Raiders complete FST certification

CAMP HUMPHREYS, Republic of Korea—Forward observers from Company A, 3rd Battalion, 69th Armored Regiment were recognized as the best fire support team in the 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, at the conclusion of the semi-annual fire support team certification held over the last two weeks at Camp Casey, Korea.

The awards ceremony during the first week in July marked the completion of two weeks of training and testing. Forward observers from across the brigade were tested on their technical and tactical knowledge and their ability to implement these tasks in a field environment. Events included the core Soldiering skills like the Army Physical Fitness Test, land navigation, and a tactical ruck march but then transitioned into forward

observer specific tasks like observation post occupation, fire support planning, and call for fire testing.

The team from Co. A, 3-69 Armor was led by 1st Lt. Thomas Summerbell and Sgt. Dustin Smith. Summerbell, from Fallon, Nevada, said the team began training at Fort Stewart in the fall by focusing on the fundamental fire support tasks.

"We started at square one, pulling out the step by step guide on how to do each Mission Essential Task List associated with our mission set," said Summerbell. "We capitalized off of our understanding of the basics and interjected multiple basic building blocks into larger applications."

The experience on the teams competing ranged from senior noncommissioned officer with 15 years in the Army to junior Soldiers on their first overseas tour. Pfc. Ryan Bedell hails from Royal Palm

Beach, Florida and has been in the Army just over a year. For Bedell, the toughest challenge of the competition came from the weather.

"Land navigation was the worst event for me because it was raining and hard to plot points on the map and do everything," said Bedell. "The ground was extremely wet, muddy, and slippery while navigating up and down the steep hills."

The fire support team certification is the first one the brigade has conducted in Korea. The "Raider Brigade" is currently in Korea as the rotational Armored Brigade Combat Team supporting the 2nd Infantry Division. All 13 teams from across the brigade completed the certification.

"The FiST certification is a semi-annual requirement that ensures our fire supporters maintain a high level of readiness," said Maj. Luke Zeck, brigade fire support officer. "This training was conducted to

assess and certify the Soldiers' ability to provide fires to their maneuver companies through physically and intellectually challenging events."

Summerbell said the certification gave him the opportunity to validate the training his team had conducted over the last year.

"I learned a ton about my team, in respect to how goal oriented and driven by competition they are, the type of attitude they possess, and how mindset means everything to team cohesion," said Summerbell. "My fire support NCO was hard on the junior enlisted Soldiers and it was not because he wanted to break them down but rather to build and craft them into lethal fire support personnel."

For Bedell, the competition was a chance to represent his team, company, and battalion.

"Being on the Best Fire Support Team means a lot because it is proof we are the best at our job."

DoDEA goes back to school

ALEXANDRIA, VIRGINIA - More than 21,500 students are beginning the 2018-2019 School Year in Department of the Department of Defense Education Activity schools in the Americas.

DoDEA Americas operates 51 schools in seven states, Puerto Rico, and Cuba. There are two school districts and approximately 4,850 employees. Cyber fitness: Everyone's responsibility

Taking care of our physical self and personal hygiene – working out, eating well, and washing up – is a normal part of our daily lives. If we put the same effort into making sure we're 'in shape' in the cyber world, we could make a big difference in protecting our personal information.

Not too long ago, cybersecurity was considered someone else's problem. But it's not a technological problem, it's a human knowledge problem and a personal responsibility, Servio Medina, acting chief of Cyber Security Division Policy Branch at Defense Health Agency, said.

"[That notion] reflected a time that is behind us [and] needs to be behind us," Medina said, speaking at the Defense Health IT Symposium in Orlando, Florida, on July 25. "We have to acknowledge that a change in one context can impact another context."

While some people receive cyber awareness training as part of their job, not all 9.4 million beneficiaries in the Military Health System do. Cybersecurity goes beyond the workplace and into homes, impacting everything from toys to video game chat rooms to email, and it's important for people of all ages to be 'cyberfit,' as Medina says. The Health and Human Services department refers to this concept as cyber hygiene, and defines it as an individual's health, or security, when conducting all activities online.

Without the right training or knowledge, anyone can accidentally fall victim to cybersecurity problems, or make personal information vulnerable.

"We do want to empower [people] to not unwittingly compromise their own information and their own wellbeing," said Medina. Part of the Military Health System's role in taking care of families is helping them understand how to protect their online presence, he said.

