Division hosts Marne Week, celebrates 104th anniversary

Fort Stewart's 3rd Infantry Division is commemorating its 104th anniversary with an expanded list of events for Marne Week back in the traditional November time slot. Events take place Nov. 13-19, and include Family day festivities, musical events, a military ball, and team and individual sports events for units to accrue points to win the coveted Marne Cup.

Marne Week is designed to display the fighting spirit, tenacity and Warrior Ethos of the Dogface Soldier and bring together currently serving 3rd ID Soldiers, Veterans, Family members and the community to celebrate the division's legacy.

The division was activated at Camp Greene, North Carolina, on Nov. 21, 1917. Governor Brian Kemp declared Nov. 21 as 3rd Infantry Division Day across the state of Georgia.

Headquartered at Fort Stewart, the 3rd Infantry Division has a rich and storied history. Sixty Dogface Soldiers have been awarded the Medal of Honor, the most of any division in the U.S. Army.

Known as the Hammer of XVIII Airborne Corps, the 3rd ID is the only armored division east of the Mississippi River. The division continues to enhance and upgrade warfighting capabilities with the most lethal ground and rotary wing combat equipment available in the world. By 2023, the 3rd ID will consist of the most modern aviation and armored brigades in the Army.

Marne Week begins with a concert at Hunter Army Airfield, Saturday, Nov. 13. Performers include Chris Janson, the Davidson Brother's Band and Noah Hicks. Active Duty Soldiers and dependents with ID cards have free admission. Tickets for retirees, DA Civilians and the local community are \$20. Gates open at 5:30 p.m. More details can be found on the Fort Stewart Family, Morale, Welfare and Recreation website at: stewarhunter.armymwr.com.

New events to Marne week this year include a boxing match on Nov. 15 and a USO cards night Nov. 17.

The 3rd ID recognizes the commitment and resilience of Army Families and their critical contributions to our readiness. Marne Week includes events for Family members to enjoy, such as spouses' kickball, Twilight Tattoo and Family day.

The annual Marne Week tradition of honoring division heroes continues, this time with the dedication of Fort Stewart gates after three Dogface Soldiers for their incredible service and bravery in World War I, World War II and the Korean War. During a ceremony on Nov. 18, gates 1, 3 and 5 will be named after the Distinguished Service Cross recipient Capt. Jesse Wooldridge, Medal of Honor Recipient Capt. Maurice Lee "Footsie" Britt and Medal of Honor Recipient Cpl. Hiroshi H. "Hershey" Miyamura, respectively.

Marne Week will conclude with the annual Marne Ball sponsored by the Society of the Third Infantry Division at the Jekyll Island Convention Center on Friday, Nov. 19. All Service Members, DA Civilians, contractors, spouses and retirees are invited. Tickets are on sale now at society3rdid.org/nov-2021-soldiers-ball.

Face masks required in on-post facilities

Effective immediately, 3rd Infantry Division, Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield GO1 requires ALL individuals to wear a mask inside ANY on-post facility at Fort Stewart or Hunter Army Airfield. Service members are also required to wear a mask inside off-post public buildings/ facilities (i.e. barber shops, religious services, grocery stores, etc.). Mask mandate exceptions

Exceptions to the mask mandate can be made if an individual is alone in a walled office; if an individual is eating and drinking and is socially distant from a co-worker; masks may be required to be lowered for identification or security purposes or as an annotated and approved reasonable accommodation. Vehicle parking safety reminder

When parking a vehicle into a space, do not block the pedestrian walkway with your bumper or trailer hitch. If there is a sidewalk, or marked pedestrian pathway, ensure that it is not blocked by any portion of your vehicle when you park by it. A pedestrian walking past the vehicle may not notice a trailer hitch, and be severely injured by walking into it. Changes to speeding violations issued

The commanding general recently authorized the Fort Stewart Military Police to issue DD Form 1408 for traffic violations when a Soldier is pulled over for speeding 10mph or over above the speed limit. The DD 1408 is effectively a military speeding ticket that allows a Soldier's brigade commander to issue administrative reprimands, non-judicial punishment, suspension of on post driving privileges, corrective training, and/or other appropriate remedial measures. Master Sergeants and above caught driving 10 mph or over the posted speed limit will have their misconduct addressed by the commanding general in accordance Policy Letter #3.

Getting to know Brig. Gen. Jean-Pierre Fagué

Brig. Gen. Jean-Pierre Fagué is from Draguignan, France. He attended the French Military Academy of Saint-Cyr Coëtquidan and he commissioned as a Marine armored cavalry officer in 1992. He holds a Bachelors degree in Foreign Languages, a Masters degree in Military Studies from the University of Virginia. Fagué serves as the Deputy Commanding General of Readiness and Plans for the 3rd Infantry Division as of July 17.

