Tanks fly with Spartan Agoge

The 3rd Combined Arms Battalion, 67th Armor Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, loaded M1A1 tanks and M2A2 Bradley Fighting Vehicles onto the Air Force's C-17 cargo aircraft May 9, at Hunter Army Airfield.

The battalion conducted the airload training as part of a brigade-level validation exercise, known as Spartan Agoge. The exercise validates the execution of certain critical tasks necessary for the brigade to fight and

win.

The Spartan Brigade adopted the word "Agoge" from its historical namesake to describe the training cycle for the Army's 15th armored brigade. "Agoge" is the rigorous training program mandated for all Spartan citizen-soldiers in ancient Greece.

"The purpose of today's exercise is to certify our ability to deploy our equipment from Fort Stewart to any location worldwide," said 1st Lt. Larry Penrod, Platoon Leader of Company B, 3-67 Armor, Penrod continued.

The 15th Air Support Squadron, U.S. Air Force supported 3-67 Armor and instructed

Soldiers on the proper load and secure techniques.

"We spent the day learning to tie down and use the chains properly," explained Pvt. Alexander Popper, a tank driver with Bravo Company, 3-67 Armor.

The exercise concluded with a short flight with the Bradley fighting vehicle and a group of Soldiers from 3-67 Armor. After driving a tank all day, Popper got to experience a different seat.

Popper admitted, "Sitting in the cockpit of the C-17 Globemaster was probably the most fun I've had at Fort Stewart."

Learn about TRICARE options

You can visit several types of providers when you need care, regardless of your TRICARE plan. It's important to understand your provider options because who you see impacts both your out-of-pocket costs and filing a claim. Take command of your health and your TRICARE health care benefit by learning about your provider options.

With TRICARE, a provider is a person, business, hospital or pharmacy that provides health care. At a minimum, TRICARE must authorize and certify all providers. The regional contractors must also verify them. This approval process makes them TRICARE-authorized providers. If you see a provider that isn't TRICARE-authorized, you'll pay the full cost of care (an exception may apply if you experience a life-threatening emergency).

There are two types of TRICARE-authorized providers: network and non-network. The two stateside regional contractors (Humana Military and Health Net Federal Services, LLC) and overseas contractor (International SOS Government Services, Inc.) have established networks of providers. These TRICARE network providers accept payment from TRICARE as the full payment for any covered health care services you get, minus your required out-of-pocket costs, when applicable. They also file claims for you. If overseas, TRICARE network providers are only required to file claims for those in TRICARE Overseas Program (TOP) Prime and TOP Prime Remote, as well as active duty services members on leave or temporary duty.

Veterans reunion comes to Hunter

Veterans from the USS Allen M. Sumner Association honored their fallen with a memorial ceremony at Hunter Army Airfield Chapel May 8, as part of their annual reunion. The Veterans honored their fallen with a wreath, rifle salute, and port call.

The Sumner Association is unique within its own right. In order to be a member of the association the only requirement is to have served on board the retired vessel for one day. This association has been conducting reunions for the past 20 years honoring their fallen.

Frank DiBello, veteran and president for the USS Allen M. Sumner Association, took command in 2000. From that time to present day, the association has been in turbulent seas of sadness and joy.

"When I took charge, we had 40 World War II-Veterans and now we only have four left," said DiBello. "The four that are remaining are no longer ambulatory."

"When we all come together, we tell our stories about our times on the ship and we laugh and even though we have told the same stories it is even funnier than the last," said DiBello with a glint in his eyes.

The USS Sumner has so much historical data preserved on the Web, from the keel (foundation) that made the ship to the last installed urinal complete with model and data from who installed it. None of this would be possible without someone doing the research.

Fredrick Willshaw, a Veteran and creator of the USS Sumner historical website, felt a sense of duty to create the in-depth history of the ship.

"It all started with me trying to

find any information on the internet about the vessel that stole my heart," Willshaw said. "I could not find anything. I decided then that I would do it myself."

Over the years, Willshaw went through archives searching for any documents that pertained to the ship. What started as a simple website with a couple of photos and paragraphs that totaled 300 megabytes has now turned in to a website that contains a gigabyte of history.

