Secretary approves implementation of revised Army Combat Fitness Test

WASHINGTON— Secretary of the Army Christine E. Wormuth issued an Army Directive today outlining a time-phased implementation of a revised ACFT as the Army's general physical fitness test.

Changes made to the ACFT incorporate feedback from Soldiers and independent analysis of test performance.

Among the key changes announced by the Army are new age-and-gender-performance normed scoring scales; the replacement of the leg tuck with the plank for the core-strength assessment; and the addition of the 2.5-mile walk as an alternate aerobic event.

"The ACFT is an essential part of maintaining the readiness of the Army as we transform into the Army of 2030," Wormuth said.

"The revisions to the ACFT are based on data and analysis, including an independent assessment required by Congress. We will continue to assess our implementation of the test to ensure it is fair and achieves our goal of strengthening the Army's fitness culture."

A common concern identified by the Army's independent analysis and the RAND study was that a gender-neutral test might not accurately measure all Soldiers' general physical fitness levels. One example was using the leg tuck as the assessment of core strength.

RAND concluded that Soldiers might have the core strength that is not accurately measured if they lack the upper body strength required to perform a leg tuck. Now, the plank will be the sole exercise to assess core strength, using recognized standards from sister services as a baseline, and modifying the scales based on Army requirements.

The revised ACFT will utilize scoring scales that are age and gender normed, similar to the APFT. The Army designed the new scoring scales from nearly 630,000 ACFT performance scores, historical performance rates from the APFT, and scoring scales used by other military services.

The Army will continue to assess performance data and has established an ACFT governance body to provide oversight of the full implementation of the new test. This structure will assess ACFT scores, pass rates, injuries and environmental considerations, and report those findings along with any recommended changes to Army Senior Leaders. The first comprehensive assessment will be in April 2023.

Unlike the APFT, which went largely unchanged for 40 years, Army leaders believe the ACFT must be adaptable. "Since 2018 we've said this test would evolve, and it has," said Sgt. Maj. of the Army Michael Grinston.

Grinston noted the governance structure will continue to advance the ACFT to maximize the physical fitness of the force.

The six-event ACFT now provides commanders and Soldiers an accurate assessment of a Soldier's physical fitness level and sustains the Army's efforts to maintain a

physically fit force capable of a wide range of missions.

Beginning April 1, units will start diagnostic testing under the new structure. Record testing begins for Regular Army and Active Guard Reserve Soldiers on October 1, 2022, to allow Soldiers six-months to train. Also on October 1, a passing ACFT score will be used for retention, graduation of initial military training, professional military education, and evaluation reports for Regular Army and Active Guard Reserve Soldiers. Implementation of separation actions may begin in April 2023 for Regular Army and Active Guard Reserve Soldiers.

The Army also approved similar, but longer, timelines for Army Reserve and Army National Guard Soldiers, with April 2023 marking the start point for most personnel policies, and the implementation of separation actions beginning in April 2024.

"During this transition, we want to make sure all Soldiers have the proper time to succeed," Grinston explained. "Put the test on the calendar and make sure your Soldiers have a solid training plan."

Grinston said while Regular Army Soldiers can be flagged beginning October 1, 2022 for failing the ACFT, no Regular Army Soldier will be separated solely for ACFT failure until April 2023.

The policy also directed a change to extend retesting periods from 90 days under the APFT to 180 days for Regular Army and Active Guard Reserve Soldiers, and 240 days for Reserve Soldiers for the ACFT. Grinston noted that the extended reconditioning timelines will guarantee that Soldiers who are willing to put in the time and training are provided an opportunity to pass the test.

To help inform the force of all the policies and procedures of the test, the Sergeant Major of the Army is initiating a chain teach throughout the force – and personal-

ly gave Army Command, Army Service Component Command, and direct reporting unit command sergeants major a class on changes to the ACFT.

"They will turn around and give that class to the NCOs who report to them as well as the [command sergeants major] for their subordinate units," Grinston said.