In this position he oversees more than 21,000 Soldiers in the most honored division in the U.S. Army. Fagué's role as deputy commanding general is part of the U.S. Army's Military Personnel Exchange Program designed to strengthen bonds of friendship, understanding, and interoperability between the countries and their respective military organizations.

Q: What inspired you to join the Army?

Fagué: Well, looking back, I must say that becoming a Soldier was an early calling, as I entered the military high school in Aix-en-Provence (in the south of France where I grew up) and I was not yet 15 years old! I believe the influence of my father was a key driver. He enlisted in 1942 in occupied France when he was 17, and spent 27 years of his life fighting France's wars from World War II to Indochina, Algeria, and Africa. I think his war stories developed my appetite for adventure and my desire to serve my country in the Army. The Army attracted me as

a place where I could find camaraderie, and a life oriented on service and action.

Q: What other service members were in your Family?

Fagué: As previously mentioned, I followed the tracks of my father who served as a noncommissioned officer from 1942 to 1968. Of note as a senior NCO, he served nearly ten years as a platoon leader, mostly in wartime. My grandfather was not a career soldier, but he spent nine years in uniform. He was drafted in 1911 as France extended the conscription duration to three years in anticipation of war. He fought throughout World War I where he was injured by nerve gas; he was not demobilized until 1919 on the Rhine River.

Q: What was your major in college and why did you choose that?

Fagué: My major was international affairs and foreign languages. It aligned well with my desire to travel the world, to learn more about foreign countries and foreign cultures. This curriculum also included strong history and geography studies. I had the opportunity to learn several foreign languages (English, German and some Arabic) which proved quite useful throughout my career in many occasions - notably in operations, as was my academic education. I strongly believe that being able to understand other cultures and other perspectives is key to success in our profession.

Q: Your bio says you were commissioned as a marine armored cavalry officer. Was armored cavalry your first choice? Can you explain the path from a marine commission to where you are now with the Army for our US Service members who might not understand how that transition works?

Fagué: To explain the differences between the U.S. and French organizations, I should tell you that the current French Chief of Staff of the Army is a marine, as were four of the seven last French CSAs. In France, unlike in the US where the Army and the marines are distinct services, the French marines are part of the French Army; an important part. The marine units have their own traditions, but they are fully integrated throughout our organizations and do not form a separate corps under the French Army. For instance a French Army brigade will comprise altogether regular Army battalions, marine battalions or French Foreign Legion battalions. All have the same training and equipment.

As a marine cavalry officer, I received the exact same training as my fellow comrades at the armored and cavalry school on both heavy tanks, light tanks and scouting warfare. I was posted several times in French prepositioned forces in

Africa, which is primarily a marine responsibility. I had the opportunity to deploy as initial entry force in several contingency operations. The expeditionary mindset is at the core of French marines ethos as it is to the Army XVIII Airborne Corps!

Q: What are your favorite sports and sports teams?

Fagué: I enjoy all sports but you will most often see me running in the morning. In my youth, I practiced a wide number of sports. I especially enjoy soccer, rugby, boxing, tennis and golf. For U.S. sports, I can play baseball, but Marne 65 (Col. Ryan McCormack) will have to train me on Lacrosse, which I never had a chance to try. I also challenged Marne 64 (Col. Kevin Lambert) at corn hole, but I will have to train harder to beat him as he is a fierce and highly trained competitor!

Q: What are your hobbies or other personal interests?

Fagué: Besides spending time with my family, I like reading history books and traveling the world.

Q: If you could have any job in the Army you wanted next, what would it be and why?

Fagué: Well, I have not really considered that yet as I am enjoying every minute of being a Dogface Soldier and proudly serving the Marne Division. Among the jobs that I would probably look for in the future is to become a division commander. The training that a deputy commanding general gets here on the Division fight is just remarkable.

Q: What does "not fancy just tough" mean to you?

Fagué: In my mind, this motto reflects the fighting spirit of our division. It combines both the gallant defensive spirit that our elders demonstrated on the shores of the Marne River in France in 1918 - with the readiness to hold ground at all costs reflected in 3rd ID motto "Nous Resterons Là!" - and the aggressive and audacious offensive mindset demonstrated during the liberation of France and Europe in WWII or more recently, in the Iraq War with the "Thunder Run".

Q: What has been your favorite part about being stationed in Coastal Georgia so far?

Fagué: My favorite part is not just enjoying the great southern food in a tropical climate, but it's the people that I have the chance to meet, work with and the great relationships we have made here. I must tell you that serving inside the US Army is a unique professional experience. Living in U.S. society is also a great personal experience for my family. We have been warmly welcomed and integrated in the division community and we feel that we belong here.