"I wanted to create a history of the ship that would last longer than I would and to honor those people who serve that didn't come home," Willshaw said. "I like doing it, it is fun."

Most of the Veteran started their adventure at Mayport, Florida where the USS Sumner called home for most of its career and where 17-year-old, Daniel Barrs, assumed his duty as an apprentice.

"It was a wonderful experience and I loved every minute of it," said Barrs. "It is super seeing all my shipmates again and the stories being brought back to my memory."

Barrs, a Daytona Beach native, served aboard the ship from apprentice to petty officer 1st class and in 1968 he left for another assignment until 1990 he came back home where he retired as a Commander with 32-years served.

DiBello came with a request to come to Hunter Army Airfield.

"Because we have member from the association everywhere in the United States we try to be fair to all our members so we have fair and manageable travel plans," said DiBello. "It was truly an honor for the 3rd Infantry to provide a color guard and firing team to help us honor our own because in the end we are all brothers of the same."

You may also see a non-network provider (also called out-of-network). These providers don't have a signed agreement with the regional contractor. There are two types of non-network providers: participating and nonparticipating. A participating provider accepts payment from TRICARE as the full payment for any covered health care services you get, minus any out-of-pocket costs. They also file claims for you. If overseas, they may file claims for you. Nonparticipating providers provide neither of those services. If stateside, they may charge you up to 15 percent above the TRICARE-allowable charge, which is the maximum amount TRICARE pays for each procedure or service. This is tied by law to Medicare's allowable charges, for services. Outside the U.S. and U.S. territories, there may be no limit to the amount that nonparticipating providers may bill, and you're responsible for paying any amount that exceeds the TRICARE-allowable charge. If you visit a nonparticipating provider, you may have to pay the provider first and file a claim for reimbursement later.

If you're enrolled in a TRICARE Prime option, your primary care manager and specialty care providers will likely be a military hospital or clinic, or

a civilian network provider. To see civilian specialists or non-network providers, you'll need prior authorization from your regional contractor or you'll pay more out of pocket under the point-of-service option. With TRICARE Select, you manage your own health care and may get care from any TRICARE-authorized provider. An authorized provider is any individual, institution/organization, or supplier that is licensed by a state, accredited by national organization, or meets other standards of the medical community, and is certified to provide benefits under TRICARE. There are two types of TRICARE-authorized providers: Network and Non-Network. you choose without a referral. You still may need prior authorization for some services. Your out-of-pocket costs vary based on the type of provider you see.

When you seek care, you have choices. Knowing which type of provider is best suited for the type of care you need and your coverage will help you save money. It will also allow you to take advantage of your full benefit.

TRICARE Scam alert (PII)

We wanted to let you know that there may be another telephone scam escalating that is targeting TRICARE beneficiaries. Someone is calling and asking them to verify their Personal Identifiable Information so they can send them a free cancer screening kit. Volunteers at local equine rescue heal through care, love

Chief Warrant Officer 2 David Gibson, a counterfire officer with 1st Battalion, 9th Field Artillery Regiment, 3rd Infantry Division Artillery pulls into Second Chances Equine Rescue, Inc., in his blue truck after attending a 5 p.m. officer meeting.

He and his wife Melanie, as well as several other 3rd ID Soldiers, visit Second Chances Equine Rescue, Inc., a non-profit organization in the state of Georgia, at least four times a week and dedicate their evenings to horses in need of care and attention.

The organization was founded in August 2013 by Andrea Doolittle, a U.S. Air Force veteran after she saved two horses from being sent to a slaughterhouse.

Doolittle, through the organization, has since given a home, if even temporary, to a total of 178 horses to date.

The mission is to assist and educate horse owners, rehome, rescue, rehabilitate, adopt or offer sanctuary to horses in need, Doolittle said.

Gibson, along with other volunteers, helps the rescue by spending time with the horses, feeding and cleaning them, performing property maintenance and ensuring they get proper exercise.

"We love it out here," Gibson said. "It's amazing how much these horses just want to be loved. It's the coolest place around, I think."

Melanie said she suffered from crippling migraines, but after coming to the rescue on a regular basis, her headaches have disappeared. She has a special fondness for the burros – small donkeys – that also reside on the property.

