nation, he said.

Army North is working with FEMA to determine what military capabilities might be needed around the entire country, Richardson said.

"Our military usually deploys around the world," she said, "and now we're serving right here in the homeland."

If more military hospital units are needed, O'Shaughnessy said Reserve forces may be called upon, or a composite unit may be built for the mission.

Northern Command is attempting to mobilize the reserve components "smartly," he said, and not call up medical personnel who are already working in hard-pressed hospitals.

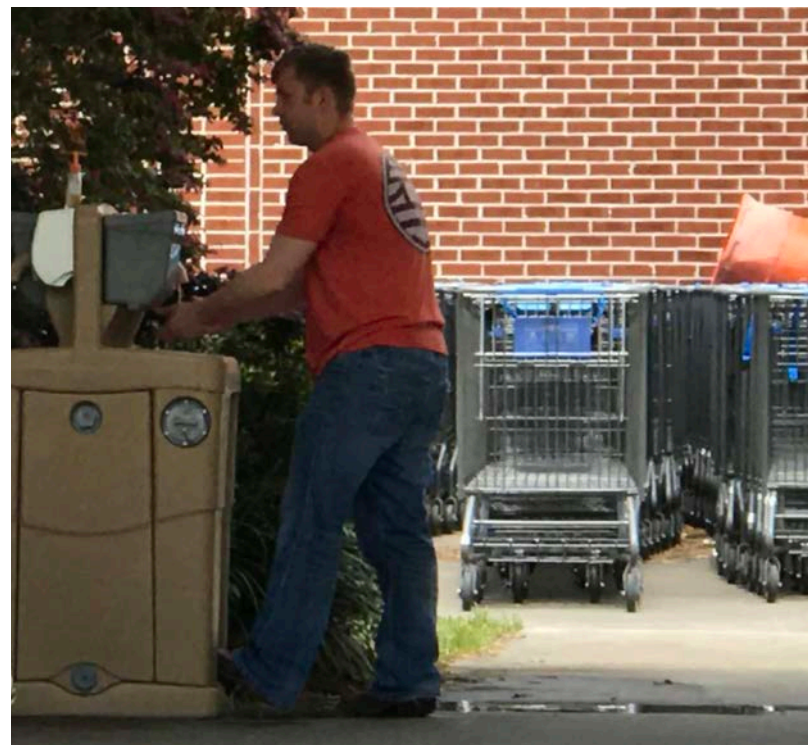
Richardson added that means not mobilizing National Guard and Reserve professionals "who might be needed right there in their own community."

Teleworking: Dogface Soldiers adapt to COVID-19 guidelines

Many aspects of how the Army conducts business at Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield have been altered in response to the COVID-19 global pandemic threat.

Efforts to maintain social distancing among Soldiers and Department of the Army civilians require reduced manning at workplaces across the installations. Many units and Leaders have directed personnel to telework by means of virtual private networks and Outlook Web Access, as well as traditional means of communication like telephone and text messaging.

Many training events have been postponed, but there are still requirements to maintain readiness as the Army's core responsibilities have not changed.

For many Soldiers, the "new normal" is different, but accountability and other readiness-related reporting requirements are still very familiar and remain responsibilities that must be completed. The various avenues of communication have proven to be effective thus far, according to many Soldiers at Fort Stewart.

"We've provided our critical personnel with VPN connection through our S6, and

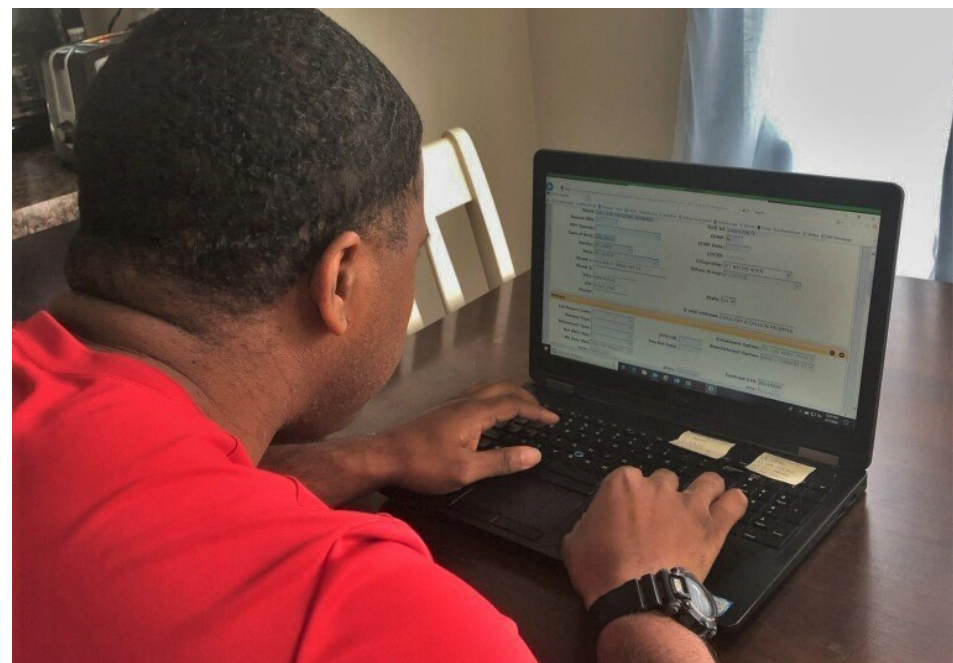
others are working through emails, and everybody still has their phones, so we can still call at any time," said 2nd Lt. Timothy Newton, operations officer with Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, 385th Military Police Battalion.

