New gate hours in effect on Fort Stewart, Hunter

Staff Report

All gates on Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield returned to normal operations May 11, with a few exceptions.

All gates are still 100% ID check, with the trusted traveler policy still suspended and visitor access restrictions still in effect.



SMA offers enlisted update in virtual town hall

The Army's top enlisted leader held a virtual town hall May 6 to provide an update on training, military education and the delivery of new uniforms, as the service continues to shift within the COVID-19 environment.

Before the town hall, Sgt. Maj. of the Army Michael Grinston said he had the opportunity to view how the 3rd Infantry Division has been able to train with safety measures in place, such as the use of masks and physical distancing.

During his visit, he saw firsthand Soldiers with the 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team training inside a gunnery simulator and a motor pool as they prepare for an upcoming gunnery range.

"Our nation requires us to be ready at all times," Grinston said, regarding the need for training. "We have to be ready to protect the nation. But we also have to protect the force."

Last week, Army Secretary Ryan McCarthy said a proposed risk mitigation framework that outlines a safe return to large-scale exercises is currently being finalized. The plan will allow units to resume collective training, following the recent success of measures safeguarding new recruits at training centers.

"This is going to be the model for how we get units back to training at some point," Grinston said. "This will take some time, but I'm confident in everything I saw today that we are not going to put the force in [an unsafe situation]."

Leadership courses

Delays in professional military education courses have also affected many noncommissioned officers looking to move up in the ranks.

The Army Sergeants Major Academy's Class 71 resident course will now tentatively be held Sept. 8 at Fort Bliss, Texas, according to Grinston.

Once students arrive, he said they will likely be placed in quarantine for a brief time to ensure they are not infected with the virus.

The PME requirements for Soldiers eligible to be promoted to staff sergeants and sergeants first class have also been temporarily suspended starting May 1.

"Before you had to complete either your advanced leadership course or your senior leadership course," Grinston said. "We waived that and those folks are getting promoted without the professional military education requirement."

On June 1, Grinston said the Army will review the suspension to determine if it should be extended. Soldiers will still be required to complete the course at a later date and will be prioritized first in the training pipeline to ensure they meet this training requirement.

The Army, though, has still been able to virtually conduct the basic leaders and master leaders courses.

In July, the Army plans to restart in-residence training for recruiters and drill sergeants, after they complete a distance learning phase.

"Again, we're looking at these schools on a case-by-case basis," he said, adding it will depend on the current Defense Department's stop-move order, which has been extended to June 30.

Even if NCOs cannot attend courses, they can still be leaders to their Soldiers through virtual means when they are not allowed to meet in-person.

"Right now, leadership is mission essential," Grinston said.

He suggests leaders use social media or other video chat options to actually see the face of their Soldier versus a text message.

"Face-to-face still matters," he said. "We're just going to have to do that virtually."

New uniforms

While masks and gloves have now become an impromptu uniform item, the Army has seen a slight delay in rolling out its new Army Green Service Uniform.

A throwback to an iconic World War II uniform, senior leaders have previously said the Army Greens aim to instill pride in Soldiers and give them a professional appearance in the office or while out in public.

But with manufacturing delays and fabric material being diverted to producing masks in the COVID-19 fight, the uniform's delivery is about a month behind schedule.

Soldiers in basic combat training will now be tentatively issued the uniform in August, while at the same time it will be available to purchase at certain locations.

"We will get those out to the force as soon as we can," Grinston said.


Popular among Soldiers stationed in warm climates, the Improved Hot Weather Combat Uniform has also seen manufacturing delays.

While the uniform is currently being sold at certain locations, the uniforms quickly go off the shelves, he said.

"We're looking to expand that," he said. "But like most things that make material, it's coming a little bit slower than we anticipated right now."

Understanding the overall frustration spurred on by the pandemic, Grinston ended the town hall by thanking Soldiers for their patience during this uncertain time.

"It takes a strong Army Family [and] we're extremely proud of everybody," he said. "We're going to get through this and we're going to be better than when we started."