Freedom isn't free; the story of a POW veteran

Like every veteran, retired Army Sgt. 1st Class Eugene Ramos has a story.

He recalled it as "the coldest winter in 100 years."

The commander-in-chief of the United Nations Command, Gen. Douglas MacArthur, had planned for a rapid invasion of the Korean peninsula, with an end goal of having U.S. troops back home by Christmas.

"It was so cold that the ground was frozen," said Ramos. "We needed to make foxholes to keep from freezing to death during the night, so I took my shovel and began digging into the hard ground."

Cold and exhausted from chipping away at icy dirt for several hours, Ramos settled for the shallow 10-inch hole he managed to dig, and that became his bed to stay warm in.

Ramos was assigned to the 3rd Infantry Division as a machine gunner. Their mission was to establish and maintain the lines used to evacuate service members to the coast of the peninsula. From there, combat-worn Soldiers and Marines would board ships and return home to the states.

Ramos and his infantry division spent four long months marching across South Korea, from Busan to Seoul, to a point known as the Kansas line. They were ordered to hunker down and prepare to hold the line, no matter the cost.

"At that point, I had been there a day shy of six months," stated Ramos.

After six months of continuous service while deployed, the Army was allowing selected Soldiers to take rest and recovery leave for two weeks in Japan before returning to combat in Korea. Ramos was one of the names selected.

"All I needed to do was set up my machine gun and stand by until the morning," said Ramos. "Then I would go on my R&R."

Unfortunately, Ramos never made it to his rest and recovery time. That night, the Chinese forces advanced upon the line his division was holding.

"We could hear commotion going on, but it was far away," said Ramos. "We didn't expect anyone to come our way."

Just as he had convinced himself it was nothing to worry about, Ramos began to hear an unusual noise just several feet ahead of him—the cutting of barbed wire, the Kansas line's first form of defense.

"I looked down past our barrier, and I saw a big mass in front of the barbed wire fencing," recalled Ramos.

Without hesitation, Ramos opened fire with his machine gun, rapidly unleashing nearly 250 rounds into the darkness, towards what he rightfully identified as a threat.

"I emptied one box of ammo and I said 'alright another box,'" said Ramos. "That went on for a while because once I opened fire, everyone else opened up too. I went through almost 3,000 rounds that night."

After Ramos and his team depleted their ammunition

supply, he began to throw hand grenades as the enemy approached the line. Despite his unwavering dedication to defending the line and his fellow Soldiers, he knew it was only a matter of minutes before the Chinese troops zeroed in on his exact location and overran the area.

"I had the idea of handing them a grenade when they finally got to me," said Ramos. "So, I prepared the grenade and told my assistant gunner to stay down."

Four Chinese troops approached; Ramos pulled the pin and counted to three in his head.

"One, two, three," he recounted.

He handed off the grenade and immediately jumped in the opposite direction, strategically landing in a foxhole.

But the blast of the explosion sent countless shards of shrapnel into Ramos' body, wounding him and making it impossible to escape. As he laid in the foxhole the remainder of the night, he felt an excessive amount of blood running down his arm.

"I didn't know that along with being wounded by the shrapnel, I had also been shot through the arm," said Ramos.

The next morning, Chinese forces swept the area, col-

lecting the wounded Soldiers and taking them as prisoners of war.

"They tied us arm to arm in a single file column," said Ramos. "They had us march all the way from the Kansas line to their labor camps."

Injured and exhausted, the Soldiers had one motivation during the taxing journey to the camps – staying alive.

"Anyone who fell out was thrown into a ditch and killed," said Ramos. "Throughout the trip, the marching would stop, we'd hear a gunshot soon after and then the marching would continue."

Despite the course of events Ramos had endured, the worst was revealed when they finally arrived at the prisoner of war camp.

Soldiers spent their days cold, hungry and in silence.

Every day, the prisoners lined up for chow where they were served what Ramos described as "soupy rice."

"They'd boil just a few cups of rice and add it to a giant pot of water," he recalled. "That's all they'd provide for the hundreds of us imprisoned there."

The new life of those captured also included wearing lice-infested clothing and sleeping on floors with no bedding. Their living quarters were overly crowded, forcing Soldiers to sleep curled up on their sides just so there was enough space for everyone to lay down at night.

Through their shared suffering and uncertainty of the future, the prisoners had grown to know and understand each other – forging unbreakable bonds.

"But we couldn't talk," expressed Ramos. "If they saw a guy talking too much or to too many people, they'd think he was planning to escape and just kill him."

Battling the hostility of their captors every day, Ramos and the rest of the camp were also forced to watch communist propaganda. Prisoners were forced outside in the cold and told to sit down on planks of hard wood and watch videos about converting to communism. This lasted for hours.