According to Capt. Chris Heyward, the commander of the 546th Military Police Company, connecting with Soldiers face-to-face while maintaining social distancing standards maintains visual accountability and allows leaders to check in on Soldiers to ensure they are safe and healthy.

"We do have leaders going out and checking on individuals, especially those that are in the barracks," Heyward said. "As of right now, I'm doing fine. My Soldiers are doing well, so no major issues here."

Staff Sgt. Vincent Dillard, the Division Artillery Brigade career counselor with 3rd Infantry Division, said he and his team can work from home because VPN allows for connections to the systems they need to access.

"Although we are teleworking, we are still able to work to our full capabilities due to our VPN," Dillard said. "We have access to everything at home that we have in the office. This allows us to stay home and still be productive."

Army delays recruit movement to basic training, offers incentive pay

FORT MEADE, Md. – To help slow the spread of coronavirus, the Army will halt the movement of new recruits to basic combat training for at least two weeks, service leaders said Monday. New recruits may also be eligible to receive up to \$6,000 of delayed shipping incentive pay added to any existing bonuses, depending on the length of delay.

About 220 recruits scheduled to ship from April 6-20 will be rescheduled. However, basic training that has already begun and advanced individual training will continue in a limited capacity to maintain readiness, said Gen. Paul Funk II, U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command commander.

"We are focusing on the health and safety of our force right now," said Maj. Gen. Frank Muth, U.S. Army Recruiting Command commander. "And this will help us ensure our training bases are fully prepared to receive our new recruits in the safest way possible."

Recruits who have experienced extreme hardship and had their basic training dates rescheduled due to living in a COVID-19 red zone may be approved for the new Future Soldier to Active Duty program. Through the program, new Soldiers can receive \$1,600, or the base pay of an E-1 private during the delay.

By April 20 the Army will have delayed the shipment of a total of about 4,000 active-duty and Army Reserve recruits since March 16, Muth estimates. Until Monday, the Army had shipped about 1,700 recruits to BCT while delaying the transportation of troops in COVID-19 red zones.

The decision to stop the transportation of trainees to BCT stems from last month's Defense Department order to minimize domestic travel and contain the COVID-19 outbreak. Muth said recruiters will continue to maintain regular virtual and phone contact with new Soldiers awaiting travel to the Army's training bases: Fort Jackson, South Carolina; Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri; Fort Benning, Georgia; and Fort Sill, Oklahoma.

"This pause is only for our current

future Soldiers who had already signed a contract with us," Muth said. "Our recruiters will still be out there in the digital space working with applicants who are interested in serving ... when the situation stabilizes."

Training changes

Smaller classes, social distancing and increased health screenings are among the significant changes at the training bases amid the COVID-19 outbreak.

About 100 Soldiers at the training installations have tested positive for coronavirus and 12 have fully recovered, Funk said. Each installation has taken measures to practice social distancing during physical training sessions and in dormitory housing, said public affairs officers at the installations.

"Ensuring the safety of all of our Soldiers, Family members and civilian personnel is always our number one priority," Funk said, adding that the service will reassess the environment at the end of the two-week delay to decide whether to resume new troop movement to BCT. "And we will continue to take an abundance of caution to protect our force as this situation develops."

Recruits take health screenings before initial processing, at their local military entrance processing stations and when they arrive at basic training installations. For their first two weeks, recruits take part in limited training while being closely monitored and taking daily health assessments, said Maj. Gen. Lonnie Hibbard, Center for Initial Military Training commander. The recruits will also take the classroom portion of the eight-week basic training curriculum during the controlled-monitoring phase.