Murray teachers set out to show students ‘We still care’

Horns honked and Murray Elementary School teachers waved from their cars as they drove the streets of Southern Oaks May 7 and children and parents waved back at the parade drove past.

Murray Elementary School interim principal April Ennis said the parade through the Fort Stewart housing areas the school serves was a send-off to say farewell before summer vacation began. Also, because of the COVID-19 pandemic, the school has been conducting digital learning, with students and teachers only seeing each other virtually.

“We are excited to go out and do a parade for them,

celebrate them and say hello,” Ennis said.

Ennis added that the end of the school year is usually filled with celebrations, award ceremonies and helping students get ready for the next grade level.

“With us being in a digital learning environment, those things are kind of hard to do, so we just wanted to do a celebratory thing for the kids,” she said.

Having the parade sends the message to the students their teachers are still here and they still care, especially during the pandemic.

“We want our Murray Elementary School kids, our Navigator Nation, to know that we are here, that we are supporting you, and thinking about you, and that even during the summer we’re going to be thinking about you and making sure everyone is okay during

this whole thing,” Ennis said.

Ennis praised her staff for the quick movement to achieve digital learning, moving from traditional teaching to online teaching in three days. It took training teachers, students, and parents on what to expect and how to make it work.

“They’ve learned a lot,” she said. “We’ve all learned a lot. Our parents have a new appreciation for what it is teachers do on a daily basis so that’s been a positive experience. But not seeing the kids face-to-face and not being able to give hugs and let them know we’re here has probably been the hardest part.”

The Directorate of Emergency Services Military Police and Fire Department participated in the parade.

Our BOSS program gives opportunities for single Soldiers to form friendships with others outside of their unit, whether it's meeting for the first time at a volunteer event, studying for the promotion board at the BOSS Study Nights or giving each other the confidence to jump out of a plane while skydiving.

Our BOSS program gives Soldiers the chance for their voices to be heard when it comes to planning BOSS events, quality-of-life concerns or if they just need a battle buddy to guide them in the right direction with an issue. At the beginning of April, we began to hold our BOSS teleconference every Monday. During this time, BOSS representatives have planned our virtual competitions and weekly workouts to stay connected.

The JRTC and Fort Polk BOSS program runs through June 30. Our BOSS Strong competition consists of teams from each unit doing a daily workout to earn points and a chance to win a trophy for their accomplishment. BOSS Strong will give each Soldier a chance to bond with others by staying motivated and healthy.

DPW says 'Get out, get fishing'

Tired of being stuck indoors trying to avoid other people? Bored trying to entertain yourself while everything is closed? Run out of ideas to entertain the kids at home? Try fishing on Fort Stewart! Fishing can be a great solo activity; or you can invite your friends and fish together, at a safe distance!

Fishing is an all-ages activity, so bring the kids! And, with 20 managed fishing ponds, two rivers, and numerous creeks and unmanaged ponds, Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield has plenty of fishing opportunities!

To get started, go to fstewart.isportsman.net. Each person must have their own iSportsman account and permit.

Prices vary depending on status, rank and age.

Children under 18 years of age, and people over 65 or disabled are all free. Any time you leave the highway on Ft. Stewart, you must be checked in to the area or pond you are fishing or recreating in. Don't forget to check out when you are done.

Don't know where to go? First a few things to consider: How far do you want to be away from the Garrison area or the highway? There are several ponds within the Garrison, and others not far from the highway. Ponds 10, 36, and 37 are located within the gates on Fort Stewart. Ponds 24, 29, and 35 are all located within the Hunter Army Airfield Garrison.

If you want to get a little further away from everything, Ponds 2, 17, and 26 are a good little drive away - 4-wheel drive may be required at times.

Check out the maps under the area tab on iSportsman website to see where these ponds are located.

What do you want to fish for? All of the managed ponds are stocked with largemouth bass, bluegill sunfish, redear sunfish and channel catfish. Most of the ponds have black crappie, as well. Some ponds have additional fish species, such as fliers, spotted sunfish, warmouth, other catfish species, and

even an occasional hybrid striped bass.

