Marne Air breaks ground on new hangar facility

The Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield Garrison held a groundbreaking ceremony for the 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade's new aircraft maintenance hangar, Oct. 29 on Hunter Army Airfield.

Lt. Col. Stephan Bolton, the Hunter Army Airfield garrison commander, said the event represents the beginning of a long-term reinvestment in Hunter Army Airfield and the local community.

"There are currently 13 hangars on Hunter Army Airfield that have served our aviation community for many decades," Bolton said. "They have served us well, but we are very happy to start a long-term investment program to replace them with modern facilities for our aviators."

The 119,500-square-foot facility will be home to the 4th Battalion, 3rd Aviation Regiment, 3rd CAB, and it is designed to enhance the unit's ability to perform maintenance on the UH-60 Black Hawk helicopters.

The project is scheduled to be completed in October 2023, with funding totaling approximately \$56.25 million. The new hangar will feature maintenance shops, administrative space, storage and various site improvements.

"The new hangar will have all of the amenities necessary to let our air crews and mechanics perform maintenance to keep our aircraft functioning properly," Bolton said. "This is the first of many to come, providing a tremendous high quality workspace and quality of life for our Soldiers."

Col. Eric Vanek, commander of the 3rd CAB, said that today marks the next chapter in Hunter Army Airfield's storied history.

"In 1954, during the construction of Hangar 860, it was impossible for anyone to predict the impact it would have on the defense of our nation," Vanek said. "From housing Air Force B-25 bombers in support of World War II, to maintaining a fleet of helicopters ready to deploy, fight and win the nation's wars if called upon, all while withstanding the impacts of severe weather conditions in coastal Georgia."

Vanek said that although the hangars have served a great purpose, it is time to rebuild and reinvest in the critical infrastructure on Hunter Army Airfield.

"With a constant demand for Army aviation, Hunter Army Airfield will remain a critical node to deploy combat ready forces to defend the nation," said Vanek. "Making investments in facilities like this will allow Soldiers to deploy rapidly around the world if the nation calls."

Leaders walk housing, get eagle's eye view of coming changes, conditions

Fort Stewart leaders from across the installation walked two housing areas during a town hall Oct. 29.

Representatives from the 3rd Infantry Division, Winn Army Community Hospital, Fort Stewart garrison, and Balfour Beatty Communities gathered at the Isenhower Terrace ball field that evening and saw two homes in that neighborhood and then visited Marne Point across the street.

The homes visited in Isenhower Terrace were a model home used as a contingency home for displaced families, and a home that had damages needing repair after the family moved out. Marne Point featured a single bedroom apartment pending rental.

Bringing leaders from across the installation together for the housing walking town halls creates synergy and makes the installation's housing a better place for everybody, said Doug Delzeith, Fort Stewart Army Housing Office Supervisor, Directorate of Public Works.

"They afford the leadership to get on the ground where the families live and see for themselves what the living conditions are," Delzeith said. "It also affords the family members an opportunity to talk to leadership—their unit leadership as well as Balfour Beatty Communities and Garrison command."

At the kickoff of the town hall in Isenhower Terrace, Fort Stewart Garrison senior enlisted leader Command Sgt. Maj. Bryan Buchanan explained to those gathered the purpose of the visit to some of the oldest homes on Fort Stewart.

"This portion of the walking town hall is so we can see what the housing area looks like now, and what they're going to look like in the future when we do some renovation in this neighborhood," Buchanan said.

Balfour Beatty Communities' Bo Letnaunchyn said renovations will begin in January and take approximately a year and a half to complete.

"We're going to do the exteriors, we've got roofs coming, we've got new stairwells, we've got new garage doors with garage door openers," he said. "The reinvestment account is what funds what we're going to be doing in this neighborhood. We have about \$25 million in our reinvestment account."

Command Sgt. Maj. Quentin Fenderson, the 3rd ID's senior enlisted leader, expressed concern with the two-bedroom homes and how those residences do not fit the current demographics of the installation. He asked about the long term plan.

"We're trying to bandage these things," Fenderson said. "At some point we're going to have to tear these down and rebuild them."