"Force health protection is the Army's top priority," said Lt. Col. Peggy Kageleiry, CIMT public affairs director. "Protecting the force includes mitigating the spread of the coronavirus by executing strict health protocols at Army training centers. The Army will continue to train new recruits to maintain operational readiness."

At Fort Sill, Soldiers continue to participate in basic training while practicing proper distancing during physical training and in learning activities.

Instructors have changed the dimensions of formations to place recruits 6 feet apart and cadence-calling drills have been eliminated. Indoor classes have also moved outdoors. Col. Michael Konczey, 434th Field Artillery Brigade commander, said March 27 among the recruits and drill sergeants remains high.

Fort Sill will livestream its basic training and advanced leadership training course graduations, which remain closed to the public.

At Fort Leonard Wood, the training base's 60-bed, open-bay dorm rooms are now housing 30 recruits per room for proper social distancing, a base official said. Kageleiry said recruits and drill sergeants at Leonard Wood and the Army's other training bases continue to get screened daily to help prevent COVID-19's spread.

"I get asked a lot, 'Why are we still training?'" said Col. Adam Hilburgh, 3rd Chemical Brigade commander at Leonard Wood. "The Army's mission is to fight and win our nation's wars, and in order to do that we need to maintain

readiness. And one of the ways we do that for the Army is to provide trained, disciplined, quality Soldiers to the force, and we do that continuously."

Fort Benning – home of the Army's Infantry School, Armor School, Ranger School, and Airborne School – suspended all combatives training. At Fort Jackson, base officials confirmed a Soldier in training with 3rd Battalion, 13th Infantry Regiment, and an Army officer enrolled in the Adjutant General Basic Officer Leader Course were among those diagnosed with COVID-19. In-person graduations at the installation have also been canceled.

Gen. James C. McConville, the Army's chief of staff, said at a press conference on March 20 that protective measures have been implemented because infection prevention is paramount. Should recruits show COVID-19 symptoms, the installations have the required medical capabilities to quarantine and treat all impacted personnel, he said.

"Parents are sending us their sons and daughters," he said. "We have an obligation to take care of them."

Pediatrics supports new Well Baby Clinic

Winn Army Community Hospital opened a Well Baby Clinic at Richmond Hill Medical Home April 7 to help stop the spread of the coronavirus and protect staff, beneficiaries and their Families.

While pediatrics continues its mission to provide inpatient and outpatient services, and support to Winn ACH's Labor and Delivery, Emergency Room and Intermediate Care, they also support the Well Baby Clinic.

Maj. Matthew Fultz, chief of Pediatrics at Winn ACH, said they had to evolve their programs and services in response to the growing threat of the COVID-19 pandemic.

He said the first thing Pediatrics did was make some structural changes.

"We're using an additional waiting room space to separate well children from sick children," Fultz said. "We're aggressively screening and using the tools of virtual health and telehealth capabilities. So, it's not uncommon for Family to call in for appointments and get a phone call from a nurse asking if they'd like to solve their health issues over the phone rather than coming to the clinic."

Fultz said they also dedicated doctors to support the clean clinic, exclusively providing well baby check-ups for infants three- to five-days old; two weeks, two months and one year. He said they augmented the Richmond Hill Medical Home staff with several pediatricians and nursing staff to support those appointments.

Ben Ernst, Group practice manager at Richmond Hill Medical Home said their location was centrally located between Winn ACH and the Tuttle Army Medical Center. The building is located in a shopping plaza just east of the Highway 17 and Highway 144 intersection.

Ernst said the safety of the staff and patients is paramount at the clean clinic, providing well baby appointments while reducing the risk of exposure.

Sgt. Preston Barnhart, a Soldier with 1st Battalion, 64th Armored Regiment, 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team visited the newly opened Well Baby Clinic at RHMH.

