From the editor,

The Battle Axe reforged: Raiders uncase colors

Soldiers assigned to 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, uncased their colors Aug. 3 on Fort Stewart.

The ceremony was held to mark the official redeployment of the brigade—known as the Battle Axe of 3rd ID—after a nine-month rotation to the Republic of Korea. The Raider Brigade deployed in October 2020 as one of the Army's first units to conduct large-scale training operations during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Col. Trent Upton, commander of the Raider Brigade, led the ceremony.

“From both World Wars, to Korea, to the Global War on Terrorism, we stand on the shoulders of giants,” Upton said. “A history and lineage of courage, selflessness, and honor that we have upheld on our most recent mission, and to which we have added yet another chapter.”

The deployment itself marked a historic return of 3rd ID Soldiers to the Republic of Korea for only the second time since the end of the Korean War.

During the deployment, Raider Soldiers worked alongside their Korean allies conducting multi-echelon training events, sharing each other's cultures, and strengthening

the U.S.-Korean alliance.

“As the first BCT in the Army to complete its train up, deploy, and operate in a COVID-19 environment, Raider outpaced others, setting multiple rotational readiness records,” Upton said.

Upton said that the success of the Raider Brigade's was shouldered by the Soldiers within its ranks and lauded the efforts of every individual in the organization. He also recognized that the Soldiers would not have been successful had it not been for the support of their families and friends.

“You all helped prevent regional aggression, maintained exceptional readiness and worked together with our ROK Army partners for the prosperity of the region,” Maj. Gen. Charles D. Costanza, commanding general of 3rd ID said.

Costanza went on to thank the Raider Soldiers for their hard work during their deployment and welcomed them home.

As the Raiders continue to reintegrate and get back to life at home, they will continue to stay ready to answer their Nation's call.

“We are Raiders first for a reason,” Upton said. “We are the Battle Axe of 3rd ID.”

Face masks required in on-post facilities

Effective immediately, 3rd Infantry Division, Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield GO1 requires ALL individuals to wear a mask inside ANY on-post facility at Fort Stewart or Hunter Army Airfield. Service members are also required to wear a mask inside off-post public buildings/ facilities (i.e. barber shops, religious services, grocery stores, etc.). Mask mandate exceptions

Exceptions to the mask mandate can be made if an individual is alone in a walled office; if an individual is eating and drinking and is socially distant from a co-worker; masks may be required to be lowered for identification or security purposes or as an annotated and approved reasonable accommodation. Vehicle parking safety reminder

When parking a vehicle into a space, do not block the pedestrian walkway with your bumper or trailer hitch. If there is a sidewalk, or marked pedestrian pathway, ensure that it is not blocked by any portion of your vehicle when you park by it. A pedestrian walking past the vehicle may not notice a trailer hitch, and be severely injured by walking into it. Changes to speeding violations issued

The commanding general recently authorized the Fort Stewart Military Police to issue DD Form 1408 for traffic violations when a Soldier is pulled over for speeding 10mph or over above the speed limit. The DD 1408 is effectively a military speeding ticket that allows a Soldier's brigade commander to issue administrative reprimands, non-judicial punishment, suspension of on post driving privileges, corrective training, and/or other appropriate remedial measures. Master Sergeants and above caught driving 10 mph or over the posted speed limit will have their misconduct addressed by the commanding general in accordance Policy Letter #3.

The 3rd Infantry Division announced on Wednesday the inaugural class of the “Marne Hall of Fame,” which was unveiled during the 3rd Infantry Division Soldier’s Ball on Nov. 19.


Earlier this year, 3rd Infantry Division senior officials, with the 3rd ID Museum’s historian, considered nominations of former Dogface Soldiers for inclusion into the Marne Hall of Fame. Twelve valorous and influential figures were chosen from the division’s storied 104-year history.

“The creation of a division hall of fame is part of a larger effort to celebrate the division’s history and celebrate its heroes, said Maj. Gen. Charles Constanza, commanding general of the 3rd Infantry Division. “While Soldiers might be familiar with the 60 Medal of Honor recipients the division has, there are many who made lasting contributions or are the epitome of a Dogface Soldier we want to honor for our Soldiers and communities of today.”

