Virtual newcomers orientation saves time, resources

Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield launch a virtual newcomers orientation Friday. The site is an interactive platform that is designed for Soldiers, their Families and Dept. of the Army Civilians to learn about essential services and facilities like reception, housing, finance, child care and recreation as soon as they receive orders here. The site launches Friday at stewartandhunter.com and is accessible on all devices.

This concept replaces the four-hour, in-person, newcomers fairs once held before the COVID-19 pandemic. "We're very excited to offer this to our incoming Soldiers, their Families and Department of the Army civilians," said David Southerland, co-program manager. "It will save people time and resources," he said.

This is the first of its kind in the Army, according to Southerland. "We think this platform will reach all segments of our diverse community," he said. "Our goal is that if a Soldier in Korea gets orders to Fort Stewart or Hunter Army Airfield he or she will go to the site before they come here and learn all about our services and facilities. We want people to know we are a team of highly motivated and experienced professionals that want to make their relocation experience to Coastal Georgia as enjoyable as possible," he added.

The virtual newcomers orientation is a mixture of

online content and videos from subject matter experts and people who have already experienced relocation here. If more information is needed easy navigable pages provide phone numbers and points of contact. Highlighted on the site are subject matter expert videos that are required viewing for all newcomers to receive a downloadable certificate of completion.

It takes about thirty minutes to complete the orientation training and can be accessed from any device, anywhere. Soldiers and Families are encouraged to search the site and to revisit it during their assignment here.

Spartan Brigade uncases colors, completes mission

Spartan Soldiers from 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, celebrated the official conclusion of their deployment by uncasing the brigade's colors in a small ceremony at Marne Garden on Fort Stewart, Georgia, Dec. 18, 2020.

Col. Terry R. Tillis, 2ABCT commander, hosted the ceremony. Tillis took command of the brigade on July 20, this past summer. He spoke with passion and pride of the accomplishments the brigade made during their deployment.

"We are excited to be back in Georgia and excited to be home for the holidays," said Tillis. "Spartans, well done. You have exceeded all expectations and outperformed at every level. We are truly proud of you and excited to be back home, where we can share in the excitement with our loved ones."

The ceremony symbolized the unit's return home from a nine-month deployment of 3,483 Soldiers to Europe in support of United States Army Europe's exercise Allied Spirit, a small-scale version of exercise DEFENDER Europe 20 and their follow-on mission, Atlantic Resolve.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, DEFENDER Europe 20 modified its original plan of a large-scale exercise to ensure the health and safety of the Soldiers. The U.S. and Polish-partnered exercise, Allied Spirit, featured the brigade crossing a river to defeat a near peer threat alongside Polish Allies

in the Drawsko-Pormorskie Training Area, Poland.

After spending five months in Poland, the brigade transitioned to the armored rotation of the USAREUR Atlantic Resolve mission. The Spartans embraced the new strategic mission and continued training in Germany, Romania, Hungary and Poland.

"The brigade displayed its tenacity and resiliency as we rapidly transitioned from one collective event to another," said Tillis. "The brigade began its journey executing DEFENDER 20 in Poland, only to quickly remission and transition to the Armored Brigade Combat Team Regionally Aligned Force for Europe."

U.S. Army Europe continues to lead the Department of Defense's Atlantic Resolve mission of increasing land efforts by bringing units based in the U.S to Europe for months at a time.

Gen. Christopher G. Cavoli, commanding general of U.S. Army Europe and Africa, indicated in 2018 that historical precedence proved that units like 2ABCT, under the 1st Cavalry Division (Forward), were in the right place in Eastern Europe.

"The Cold War ended with the victory of the people of Europe," said Cavoli. "The people of Europe were liberated from decades of misrule, and received the opportunity to start life anew, as part of a Europe whole, free, and at peace. And that continues to be our mission today. And the Atlantic Resolve mission, just like its history would suggest, is here to fulfil that mission again."

Atlantic Resolve's culminating event, Combined

Resolve XIV, was a joint multinational collective training exercise hosted at 7th Army Training Command's Grafenwoehr and Hohenfels training areas. The event was designed to showcase NATO's military might across the European front while evaluating and assessing the readiness of the brigade to fight and win.