Face masks required in on-post facilities

Effective immediately, 3rd Infantry Division, Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield GO1 requires ALL individuals to wear a mask inside ANY on-post facility at Fort Stewart or Hunter Army Airfield. Service members are also required to wear a mask inside off-post public buildings/ facilities (i.e. barber shops, religious services, grocery stores, etc.). Mask mandate exceptions

Exceptions to the mask mandate can be made if an individual is alone in a walled office; if an individual is eating and drinking and is socially distant from a co-worker; masks may be required to be lowered for identification or security purposes or as an annotated and approved reasonable accommodation. Vehicle parking safety reminder

When parking a vehicle into a space, do not block the pedestrian walkway with your bumper or trailer hitch. If there is a sidewalk, or marked pedestrian pathway, ensure that it is not blocked by any portion of your vehicle when you park by it. A pedestrian walking past the vehicle may not notice a trailer hitch, and be severely injured by walking into it. Changes to speeding violations issued

The commanding general recently authorized the Fort Stewart Military Police to issue DD Form 1408 for traffic violations when a Soldier is pulled over for speeding 10mph or over above the speed limit. The DD 1408 is effectively a military speeding ticket that allows a Soldier's brigade commander to issue administrative reprimands, non-judicial punishment, suspension of on post driving privileges, corrective training, and/or other appropriate remedial measures. Master Sergeants and above caught driving 10 mph or over the posted speed limit will have their misconduct addressed by the commanding general in accordance Policy Letter #3.

Armor officer excels at 2021 Berlin Marathon

Capt. Connor Roche, a company commander assigned to 2nd Battalion, 69th Armor Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, competed and placed in the top 50 at the Berlin Marathon, Sept. 26 in Berlin. The Berlin Marathon is one of six races that are part of the World Marathon Majors. The other races include Chicago, Boston, New York, Tokyo and London. This year marked the 47th edition of the annual race hosting over 25,000 competitors from across the globe.

According to Roche, this race was a long time goal and was one of many he has conquered, beginning with his time at the United States Military Academy.

“I wasn’t fast enough to run cross country or track, but then I realized I could run until everybody else gives up,” Roche explained. “I made the Marathon team and ran for four years and ended up staying with it after commissioning.”

The Berlin Marathon was his 17th race. During the challenge, runners routed through the city for 26.2 miles, starting and finishing in Tiergarten (Berlin’s most popular inner-city park). This was a challenge that Roche was ready for.

“I knew going into the race the amount of prep and workouts I had done prior to entering and this helped me know what time I was going to be able to run,” Roche said. “It was hot that day. So I had to adjust expectations a little bit, but I ran exactly the time I thought I was capable.”

Roche ended the race ranked No. 43 – a feat he never expected to accomplish – and was the

second American to cross the finish line.

“Doing well in this race made me a lot more excited for the next one and to see where I can take this and how far I can go in running,” Roche added.

Roche’s passion for running marathons not only helps him to stay in shape, it also helps him as a commander by ensuring Soldiers are a top planning priority.

“The Army has forced me to plan out all of my time and set realistic goals of what I am going to be able to accomplish,” Roche said. “There is a lot of planning that goes into running a marathon, whether it’s training or working around Army training cycles. Planning also gives Soldiers the time and opportunity to reach their own goals”

Roche expressed that it’s the job of leaders to allocate resources and accommodate Soldiers the best way one can and give them the time they need to pursue their own interests.

“Pursuing your personal goals outside of work is essential to maintaining your mental health, so protect time every day, even if it’s only 20 minutes to do something you are passionate about,” Roche asserted. “I find working every day towards a goal keeps me grounded and brings me more joy than the actual accomplishment of the goal. So never stop improving and remember to help someone else along the way.”

Currently, Roche is already planning his next race. He qualified for a spot in the National Championships Half Marathon in Hardeeville, South Carolina, in December and plans to complete in the last of the six World Marathon Majors in London this coming spring.

Army to build on lessons learned from pandemic response

Many of the emergency medical facilities the Army built in support of COVID-19 response efforts remain in operation. Others stand ready for a future threat.