Being cyberfit includes recognizing risky behavior, such as clicking a link in a suspicious email. Simple acts, like walking away from an unlocked computer or not having a passcode on a phone, accounts for more than half of all data breaches according to the Society of Human Resource Professionals. Additional cyberfit tips include:

Avoid phishing. Don't open e-mails or links from an unknown source, and don't reply to requests for personal or medical information.

Being social online also means you're global. Think carefully before posting anything on the internet, and remember social media and websites can be tracked and hacked.

Use caution when using public Wi-Fi. While it's convenient, it's usually unsecure.

Password protecting devices and applications, using reliable malware software, avoiding unsecure networks to share personal information, and avoiding public Wi-Fi networks can help protect personal information. In addition, beneficiaries can protect their health information by using a secure messaging portal through a provider to share health information and carefully checking health care statements to avoid fraud or scams.

Medina said people sometimes need nudges, such as pop-up notifications indicating the security certificate of a website and caution to proceed at risk.

"It takes repeated training, it takes nudges, it takes effective training, but it takes more than that, too," said Medina, believing it takes three months to change a habit, six months to change a behavior, and a year to change a lifestyle.

"It takes us to recognize that most incidents trace back to some sort of behavior," said Medina, referring to a 2015 Department of Defense memo stated roughly 80 percent of cybersecurity breakdowns can be traced back to humans – even after training, said Medina. Most of these cases come down to ignorance, willful neglect, poor judgement, ineffective policy, or criminal intent, he said.

Cybersecurity can dramatically impact the family wellbeing, and when the wellbeing of the family is affected, the readiness of service members and their ability to complete their mission can also be impacted, Medina said.

"It wasn't too long ago that cybersecurity was someone else's problem," said Medina. "We can't have that mindset anymore. Cybersecurity is really, in a way, everybody's responsibility today."

New electronic health record update

Senior Military Health System leaders met at the Defense Health Information Technology Symposium in Orlando, Florida to discuss progress with MHS GENESIS. "We want to continue moving forward [and] we need to continue with our forward momentum," said Vice Adm. Raquel Bono, director of Defense Health Agency. "While acknowledging some areas we have needed to make adjustments, we're progressing forward."

As the deployments continue, feedback from users is critically important, said Bono, adding that input is being processed and measured. Throughout the process, DHA remains committed to ensuring a high level of cybersecurity.

"We have a lot to share with the broader health care community and we are helping to raise the bar in the security environment," said Bono.

Stacy Cummings, program executive officer for Defense Healthcare Management Systems, said the initial operational test and evaluation ended at Madigan Army Medical Center, one of the original IOC sites, July 13.

"There has been measurable success in the adoption of workflows, roles and other efforts to continue to improve performance of MHS GENESIS," said Cummings.

The final test report is expected later this year, with emerging results being evident as soon as this fall. "We'll be working with the test community to get any feedback in real time so we can make sure we're being as responsive as possible, and make sure that there isn't anything coming out of the test that we weren't already aware of and already working on," said Cummings.

Cummings announced the next four sites for MHS GENESIS deployment, which will be known as wave one sites. These include Naval Air Station Lemoore, Travis Air Force Base, and Army Medical Health Clinic Presidio of Monterey in California, as well as Mountain Home Air Force Base in southwestern Idaho.

"The next waves of deployments will be the first facilities to field the standard baseline of MHS GENESIS and will benefit from the results of our optimization period, as well as improvements to our training, deployment, and change management strategy all based on lessons learned from IOC," said Cummings, adding that the Military Health System is committed to identifying and

delivering the right capabilities.

The MHS continues to capture feedback from users at Madigan, just as it did before and during the test period, Cummings said, and experts are already aware and working on feedback. She believes the test at Madigan is going to reinforce lessons learned and the MHS needs to go on to the next site to demonstrate these improvements – including training and deployment strategies, and change management.

Eventually, MHS-GENESIS will provide a single electronic health record for each of the 9.4 million MHS beneficiaries. It will be used by about 200,000 providers at 1,200 sites and has already received some positive feedback from users in the field.

"By far, the greatest way to learn the system is to actually utilize it," said Navy Lt. Cmdr. Dean Kang, pharmacy department head at Naval Hospital Bremerton for about eight months.