"Our main goal is to save as many babies (horses) as possible, but if we can save a few humans along the way, let's do that," Doolittle said.

The organization receives help from a constant rotation of military volunteers, but due to deployments, permanent changes of duty station, and extensive leave days, they are always seeking more help, Doolittle said.

"We're okay with (the rotation of volunteers) because that means we get to help more. We get to love more and we get to meet more," Doolittle said. "It just works."

Each volunteer has their favorite horse, based on their different personalities, but each horse is cared for based on their specific need, Doolittle said.

"It is an experience being in the field with the horses," Gibson said.

Spc. Nicole Stanford, 10th Engineer Battalion, 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd ID, said she has been volunteering with the horses for two years and even brings her 3-month-old daughter, Amelia.

"I'm addicted to this place," Stanford said. "It's an amazing feeling when you go to these creatures, and you're having a down day – they feel it."

Stanford has her top four favorite horses, but has genuinely bonded with a horse named Nick, who she said is a sweetheart.

"It is an absolute stress reliever," Stanford said. "Everyone is broken in their own way – whether it is the horses or us – but we heal each other."

Doolittle said she is giving second chances to not only her horses but to the Soldiers as well.

"Everybody can give love, and the horses will give it right back to you," Doolittle said. "We give (the horses) the time they need; we give people the time they need. It has a purpose, and it all meshes together rather well."

ARNG since 2009.

As the Army National Guard focuses on increased individual and collective training through the ARNG 4.0 readiness concept, the 48th Infantry Brigade Combat Team, headquartered in Macon, Georgia led the charge into the training area known as “The box” to conduct full spectrum progressions of their combat capabilities. These evolutions are needed to certify the organization for near-term deployment requirements.

“It’s important for our unit to take advantage of the training opportunities afforded to it,” said Georgia Army National Guard Commander, Brigadier General Randall Simmons Jr. “There is no better training opportunity on the planet than a collective training readiness center like JRTC.”

Commanders and staff primaries spent over a year planning the logistics of the operation by way of meetings, visits, and phone calls with on-post coordinators. While Ga. ARNG’s cycle at Fort Polk spans almost the entire month, the actual evaluation phase lasts only a few weeks. The weeks before and after are necessary to move thousands of personnel, hundreds of vehicles, and a massive array of equipment and personal gear.

The middle weeks that Soldiers spend in the dirt, wearing Multiple Integrated Laser Engagement System halos and harnesses, challenges the participants to react and make decisions under pressure in specialized scenarios. The unique events within the storyline require the rotational training unit to work with role players that vary from local villagers to ambassadors of foreign lands. They conduct all of this under the watchful eye of observer controller-trainers, who provide feedback and mentorship during and after the rotation is completed.

“We want the brigade to show improve-

ment from day one to the last training day,” said Simmons. “We want them to get better. They’ll have many reps of training through this rotation and build on their competencies which will give them much more confidence going forward”

The lessons learned from this exercise will be packaged up as after action reviews and built upon as the brigade moves closer to a deployment timeline. Everyone from the newest junior Guardsmen to the most seasoned leaders will have opportunities for growth as they respond to high stress decision making processes and tactical battles with enemy opposition forces, played by visiting National Guard members from other states.

While the 48th IBCT is ultimately the brigade conducting the rotation, a number of support elements to include those from 648th Maneuver Enhancement Brigade, headquartered in Columbus, Ga., provide administrative, logistical, and operational support to the Soldiers conducting mission scenarios within the training area.

“The big challenge is that we are bringing not only my Soldiers here, but Soldiers from the brigade and other units across the state,” said Lt. Col. John Lowe, commander of the 348th Brigade Support Battalion, Ellenwood, Georgia. “We’re spread all across the post, so we’re not all physically located together.”

Lowe also expressed his appreciation for the way his Soldiers gelled quickly to make the rotational support a success. “They’ve come in, and they’ve had a great attitude,” said Lowe. “It was pretty seamless.”

The 48th IBCT was partnered with the active Army through the Associated Unit Pilot program in 2016, task organizing with the 3rd Infantry Division located in Fort Stewart. Throughout the last two years, the brigade has conducted a number of training exercises with the division and is now being evaluated and certified as a ready brigade that can be deployed to support 3rd ID combatant commanders during future overseas contingencies.