Should the nation suffer from a global crisis, natural disaster or another pandemic, Army leaders believe they will be better equipped to respond to another national emergency. And it can learn from the lessons during the service's response to the pandemic.

The Army still has nine medical teams supporting health care workers at hospitals nationwide. In the past year and a half, the branch has mobilized about 50,000 Soldiers in support of the response efforts.

"It's just like 9/11. There is a day, maybe in our lives, something like this is going to happen again," said now retired Lt. Gen. Todd Semonite, former Army Corps of Engineers commander. "All of the designs for all that we built are all in the states and cities. Some of the facilities are still there ... dormant. They've got [patient] beds that are waiting for something to happen."

To date, the Army has delivered 485 million COVID-19 vaccines and administered more than 400 million.

Recent numbers show that the number of COVID-19 deaths and hospitalizations have been declining, however, the Army's surgeon general, Lt. Gen. Scott Dingle, said the Army must remain diligent. The Army leaders, speaking during the Association of the U.S. Army Annual Meeting and Exposition on Oct. 13, said they can continue to strengthen relationships between the service and federal and state agencies, which improved response times.


"It's imperative that we continue to keep our foot on the pedal of force health protection of not just our Soldiers and our civilians, but our family members and the nation," Dingle said.

During the onset of the pandemic then-New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo asked Semonite and a team of engineers to assist with the hospital bed shortage in the state. The Army learned that having more hospital workers and health care professionals could alleviate the need for more beds and larger hospitals. The ability to call upon National Guard and Army Reserve components also proved critical, said Maj. Gen. Bob Whittle, U.S. Army North deputy commander.

The Corps developed a plan with teams of engineers to build makeshift hospital facilities at college dorms, hotels, sports venues and convention centers across the nation. The Corps worked with the National Guard and Army Medical Command to set up makeshift hospitals.

Whittle said that the pandemic response allowed the service to reexamine how it mobilizes and integrates its forces.

The Army Reserve's largest mobilization in history contributed to the vaccination efforts in underserved communities in 25 states, including locations in North Dakota

and New Mexico.

"The big question that we had was, how fast could we do this?" said Maj. Gen. Joe Robinson, commander of the 3rd Medical Command, Deployment Support. "And could we be relevant with the speed that COVID was progressing? Can we actually get Reserve Soldiers out of their civilian occupations and into the front lines in a time that was actually going to make a difference?"

Whittle said in July 2019 the Army first labeled a list of "Black Swan" events that included responses to crises that included a pandemic. Whittle said the Army laid out plans but could not have predicted the scope and scale of the virus' spread.

The Army also faced the challenge of educating the public about the safety and effectiveness of the COVID-19 vaccines.

Retired Lt. Gen. Paul Ostrowski, former director of the Army Acquisition Corps, said the nation must revamp its approach toward strategic communications on social media platforms. While he applauded the service's multi-command response to the pandemic he noted that the country failed to sway Americans who remained on the fence on whether to take the COVID-19 vaccine.

"The biggest lesson learned is the value of strategic communications," said Ostrowski, who also served as deputy to retired Gen. Gustavo Perna, the former commander of Army Materiel Command during Operation Warp Speed. "Social media has completely changed the landscape of this country. And until we get ahead of that, we are going to continue to be challenged in that particular arena. That is our biggest failure."

The Army not only helped lead the battle against coronavirus, it also developed weapons against it. The service joined the scramble to develop viable vaccines as part of Operation Warp Speed, which combined the efforts of the Defense Department and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

U.S. Army Medical Research and Development Command spent 18 months supporting government agencies to help detect, treat and prevent the virus, said Command Sgt. Maj. Victor Laragione, the command's senior enlisted leader. Laragione added that Telehealth assisted with treatments by using a network to connect critical care expertise to health care clinicians operating in limited resource environments.

"If COVID has taught us anything it is [knowing] the value of DOD investments in medical research and development, as well as the importance of collaboration among other government agencies," Laragione said. "We must continue to build upon these relationships in the advancements we've made together to bring an end to COVID-19 and prepare for our future threats."