The goal of these exercises is to evaluate and increase the military readiness and lethality of all U.S. allies and partners. Combining forces on such a massive scale showcased their interoperability and helped to continue promoting regional stability, further enhancing relationships between the U.S. allies and their partnered militaries.

"Throughout all the back-to-back collective events, and amidst a global pandemic, the Spartan Brigade exercised their ability to tackle complex problem sets and to be resourceful and diligent in getting the mission done," said Maj. Gen. Antonio Aguto, the commanding general of 3rd Infantry Division.

"Over the past 10 months, you have done extraordinary things. Be proud of your accomplishments and your Dogface Soldier legacy. We are so glad to have you back, and I look forward to what your brigade will accomplish in the modernization efforts ahead."

Now that the Spartans are stateside, they'll spend the next several weeks focused on their transition to garrison operations as equipment continues to arrive from the ports of Europe.

Raider Soldiers earn their Silver Spurs

Soldiers and Korean Augmentations to the United States Army across the 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, and Republic of Korea. Soldiers had their mental fortitude and physical toughness tested to earn their silver spurs during the 2020 Warpaint Spur Ride hosted by 5th Squadron, 7th Cavalry Regiment, 1st ABCT, 3rd ID, Dec. 22-23, at Camp Casey and Camp Hovey, Republic of Korea.

The Spur Ride is an event held over multiple days. Soldiers must pass a series of physical and mental tests that evaluate their leadership skills, technical and tactical proficiency and teamwork under high levels of stress and fatigue, during the day and night.

“I believe that the Spur Ride is important because it validates you as not only a Scout but as a Soldier,” said Sgt. Dan Satterwhite, a spur holder from 5th Sqn., 7th Cav. Regt.

The spur candidates completed 14 stations, including a live fire range, medical evacuation, and ruck marching more than 30 miles across Camp Casey/Hovey.

“I joined the Spur Ride after I saw other female soldiers earn their spurs, and I’m always a go-getter,” said Pfc. Aniyah Daniel, an unit supply specialist from 5th Sqn., 7th Cav. Regt. and the youngest spur holder for this Spur Ride at the age of 19. “During the Spur Ride, my body was put through a lot of obstacles that I have never been through. I was exhausted, but I kept telling myself ‘don’t quit,’ which is what got me through the whole event.”

By supporting and motivating each other, they learned about themselves and the importance of the team.

“The support of my team was what got me through all the courses during the Spur Ride,” said Sgt. 1st Class Kenneth Shelton, a cavalry scout from 5th Sqn., 7th Cav. Regt. and the oldest spur holder for this Spur Ride at the age of 42.

The event concluded with a ceremony with each of 258 Soldiers who earned their spurs, receiving them from their current spur holders. They were also congratulated by Gen. Robert Abrams, the Commanding General for United States Forces Korea, Combined Forces Command and United Nations Command, who was visiting the installation that day. After the ceremony, the Soldiers stepped off with silver spurs attached to their boots.

“You all are going to have strengths and weaknesses but completing the Spur Ride makes you stronger and realize how much of a team player you need to be in the Army,” said Satterwhite.

Routine COVID-19 testing

Routine COVID-19 testing for ADSMs provided by civilian off post providers are NOT covered by TRICARE without an Approved Authorization therefore making you liable for the bill. ADSMs using Urgent Care Clinics are NOT covered by TRICARE without an Approved Authorization on file with TRICARE. All COVID-19 testing and Urgent Care should be provided by the Military Healthcare System management and tracking. For Emergencies (Loss of Life, Limb, or Vision) stop at the nearest Emergency Room and provide your TRICARE insurance information. ADSMs on leave or when in the absence of an MTF they attain an Approved Urgent Care Referral from their duty station Primary Care Manager at their Healthcare Clinic or contact the Nurse Advise Line at 800-874-2273 Option 1 24/7 hours. Note: The rules for Non-Active Duty beneficiaries are different for ADSMs covered by TRI-Prime.

Soldiers enhance, modernize care to patients

The Dust Off Soldiers of Company C, 2nd Battalion, 3rd General Support Aviation Battalion, fielded and distributed new and additional medical equipment, Dec. 1-11, on Hunter Army Airfield.