The Canoochee River is well-known for its redbreast sun-fish! There are numerous river landings to launch a boat or just access the river to bank fish.

Are you fishing from a boat or the bank? Boats are allowed in all of the ponds, but the following ponds have established ramps to easily launch your boat: Ponds 1, 2, 3, 17, 21, 26, and 28.

Remember that internal combustion outboard motors - outboard engines - are only allowed to be used in the rivers, not in the ponds. In ponds, boats must be powered by trolling motor, paddles, etc. Nearly all of the ponds have great bank access, so a boat may not even be needed.

The iSportsman system has provided some great angler use and harvest information.

In 2019, some of the more popular fishing ponds were Ponds 1, 3, 10, 19, 21, 26, 28, and 30. Fishermen harvested the most fish from ponds 1, 3, 19, 30, and 33. Overall, Pond 3, also known as Holbrook Pond, proved to be the most productive pond on post. People reported harvesting more bluegill sunfish, channel catfish, black crappie and redbreast sunfish from here than any other pond on Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield. People checked in to fish at Holbrook more than 2,200 times and reportedly kept more than 1,300 fish.

Pond 1, or Pineview Lake, had the highest number of largemouth bass both caught and harvested than anywhere else on the installations and the most harvested redear sunfish than other ponds. Bluegill sunfish were harvested in the largest numbers from ponds 1, 3, 10, 19, 30, 32, and 33.

Ponds 3, 24, and 30 produced the most channel catfish, but this was no surprise since these ponds are stocked annually for kids fishing events. Black crappie fishermen had good luck in ponds 1, 2, 3, 19, 28, 30 and 33. Reported harvest of redear sun-fish was greatest in ponds 1, 26, and 32.

Upon checkout, anglers are asked if they harvested anything. If they select

bass, it gives the opportunity to report how many you caught, how many you kept, then lengths and weights for up to five bass. Many largemouth bass anglers are catch-and-release only fishermen, therefore many just answer they did not harvest anything, even if they caught a lot of fish. The ponds with the highest numbers of bass caught were ponds 1, 2, 20, 21, 23, 26, 30 and 32. Nearly 150 bass were harvested from Pond 1, while less than two dozen bass were kept from any of the other ponds. The largest reported bass was 27 inches long, 14.17 lbs and came from Pond 10, followed by a 28 inch, 10.5 lb bass from Pond 28. Only four out of the 20 ponds did not have reports of bass over 20 inches in length; but two of those four did have bass reported over 5 lbs.

If a managed pond isn't what you are looking for, there are numerous other fishing holes spread across Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield. Between rivers, creeks, streams, and other various water bodies, there are plenty of fishing holes to choose from. Some of the more popular training areas that anglers check-in to fish are B1, B23, B24, C17, C18, E1, F15 and F17.

Excluding the managed ponds, anglers reported harvesting more than 20,000 fish from Marne installations in 2019. More than 12,500 bluegill sunfish and nearly 5,000 redbreast sunfish were reportedly harvested. On average, anglers harvested 2.3 fish each time they checked in.

Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield Directorate of Public Works Fish and Wildlife Branch conducted the annual fall pond population survey from October through December 2019.

Three ponds stood out for all surveyed species: ponds 1, 19 and 26. Pond 1 stood out with a lot of healthy bass, a lot of large bluegill and crappie, and the largest redear at 10.75 inches, 0.98 lbs. The biggest bass and crappie both came from pond 19. The bass was 22 inches, 6.4 lbs and the crappie was 14.7 inches, 1.6 lbs. Pond 19 also produced the most bluegill and some large

redear. Pond 26 had the largest bluegill during the entire survey, 10.7 inches, 1.07 lbs. There were multiple bluegill more than 10 inches seen here.

The most redear and crappie were seen in Pond 26, as well. As for bass, it really stood out from the others with the most bass over 18 inches.

A few other ponds were notable.