Army scientists developed imaging techniques for the testing of COVID-19 vaccines and antibody treatments. Laragione said animal testing has enabled researchers to replicate the disease to develop its own vaccine, which has entered phase one of clinical trials.

The Army's battle against the virus began with an impromptu meeting inside the Pentagon in March 2020.

Then-Army Secretary Ryan McCarthy and Chief of Staff Gen. James C. McConville called upon Army leaders to formulate a plan to protect more than 1 million Soldiers and civilians.

"It was our secretary and our chief that said, 'OK, it's time,'" Dingle said. "We had watched the pandemic start. We watched it hit our Soldiers and our forces in Europe and Korea. We saw this tsunami coming."

The Army sent Urban Augmentation Medical Task Forces to New York City and then elsewhere. It rolled out safety measures and shifted to partial telework status for Soldiers for the first time while continuing to participate in scheduled joint exercises and trainings.

"It was amazing to me how adaptable our teammates were," Laragione said.



Army civilians, Soldiers must modernize together, senior Army official says

WASHINGTON — As the Army modernizes, it is essential that its 300,000 civilian employees maintain the skills necessary to support a multi-domain force, a top Army civilian said last week.

“Readiness is not all about Army units that are trained, equipped and manned to fight battles,” but also ensuring that its civilians are ready, said Christopher Lowman, senior official performing the duties of the Army undersecretary.

As part of modernizing and preparing the Army, the force will be “quick, lethal, and very mobile,” he said during the Association of the U.S. Army Annual Meeting and Exposition Oct. 13. With that, however, comes the need for highly skilled, talented individuals to carry out the Army’s future.

“The Army’s at an inflection point as we look forward to what [a multi-domain operation] capable Army is required to do or will be required to do in the future,” Lowman said.

One question often posed to officials regarding the future is how the Army will build teams of civilians to accomplish the mission, said Mark Lewis, senior official performing the duties of the assistant secretary of the Army for manpower and reserve affairs.

“Until recently, there has not been a clear definition to describe the Army civilian corps’ readi-

ness to accomplish the mission or consistent metrics to assess civilian readiness,” Lewis added.

As part of the Army People Strategy, the Civilian Implementation Plan, which was announced last year, aims to modernize and transform the Army’s talent management approach.

The plan helps create a civilian corps that can transform the workforce, modernize how civilians are hired, develop career advancement programs, and create “world-class supervisors,” Lewis said.

Because the CIP is solely focused on Army civilians, it provides the Army with a civilian talent management strategy while also facilitating the transformation of infrastructure and government programs.

With the CIP, “the Army will [be] able to place the right civilian in the right job to support its Soldiers,” Lewis said. The plan also optimizes the vital contributions of Army civilians by modernizing talent management processes and policies and practices.

The plan also increases the Army’s ability to acquire, develop, employ, and retain civilian talent and ensure readiness. It provides strategic guidance to grow mission-critical occupations at critical-fill locations and defines career requirements to execute career development opportunities and training.

In addition to developing the right people, the Army must retain them as well, Lewis said. By doing so, the best talent can be kept to build a

civilian corps capable of moving toward multi-domain operations at the same pace as the total Army.

“We all know the Soldiers do amazing things, but they can’t do them alone. And they’re not doing them alone,” Lewis said. “We must have talented and dedicated Army civilians to maximize the readiness capability, capacity and lethality of our Army.”

In the Army’s civilian ranks, lethality and readiness are just as important, Lewis said.

“We want you to recognize your unique skills and talents through a robust and rewarding career,” Lewis said. “While working for our nation’s defense, I don’t think there has ever been a better time to be an Army civilian.”

Civilians will continue to be a key role in defending the nation in the future, he said.

Army civilians “provide the critical skills that the team needs,” Lewis said. “We are one Army [of] Soldiers and civilians, contractors, family members. We all serve the same great nation and we all work every day to provide the readiness that we need.

“There’s absolutely no doubt that our Army’s greatest strength is our people, [including] our civilians,” Lewis said. “Thank you for using your talents and your skills and most genuinely thank you for your passion for our Army and about how you go about your daily jobs in taking care of your people.”