The Dust Off Company is the medical evacuation element of the 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division, and currently the acting MEDEVAC capability for Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield. The company is comprised of five platoons and each own three kits. The fielding put 160 pieces of additional equipment in each kit, modernizing and enhancing their ability to provide care to patients.

“This equipment means that if we pick up someone’s son, daughter, husband, or wife we

have the best tools, the most up-to-date tools, and the right amount of tools to give them the best treatment possible,” said Capt. Peter Wood, a medical pilot assigned to 2nd Bn., 3rd GSAB. “Our medics need this equipment to ... care for those lives.”

One of the new pieces that will benefit the Soldiers is the special medical emergency evacuation device, said Staff Sgt. Daniel Sandoval, a critical care flight medic assigned to 2nd Bn., 3rd GSAB.

The SMEED connects to the NATO litter and creates a modular platform. This allows the medics to have all of the monitoring devices, fluids, and oxygen, if needed, in one place and remain connected to a patient while being transported. Devices like the SMEED also save space within the aircraft, Sandoval continued.

Some of the new equipment received are updat-

ed versions of their current stock. One piece in particular is the traction splint. The older traction splint is a large aluminum apparatus designed to immobilize a patient’s leg. They received the new, tactical version that is modular and can be used for splinting legs and arms, or can be used in a sling as a stabilizing brace, Sandoval said.

The new supplies give the medical Soldiers of the Dust Off Company tools that can be used for multiple applications, but also means the Soldiers will have to be trained on how to use them in all applications.

“We are glad to have newer, more modern equipment that will help us provide better medical care in the aircraft,” said Sgt. 1st Class Daniel Sherwin, a flight medic assigned to 2nd Bn., 3rd GSAB. “We are always excited to get our hands on new equipment and train on it ... and provide the best care possible.”

Resolve to be hurricane ready in the New Year

A new year means a new threat for a hurricane and Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield has already begun preparing for the 2021 Hurricane Season.

Here on the installation, planning and preparation includes ensuring installation personnel assigned emergency management and response functions meet their training requirements, reviewing and updating the Installation Hurricane Plan; conducting a Garrison and 3rd Infantry Division Hurricane Table Top Exercise; evacuation planning, identifying critical and essential personnel; conducting emergency operations center training, participating in surrounding county's planning meetings and information forums, planning Fort Stewart Facebook severe weather town halls for the Garrison and Senior Commander, and ensuring incident and emergency information can be disseminated to as many Fort Stewart-Hunter Airfield personnel as soon as possible. On top of all this planning, we must continue to remember, accomplishing all this

will include the possibility of a hurricane hitting Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield while we continue to operate in the current COVID-19 environment.

The Colorado State University Tropical Meteorology Project predicts another active Atlantic Hurricane Season in 2021. The Hurricane Season begins officially on June 1 and runs through Nov. 30 each year. Tropical storms and hurricanes may and have occurred both before and after those dates. The first hurricane in 2018 occurred during the month of Jan.

The Colorado State project team has conducted annual studies for the last 38 years. Predictions and forecasts are based on tropical storm and hurricane seasons that have occurred in the past using data pulled from the last 30-60 years and also based on climate-related global and regional scientific predictors.

It's still too early for the seasonal prediction of the possible number of tropical storms/hurricanes for this year. In April, climatologists will announce with their annual prediction for the possible number of storms for 2021.

The climatologists say that the record-breaking 2020 season has little bearing on how 2021 will be. At this time the 2021 Hurricane Season Outlook is a 25% possibility for an extremely active season; a 35% possibility for an above active season and 30% for a near average season. We were lucky in 2019 and 2020, as just four hours drive to the south the Florida Panhandle and four hours to our north, coastal North Carolina were devastated by several hurricanes. Regardless of how many storms are predicted, it only takes ONE storm hitting coastal Georgia to cause catastrophic damages to our area.

Regardless of predictions, as Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield prepares it's important that we maintain our individual and Family preparedness at all times. It's not too early to begin planning or even checking out last year's plan to take care of ourselves and/or our Families. If you don't already have an individual or Family plan ready.army.mil/ provides checklists, fact sheets and guidelines for a host of possible emergencies, not only preparing for Hurricane Season, but also include COVID-19 as well.