The chain teach will continue throughout the Army to ensure all noncommissioned officers and Soldiers are directly informed of the policy.

To ensure Soldiers throughout the Total Army have comparable training opportunities, the Army procured and distributed more than 40,000 sets of equipment, 60% of which were designated for Soldiers in the Army Reserve and National Guard.

Grinston encouraged Leaders to use their equipment for physical readiness training, including on drill weekends for the Reserve Component, to help Soldiers familiarize themselves with the events before testing.

There are also a number of resources available on the ACFT website to help Soldiers train, including workout program examples and videos of exercises – many of which require no equipment.

Army leaders expect units to incorporate principles of all the Holistic Health and Fitness (H2F) System domains into their training. In addition to the physical domain, Leaders should include proper nutrition, sleep, and spiritual and mental fitness to improve overall Soldier readiness. Unit master fitness trainers are the subject-matter experts and are trained to advise in all domains of fitness.

"If you really want to improve your ACFT score," Grinston agreed, "start with those other four domains of fitness."

From dirty to clean; Provider Soldiers train to bring fresh water

Former EPA Administrator Stephen Johnson once said, “Water is the lifeblood of our bodies, our economy, our nation and our well-being.”

To ensure the well-being of the Soldiers within the 3rd Infantry Division, Army water treatment specialists assigned to Alpha Company, 87th Division Sustainment Support Battalion, 3rd Division Sustainment Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division, conducted a three-day water purification training event March 22-24 on Fort Stewart.

“Alpha Company’s water platoon are conducting water purification training in order to enhance Soldiers proficiency in the 92W (water treatment specialist) MOS (military occupational specialty),” said 1st Lt. Bailey Pollack, the executive officer of Alpha Co. “The training validates the mission essential task list, equipment and ensures Soldiers are ready to execute water operations at a moment’s notice.”

Water purification training assists in the unit’s garrison mission for potential upcoming missions and prepares Soldiers for field or expeditionary logistic support.

“This training will allow Alpha Co. to rapidly provide quality bulk water storage and distribution,” Pollack said. “When Soldiers are qualified on water equipment they will be able to rapidly set up in any situation presented to the platoon.”

The ability to purify water is a unique function to Alpha Co., the 3rd DSB and the Division.

“It will be the first time in several years that this company has been able to purify water for consumption,” Pollack said.

Alpha Co. uses unique equipment while conducting water purification operations to allow the unit to draw from a variety of water sources and provide clean drinking water for Soldiers or in a humanitarian assistance role.

“The unit will be using a tactical water purification system (TWPS),” Pollack said. “The TWPS provides a rapidly deployable water purification system capable of producing at least 1,500 gallons of potable water from a fresh water source and 1,200 gallons from a seawater source.”

Normal day-to-day operations for the water platoon includes training on various equipment

to ensure the Soldiers in the platoon are always ready to perform their mission.

“The water platoon normally conducts training on the TWPs, lightweight water purifiers (LWP), load handling system compatible water tanks and LADs (Laundry Advanced Systems) in order to be proficient and trained managing shower and laundry operations and conducting bulk water storage and distribution,” Pollack said.

The purification equipment within the platoon allows for modularity, scalability and ease of transportation on a variety of platforms to ensure the Alpha Co. Soldiers are always able to perform their mission.

“LWP is at squad or platoon level equipment,” said Staff Sgt. Robert Handy, the 3rd DSB fuel and water noncommissioned officer in charge. “With that being said it is not a large-scale system to support a garrison, but it makes up for it in its diversity in transportation. You can pack it into the High Mobility Multipurpose Wheeled Vehicle (HMMWV) or even a Tricon container. Operational flexibility can be achieved with the addition of Extended Capability Modules (ECMs).”

In the future, Alpha Co. plans to have additional training to build on the skills the Soldiers learned during the water purification training.

“The unit will continue to incorporate real life scenarios into future training to allow Soldiers to constantly build on their skills and ensure the unit is ready at a moment’s notice,” Pollack said.

