TF Viking celebrates Native Americans

November is Native American Heritage Month and Native Americans from Task Force Viking shared their cultural history, family traditions, and motivations for military service during a ceremony at Club Stewart, Nov. 7.

Spc. Jeremiah Dedmon, a Navajo, serves with the 5th Squadron, 7th Cavalry Regiment. Dedmon has numerous family members who have served in the military including his father, both grandfathers, and two uncles--one who is currently an active duty Army captain. One of his grandfathers was a Navajo Code Talker in World War II and the Korean War and one was the first Navajo to make the rank of Colonel.

"My Family encouraged me to join the military because of our long history of military service," said Dedmon. "My biggest inspiration is my father who is a cavalry scout like me and served from 1998-2001."

The guest speaker, 1st Lt. Thomas E. Summerbell II is a native of Fallon, Nevada, and the Fallon Paiute-

Shoshone Tribe, serves with 1ABCT. After graduating high school, he enlisted in the Wyoming Army National Guard as a multiple-launch rocket systems operations fire direction specialist. He served five years as an enlisted Soldier. In 2016, he received a commission with the Wyoming Army National Guard as a field artillery officer and earned a bachelor's degree in kinesiology and public health from the University of Wyoming.

Summerbell said that his motivation for joining the Army was to both serve the country and to open up educational and career opportunities for him that were not available in his hometown. Summerbell talked about the traditions of his tribe and the challenges tribes across the country face in preserving their cultural heritage.

"Many tribes have a recurring problem with cultural resiliency," said Summerbell. "Some like my tribe use pre-elementary programs to teach the history and longevity of our cultural knowledge and practices."

Summerbell said that rebuilding their cultural

resilience goes beyond just learning the language and history.

"It's a way young people learn how to integrate into popular society," said Summerbell. "It's also how Native Americans rebuild our economic infrastructure."

One example Summerbell highlighted was the Chitimacha tribe from Louisiana who have partnered with Rosetta Stone and other language-immersion software companies to capture their language and with it many of the traditions of the tribe. The program has been very successful and the language now flourishes throughout their tribe and is included in their education programs.

The Task Force Viking Commander, Lt. Col. Nathan Miller, emphasized the importance of celebrating cultural events while thanking everyone in attendance for participating.

"There are different starting point for all of us but we all come together in uniform," Miller said. "Our diversity is a strength and something to be celebrated."

WWI: Final Allied offensive decides fate of Europe

WASHINGTON -- By mid-September 1918, the French and U.S. armies under the command of Gen. John J. Pershing had achieved victory in a critical campaign, driving back the Germans from the Saint-Mihiel salient.

With that area secured, about 600,000 Americans, along with some 220,000 French and Italian troops, moved 40 miles to the northwest along the bank of the Meuse River in the Meuse-Argonne region of France.

This movement of forces took about two weeks and was confined to the hours of darkness to maintain secrecy, said Brian F. Neumann, a historian who authored the Center of Military History pamphlet: "The U.S. Army in the World War I Era."

The transfer of forces took place without a serious setback, he said. This was largely attributable to the careful supervision of a young staff officer from Pershing's First Army, Col. George C. Marshall. Marshall would later become the Army's chief of staff during World War II.

That large-scale operation, known as the Meuse-Argonne Offensive, lasted right up to the armistice, Nov. 11, 1918. A total of 220 allied divisions participated in the offensive, 42 of which belonged to the American Expeditionary Forces.

IMPOSING DEFENSES

On the east side of the American sector was the unfordable Meuse River with the dense Argonne Forest on the west. The Argonne was on high ground, from which the Germans rained artillery fire on U.S. forces, Neumann said.

Since the Germans had occupied the area for several years, they had developed an elaborate defensive system of four fortified lines featuring a dense network of wire entanglements, machine-gun positions with interlocking fires, and concrete fighting positions. In between the trench lines, the Germans had developed a series of intermediate strong points in the numerous woods and knolls. The defensive system was about 15 miles deep, with five divisions on line and another seven in reserve, Neumann said.

Against this imposing defense, the American First Army's 600,000 men would attack with nine divisions on line and another five in reserve, with III Corps on the east flank, V Corps in the center, and I Corps on the west flank. A total of 2,700 pieces of artillery, 189 tanks, and 821 aircraft supported the American infantrymen, Neumann said.