Military housing allowances see increase in New Year

The Department of Defense 2021 BAH rates increased an average of 2.9% and took effect on Jan. 1. We are excited to see the increases for both installations exceeding the DOD BAH average increase.

What does this mean for our Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield Soldiers? An increase in take-home pay which helps to close the gap in getting families an opportunity to choose where they desire to live. The BAH increase also helps ease the cost of living and out of pocket expenses associated with living off the installation.

The Basic Allowance for Housing is based on geograph-

ic duty location, pay grade, and dependency status. BAH is intended to provide service members equitable housing compensation based on housing costs in local civilian and housing markets.

Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield will see a Basic Allowance for Housing increase, based on an average of all pay grades at the "with dependent" rates. The stipends at Fort Stewart will rise between 2.5-10% depending on rank, for an overall average increase of 5.5%.

The stipends at Hunter Army Airfield will rise between 0.5-10.4% depending on rank, for an overall average increase of 3.1%.

Service members who have a drop in BAH for their locality will have their BAH protected by individual rate

protection. The rate protection ensures that service members who have made long-term commitments in the form of a lease or contract are not penalized if the area's housing costs decrease.

The Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield Housing Service Office is dedicated to the annual BAH data collection. The BAH data collection is used to determine which neighborhoods data is collected and to direct the data collection effort in those neighborhoods toward adequate apartment complexes and individual housing units.





SHARP program assists victims with getting the help they need

As the Army works to ensure dignity and respect within its Soldier and civilian workforce, there is a growing reliance on the resources that can build a support network for employees who have been victimized by sexual harassment or assault in the workplace.

During the Army Materiel Command's recent Sexual Harassment/Assault Response and Prevention Summit, professionals heard not only from senior leadership and fellow SHARP program managers but also from professionals from resources outside the SHARP arena that provide a wide range of support for sexual harassment/assault victims.

"With the SHARP Summit, we bring in all of our team members from AMC's major subordinate commands and we work together collectively to learn how to better assist victims. There are always new professionals who need to build their knowledge base and network, and there are always new regulations and policies, and new environmental concerns to review and discuss," said AMC SHARP Program Manager Kim Green.

"This year – with the theme Building Cohesive Teams through Character, Trust and Resilience – we also brought in support organizations that we, as SHARP professionals, work with to provide victim assistance. Together, we can learn how to assist each other in helping victims."

SHARP professionals require extensive training because of the sensitivities and special needs they must respond to when assisting victims, said AMC Sexual Assault Coordinator Maureen Trainor.

"This is a specialized field that requires a lot of training and commitment. The summit helps to fulfill the training requirement and also to assist our junior SHARP professionals to develop their victim advocacy skills," Trainor said.

This year's summit was kicked off by Lisha Adams, the executive deputy to AMC's commanding general, who said the summit is an opportunity to exchange ideas and build the SHARP team across the AMC enterprise.

"We really do appreciate your support and your participation in this summit," Adams told the SHARP Summit attendees "We want you to have conversations, provide feedback and ask questions. We want to learn from you

from the lens of your role with SHARP. We want you to learn from each other."

The annual event allows SHARP professionals to review the program's accomplishments in helping to provide a safe and secure work environment, and to identify areas where more effort is needed.

"Are we making a difference? Are we doing everything

work place and that they trust leadership will take action when needed. We need to encourage and support each other so that every one of us can contribute," Adams said. "We need to recognize that it's the responsibility of all of us to intervene and act to prevent incidents of sexual harassment and assault."

Among the SHARP Summit presenters, attendees heard from both victim advocates and victims themselves, including Sgt. Maj. Aaron Stone, who recounted how a rape when he was a teenager affected him both personally and professionally in his adult life. Stone has shared his story with several Soldier units in hopes of helping other victims who may be afraid to publicly speak out against their attacker.

"Rape is a dirty, four-letter word. It is painful, ugly," Stone said. "All I was thinking about at that time was survival and wanting it to be over. Victims tend not to remember exact details of rape because their brain shuts down, they don't want to remember ... As a Soldier, war kept me busy and kept my mind off things. I did suffer from post-traumatic stress syndrome. But it wasn't from conflict. It was from this rape from so long ago. It was still debilitating to remember."