Inductees were selected based on their service within the division, their lifelong commitment to the division’s values, and either their valorous combat actions or their contributions to their chosen field outside of the division.

“The Marne Hall of Fame is about preserving our legacy, paying homage to our Marne heroes and promoting the history of our 104 years, which includes 38 campaign streamers and valorous combat actions from the Marne to the Euphrates Rivers,” said Col. Ryan McCormack, the 3rd ID chief of staff. “Broadly, the Marne Hall of Fame initiative is aligned with one of Maj. Gen. Constanza’s objectives to use the outstanding heritage and lineage of the Marne Division to connect with today’s Dogface Soldiers. The intent is to amplify discrete, historical, and special events tied to the 3rd ID legacy and share them with our Soldiers. Specifically, we want to embrace these men and women for their courage, selfless service, grit, and resilience in the face of the enemy or other adversities.”

Coastal Georgia named 2021 Great American Defense Community

Coastal Georgia was recently named a Great American Defense Community for 2021. The honor is bestowed by the Association of Defense Communities.

The recognition celebrates communities with an exceptional commitment to improving the lives of service members, veterans and their families, according to the ADC.

"We are extremely honored to be selected as a 2021 Great American Defense Community," said Hinesville Mayor Allen Brown, chair of the Coastal Georgia Military Affairs Committee. "The whole region works tirelessly through programs, initiatives and partnerships to improve the quality of life and mission effectiveness for over 56,645 military professionals, civilians and family members and the 19,214 retirees who make up coastal Georgia's military family."

Partnerships and initiatives are core functions of defense communities. They provided direct financial investment in infrastructure that supports the base. Defense communities also provide important services our military families depend upon, including schools, housing, healthcare and other social services that promote

a high quality of life.

"The strength of our military starts at home, in America's defense communities," ADC President Joe Driskill said. "We selected Coastal Georgia to be part of the 2021 class because they are a region that consistently goes above and beyond to support service members, veterans, and military families living in their community."

The mission of the ADC is to build resilient communities that support America's military.

"We are the connection point for leaders from communities, states, the military and industry on community-military issues by enhancing knowledge, information sharing, and best practices," according to the ADC. "With nearly 300 communities, states, regions, and affiliated industry organizations, ADC represents every major defense community/state in the nation."

Coastal Georgia is home to Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield and is one of five communities across the country named to the 2021 Class of Great American Defense Communities. The other are Altus, Oklahoma; Everett, Washington; Great Falls, Montana; and the NAS Pensacola & NAS Whiting Field Community. Coastal Georgia is the only Army presence recognized, said Fort Stewart Garrison

Commander Bryan Logan.

"It is humbling to be the only Army installation recognized this year as a Great American Defense Community," Logan said. "Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield would not be a seven-time Army Community of Excellence without the existing partnerships we have established throughout Coastal Georgia. Spartan wins 2021 XVIII Airborne Corps NCO of the Year

Sgt. Hunter Davidson, an infantryman assigned to 3rd Battalion, 15th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, won the 2021 XVIII Airborne Corps Noncommissioned Officer of the Year Competition on Wednesday, June 23 on Fort Bragg, North Carolina. Four noncommissioned officers went head-to-head with one competitor from four of the XVIII Airborne Corps divisions: the 3rd Infantry Division, the 10th Mountain Division, the 82nd Airborne Division and the 101st Air Assault Division. The competition included but was not limited to the new Army Combat Fitness Test, an obstacle course, land navigation, medical lanes, a 16-mile ruck with warrior skills tasks and battle drill questions.

Davidson, a 24-year-old from Covington, Georgia, commented that the first day of the competition started early at approximately 4 a.m. and ended at 11:30 p.m., but the second day was even more strenuous.

“The second day was probably the hardest ruck I think I’ve done in my Army career,” said Davidson. “My watch had me just shy of 19 miles total for that day including the ruck and stations together.”

Davidson pushed past the competition in the first day with the day-into-night land navigation test.