Kang was at Camp Pendleton, California, preparing to select orders when he learned Bremerton would be one of the four IOC sites for MHS-GENESIS.

"That was one of the reasons I asked to be assigned here," Kang said. "I was interested in taking on a challenge and being on the front lines of this development. And the pharmacy department is usually tip of the spear in providing patient-centered care."

Kang describes the initial period of MHS-GENESIS at Bremerton as exciting and hectic – and also exhausting. The go-live period coincided with a pharmacy department renovation that doubled the number of service windows from six to 12.

"There was some frustration, of course, because switching to an entirely new electronic health record is expected to have its challenges," Kang said. "But we've taken a very positive approach to this. We're working hard to increase efficiency and identify shortcomings while ensuring patient safety is our top priority. As an IOC site, we feel an inherent responsibility to identify the glitches and work on optimizing the system."

Cummings said it's only fitting, being at DHITS, to recognize the leadership role DoD has in developing and adopting an electronic health record.

"DHA oversees and continues to maintain several ... data management systems that allow us to do our jobs today," said Cummings. "The DoD should be recognized as a leader in the nation in adopting and developing new systems."



“Hounds” fire high angle hell at Stewart

Mortar men from 3rd Battalion, 67th Armor Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, completed their Mortar Training and Evaluation Program certification at Mortar Point Four, Fort Stewart, July 31-Aug. 1.

The combined arms battalion from the Spartan Brigade sent their indirect fire infantrymen and M1064A3 mortar carriers to certify their skills during the three – day training event.

MORTEP evaluates a mortar platoon on all mortar specific tactical tasks and certifies their ability to deliver timely and accurate fires in support of combat operations.

“The training we are conducting this week goes a long way in preparing us for the demands of combat,” said Staff Sgt. Stephen Schenkel, platoon sergeant, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 3-67 Armor. “The missions that we receive here in training are the same that we would receive with troops in combat and it ensures that we are prepared to provide accurate and timely fires for the brigade.”

Training events like these are also an opportunity to introduce newly arrived Soldiers to their equipment, test the proficiencies of a section, and build confidence within crews.

“Our crews are all newly assembled,

so training like this provides us the ability to get hands on and perfect our skills in a live fire setting,” said Schenkel.

Mortars are a valuable combat multiplier for a commander. A platoon’s ability to deliver precision fires is a welcomed asset for 2nd Brigade, expanding its arsenal by delivering munitions of high explosive against personnel and equipment providing both fragmentation and blast effect in addition to smoke used for screening the battlefield.

“The value that an accurate mortar platoon adds to the fight, is hard to measure. Accurate indirect fire produces a demoralizing effect on the enemy and can be achieved by delivering the maximum number of rounds from all the mortars, in the shortest possible time,” said Sgt. Mitchell Colley, fire direction center chief, HHC, 3-67 Armor.

MORTEP provides added value allowing Soldiers to hone their tactical skills and develop their leadership abilities.

“As a young leader, it’s great to be able to get here with my men and train them up using live rounds,” said squad leader Spc. Dominic Guzzo, HHC, 3-67 Armor, 2ABCT.

Live fire certifications enable indirect fire infantrymen to refine their procedures and tactics as the Spartan Brigade continues its transition from an infantry to armored brigade combat team.

DPTMS arms Soldiers with knowledge on antiterrorism

The specialists within the Directorate of Plans, Training, Mobilization and Security are spreading the word of their newly organized resource center, which makes materials on anti-terrorism and preparedness available throughout the year, but especially during Anti-Terrorism Awareness Month this August.

The center is intended to support security awareness within Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield, said Dave Evans, anti-terrorism specialist with DPTMS.

"This is the best concept that we've had in a long, long time," said Randall "Mack" McPherson, installation emergency manager.

More than 80 slots in the center contain posters, handouts, preparedness merchandise and informational materials, McPherson said.

In addition, the DPTMS staff stocked the resource center with cardboard boxes to help Soldiers, Families and installation employees transport all the materials they grab.

Terrorism is an enduring, persistent, worldwide threat to the nation and the forces, according to the U.S. Army Office of the Provost Marshal General. People are the Army's greatest asset and protecting Army communities is a vital responsibility of the Army.

McPherson said the main reason people should arm themselves with information this month on anti-terrorism is, "Because anything can happen."