When sharing his story, Stone stresses that it's not a sign of weakness to seek help and that a victim is not to blame for what happened. "This is about changing the culture, starting a new paradigm, where Soldiers who have been victimized can get the help they need," he said. "I talk about what happened to me because I want to get it out from the shadows and to give victims the courage to seek help."

"All these resources can be important for a victim's reporting and recovery from sexual harassment or assault," said Green, the AMC SHARP program manager. "In every way, we do what we can to prevent sexual harassment and assault in the workplace. But, if it does happen, we want to make sure victims have the support they need to overcome."

we need to do? Are there things we can do differently for a better program and to achieve more results?" Adams asked. "We need to challenge the status quo. We need to look at where we can improve going forward. As we chart the path ahead we must be dedicated to training and developing our workforce."

Winn holds vaccine town hall

A live broadcast was hosted by leaders of U.S. Army Medical Department Activity-Fort Stewart/Hunter Army Airfield, on Jan. 7 to provide information about the ongoing effort to vaccinate the community at Fort Stewart/Hunter Army Airfield area – and to answer questions and concerns.

Commander, Col. Julie Freeman, the Senior Enlisted Leader, Command Sgt. Charles Robinson, and Deputy Commander for Clinical Services, Col. Nia Middleton, hosted the town hall. Freeman said she wanted to provide information to community members to help them make an informed decision regarding the vaccine; whether they chose to take it or not.

“We’re currently administrating the vaccine to first responders, healthcare personnel, and support personnel,” Freeman said. “And we’re going to move into other phases according to DoD (Department of Defense) guidelines.”

“We’re not immunizing our patients yet,” Freeman said, but noted they planned to vaccinate beneficiaries, including high risk patients and family members over 18 years old, when they are eligible.”

She said eligible personnel would be contacted when it was their respective opportunity to take the vaccine. She encouraged community members to follow the hospital’s Facebook site as the various phases would be announced there – as well as through primary care managers and community advertising.

Dr. Middleton, an Obstetrician Gynecologist, who is also a fertility specialist, provided additional information about the Moderna Vaccine – the vaccine currently available for distribution by Winn Army Community Hospital.


“This vaccine is a messenger RNA (Ribonucleic acid) based vaccine that essentially tells your immune cells to make a harmless protein - called a spike protein,” Middleton said. She said that protein was similar to the protein on the outside of the COVID-19 virus. She said your body then recognizes the protein as foreign and builds an immune response of antibodies.

“Your body will then break down this mRNA, and gets rid of it,” Middleton said. “So there’s no live virus, no virus particles; it cannot give you COVID-19.”

She noted the vaccine was approved by the Food and Drug Administration, or FDA, for emergency use authorization.

Dr. Middleton stated that for most people, the benefits of getting this vaccine outweigh the risks. You should not get the vaccine if are allergic to the vaccine or the components. The vaccine was reported being about 94% effective in preventing COVID-19. Middleton said the vaccine was approved for patients ages 18 and older, and required two shots to attain maximum effectiveness. Those shots being separated by at least 28 days.

Dr. Middleton stated if you receive the Moderna vaccine, you would have to get the follow-up Moderna shot as well – noting the Moderna and other vaccines were not interchangeable.

Middleton said some known side effects of vaccine included sore arms, fatigue, headache, muscle or joint pain, and chills.

She said those indicators were actually the same as if your body is producing an immune response to the vaccine—to help you combat and decrease your risk of COVID-19.

The severe adverse side effects noted in the phase III clinical trial were the same in the vaccine and placebo (saline injection) groups. Freeman said a screening and monitoring process before and after the vaccination have been set up to assess for severe reactions.

“We’re going to ask you if you have severe allergies, if you’ve had any vaccines within the past 14 days, and if you’re considering getting other vaccines,” Freeman said. “That doesn’t mean that you can’t get the Moderna vaccine, it just means that we’re going to ask you some additional questions. This vaccine might not be as effective with people with immune disorders.”

She said they would also ask about medical issues like bleeding disorders –because the vaccination is administered with an injection to the arm; which may cause some bleeding.