INITIAL ASSAULT

At 5:30 a.m., Sept. 26, after a three-hour artillery bombardment, the three corps launched their attacks. Despite a heavy fog, the rugged terrain, and the network of barbed wire, the weight of the American onslaught quickly overran the Germans' forward positions. On both flanks, the corps made good progress, he said. In the center, however, the V Corps experienced problems, but nonetheless seized their objective on the following day, he said.

Throughout the remainder of September, First Army slowly plodded forward. Heavy rains on Sept. 27 and 28 bogged down the few tanks that had not already succumbed to mechanical failure. The rains also interfered with the forward movement of the supporting artillery and the resupply efforts as the already congested roads became muddy, he noted.

Moreover, the Germans had used the delay to rush in their reserves, Neumann said. The American advance had become a continuous series of bloody, hard-fought engagements.

FOG OF WAR

Not all of First Army's difficulties came from the enemy or the weather, Neumann said. Of the nine divisions in the initial assault, only three, the 4th, 28th, and 77th, had significant combat experience. The 79th Division, which had the critical mission to take the town of Montfaucon, had been in France for only seven weeks. The heavy fog and rain and the broken terrain exacerbated the situation for the inexperienced troops.

Many divisions suffered from a lack of coordination among their own units and liaison with adjoining and higher units, he continued. Teamwork between the Infantry and their Artillery often proved awkward and ineffective, especially in those divisions that had to rely on Artillery brigades from other divisions because their own brigades were unavailable.

Overcoming these problems, the First Army advanced eight miles into the German lines by the end of September. Remarkably, it had fought through some of the strongest positions on the Western Front and captured 9,000 prisoners and a large amount of war supplies, including 100 guns, Neumann said. With the severity of the fighting and the intermingling of units in the twisted terrain, Pershing had little choice but to pause to reorganize.

Elsewhere on the Western Front, French and British forces had also slowed and then paused to improve their interior lines of communications, Neumann said.

During the first days of October, Pershing took advantage of the pause to rotate three battle-hardened divisions, the 3rd, 32nd and 1st, into the line, relieving some of the less experienced, the 37th, 79th and 35th. As First Army reorganized its line, the Germans also strengthened their position with six new divisions brought into the area, for a total of 11. The numerical odds were beginning to even. At 5:30 a.m., Oct. 4, First Army renewed its attack, but progress was slow and severe, Neumann said.

As new American divisions were rotated into line, the Germans continued their reinforcement efforts as well. By Oct. 6, the Germans had 27 divisions in the area.

On Oct. 14, First Army launched a general assault all along the German lines. By the third week in October, First Army had reached most of the objectives of the first phase of the campaign: penetration of the third German line and clearing of the Argonne Forest, Neumann said.

NORTHERN LINES

With the divisions of First Army fighting in the Meuse-Argonne region, other American divisions were providing crucial assistance to the French and British advances, Neumann said. To the north, two divisions of II Corps continued to support the British advance. The 2nd Division was operating with the French Fourth Army on the First Army's western flank.

On Oct. 10, the 36th Division relieved the 2nd Division and advanced to the Aisne River by Oct. 13, which brought the French Fourth Army on line with the American First Army, Neumann said.

DECENTRALIZED COMMAND

By mid-October, Pershing realized that too much of the operational and tactical direction of the war was concentrated in his hands. As AEF commander, he was the American theater commander responsible for the administration, training, and supplying of the American troops in France, as well as coordination with the other national commanders. In addition, he was the field commander for three corps consisting of 14 divisions in a desperate fight over rough terrain.

In order to better distribute leadership, Pershing assigned corps commanders, Neumann said. Pershing could now focus his attention on the larger strategic issues of theater command.

OBJECTIVES ACHIEVED

Over the remainder of October and early November, the Americans made substantial progress, and by Nov. 4, First Army had elements along the heights overlooking the Meuse River, Neumann said. The Americans had achieved their objective.

Infantry and Artillery coordination was superb. Troops pushed through and around German strong points, while special assault troops reduced them. Improved staff work and coordination afforded First Army the flexibility to bypass German defenses. Unlike former attacks that made strong first-day gains followed by smaller ones, this attack was different. The American units had finally developed into a well-trained, well-organized fighting force, Neumann said.

The Germans had had enough. The fighting ended at the eleventh hour of Nov. 11, 1918, the time the armistice went into effect, ending the Great War.