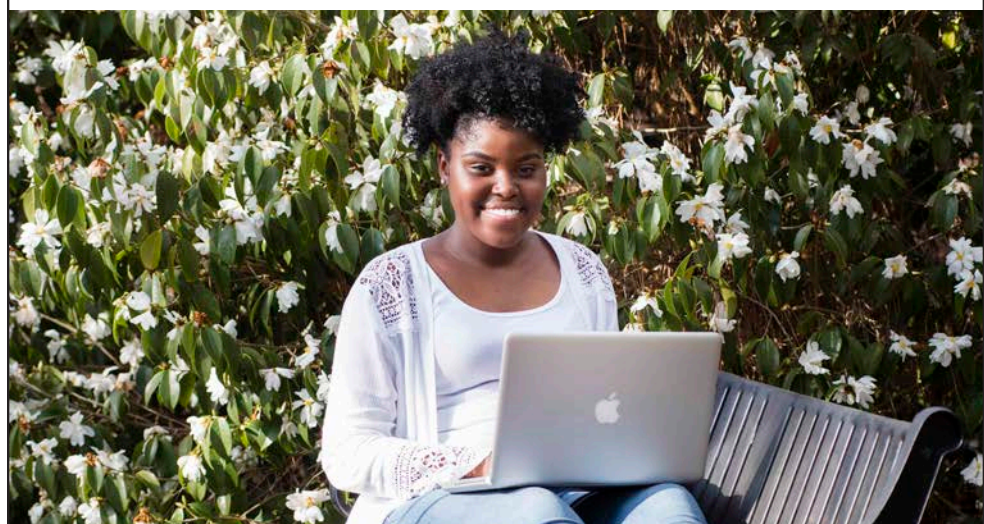

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Marne leader checks up on community

Fort Stewart Garrison's senior enlisted leader, Command Sgt. Maj. Rebecca Myers, visited several locations in the Marne community April 3 to ensure things were smooth operating smoothly as safety precautions for COVID-19 remain in place on Fort Stewart.

"This is the first time any of us have had to figure out what to do in a pandemic," Myers said.

"At the end of the day, it's all about readiness," she said. "The Army keeps rolling along. We just want to make sure that the health of our force is protected, so if we do receive the call to be the nation's first responders, we are ready to go at any given moment."

The first stop during her checks was the Fort Stewart Commissary. Myers verified that the commissary was stocked with essentials like diapers, baby formula and cleaning supplies. She then spoke with employees to see if the new COVID-19 guidelines helped operations run smoother.

Myers ensured that the noncommissioned officer positioned at the commissary entrance was synced with store managers, so if they needed to make a judgment call based on too many people in the store, the NCO could limit the number of people going into the store.

From there, Myers went to the drive-thru pharmacy to get the input of patients receiving medication. One pharmacy visitor thanked Myers and told her the drive-thru pharmacy was a good idea to reduce the risk of spreading the virus.

"While we are looking after our Soldiers, it's also about protecting the health and readiness of our community," said Myers. "Even though a young Soldier might not feel that they are sick or susceptible, there are also other people in the community that we have to look out for. If they are asymptomatic, they might be passing the

virus on and not even know it."

The next stop was Gate 3 on Fort Stewart. On duty was a Soldier and a civilian security guard to assist people if needed. As people entered the gate, the guards let them know the important updates that pertain to gate hours and how they will be functioning as rules change.

"I think it's great to see the sergeant major and be able to interact with her and talk about issues going on," said Pvt. Blake Mowder, a military police officer with the 546th Military Police Company, 385th Military Police Battalion, 16th Military Police Brigade. "It's good that higher leadership is coming around looking after every-

body."

Myers said she appreciates hearing feedback from people in the community and found several ways to improve the flow of establishments while fighting this pandemic.

"We are all in this together," said Myers. "Everybody plays a small part and there's always something you can do; whether you stay at home, go the commissary by yourself instead of taking your whole family, or donate blood. Everyone can do something but to make this effective, we all have to do something together in order to help stop the spread."

How to sew your own face mask

Unable to find masks online or at your local stores? The CDC says that you can make your own masks at home using common household items. These do-it-yourself face coverings are simple to make and can be worn whether or not you are exhibiting symptoms. The CDC recommends wearing a mask in areas where social distancing can be a little more challenging, including supermarkets and pharmacies.

What you will need



Cotton fabric



Lightweight fusible interfacing (optional: used to stiffen cotton fabric)

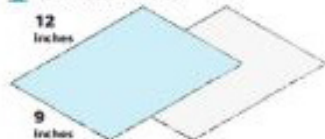


1/2" elastic



Basic sewing supplies: thread, needle, pins, scissors, ruler (sewing machine is optional)

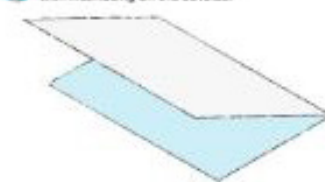
1 Cut cotton fabric and interfacing to 12 inches X 9 inches.