CSM Robinson said whether individuals chose to get the vaccine or not, vigilance remained important in the fight against COVID-19. He encouraged community members to continue to wear face masks, to wash hands, avoid crowds, and to maintain at least six-foot separation when around others. Robinson encouraged people to ask questions and get their information from reliable sources, and that Winn would make references available on their website and Facebook page.

Freeman, Middleton, and Robinson said they each decided to take the vaccine to protect themselves, their Families, and the team.




Facts about COVID-19 vaccines

Vaccines (shots) are one of the tools we have to fight the COVID-19 pandemic.



To stop this pandemic, we need to use all of our prevention tools. Vaccines are one of the most effective tools to protect your health and prevent disease. Vaccines work with your body's natural defenses so **your body will be ready to fight the virus**, if you are exposed (also called immunity). Other steps, like wearing a mask that covers your nose and mouth and staying at least 6 feet away from other people you don't live with, also help stop the spread of COVID-19.

Studies show that COVID-19 **vaccines are very effective** at keeping you from getting COVID-19. Experts also think that getting a COVID-19 vaccine may help keep you from getting seriously ill even if you do get COVID-19. These vaccines cannot give you the disease itself.



The vaccines are safe. The U.S. vaccine safety system makes sure that all vaccines are as safe as possible. All the COVID-19 vaccines that are being used have gone through the same safety tests and meet the same standards as any other vaccines produced through the years. A system in place across the entire country that allows CDC to watch for safety issues and make sure the vaccines stay safe.



Different types of COVID-19 vaccines will be available. Most of these vaccines are given in two shots, one at a time and spaced apart. The first shot gets your body ready. The second shot is given at least three weeks later to make sure you have full protection. If you are told you need two shots, make sure that you get both of them. The vaccines may work in slightly different ways, but all types of the vaccines will help protect you.



The vaccines may cause side effects in some people, like sore muscles, feeling tired, or mild fever. These reactions mean the vaccine is working to help teach your body how to fight COVID-19 if you are exposed. For most people, these side effects will last no longer than a day or two. **Having these types of side effects does NOT mean that you have COVID-19.** If you have questions about your health after your shot, call your doctor, nurse, or clinic. As with any medicine, it is rare but possible to have a serious reaction, such as not being able to breathe. It is very unlikely that this will happen, but if it does, call 911 or go to the nearest emergency room.



When you get the vaccine, you and your healthcare worker will both need to wear masks.

CDC recommends that during the pandemic, people wear a mask that covers their nose and mouth when in contact with others outside their household, when in healthcare facilities, and when receiving any vaccine, including a COVID-19 vaccine.



Even after you get your vaccine, you will need to keep wearing a mask that covers your nose and mouth, washing your hands often, and staying at least 6 feet away from other people you do not live with. This gives you and others the best protection from catching the virus. Right now, experts don't know how long the vaccine will protect you, so it's a good idea to continue following the guidelines from CDC and your health department. **We also know not everyone will be able to get vaccinated right away, so it's still important to protect yourself and others.**

COVID-19 challenges don't stop Dogface Soldiers from success

Ranger School is the Army's toughest course and the premier small unit tactics and leadership school. The COVID-19 pandemic has added to the difficulty, but it did not stop three 3rd Infantry Division Soldiers from earning their tabs Nov. 13 at Fort Benning.

Spc. Blayne Adams and Spc. Carl Siberski, both infantrymen, and Sgt. 1st Class Miguel Zarate, a Bradley Fighting Vehicle mechanic, all assigned to 1st Battalion, 64th Armor Regiment, 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, started training for Ranger School during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Typically, large group physical training events are necessary for a pre-Ranger program; however, these were not authorized due to the virus. These three Soldiers had to instead find innovative ways to hold each other accountable using technology.

"Our commander would give workouts for the week and we had to send in proof," said Siberski, a Clayton, Missouri, native. "We'd send a screenshot in the group chat, and it was nice because they still kept people accountable."

Command Sgt. Maj. Michael Hall, the senior enlisted advisor for 1st Bn., 64th AR, attributed a great deal of the training success to the Soldier's company commander.