The Meuse-Argonne Campaign was the greatest battle that the U.S. Army had fought in its history, Neumann concluded. Almost 1.25 million American troops had participated during the course of the 47-day campaign. American casualties were high -- over 117,000 -- but the results were impressive. First Army had driven 43 German divisions back about 30 miles over some of the most difficult terrain and most heavily fortified positions on the Western Front. It had inflicted over 120,000 casualties on the Germans and captured 468 guns.

Memorials help connect to those who fought for us

WASHINGTON -- A century ago on Nov. 11, an armistice was signed to end World War I -- the war to end all wars.

History has shown, though, that conflict did not stop with that agreement. Through the decades, America has fought many other times in support of its ideals.

Some of those wars are memorialized in the National Mall here. At a nearby location, a long-awaited World War I monument is expected to join those memorials in 2021.

Whatever your opinion on war is, those who volunteered or were drafted to defend this nation should still not be forgotten.

Visiting the war memorials that dot the nation's capital, attending a humble parade in any small American town, or just shaking the hand of a veteran can help honor their sacrifice.

In the Vietnam War, one of my uncles was a Marine who patrolled through thick vegetation after it was sprayed with Agent Orange. In 2014, he died from bile duct cancer, believed to be the result of his exposure to the toxic blend of herbicides as well as liver flukes.

During World War II, my late grandfather served as a mechanic for P-51 Mustang fighters that battled in dogfights up in the skies above Europe.

Other family members, including myself, also served honorably.

On this Veterans Day, I felt I owed it to them, and to the countless others who signed up before me, to visit a few of the memorials.

The first living link to the past I met was Ewing Miller at the National World War II Memorial.

Just a month after he turned 95, Miller braved Sunday's chilly weather to speak during a ceremony there.

During the war, Miller served as a B-24 Liberator bomber pilot assigned to the 719th Squadron, which flew missions out of Italy.

Miller, a former U.S. Army Air Force first lieutenant, conducted more than 20 combat missions until February 1945, when his plane was downed by a flak burst. He was the sole survivor.

For the rest of the war, Miller was held as a prisoner of war.

After his speech, Miller and other veterans helped lay wreaths at the memorial. With the assistance of his fourwheeled walker, Miller then posed for photos and chatted with onlookers.

"A day doesn't go by that I don't remember those fellows," he said to me. "But time has dulled their memory and they now have become part of that America that gave their lives from the time of the Revolution.

"The important thing was," he added, "that there is an ideal of America and that's what we strived for."

A short walk away at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, I traced my fingers

across a few names etched into the black granite slabs that bore all U.S. troops killed in the war.

The tactile sensation from the carved out names against my fingers seemed to draw me in closer.

Tommy Lee Stephens ... Bobby L. Weathers ... Charles C. Asselta. I wondered about the lives behind those names. Where did they serve, how did they die, who still missed them?

I then stepped back and watched the other visitors. In front of Panel 38 West of the stone memorial, Donald Fredenburg's face reflected off the mirror-like polished granite.

Dressed in his cavalry hat and medals pinned onto his shirt, the former 1st Cavalry Division sergeant stood quietly and stared at the rows of names.

Moments later, when he began to leave, I asked him why he came to the memorial for Veterans Day.

"I feel that I owe it to my friends who are on this wall over here and to give them the respect that they deserve," said Fredenburg, who lives in Atlanta.

He told me he had served in Hue and lost a few buddies during his tour in 1968-1969. One, in particular, was Cpl. Donald Olsen.

Both men deployed to Vietnam around the same time and were placed in the same platoon. "We kind of paired up," Fredenburg said. "We just hit it off real well."

During one mission, he and Olsen were ordered to investigate a cave possibly used by the enemy in a place called Rocket Ridge. He and Olsen were parallel to each other as they flanked each side of the cave. All of a sudden, a shot rang out.

"Right through the heart and that was it," he recalled of his friend's fatal wound.

"That could have been me on that side. "That's the main reason I come up here."

I then shook his hand and thanked him as he left the memorial. After all, he was one of the reasons I also came here.

Safety Spotlight: Enjoy Thanksgiving safely

Thanksgiving is just around the corner. Many people are looking forward to enjoying a turkey dinner. There are several ways to prepare it and if you're going to use a deep fryer, there are few things to remember before, during and after you fry a turkey.

•Don't buy the bird too early.

If bought fresh, keep it in the refrigerator (40 degrees Fahrenheit or less) and cook within one to two days.

If bought frozen, it takes four to five pounds per day to thaw safely in the refrigerator; for a 12 pounder it will take two and a half to three days in the refrigerator to thaw, then cook within one to two days.