“I had all five points completed in one hour and 10 minutes and was back to the start point at one hour and 20 minutes. I was done before nightfall even came about with the next competitor behind me with approximately 45 minutes in time,” said Davidson. “I definitely think I separated myself at that point.”

To be able to go to the 2021 XVIII Airborne Corps NCOY Competition, Davidson had to win at the brigade and division levels. He is proud to represent the 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team and 3rd Infantry Division.

“It’s a huge opportunity not just to represent 2nd Brigade but also 3rd Infantry Division and all of Fort Stewart. It’s a great honor,” said Davidson. “There was great competition at the division level to get here.”

When asked about his future goals, Davidson was laser-focused with his sights set on the next competition level at U.S. Army Forces Command.

“So next we got FORSCOM probably in the next month or so, and we’ll just go from there,” said Davidson. “I’m set on the 50-meter target to bring home the FORSCOM championship as well for 3rd Infantry Division and 3rd Battalion, 15th Infantry Regiment.”

Davidson described what the competition meant to him personally. “To be recognized on such a big level because XVIII Airborne Corps has approximately 90,000 Soldiers and to be recognized as one of the top Soldiers as the number one NCO is pretty humbling,” said Davidson.

“The Spartan Brigade is extremely proud of Sgt. Davidson and all that he has accomplished,” said Command Sgt. Maj. Jamie Lopez, the senior non-commissioned officer of 2nd ABCT, 3rd ID. “Sgt. Davidson represents the best of the NCO Corps and is an inspiration for present and future 2nd ABCT, 3rd ID and XVIII Airborne Corps NCOs.”

Soldiers and civilians of the 3rd Infantry Division, alongside Fort Stewart police and fire emergency services personnel, held a 9/11 "Patriot Day" Remembrance Ceremony at the Alwyn Cashe Memorial Garden, Sept. 10 on Fort Stewart, to commemorate the 20th anniversary of the Sept. 11, 2001 terrorist attacks.

Hosted by 3rd ID's command team, Maj. Gen. Charles Costanza and Command Sgt. Maj. Quentin Fenderson, the event focused on encouraging Soldiers to take time to personally reflect on the service and sacrifices of the people lost, and to share in the response and resilience of the survivors and the United States.

"As I drove in this morning on the back road, I saw the pictures of the 2,977 people we lost on Sept. 11; 412 of them were first responders," said Costanza. "So as we talk about why tomorrow is Patriot Day, it is because of service. For all of our first responders that are here today, thank you for your service. Thank you for what you do. Service is more than just this uniform," he said, pointing at his own Army uniform. "For a lot of it, it's about you."

Costanza encouraged attendees to reflect on the service members that lost their lives fighting in Iraq or Afghanistan after the events of 9/11.

Many Soldiers attribute the heroic efforts they witnessed on 9/11 and afterward as their inspiration for serving in the military. Costanza said young service members personally inspire him, emphasizing emergency services member, Pfc. Lucas Williams, age 19, who was not even born at the time of the terrorist attacks. Williams serves as a firefighter on Fort Stewart and assisted Fire

Chief Steven Kelly during the ceremony in laying a wreath in honor of firefighters and emergency medical personnel.

Laying a wreath in honor of police officers was Lt. Col. Craig Giancaterino, the commander of the 385th Military Police Battalion and the Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield Police Chief, Bart Knoch.

The 3rd ID command team laid the final wreath in honor of Soldiers and civilians lost in the attacks.

Sept. 11, 2001, changed more than the skyline of New York City; the attacks changed a generation of Americans, the Army and the world.

At the time of the attacks, Fenderson was serving in Manhattan as an Army recruiter with the New York City Recruiting Battalion. He was in the city that day with another recruiter from the Air Force and their government vehicle was parked in one of the Twin Towers. He recounted running from the site and assisting others lost in the chaos as they made their way on foot to their own headquarters located miles away. Covered in dust and having worn through the Army dress shoes he was wearing, Fenderson remembers helping others while still trying to understand the scope of what was happening around them.