Guardsmen demobilize after COVID-19 response team activation

More than thirty Airmen from the 165th Airlift Wing, Georgia Air National Guard, demobilized on March 18 at the 165th Airlift Wing after volunteering to serve on the Georgia Coronavirus Response Task Force.

These multi-capable Airmen, from a variety of career fields have served more than 60 days spread out across 15 COVID testing sites and 11 hospitals throughout the state of Georgia and are a mix of members from the wing or one of its geographically separated units. The 117th Air Control Squadron, located at Hunter Army Airfield or the 224th Joint Communications Support Squadron located in Brunswick.

“As a guardsman, in the back of your mind you always know that you may be called upon for any number of situations that support the community,” said U.S. Air Force Col. Robert S. Noren, 165th AW commander, “Just over two years ago a global pandemic was one of the least likely scenarios we expected, but our Airmen have adapted to the challenges and have proven their resiliency throughout the COVID-19 mission.”

The Governor of Georgia, Brian Kemp, called on the 165th Airlift Wing in March of 2020 to provide a wide range of support to the residents of Georgia where the 165th AW provided medical support teams, support at testing sites and assistance in public health call centers. In April 2020, more Airmen were called upon to disinfect government buildings and senior living facilities to help stop the spread of COVID-19.

“The skillsets our Airmen have showcased highlights their commitment to the minuteman ethos of “Always Ready, Always There” and I am proud of the support our people provided to the front-line workers to help alleviate the strain the pandemic had on our healthcare system,” said Noren.

Over the last 24 months, the 165th Airlift Wing activated over 200 Guardsmen total who were on teams that cleaned approximately 19,559 rooms at 248 facilities, administered 22,272 COVID-19 tests and 220,515 COVID-19 vaccinations across the state of Georgia.

One of these Airmen, Tech. Sgt. Lonnie Jarvis, a medic from the 117th Air Control Squadron, Hunter Army Airfield, said she was on the initial Coronavirus Response Task Force in March of 2020 and said that remaining flexible at all times was the key to success during this pandemic.

“We never knew what to expect going into each shift but we just did our best and helped wherever we could,” said Jarvis.

Senior Airman Jessie Adams, a cyber-security specialist with the 165th Communications Flight, who has been in the Georgia Air National Guard for three years, said he came back from cyber security technical training in 2021 and he was shortly after activated in support of COVID-19 vaccination roll out around the state and was activated again during the rise of local COVID-19 cases to augment

at a hospital in December 2021.

Adams said this was his third time being activated as a member of the Coronavirus Response Task Force, which totals to 12 months combined of service on the task force.

After two years of historical activations by Georgia Guardsmen, these two Airmen reflected on their time serving in the community during the COVID-19 pandemic and both agreed that it was a humbling experience that they will never forget.

“Serving out in the community during the pandemic made me realize how much is actually required of nurses to care for patients and just how stretched hospital staff have been throughout this time,” said Adams, “Even though our tasks sometimes seemed like very small things, they made a big difference for the nurses and it felt good to be a part of it.”

“As this tasking comes to an end, it feels great to know I made a difference in my community as well as the specific individuals I met along the way,” said Jarvis, “This experience has confirmed the overall reason I decided to serve in the Air National Guard and it feels absolutely outstanding to have been a part of it.”

Zutendaal APS-2 site receives support from deployed Dogface Soldiers

ZUTENDAAL, Belgium — The Army Prepositioned Stocks-2 worksite in Zutendaal has been extremely busy prepping and pushing out thousands of vehicles and equipment pieces in support of current operations in Europe. In addition to that mission, the worksite has continued to focus on its normal day-to-day operations – maintaining thousands more vehicles and equipment pieces with regularly scheduled top-to-bottom maintenance checks and services, technical inspections, and quality control checks.

It's an enormous amount of work for a team of just over 180 personnel, both U.S. and Belgium, but recently they nearly doubled in size when more than 130 Soldier mechanics from a U.S.-based maintenance company deployed to their site to help turn wrenches.