"You've got to be alert because we're not going to get any warnings," Evans said. "Everybody has got to be situationally aware of what is going on around them."

The resource center was developed to provide unit anti-terrorism officers and emergency management coordinators a year-round resource, but DPTMS welcomes all DOD cardholders.

Evans said DPTMS also conducts AT level II training. This past June, they graduated 41 AT level II officers.

Soldiers in the training are familiarized with AT plans and policies. The ATOs then take the training back to their organizations. Well-ran unit AT programs help those organizations provide a safer and more secure environment for their Soldiers, civilians and Family members, Evans said. This translates into an overall safer and secure installation.

Personnel who visit the center will find information on individual protective measures, emergency preparedness, operational security, computer security, cyber security and anti-terrorism. There is also information on hurricane and severe weather preparedness.

There are even coloring books with crayons for kids to be educated, and to ignite their curiosity about anti-terrorism.

"Be aware, be prepared and say something if you see something," McPherson said.

The resource center will be available year round for newcomers fairs, deployment fairs, Family Readiness Group meetings, and to support annual Anti-Terrorism Level I Awareness Training briefings.

K-9s train with handlers at Fort Stewart

Military working dog handlers with 93rd Military Working Dog Detachment, 385th Military Police Battalion, conducted police dog training at Fort Stewart's George P. Hays Library Aug. 3.

The training prepares military working dogs to operate in different environments and scenarios, said Spc. Christopher Diak, an MWD handler with 93rd MWD.

There are two types of K-9 training the MWDs go through -- patrol and enhanced detection.

MWDs are trained to exercise obedience and controlled aggression when patrolling and detect weapons of mass destruction, improvise explosive devices, and narcotics when searching.

"My dog Alan and I have been working together for the last year and a half," said Diak. "Today Alan will work on basic obedience and controlled aggression. Then he will search the library."

"The MWDs go through four hours of patrol dog skills and four hours of enhanced detection training every week," said Pfc. Jerrold Wilkins, a dog handler with 93rd MWD Det.

Wilkins said the controlled aggression training helps MWDs to chase running suspects and remain aware that the handler is there and still in charge.

Wilkins said, "When you work with a dog it is just like being a noncommissioned officer. Regardless of your rank, you're responsible for someone's life. If my dog is messed up, I'm messed up."

In April, DoDEA rolled-out its five-year strategic plan, the Blueprint for Continuous Improvement. The Blueprint serves as the foundation for all DoDEA's plans and efforts. DoDEA will use the Blueprint as a basis to make improvements across the school system. For more information about the Blueprint, visit: Caution-<https://www.dodea.edu/Blueprint/index.cfm>

DoDEA is implementing college and career ready standards, which support the mobile, military-connected students as they move in and out of DoDEA schools. CCRS provide a consistent, clear understanding of what students are expected to learn, so teachers and parents know what they need to do to help them succeed. The standards are designed to be robust and relevant to the real world, reflecting the knowledge and skills that our young people need for success in college and careers. CCRS is implemented in different phases. This school year, DoDEA will roll out new literacy and science standards for pre-kindergarten to fifth grade as well as a revised business management career pathway as part of career and technical education. This career pathway offers courses in management, business law, business/personal finance, marketing/entrepreneurship, and spreadsheets/ databases. Additionally, DoDEA is launching Choices360, a systemic career and academic online planning tool that will enable students in grades 7-12 to have access to high-quality learning experiences around exploring, planning, and preparing for life after high school. School counselors will implement Choices360 to help students engage in rigorous course planning, understand the college application process, explore college and career options that best fit their interests and goals, apply for college, and find and apply for scholarships.

This school year, there will be four new 21st-century school building openings. The schools are E.A. White Elementary School at Fort Benning; Fort Campbell High School at Fort Campbell, Kentucky; Bolden Elementary and Middles School in Marine Corps Air Station Beaufort, South Carolina; and DeLalio Elementary School in Camp Lejeune, North Carolina.

Last spring, DoDEA transitioned to online standards-based assessments with the administration of the College and Career Ready Standards Summative assessments in mathematics and literacy for certain grades. These CCRS-aligned summative assessments measure student mastery of content standards taught for the grade level and/or course. It was the first year for the new DoDEA CCRS comprehensive assessment. Results will be shared in the fall.