The ceremony included a firing party, moment of silence, the playing of taps, laying of wreaths and the ringing of a ceremonial bell from Fort Stewart Fire Station 1 in sequence with a reading of the timeline of tragic events of 9/11. Early Friday morning, participants of the Fort Stewart 9/11 Remembrance Run rang the bell as they completed the race.

Demobilizing Guard Soldiers affect installation services

Several hundred National Guard Soldiers will be seen across Fort Stewart October through November as they demobilize from supporting the southwest border mission.

The demobilization will affect services on the installation. Soldiers and families may see delays in or increased wait times for ID card appointments and medical appointments.

“We’ll see an increase of Soldiers on the Fort Stewart foot print,” said John Cubbedge, garrison mobilization support specialist.

Wait times for medical appointments, urgent care and emergency room care will increase because of this mission, said Sean McLaughlin, Winn Army Community Hospital plans chief. Eight providers from Winn Army Community Hospital will support the demobilization.

“That’s a loss of 168 appointments for Fort Stewart Soldiers and families,” said McLaughlin. “On a normal day, wait times are three days for a same-day appointment and 16 days for a routine appointment. Shifting eight providers to support the demobilization doubles wait times to six days and 32 days, respectively.”

Additional medical personnel have been brought in to help with the demobilization, Cubbedge said.

“We want to make sure we provide adequate health care for the Fort Stewart community and their families,” he said.

Urgent care can also absorb the impact on Fort Stewart Soldiers and families, McLaughlin said.


“Wait times will be longer, though, so network providers can establish care with new patients,” he said. “Increased use of the Emergency Room is also expected, and wait times will increase there. We appreciate your patience. Please address concerns to the patient care advocate.”

The demobilizing National Guard Soldiers will use other on-post facilities, too, Cubbedge said.

“You’ll see increased foot traffic in the PX, commissary, MWR facilities and I guarantee you’ll see them at the food court,” he said.

The demobilization will run from October through November. The highest number of demobilizing National Guard Soldiers will be in mid-October. Fort Stewart is a mobilization force generation installation. Demobilizing National Guard units after completing deployments is one mission of an MFGI.

Gate renaming ceremony honors three legendary Dogface Soldiers

The 3rd Infantry Division hosted a gate dedication and renaming ceremony, Nov. 18 on Fort Stewart. Gates 1,3 and 5 were renamed in honor of Medal of Honor recipients, Capt. Jesse Wooldridge, Capt. Maurice Britt and Cpl. Hiroshi Miyamura during a ceremony on the installation, Nov. 18.

3rd ID officials hosted the ceremony to honor the legacy of the Dogface Soldiers in ways that will mark their memory and selfless service for the current Soldiers and community. The distinguished Dogface Soldiers are from three distinct periods of the 3rd ID history.

“Capt. Jesse Wooldridge is a World War I Distinguished Service Cross recipient for extraordinary heroism in action while serving as the commander of Golf Company, with 38th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Division, at Chateau-Thierry, France, on July 15, 1918,” said Maj. Gen. Charles Costanza the commanding general of the 3rd ID. “A hero during the very conflict to which the Division owes its motto ‘Rock of the Marne,’ Capt. Wooldridge led a counterattack of 189 men against a German force of five times his own numbers.”

While only 51 men returned unhurt, his company conquered or took prisoner approximately 1,000 German

soldiers. Wooldridge’s success was not without personal sacrifice as he completed his mission having been shot in the chest and back as well as overcoming a bayonet wound to the neck.

“Capt. Maurice ‘Footsie’ Britt is a Medal of Honor recipient from World War II as a member of Lima Company, 3rd Battalion, 30th Infantry Regiment, 3rd ID,” Costanza said. “On Oct. 29, 1943, he received the Silver Star for his actions at Acerno, Italy, as well as the Medal of Honor and a battlefield promotion for his extraordinary actions against the enemy at Mignano, Italy.”