2 Iron interfacing to material (adhesive side to back of material).



3 Once ironed, fold fabric in half with interfacing on the outside.

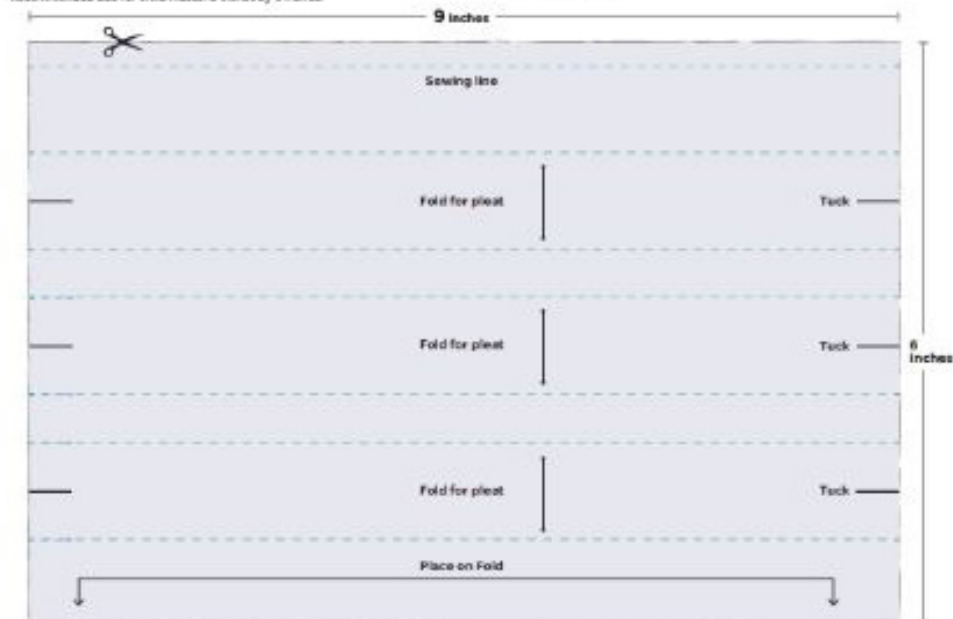


4 Cut two pieces of elastic (each 7 inches)



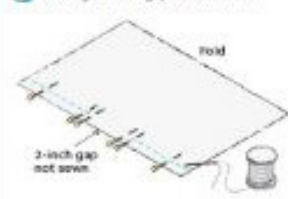
Pattern for adult mask

Recommended size for child masks: 8 inches by 5 inches.

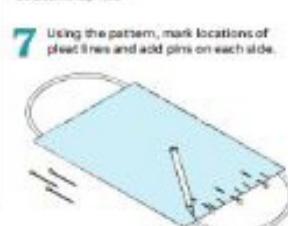
5 Pin and sew 1/4 inch from edge leaving a 2-inch gap in the center.



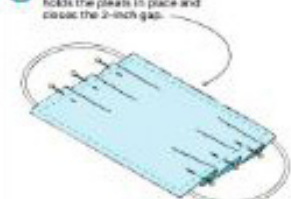
6 Put elastic band on each corner, inside the material and pin to keep in place. Make sure the elastic is not twisted. Pin in center as well.



7 Using the pattern, mark locations of pleat lines and add pins on each side.



8 Fold 3 pleats. Sew around the entire perimeter of the mask. This holds the pleats in place and closes the 2-inch gap.

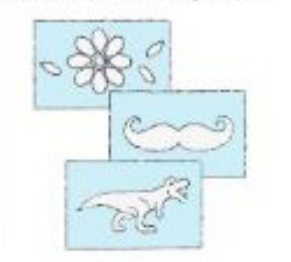


Your mask is complete.

Army issues guidance for use of cloth face coverings

WASHINGTON - To mitigate the spread of COVID-19, the U.S. Army is implementing Department of Defense guidance on the use of cloth face coverings. Soldiers, Family members, Army civilian employees and contractors should follow Centers for Disease Control guidelines on the use of cloth face coverings in public settings or where other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain.

Soldiers are authorized to wear the neck gaiter and other cloth items, such as bandannas and scarves, as face cov-

erings. Soldiers should not, however, fashion face coverings from Army Combat Uniforms or other materials that have been chemically-treated. Personal protective equipment, such as N95 respirators or surgical masks, must be reserved for use in medical settings.

Force health protection is the Army's top priority. Army senior leaders are urging everyone to adhere to the latest CDC guidelines to prevent the spread of the virus, including practicing rigorous protocols for personal hygiene, staying home when sick and implementing social distancing techniques.