Company B, 87th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion, 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade, deployed from Fort Stewart, Georgia, to Europe a few days ago with the mission to augment Army Field Support Battalion-Benelux – and more specifically its Zutendaal APS-2 worksite.

Tiffany Mikus is the site director at Zutendaal, AFSBn-Benelux, 405th Army Field Support Brigade. She said she and her team are looking closely at current workload requirements as well as AFSBn-Benelux's upcoming support to the next iteration of DEFENDER-Europe and other missions.

“And at the same time we're looking at all the remaining (equipment by unit) on site because we want to take advantage of the maintenance company's deployment and put hands on every item here on Zutendaal,” Mikus said.

That means completing all the technical inspections and looking at all required services and where those services fall within the maintenance cycle in order to even

out the workload that remains, she said.

The commander of AFSBn-Benelux, Lt. Col. Aaron Jones, said he looks forward to getting the maintenance company fully integrated into his team, knowing they'll enhance his battalion's ability to rapidly prepare and maintain the APS-2 equipment sets.

“What a unique opportunity for this maintenance company deployed here from the U.S., but also for my battalion,” said Jones. “We look forward to working with them and know our collaborative efforts will truly make a difference.”

The Zutendaal maintenance team is currently meeting with Company B, 87th CSSB, daily to determine the overall workload process, but even in this early stage of their integration into the Zutendaal team, Mikus said she and her team are impressed with the many capabilities the maintenance company from Fort Stewart carries in its tool box.

The 87th CSSB maintenance company consists of an automotive shop, ground support equipment shop, service and recovery shop, armament shop, communications and electronics shop, parts and supply, and a calibration team, said 1st Sgt. Thomas Johns, Company B first sergeant, 87th CSSB.

The calibration team – which is also known as Test, Measurement and Diagnostic Equipment – “is huge,” added Mikus. “We're definitely going to take advantage of having that capability on site.”

Johns said AFSBn-Benelux currently sends everything to Kaiserslautern, Germany, to be calibrated, “but we brought our calibration team and shop with us so we're going to take over that duty, and no longer will anything that needs to be calibrated be sent to Kaiserslautern.”

And once all the vehicles and equipment pieces are fully mission capable and ready for issue in support of current operations in Europe, Johns said his company will begin cross training with the APS-2 team at Zutendaal.

“A lot of the Belgium local national workforce here have not received the same training we have,” Johns said, “so we're going to provide them with that training and more.”

When the maintenance company landed in Europe, Johns said he and his Soldiers were very impressed with the reception they received from the 405th AFSB and U.S. Army Garrison Benelux.

“Truthfully, of the 10 deployments I've been on in my 20-year career, this one has been the most amazing,” said Johns, who again emphasized how impressed he was with the community support.

The Family Readiness Group came out and greeted all the Soldiers. The Exchange, the commissary and the sports club extended their hours for the Soldiers. And the executive officer from the 405th AFSB, Lt. Col. Oliver Davis, was there on day one to greet the maintenance company upon their arrival at Ramstein Air Base, Germany.

“I don't think I could have asked for a better reception and integration,” said Johns.

And now that they are near the point of full integration, Mikus and Johns are both thinking beyond Zutendaal – more specifically theater wide.

“What they bring is bigger than just supporting Zutendaal. It's really support to the entire theater because they bring such a huge capability with them,” Mikus said. “I believe this team is going to end up being a theater asset more so than just a Zutendaal asset.”

And the wheels to support that theory are already in motion, as it turns out. According to Johns, next week the support maintenance company will send more than a dozen Soldiers from its armament shop, automotive shop and its ground support equipment shop to Eygelshoven, Netherlands, to augment AFSBn-Benelux's APS-2 worksite there.

“Our armament tech, chief warrant officer Kim, is over there right now coordinating the support we'll bring to that site,” Johns added.





Alpha Company Soldiers host logistics airlift training

Automated logistical specialists assigned to the Supply Support Activities (SSA) Platoon, Alpha Company, 87th Division Sustainment Support Battalion, 3rd Division Sustainment Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division, conducted pallet air-load training with aviators from the 603rd Aviation Support Battalion, 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade on Wright Army Airfield, March 22.