Pond 3 had large bass and a couple of large bluegill. Pond 17 had some large bass and bluegill. The largest warmouth during the survey was also seen here, 8.5 inches, 0.43 lbs. Large bass, bluegill, crappie and redear were all seen in Pond 28.

Ponds 36 and 37 are both extremely deep, with the bottom sloping greatly right off the bank. This makes sampling for fish difficult. Even with the difficulty in getting a good sample, large bass larger than 18 inches and weighing more than 3.5 lbs as well as bluegill larger than 8 inches were seen in both ponds. Only four redear were seen in Pond 36, but all were longer than 10 inches and 0.6 lbs. Remember, these surveys just give a glimpse of what is actually in the pond.

Just like regular fishing, not all the fish "bite" and many fish are missed.

Pond 35 at Hunter was closed in August 2019 due to a pond turnover that killed most of the fish. This year's fall population survey showed that it is making a great recovery. No large fish were seen during the survey, but the fish seen were extremely healthy and growing. There was also good evidence of reproduction. Continued evaluation of the fish population will determine when it will open again.

Now that you have a few ideas, get out there and fish! Remember, on post, you must have an iSportsman permit and be checked-in to the area or pond you wish to fish, hunt or recreate in prior to leaving the highway.

SFABS LOOK TO GROW FORCE, EXPAND MISSIONS

FORT MEADE, Md. — Security force assistance brigade Soldiers from the first-ever team to operate in Africa spoke of their recent mission May 6 in training Senegalese soldiers on logistics support.

The discussion was part of a recruiting push to add more qualified Soldiers to the Army's six SFABs, which are still hiring using virtual assessments and bonuses worth nearly \$60,000 for in-demand career fields.

SFABs have previously deployed to Iraq and Afghanistan, the latter of which is where the 4th SFAB will deploy this fall to replace the 3rd SFAB.

Upcoming missions will also include counter-narcotics advising in the U.S. Southern Command region, as well as others in the Indo-Pacific region and back to Africa, said Lt. Col. Kevin Field, the SFAB recruiting team lead, during a livestream on Facebook.

The SFAB mission is a re-focused train, assist and advise strategy that envisioned the specialized units in hotspots around the world.

Since they serve as permanent organizations, the units provide a more concerted effort than previous ad hoc advise and train formations, while also freeing up conventional brigade combat teams and Special Forces units.

"With the Army standing up the SFABs, it allows us to professionalize the delivery of the security assistance mission, because we have a dedicated force," Field said. "That's all they do. It also helps us preserve the readiness of our BCTs to respond to worldwide contingencies."

African mission

In the first mission outside U.S. Central Command, the 1st SFAB's Logistics Advisor Team 1610 traveled to Senegal in March to instruct its military personnel in preventative maintenance, vehicle recovery and motor pool operations.

While the training went well, team members said, the location still presented them with an unusual work

environment.

Due to the reduced U.S. military presence in Africa, the team had limited tactical communications and quality medical facilities available to them, while they also had to work out of a hotel for three weeks.

"A deployment on the continent of Africa is much different than what most of us have experienced through deployments to Afghanistan and Iraq and brings about different challenges, especially for a small team," said Maj. Michael Pachucki, the team leader.

One of the highlights for Staff Sgt. Braxton Pernice, the team's maintenance advisor, was the vehicle recovery portion of the training.

It allowed the Senegalese soldiers "to put hands on their equipment and get familiar with how to utilize their recovery trucks," he said. "Overall, it was a great training event and we learned a lot from them as well as they learned a lot from us."

Pachucki, who also deployed with the 1st SFAB to Afghanistan in 2018, said his assignment with the brigade has been one of his most rewarding in his 15-year career.

"What I will promise you if you come to an SFAB," he said, "is the opportunity to grow personally and professionally, work with great people, and receive individual and professional training opportunities not often seen in other units."

Promotions, bonuses

Not only do SFABs have a unique mission, they also had higher promotion rates than other Army units last year, Field said.

Enlisted promotion rates from sergeant first class through sergeant major at SFABs ranged from 33% to 65%, compared to about 17% to 41% across the Army. On the officer side, promotion rates from major through colonel at SFABs ranged from 79% to 89%, compared to 21% to 67%.