•Smaller birds work best for frying. The turkey should be no larger than 12 pounds. You can fry parts instead, such as breasts, wings or legs. It should be fresh, completely thawed and not stuffed.

•If you bought a frozen turkey and don't have time to thaw it in the refrigerator before the family dinner, use a quick-thaw, water method--submerge the frozen bagged bird in cold tap water, changing the water every 30 minutes so it continues to thaw. Small packages of meat, poultry or seafood — about a pound — may thaw in an hour or less. For whole turkeys, estimate about 30 minutes per pound. So a 12-pound bird will take approximately six hours with this method. Remember, when thawed completely, the food must be cooked immediately.

•When working with large amounts of hot oil, select a cooking vessel large enough to completely submerge the turkey without it spilling over. The oil should cover

the turkey by one to two inches. Select a safe location outdoors for deep fat frying a turkey. Heat the cooking oil to 350 degree. Very slowly and carefully lower the turkey into the hot oil. Monitor the temperature of the oil with a thermometer during cooking. Never leave the hot oil unattended.

•Allow approximately three to five minutes of cook time per pound. When reaching approximate time needed, check to see if the turkey is safely cooked by removing the turkey from the oil, draining the oil from the cavity and with a food thermometer, check the internal temperature of bird. Do not test the temperature while the turkey is submerged in oil. The turkey is safely cooked when the turkey reaches a minimum internal temperature of 165 degrees in the innermost part of the thigh and wing and the thickest part of the breast. If the turkey has not reached 165 degrees in all three locations, then return it to the hot oil for additional cooking. When the turkey reaches 165 degrees, remove it from the oil and place it on a sturdy tray lined with paper towels. The skin can range in color from golden to dark brown to almost black. Let it rest about 20 minutes before carving, to let the juices set.

After dinner, remember to follow the two-hour rule. For safety, do not leave the turkey or other perishable foods sitting out at room temperature longer than two hours. Slice leftover turkey and place in a shallow container and store in the refrigerator for three to four days or freeze for longer storage.

So safely enjoy that southern style deep fried turkey and all the fixings and have a great safe Thanksgiving. For more turkey deep frying safety tips visit the following website www.usda.gov.

CHAPLAIN'S CORNER The standing orders of the Gospel

"Be joyful always; pray continually; give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." **1Thessalonians 5:16-18**

Writing over 100 years ago, Professor James Denney of Scotland called these three commands "the standing orders of the gospel." They are "standing orders" because they always apply to every Christian in every situation. The Greek makes this very clear because these imperatives are all in the present tense. You could translate it "continually rejoice, continually pray, and continually give thanks."

This is a great challenge, isn't it? After all, we would have no problem if the text said, rejoice sometimes, or pray occasionally, or give thanks when you feel like it.

It's the modifiers that trip us up - always, continually and in all circumstances.

Here is a spiritual truth by Dr. Ray Pritchard:

"The real impact of the gospel will be seen when we don't feel joyful, when we don't want to pray, and when we can't think of a reason to be thankful." That's when we discover the truth and power of genuine Christianity. These simple commands reveal the true life-changing power of Jesus Christ. When Jesus enters a life, he changes it from the inside out so that we have both the ability and the desire to rejoice, to pray, and give thanks even in the worst moments of life. It is Christ living in me that accomplishes this – not anything of myself. When I try this on my own, I fail every time. When I depend on Christ, pressing into His power, He sustains me."

I admit that things happen to us (and to our loved ones) that make no sense. Try as we might, we cannot trace God's hand in every circumstance because God paints on a canvas much larger than our tiny vision. How do we give thanks when our hearts are broken? How do we pray when we are so confused? How do we rejoice when we are angry at what sin has done in the world?

Without a doubt, this is not easy, but it is absolutely necessary. As hard as it may be to rejoice always, what is our alternative? To give in to despair and anger? If we refuse to give thanks in every situation, we are virtually saying that we know better than God how to run our lives. By praying when we don't feel like it, we are proclaiming that God's wisdom is greater than ours. We are deliberately placing God at the head of our lives and enabling Him to lead us through the turbulence.

This is the will of God in Christ Jesus for us. These three things will be more clearly seen in the darkness of our pain than the light of things going well. When times are tough, we can still rejoice in God, we can still pray, we still give thanks. When stuff happens, and we do these things, it's affirming to our faith, it enables the power of God to work, and it shows others that we've got the real thing with Jesus.