“The SSA platoon are conducting the training to boost Soldier’s knowledge on cold and hot pallet load training into a CH47F Chinook,” said 1st Lt. Bailey Pollack, the executive officer of Alpha Co. “The unit is also conducting forklift training with the civilians at Wright Army Airfield.”

The training consisted of two phases beginning with classroom instruction to ensure the Soldiers knew how to safely load equipment and conduct expeditionary logistic support.

“The classroom portion was on airfield operations and how it is different from operating in the motorpool, said 1st Lt. Jeffrey Campbell, the SSA platoon leader of Alpha Co. “So, there are a lot of what you can and cannot do on Wright Army Airfield and what was required of us.”

The training assists in the unit’s garrison mission and assists Soldiers in preparing for field or expeditionary logistic support by enhancing their ability to conduct logistic support operations.

“This allows the unit to be better equipped and more knowledgeable during day-to-day operations and better prepare the Soldiers for anything thrown at them in a deployed environment,” Pollack said. “If the platoon can efficiently and safely load pallets into an aircraft the skies are the limit.”

During daily operations, the SSA platoon typically only

conducts operations with the SSA at Fort Stewart ensuring units assigned to the installation have the necessary classes of supply to support their operations.

“Day-to-day operations consists of running the warehouse,” Campbell said. “We receive customer’s part off of the trucks, process those parts and then put the parts into customer bins so that they can pick up their parts. So, we’re manage, process and delivering class 2 and 3 items.”

This training allows the Soldiers to train hands-on with equipment outside of the warehouse or the motorpool.

“This is high speed training that these guys can use as 92 Alphas (automated logistical specialist) outside of the warehouse,” Campbell said. “When it comes to loading aircraft, that is not something we get to do a lot and none of my Soldiers have done it before.”

The training was a first for many of the Soldiers involved and allowed them to gain additional skills to support the Division’s operations.

“It was my first time loading the multi-pack pallets from the SSA to the Chinook,” said Spc. Kendall Witherspoon, an automated logistical specialist assigned to Alpha Co. “This is important because if we go to a downrange environment and we have to move our supplies to the next base we will be proficient using a Chinook or sling load.”


The training added an additional logistic support capability to the company which provides a variety of classes of supply to units within the 3rd Inf. Div. and tenant units at Fort Stewart.

“With us having Soldiers in the warehouse that are trained on the air-loading, now the Division has that capability to be able to load a bird and not outsource it because we have the capability right here in the SSA,” Campbell said.

In the future Alpha Co. plans to build on the skills learned from the pallet load training.

“The SSA will continue to build on this training and hopefully continue to conduct high speed training with the CAB (Combat Aviation Brigade) in the future,” Pollack said.

Fasting: an integral part of Lent

I know that we are in the middle of Lent and Easter is coming up in a few weeks, but I have been asked a lot of questions this year about my Lenten disciplines and why I do them.

I started to fast this year and someone asked me if I was on a diet and I quickly answered no – I gave it up for Lent. This person gave me the side-eye and said “sure,” like he questioned my motivation, but I went on to explain myself. Yes fasting has a side benefit for my health, but the main goal for me is to take that time and focus on my personal relationship with God.

If you are not intentionally taking time out each day for God, then you will soon find yourself with no time because other things will naturally fill that void.

In a hectic world, finding time to work on our relationship with God can be difficult. Whether it's work, Family, friends, or any of the myriad ways life distracts us, it is easy to let our spiritual life fall away. Every year on Ash Wednesday, we are invited to seek spiritual growth during the season of Lent. This is a perfect opportunity for us to break from the distractions of life and focus on renewing our spirits in God.

There are multiple ways for engaging a new or renewed spiritual discipline for the season of Lent, and it is never too late to start either.

I like to take a little time to do some self-reflecting and ask God and myself where I need some work. Maybe I need to work on my prayer life, maybe I am