"I will tell you that most of those individuals, they're going to be promoted with or without SFAB in their files, because we are hiring highly-qualified individuals," Field said. "That's also another way the SFAB helps you get promoted, because you are being exposed to some of the top

NCOs and officers in our Army from various [military occupational specialties]."

Some of the slots that SFABs are currently looking to fill include: military intelligence - 35 series; unit supply specialist - 92Y, fire support specialist - 13F, signal - 25 series; and combat engineer - 12B.

As much as \$58,300 is also being offered in selective retention bonuses for specialists through staff sergeants in the 35 series, as well as for information technology specialist - 25B; military police - 31B; and chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear specialist - 74D.

Even if an enlisted Soldier does not qualify for a bonus that Soldier can still receive a \$5,000 assignment incentive pay.

Positions in the SFAB also count as a broadening assignment, providing tactical options for NCOs other than being a recruiter or drill sergeant.

"This gives you the same credit as doing one of those jobs, except that you get to stay and work within your



MOS and be exposed to some of that same equipment," Field said. "So, by time your time in the SFAB is complete and you're rotating back to your BCT, you don't need to be re-greened. You've been working in your MOS with Soldiers out there."

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



Veterans virtually recall end of WWII in Europe

WASHINGTON — After being freed from a World War II prison camp by British forces, Harold Radish immediately sought the simple pleasures of freedom: a beer and a nice sleep.

A reconnaissance sergeant with the 90th Infantry Division, Radish was captured by German soldiers in February 1945. Following months as a prisoner in Nazi Germany, the Jewish-American was rescued in late April, a week before the official victory in Europe.

“The war in Europe was over,” he said in a video. “The desolation and the buildings that were bombed, the killings and the rough times that I and my buddies had - it was over.”

Amid the current war on COVID-19, several veterans, public figures and family members of those killed in WWII shared a series of videos released May 8, as part of an online commemoration to honor the 75th anniversary of V-E Day.

In his video, Radish said that he and other prisoners were flown to Brussels. There, they were cleaned up, fed, clothed in British uniforms and given a couple of hours off in the city.

“We went into a bar, we drank some beer and then we went to sleep,” he said. “And that was true liberation.”

In a letter he mailed to his family after his release, Radish said he could not wait to return to them.

“I don’t think anyone can get me home fast enough, though they are using airplane and ship,” he said, reciting the letter. “Freedom is worth any price. It took a long time, but I [finally] found out.”

V-E Day

Just days after the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor in Hawaii on Dec. 7, 1941, Americans were thrust into an ongoing fight across Europe as both Germany and Italy declared war on the United States.

Months of hard battles ensued, as Allied forces began to defeat enemy strongholds in Africa and Europe. In May 1943, Axis troops were defeated in northern Africa and by the fall of 1943, fascist Italy surrendered.

In June 1944, the D-Day invasion of Normandy broke through Germany’s Atlantic defenses and established a foothold for Allied forces that led to Paris being liberated later that summer.

Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg also became liberated by Allied forces.

In early 1945, Allies reached Germany’s western border, then crossed the Rhine River in March, said Jane Droppa, vice chair of the Friends of the National WWII Memorial.

“The determined push into the heart of German fatherland was slow yet steady as the Allies encountered German forces not yet willing to give up the fight,” she said. “As they pushed into Germany, Allied forces encountered scenes of unspeak-

able horror and human suffering in Nazi concentration camps, all of which gave new meaning to the war.”

As American and Soviet soldiers moved into Germany from the west and east, both forces met in late April along the Elbe River, cutting the remaining German forces in two.

Less than a week later, Nazi Germany leader Adolf Hitler committed suicide a few days before the fall of Berlin. German leaders then signed an unconditional surrender of their entire forces, ending the war in Europe on May 8, 1945.

An estimated 15 to 20 million people died during the war in Europe. In total, WWII claimed some 60 million people worldwide, including 400,000 Americans.