“The world is a very dangerous place and the threats that face our nation are real,” said Simmons. “If we are called in the future to do something, rotations like this and training opportunities like this will help our Soldiers be more lethal and more survivable on the battlefield.”







Safety Spotlight

Think safety through preventive maintenance, use of proper PPE

Most vehicle and equipment operators appreciate their mechanics, especially when vehicles and equipment are not operating at its best. Mechanics keep our vehicles and other equipment up and running; however, not many people consider the all hazards they must cope with on a daily basis while performing their job.

First and foremost, it is imperative that mechanics arrive to work well rested and alert, in efforts to avoid accidents and injuries due to declining cognitive ability particularly judgment and decision-making ability. That being said, you should apply these tips even in your garage or workshop at your house; always remembering safety is everyone's job.

Maintenance is one of the Army's top five injury producing activities. While the most serious (fatal) maintenance-related injuries occur when Soldiers are pinned between or crushed under equipment; burned during fuel handling operations; or electrocuted while conducting maintenance operations. A majority of maintenance-related injuries occur

when Soldiers:

- Slip or fall from a vehicle or other elevation.
- Are caught between or struck by a vehicle hood, hatch, door, or ramp.
- Have hands or fingers are struck by moving parts (i.e., fan blades, belts, etc.).
- Are struck in the face or eyes by debris, fluid, metal chips or other objects.
- Lose their grip on objects or use improper lifting techniques.

To minimize these types of injuries:

- Make available and enforce the use of appropriate personal protective equipment to include safety goggles, face shields, and gloves. Require Soldiers wear safety goggles anytime they are conducting maintenance or are in the maintenance shop or motor pool.
- Ensure areas are clear of obstructions and hazards.
- Make work platforms available when possible.
- When feasible, have personnel use fall protection when working at heights above six feet.
- Remind personnel to use safety pins and devices that secure hoods, hatches, doors, and ramps.
- Stress the importance of situational awareness and communication between crewmembers.

- Institute procedures similar to lockout/tag - out for operations involving hazardous machinery and emphasize the need for clear and concise communication between work crewmembers.
- Conduct spot checks to ensure appropriate guards and barriers are in place, and equipment is properly grounded.
- Never allow personnel to stand directly behind a moving vehicle or position themselves where they could be pinned or crushed.
- Ensure all personnel follow the procedures outlined in the technical manuals and standard operating procedures.
- Promote a positive safety climate by developing metrics that measure positive, proactive safety behavior and instituting a challenging but attainable awards program.
- Keeping up with equipment safety issues is important. You can access important safety messages and alerts through the Army electronic product support site. Additionally, know who your local logistics assistance representative is, so that you can contact them regarding equipment concerns or questions.

Forward Support Companies Ensure Mission Readiness

BAGRAM AIRFIELD, Afghanistan - Throughout Afghanistan, companies of Soldiers from a variety of occupational specialties come together to provide sustainment operations in hazardous locations. They ensure mission readiness for forward operating bases in Afghanistan and without them the larger mission could not be accomplished.

Soldiers in the FSC come a variety of occupational specialties and backgrounds.

"We have personnel there running multiple missions consisting of airfield operations, refueling operations, forklift operations, Tactical Water Purification Systems, or water purification operations, and many more missions," Capt. Kevin Bane, the Juliet Forward Support Company commander, 1-41 Infantry Battalion

Currently, J FSC is providing assistance for the 1st Security Forces Assistance Brigade (SFAB) with operations at the Tarin Kowt Airfield.

"For this deployment, we have a very unique mission," said Bane. "United States Forces-Afghanistan, or big Army officials, selected [a small group] of FSCs and strategically placed them around theater."

These support companies are expanding smaller bases around the country to support the SFAB. Meanwhile, on the other side of the country, Soldiers with the Camp Dahlke West (DW) FSC ensure mission accomplishment by providing all aspects of sustainment on the camp.

A company of approximately 30 Soldiers provides sustainment operations for Dahlke West. This area of the camp hosts various units, including the SFAB and a cavalry unit, and a myriad of contractors, who all depend on the FSC for movement of equipment.