"Leaders such as Capt. Douglas Sparrow truly set the mark for the battalion's pre-Ranger Course," said Hall, whose unit is known as Rogue Nation. "He set the tone for all our Soldiers to be a part of something bigger than themselves and strive for excellence. The program's focus was never to be centered around only combat arms Soldiers; in Rogue Nation, we all wear the uniform and we all strive to better ourselves."

Over the summer, performing Ranger Training Tasks and getting the physical examines necessary for Ranger School proved difficult with COVID-19 safety precautions, said Adams.

"Ranger-qualified leaders came together and designed

a comprehensive 12-week program that would provide focus to battle rhythm and required mission preparedness, pay mind to the value of leader-invested PT with their organic companies, but also consolidate our motivated Soldiers to a competitive and ambitious environment," explained Sparrow. "We could not have predicted the impact that COVID-19 would have on the original concept, but the cadre would not allow it to deter them and the Soldiers remained as engaged as ever."

Sparrow explained it was a group effort to ensure the Soldiers had what they needed for success. Training cadre like 1st Lt. Zachary Hobson and 1st Lt. David Stanley oversaw much of the daily management of the program, intuitively and creatively finding ways to maintain training and contact participants through distributed means.

A Google drive containing workouts and recovery techniques was created. Cadre led online workouts, and maintained constant digital interaction with the trainees for accountability. Weekend volunteer workouts and the unit's "Rogue Sunday seven-mile" fun runs were attended while adhering to necessary COVID-19 distancing requirements.

Seeing the Soldiers succeed was not surprising, but was an important proof of concept for the unit and evidenced the fact that they could train up their Soldiers for an extremely challenging real-world school despite the global pandemic.

"Performance on demand, no matter the mission, is foremost in our mind," Sparrow said. "Making the time for pain now, to succeed later, through sweat equity and shared suffering, has forged a group and mindset unlike any other."

"I started preparing in June; I was told I was going in August," said Adams, a Houston, Texas, native. "COVID-19 prevented people from getting their physicals in time, so I was slated for a July start date — way earlier than I was expecting."

Quarantining prior to Ranger School provided a unique opportunity for the Dogface Soldiers to prepare.

"For those two weeks, we didn't have any interaction with anybody else," said Zarate, an Alice, Texas, native who serves as a mechanic in the unit. "That gave us time to eat right, have a good night's sleep and workout for two weeks. You wouldn't get that kind of lucky hand if it were regular operations."

Mechanics are not a military occupational specialty that one might normally expect to see graduating from one of the Army's most grueling schools.

"Sgt. 1st Class Zarate is an exceptional mechanic and an even more exceptional leader," said Hall. "I believe Zarate wanted to better himself while setting an extreme example for his Soldiers."

The battalion had a total of four rangers graduate in the last seven months alone. Sgt. William Gagliardi, a combat medic, also recently earned his tab.

For Zarate and the others, Ranger School was a chance to grow and develop as both Soldiers and leaders, and graduating the school is an experience that Zarate hopes others will strive to attain.

"I think Soldiers should go to Ranger School because it gives them that experience of being a leader," said Zarate. "It was nice to sit back and let younger Soldiers step up and make those leadership decisions; to be a follower of the Soldiers for a while was humbling as well."

Not only did the Dogface Soldiers hold each other to a high standard during the train-up in extraordinary circumstances, but they also kept each other motivated at Ranger School.

"My best advice would be to have a battle buddy group or a battle buddy pair," said Zarate. "There's gonna be times when you're going to want to quit, and there's going to be times where you just need that motivation. It always helps to have somebody there with you — especially a familiar face."

The newly-tabbed trio moved on to the next challenge of their careers together as well, joining their battalion on the ongoing mission in the Republic of Korea. The 1st ABCT is currently deployed as part of a regular rotation of forces to support the United States' commitment to Southeast Asia partners and allies.

For the command team of the Ranger School graduates, their Soldiers' performance showed a high level of dedication and effort, which they hope others will strive to emulate.


"It is difficult to put into words how truly proud I am of these Soldiers," said Hall. "Their individual commitment to excellence very much paves the way for Rogue Nation excellence. What these Soldiers may not realize just yet is that what they have achieved has impacted the entire Army; they have made the Army stronger."