Beginning of the end of evil

For retired Col. Frank Cohn, that day was just like any other at that time.

As an intelligence agent who could speak German, he was assigned to a unit called T-Force that was in Magdeburg near Berlin. The unit’s mission was to go into large German cities after they were captured to inspect building and personality targets.

“Building targets were anything that was going to be of use to the force and in support of the criminal investigations and prosecution of war criminals,” he said. “And the personality targets were people who were going to be tried.”

When news came of the surrender, he said it didn’t really mean much to him

and others in his unit. To them, the war had already been over for a few weeks.

“So we never really even celebrated it,” he said of V-E Day. “We just took it as another day and we were in the occupation as far as we were concerned. It means so much more now than it did then.

“When I was drafted, I had absolutely no fear that we were going to lose the war,” he added. “We were going to win. But certainly, in retrospect, it wasn’t that obvious and I think we can celebrate it.”

The son of 2nd Lt. Robert Meek also spoke of his father’s sacrifice months earlier in the war.

Meek, a B-25 Mitchell bomber copilot, was killed during a raid on the Magenta Bridge near Milan, Italy, in October 1944.

“The plane was hit by flak, killing my father instantly,” said retired Col. Robert Meek Jr. “The pilot was able to return the plane and land it, even though he and two other members of the crew were wounded.”

To him, V-E Day meant the beginning of the end of evil in the world, in regard to German fascism and Japanese imperialism. By remembering this day, he hopes it can serve as a stark reminder to not let certain history repeat itself.

“If we are to allow evil to persist and exist, then we will go through the catastrophic conditions that we had in World War II,” he said. “So, please remember that men and women were willing to sacrifice to save freedom and democracy.”

Considerations on distance learning

He quipped, "For students, they get to go to school but don't get to be with their friends. For teachers, they get to teach, but only to a screen. And for parents, we get to fail at tech support and class monitor."

I think Gaffigan appropriately captures the emotions of loss and helplessness being felt by all those involved in educating our children during the COVID-19 pandemic.

According to the Georgia Department of Education (georgiainsights.com/georgia-school-closures), in the state of Georgia there are 214 school districts closed, 2,235 schools not-in-session, and 1,732,475 students away from the classroom.

Needless to say, many Families are now distance learning, and there is going to be tension in just about every household containing school-aged children.

Further, many parents are now teleworking, adding an extra level of difficulty. So many Families are feeling the tensions of distance learning, teleworking, and generally being on top of each other with no real outlet for getting away and having some breathing room. Thus, Families are operating in survival mode.

It is important to remember that survival mode means we are not necessarily equipped or talented for the current circumstances, so we do our best and hope for the best.

In "The All-or-Nothing Marriage," Dr. Eli Finkel explores the modern state of marriage and points out that many marriages are either going very well or very poorly, with little middle ground.

He states that a defining trait for a marriage that is going well is the ability to shift and adjust their expectations to allow for a time frame of struggle and survival mode.

In the modern era, we use our intimate relationships and Family units to get to an end goal of individually "living our best life."

But as challenges to that end goal arise, it is vital that we recognize our strengths and limitations within those challenges and make adjustments accordingly.

As we function in survival mode while distance learning and teleworking, take the time to realize that the expectations you might have held for

yourself and your Family in the near future may have changed.

I encourage people to consider the following tactics:

First, think through your current expectations for the household and consider if those expectations are realistic for the current state of survival.

Rather than focus on "living my best life," focus on ensuring the individual and household needs of physical safety, emotional safety and presence of belonging within the home.

Ask yourself: Are Family members able to talk freely about their experience without feeling guilt for struggling? Are children able to play? Do children have the emotional space and safety to meltdown because they cannot be with their friends?

For that matter, do parents have the emotional space and safety to meltdown because they cannot be with their friends? Are parents connecting to recharge their relationship in a way that is helpful to both partners? These are just a few of the questions to consider.

Second, are you effectively communicating those realistic needs and hearing those needs from your children.

As you adjust your expectations for this time frame, make sure those revised expectations are being communicated effectively to those around you.