They mainly focus on moving cargo and providing water support, construction material and subsistence management and pick-up and deliver sling loads from the flight line, said Capt. Amar Arias, the DW FSC commander, 704th BSB. "I don't think there is anything too big or too small that we can't do. We'll go ahead and do it to the best of our ability."

As Dahlke's population continues to grow, a large part of the company's mission is increasing force protection around the base.

Arias said if you look at Dahlke compared to a couple of months ago, you would see a drastically different base. He said even though the reorganization is still in process, spaces such as the expanded flight line, hardened buildings and living quarters demonstrate an FSC's power of change.

"When we got here there was not much built. And so, in a month and a half, everything has been expanded rapidly," said Arias. "My intent, since we got here, was to be value added."

He said that their team will do whatever it takes to give units the support they require.

The team consists of a hodge-podge of military occupational specialties including water treatment specialists, generator mechanics and cooks. While their specialties may lie elsewhere, these Soldiers rose to the challenge to operate a comprehensive support company. Arias said their varied MOSs would provide a range of logistical support to support Dahlke's expansion.

"It's like building a plane while it's in the air," said Sgt. 1st Class Julio Lobato, non-commissioned officer in charge of DW FSC. "We've got a great group of Soldiers working outside of their comfort zone."

This is true for J FSC as well. Bane said that their light infantry brigade had none of the equipment or training on airfield refueling operations prior to deploying. Much like the DW FSC, his Soldiers had to learn their job on the fly.

"[Tarin Kowt's] lifeline lays with proper handling and maneuvering of the forklift," Bane said. "Our Soldiers and NCOs up at TK also had a week to learn this and, not only that, learn this skill set in the dark under night vision goggles while the blades of a [Boeing CH-47 Chinook] are turning feet above their heads."

By providing sustainment operations to austere bases, support companies ensure our military forces and coalition partners have the proper training and equipment needed for a successful mission.

The Fort Stewart "Rockets", a child and youth services track team, competed in the Georgia Recreation and Park Association Track and Field State Championship, May 5, in Commerce, Georgia.

The track team consists of military dependents between the ages of 7 to 14 who love to run.

With the help of a few active duty Soldiers who volunteered to be coaches, the Rockets were able to take home five state titles.

1st Sgt. Isaiah Taylor, first sergeant of Company E, 703rd Brigade Support Battalion, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, is head coach of the track team.

After a long day of working with Soldiers, Taylor said he spends his evenings educating kids about running techniques and teaching them how to recover after a good run.

"I've spent years running in high school, college and on club teams," said Taylor. "My love for the sport is what made me want to coach. I just want to share my knowledge with the kids."

Sharice Alston, an ophthalmologist at Winn Army Community Hospital at Fort Stewart, Georgia, and team mom said she noticed her son had an appreciation for the sport when he was only four years old.

"His dream is to run in the Olympics, and my job as a mom is to help him achieve his dreams," Sharice said. "He watches videos about Olympic runners and references their training techniques. He applies them in practice and races his friends for motivation."

Sgt. 1st Class Timothy Alston, a culinary specialist from 703rd BSB, 2nd ABCT and assistant coach of the Rockets said he uses coaching his son's team as an opportunity to spend time together when he is not deployed or in the field.

"This has helped the relationship between me and my son because it's something he enjoys doing," said Timothy. "When he sees me there with him every step of the way - through the wins and losses, it helps create a bond that he will never forget."

Keeping in mind that members of the team are young, the coaches said they encourage the young athletes to give it their all at each practice and meet.

"The coaches really care for the kids and they make them work hard," Sharice said. "Their passion pushes off on the kids and the kids return the same energy."

Many of the athletes on the team have the same ambition as the Alston's son. The coaches said the children run nearly four miles each practice and most of them view practice as an incentive.

"My parents are very strict on me about my grades," said Tilman Smithbey, a member of the team. "If I don't get honor roll, I'm not allowed to run or practice. My goal is to be the fastest 9 to 10-year-old boy in all the races I do."

The Rockets are now preparing to take 30 runners to compete in nationals at the ESPN Wide World of Sports Complex in Orlando, Florida in July.