Behind the Scenes Relocation Readiness: Tim Cray

Regardless of whether you are new to the Army, seasoned, a spouse, a parent, or a child relocation readiness can be essential for seamless transitions between duty stations.

Relocation readiness can provide Soldiers and their Families with essential house-hold goods if they are needed during a PCS move.

The relocation readiness program can loan items relating to sleeping or dining preventing families from discomfort in their new homes.

Tim Cray, a relocation readiness specialist, has been working in Army Community Services for more than 15 years.

He has worked in multiple programs such as the mobilization and deployment program, Information and referral and now in relocation.

Cray possesses the rare trait of being unequivocally positive. He spreads an air of alacrity, infecting those around him with cheerfulness. Cray's attitude and customer service help to provide a sense of relief to visiting Soldiers and Families, regardless of the situation they are currently in. He reports that the mission of relocation readiness is to ensure that any issue that a Family or single Soldier faces will be handled.

One of the best memories Cray shared was his time spent in the "Rocky" mascot costume. Rocky is the 3rd Infantry Division mascot and several years ago Cray would dress up as Rocky and support the live action puppet shows that

took place. Cray was featured as the life size Rocky in one of the earlier "Sgt. Rocky Neighborhood" videos which featured Sgt. Rocky meeting the Family Advocacy Bear.

Cray said his favorite part of his current role is seeing the smiles of Soldiers after they have been assisted.

Cray recalled moments when Soldiers or Family members would approach him expressing gratitude and letting him know, how much the program helped bringing relief and joy to their Family.

Cray orks on a team with Linda McKnight, the program manager, Gregory Hinds, and Josephine Edwards - contractors assigned to the relocation program. Together they work together to welcome all the newcomers to Fort Stewart, in the most positive light.

The relocation readiness program also conducts training for Soldiers to become sponsors and spread awareness of the program. Training foccurs daily.

In most situations sponsors are matched with Soldiers who are in similar life situations, to create comradery and a sense of commonality between sponsors and Soldiers.

Raider Brigade Senior NCOs Conduct New ACFT

CAMP HUMPHREYS, Republic of Korea – “After 16 years in the Army, I was so glad to see something like this.”

Those were the words from First Sgt. Fausto Trivino after a demonstration and execution of the new Army Combat Fitness Test during a leadership development program for senior enlisted leaders from the 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, who are in Korea as the rotational brigade supporting the 2nd Infantry Division.

The LPD had been planned before the official Army announcement of the new fitness test, and the event was added by the Raider Brigade Command Sergeant Major, Command Sgt. Maj. Robert Leimer, so that first sergeants and sergeants major could experience, first-hand, the new events and also familiarize themselves with the time and resource challenges in setting up and executing the test at the company and battalion level.

“We want to focus on the new events that our senior enlisted leaders will be training their Soldiers on,” said Leimer.

With only a short amount of time to set up the event, Command Sergeant Major Christopher Williams, 2nd Battalion, 7th Infantry Regiment, faced some unique challenges in ensuring that the equipment was to the standard specified for the new events.

“Resourcing for this event was a bit of a challenge because we don’t have the exact equipment on hand yet, for instance we have 14 pound medicine balls but not 10 pound ones,” said Williams. “We were able to borrow 10 pound medicine balls from the gym though and this won’t be an issue going forward because the Army is providing the required equipment to the battalions.”

The brigade’s first sergeants and sergeants majors met 5:30 a.m. at the football field in front of the brigade headquarters, and teams at each event gave a short brief on the event and then demonstrated the correct execution of each event.

After completing the demonstrations on each lane, the leaders were split into five groups and had 10 minutes to execute each station to standard. While there was not a consensus on which event was the hardest, the events mentioned the most were the 250-meter sprint, drag, and carry and the leg tuck.

“The sprint-drag-carry is the most challenging because it requires you to sprint a 25-meter lane, down and back five times all while performing different tasks and racing against the clock,” said First Sgt. David Pelham. “With this being the first time ever attempting this event, I didn’t have an idea of how to pace myself so I went all out and by the time I hit the 40 kettlebells my legs were feeling it.”

Trivino said that going through the events highlighted how balanced Soldiers will have to be between strength and endurance to be successful on the new test. Trivino,

who is a master fitness trainer, had his favorites from the new test.