As adults, we have - typically - a greater ability to communicate our internal world and expectations. Children, however, might struggle in this regard and try to communicate their needs through their tantrums and meltdowns.

The Centers for Disease Control, cdc.gov, notes that children and teens might be more likely to communicate their needs through excessive crying, returning to behaviors they have outgrown, excessive worry, poor eating habits, irritability, poor school performance, poor focus, and physical complaints.

When these behaviors happen, continue to look for ways to create a sense that their frustration is acceptable and look to the context of the outburst to identify the need your child might be trying to convey.

Distance learning, telework, and a full house are going to make for mounting tensions, but how those tensions are handled makes all the difference. Hopefully, the tools I discussed here can help.

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Chaplain Corps embraces virtual world to provide services, support

WASHINGTON — With chapels closed and a ban on large gatherings, the U.S. Army Chaplain Corps has responded in creative and proactive ways to still engage with followers, its chief said.

Facing physical distance challenges, chaplains and religious affairs Soldiers have turned to social media platforms and online video conferencing sites, allowing many of them to reach more people than before the coronavirus hit.

“Our people are watching you as you bring ministry and care to them in large numbers,” Maj. Gen. Thomas Solhjem, the chief of chaplains, said during a virtual Chaplain Corps town hall from the Pentagon.

On top of livestreamed worship services, chaplains have organized virtual potlucks and games among community members, with at least one chapel creating a “Bible Madness” bracket after college basketball canceled its March Madness tournament.

Further, Soldiers in the Chaplain Corps have conducted virtual religious education opportunities, drive-in services, as well as drive-thru confessions and communions.

“We are in a unique time,” said Sgt. Maj. Ralph Martinez, the corps’ senior enlisted leader. “And as we deal with the challenges of this COVID-19 pandemic, I have witnessed unit ministry teams all across the world leveraging creative and innovative approaches.”

Through virtual settings, the diversity of faith found across the Army was also recently on show.

Last month, Army chaplains virtually celebrated the Buddha’s birthday, the Jewish Passover, and multiple events

during Christian Holy Week, all in the same week. And currently, they are supporting the Muslim holiday of Ramadan, Solhjem said.

“Where else but in the Chaplain Corps can we celebrate such unique diversity as seen in that same virtual lens, in a way that probably we would not have seen in isolation of one another,” he said.

Suicide prevention

The Army’s chief of staff has recently established a new senior leader working group for suicide prevention, in which the Chaplain Corps will play a vital role, Solhjem said.

In support of those efforts, the corps received several submissions for the new name of its own suicide prevention campaign plan. Those submissions will be cut down to about 10 and then voted on by senior leaders very soon, he said.


As they did before, chaplains and religious support Soldiers will be heavily involved in helping curb suicide, which the general said mainly stems from breakdowns in relationships.

“The Chaplain Corps leads the way in providing the means to build healthy and strong relationships and we’ll continue to do that and support our Army,” he said.

He also reminded his online audience of the National Day of Prayer last Thursday. With its roots dating back to 1775, the day is an observance for people to turn to God in prayer and meditation.

While public events are typically held on this day, Solhjem said it can still be celebrated alone.

“Wherever we are, we can pray,” he said. “That is something that doesn’t require an audience. It is something that is very intimate and special between us and our God.”





"We've implemented full sanitization before the

stores open up and after closing," said Holli Morales, Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield Exchange general manager. "We wipe down our counters and touch pads in between each customer, we've placed sneeze guards in every facility with customer access, all our associates and customers wear masks and wash hands before entering the facility. On top of that, we wipe down carts and any touch point that we can sanitize to ensure we're taking care of people."


With businesses in Georgia and Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield looking toward the future, these relationships could prove to be integral to the safety of our local communities.

"I think it's important that we share notes to keep everyone safe," Robbins said.

Johnson commented on his experience at Hunter Army Airfield in a press conference May 12, where he said he wants Savannah residents to feel safe.

"From my experience at Hunter, I felt safe," he said. "They were doing what they could do. That is how you transition to a new normal."