During that event, while disdaining enemy hand grenades and close-range machine pistol, machine gun and rifle fire, Britt inspired and led a handful of his men in repelling a counterattack of approximately 100 Germans against his company positions north of Mignano, Italy, on Nov. 10, 1943. His actions resulted in the capture of four Germans and enabled several captured Americans to escape. He later earned a Bronze Star Medal and became the first infantry Soldier to be awarded the top combat decorations for valor in a single war.

“Take what you’ve learned here because you never know when it’s going to stick to a kid who grew up going to all the Medal of Honor events from age five to about age 14 in the 80s and 90s,” said Christopher Britt, Britt’s grandson. “I take what he taught me then and what I saw

all of these other men exemplify and have brought that through to my life and I hope that I can pass that along to my children and grandchildren, other people that I meet and other people that I work with.”

“As a son of Japanese immigrant parents, Cpl. Hiroshi H. ‘Hershey’ Miyamura is a Medal of Honor recipient from the Korean War,” Costanza said. “While serving with Company H, 2nd Battalion, 7th Infantry Regiment, 3rd ID at Taejon-Ni, Korea, on April 24, 1951, the enemy attacked, threatening to overrun their defensive position. Cpl. Miyamura unhesitatingly jumped from his shelter, wielding his bayonet in close hand-to-hand combat, subduing approximately ten enemy Soldiers.”

Following the attack, he administered first-aid to the wounded and directed evacuation, continued to deliver fire until his ammunition was expended, while ordering his squad to withdraw and stayed behind to bayonet his way through infiltrated enemy soldiers, killing more than 50 of the enemy before he was severely wounded.

“In the future, as you drive in Wooldridge, Britt or Miyamura Gates, take some time to remember these three incredible Dogface Soldiers,” Costanza said. “Think about what selfless service is truly all about and what service to our nation means.”





Spartans set aim for most modernized division in Army

Modernized Paladin M109A7 howitzers, assigned to the “BattleKing Battalion,” 1st Battalion, 9th Field Artillery Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, performed firing missions during artillery Table VI section level qualifications, Nov. 5 as part of the culminating exercise in operator new equipment training at Fort Stewart.

Bravo Battery, 1-9 FAR, 2nd ABCT was the first unit on Fort Stewart to go through OPNET for the recently received modernized artillery platform. The “Spartan Brigade,” 2nd ABCT is the tip of the spear in the Division’s glide path to become the most modernized division in the Army by summer 2023.

“From a fire support perspective, the new M109A7 Paladin provides the supported maneuver commander a self-propelled artillery platform that possesses greatly increased maneuverability, survivability and maintenance efficiency,” said Lt. Col.

Joseph L. Handke, commander of the 1-9 FAR, 2nd ABCT.

The modernized Paladin now possesses an electronic diagnostic system for improved maintenance troubleshooting.

“The value added from the new M109A7 is tremendous from a maintenance and logistics perspective,” said Chief Warrant Officer 2 Mark T. Mansbridge, the battalion maintenance technician for the 1-9 FAR, 2nd ABCT. “The chassis similarities to the Bradley make parts more easily accessible through the Army supply channels, and the new high voltage turret system has replaced the legacy hydraulic turret which was prone to a lot of leaks and component failures.”

Many of the old hydraulic driven fire control elements have been replaced by a high voltage system that is both more reliable and responsive. The Bradley-common engine, wider chassis, increased ground clearance, digital driver display unit and new suspension system all contribute to a more maneuverable self-propelled howitzer that can

rapidly shoot and displace in all conditions in direct support of maneuver forces.

“The M109A7 provides the armored brigade combat team a modernized self-propelled artillery platform that enhances the fires war fighting function’s ability to sustain and maintain the tempo of a combined arms fight,” said Capt. Mark Pangilinan, commander of Bravo Battery, 1-9 FAR, 2nd ABCT. “At the battery level, the M109A7’s focus on mechanical interoperability with like items from the Bradley Fighting Vehicle enables our organization to maintain combat power for the duration of an operation and execute the battalion’s field artillery support plan.”

Additionally, the modernized Paladin has the capability to configure armament based on the operational environment, allowing for additional armor upgrades to provide increased force protection to the howitzer and crew. The 1-9 FAR OPNET will conclude by spring 2022.