"They were trying to brainwash us," said Ramos. "They hoped I would turn on my country, but I never did."

Ramos spent over two years as a prisoner of war before finally being liberated in August of 1953.

Almost unrecognizable, Ramos, who left the U.S. as a fully healthy and functional young soldier, returned as a 97 pound man with limited mobility in his arm from the night he was wounded.

He attributes his survival of those harsh years to his fellow POWs.

"You have to stick true to who you are and rely on the good people around you to get you through a time like that," said Ramos.

Despite the freezing nights, brush with death and years as a prisoner of war, Ramos was dedicated to continuing to serve the United States of America. After being repatriated, Ramos stayed in the Army and retired after 22 years with an honorable discharge.

"Freedom isn't free," stated Ramos. "You have to earn it."







Pfizer vaccine now offered to children ages 5-11

Following the Centers for Disease Control guidance, U.S. Army Medical Department Activity, Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield began providing the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine to Families with children ages 5-11 years old during a special drive-thru vaccine clinic, Nov. 9 at the corner of East 6th Street and Harmon Avenue.

The event was scheduled after the U.S. Food and Drug Administration issued an Emergency Use Authorization to permit the emergency use of Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine for individuals 5 years of age and older, last week.

“The CDC notes after two 10-mili-

gram doses, the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine was approximately 91% effective at preventing symptomatic infection in children age 5 to 11 and caused no unexpected safety issues,” said Maj. Tracey Baldauf, the Director of the Installation Public Health at Winn Army Community Hospital on Fort Stewart. “Getting your child vaccinated will help protect them from getting COVID-19 and reduce their risk of severe disease, hospitalizations, or developing long-term COVID-19 complications. It will also reduce disruptions to in-person learning and activities by helping curb community transmission.”

The Pfizer-BioNTech pediatric COVID-19 vaccine for 5-11 year olds is administered as a two-dose series, 21 days apart. Each dose contains 10 mil-

igrams of the vaccine, which is one third the adult dose, and is specially marked with an orange caps and labels with orange borders.

“If your child has a history of a severe allergic reaction to a component of the vaccine, talk to your pediatrician to determine if it is safe to receive the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 pediatric vaccine,” Baldauf said.

Winn ACH also held a town hall to provide a COVID-19 update, noon, Nov. 10 and to answer questions regarding the new vaccine opportunity.

During the session, it was noted additional vaccine and booster opportunities would be announced on the Winn ACH Facebook Site each Monday at [facebook.com/winncares](https://www.facebook.com/winncares).

Regardless of all the things that separate us, and our differences, I am sure we can all agree that this holiday season demands a greater spirit of gratitude.





The events of the truck rodeo include straight-line backing with the palletized load system, serpentine with the medium tactical vehicle, alley docking with the MTV, crop exchange, high physical demand tie down with the heavy equipment transport system and a written exam.

“Truck rodeos are historical in the transportation realm,” said Sgt. 1st Class Wayne St. Croix, the senior truck master for C Co. “It’s given the new and seasoned operators the opportunity to display their technical proficiency, create a competitive environment and a winning spirit through the organization.”

The truck rodeo gives Soldiers the ability to demonstrate their skills in the form a competition to view the Soldiers capabilities operating various pieces of equipment.

“It’s important because it shows what our strengths and weaknesses are so, we can focus more on what we are not strong and build it,” said Spc. Logan Frazier a motor transport operator assigned to C Co.

In addition to building proficiency in their assigned duty, the rodeo also gives the Soldiers an opportunity to compete and build camaraderie.

“It builds esprit de corps and camaraderie because it give the Soldiers an opportunity to show out who’s the better operator or driver,” Manlove said. “I would also like for the Soldiers to be able to learn more knowledge and gain more expertise on their platform.”

Installation hosts fall cemetery tour

The Fort Stewart Cemetery and Historical Communities Council conducted the fall cemetery tour Nov. 4. The visit included stops at Todd Ray, Warnell, Salem, Z.R. Moody and Jerusalem cemeteries.

Brian Greer, Directorate of Public Works cultural resources manager and archaeologist explained that the production of turpentine from the vast pine forests was one of the primary economic resources in the area. "The sap extracted from the pine trees was boiled down to make turpentine and rosin that was used in a wide variety of industries that manufactured paints, solvents, var-

nishes, and paper manufacturing," he said.

There are 60 cemeteries on Fort Stewart that are the last remaining evidence of the vibrant communities that once inhabited the area. The lands were purchased by Congress to create Camp Stewart in 1940-1941 to help prepare the U.S. for entry into World War II, as anti-aircraft defense training facility.

The installation supports two cemetery and historical communities tours every year in April and November. Information about these visits and other activities are share on the Fort Stewart Hunter Army Airfield social media sites and on the Team Stewart website.