“I liked the dead lift and the leg tuck,” said Trivino. “The leg tuck works your arms, abs, core, and legs.”

Pelham agrees that the new test will be a challenge for Soldiers.

“The Army Combat Fitness Test is no joke,” said Pelham. “I think every troop, company, and battery should have their leaders take the ACFT as soon as possible; that way they can see just how demanding it is and so that way they can make the changes necessary to their current PT schedules.”

By October 2020, all Soldiers, regardless of age or gender, will be required to take the new Army Combat Fitness Test and beginning this October, the Army will field the necessary equipment to 60 battalions across the active Army. The Army will then conduct a one-year evaluation to work out how the test will be scored, make adjustments to events as needed and consider the policies required to implement the new test.

Check your Hearing Protection Devices

There was a recent article in the Military Times that reported about the company 3M™ for allegedly selling defective combat arms™ hearing protection devices to the U.S. military. The company settled for 9.1 million dollars. All claims were allegations and no determination of liability were stated. This is followed by a recent recall in their Peltor™ Comtac™ hearing defender headset. Force health protection is an important part of the mission. Good hearing allows for Soldiers to successfully shoot, move and communicate. Below are a few facts in order to keep everyone informed:

Not all Army issued hearing protection devices are defective. Only the 3M™ dual-ended Combat Arms™ earplugs were identified in this article. If you have this specific ear plug (see photo) do not continue to use it.

This specific ear plug is an old generation (version 2). We are now on the fourth generation of this hearing protection device. Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield no longer distributes this version of the Combat Arms™ ear plug. If in need of replacement hearing protection devices, visit the Audie Murphy Soldier Service Center between the hours of 8:45 a.m. and 4 p.m., at building 253, room 1031 and the Army Hearing Program will fit you with a

new set of hearing protection devices. Multiple options are available.

Separate from the Combat Arms™ earplug is the recall of the 3M™ Peltor™ Comtac.™ The headset recall is not a result of defective hearing protection nor sound detection capabilities. The sound localization capabilities (ability to find where the sound is located in your environment), is not functioning as expected due to a wiring issue. This can present greater challenges in field operations. Please call 3M Peltor customer service line at 1-800-328-1667, option No. 2 and then option No. 1 to arrange shipment for repair or replacement at their discretion, or email the company at peltor.comms@mmm.com.

This emphasizes the importance of having your hearing protection devices fit/checked at least annually. This can be done at the time of your annual hearing test or during your annual hearing conservation training. To schedule battalion trainings for Fort Stewart or Hunter Army Airfield units, you can contact the Army Hearing Program at 767-3133 for support.

The Army is loud, most of the weapons we fire and vehicles we travel by are of a noise hazardous level. How do you know if sound is too loud? Sound is dangerous when you have to shout over the background noise to be heard, noise is painful to your ears, noise makes ring-

ing in your ears or you have decreased/muffled hearing for several hours after exposure. If you feel your hearing has been negatively affected by loud noise exposure walk-in to the Audie Murphy Soldier Service Center, building 253, room 1031 and the Army Hearing Program can administer a hearing test. Hours are Monday through Friday 8:45 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Signs of hearing loss may include: Ringing, buzzing, or hissing noises one or more days after exposure; muffled hearing; suddenly having to turn up the volume of the television or radio, and having other Family members complain about the volume levels.

Here at Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield the Army Hearing Program will continue to support Soldiers and inform them of risk and ensure proper equipment is issued.

United Concordia is committed to providing quality outcomes through our network of dental professionals who treat members under both the TRICARE Dental Program (TDP) and Active Duty Dental Program (ADDP). Quality of care concerns for treatment received by a United Concordia network dentist can be addressed by the patient in the following manner:

- Address the incident regarding clinical quality with the treating dentist to provide an opportunity to rectify the concern. If preferred, the patient can request that United Concordia contact the treating dentist for corrective action.
- If the treating dentist does not correct the issue after the initial request, the patient should contact United Concordia to address the concerns.

If desired, the patient can submit a quality of care grievance. This will initiate a formal clinical review of the care received.

- To file an ADDP grievance, submit the online Grievance Form to United Concordia.
- To file a TDP grievance, submit the online Grievance Form to United Concordia.

When a grievance is submitted, United Concordia will investigate the concern, resolve it as appropriate and notify the requestor of the results.
