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Army surveys privatized housing satisfaction

WASHINGTON -- The Army will conduct a Residential Communities Initiative resident satisfaction survey April 23 through May 24 to gather feedback about life in privatized housing.

An online survey link will be emailed April 23 to more than 80,000 residents living in privatized family and unaccompanied housing at 49 locations. Completing the survey takes about 10 minutes. Residents have 30 days to complete the survey.

Army family and unaccompanied housing residents can rate their satisfaction with services, property and the overall housing experience through the online survey. Feedback plays an important role in helping the Army maintain a high quality of life for Soldiers and families.

Army housing officials expect to announce survey results by July. Survey results will guide the decisions the Army makes today about future housing and will effect generations of Soldiers and families.

"We are committed to improving your housing experience," said Lt. Gen. Gwen Bingham, the Assistant Chief of Staff for Installation Management.

"Feedback concerning your experience is very important to us. The information residents provide annually continues to guide the Army and RCI companies in future improvements to our privatized housing facilities and services, thus providing a better quality of life for all residents and families." The Assistant Chief of Staff for Installation Management, the sponsor of the survey, provides program oversight and expertise for services and installation infrastructure to enable Total Army readiness.

Privatized housing residents who do not receive the survey notice email should contact their local housing offices. CEL & Associates is the company conducting the resident satisfaction survey for privatized residential communities across Army installations.

Using the Congressional Military Housing Privatization Initiatives Authorities of 1996, the Residential Communities Initiative was established as the Army's public-private venture to privatize housing on Army installations. Privatized housing comprises 98 percent of the Army's family housing inventory in the United States.

Fort Carson was the first installation to convert to privatized housing in November 1999.



Glory's Guns welcomes 41 new NCOs

1st Battalion, 41st Field Artillery Regiment, 1st Armor Brigade Combat Team "Glory's Guns" formally inducted 41 sergeants to the corps of non-commissioned officers April 18 at Club Stewart.

The ceremony was held to honor the past and present non-commissioned officers and highlight the distinction of the corps of non-commissioned officers throughout the Army.

Command Sgt. Maj. Rickey G. Jackson, 1-41 senior enlisted leader, hosted the ceremony. Jackson emphasized the role of the NCO induction ceremony traditions and said that past, present, and future leaders should never forget the importance of the corps of non-commissioned officers.

"The importance of recognizing the transition from just one of the guys or gals to a non-commissioned officer should be shared among the superiors, peers, and Soldiers of the newly promoted," said Jackson.

Jackson enlisted in the Army in 1995 and was recently selected to be the 1st Infantry Division Artillery Command Sergeant Major. Jackson said his main piece of advice for the new sergeants is to remember the responsibility they have towards their junior Soldiers.

"It's important to know they will be

charged with leading America's men and women through everyday life as a Soldier," said Jackson.

America's non-commissioned officers can trace their roots back to colonial America. Baron Frederick von Steuben established the standards for selecting and promoting colonial Soldiers to sergeant through the regimental commander. This four-part process is still honored today, however, we no longer require the exchange of goods, but we do require the exchange of knowledge and recognition of this promotion to sergeant in front of their peers.

Sgt. Quinton Gundolf, a fire support specialist from the 1st Battalion, 64th Armor Regiment, attached to 1st Battalion, 41st Field Artillery Regiment, was one of the newly inducted sergeants.

"It feels good to have something to symbolize the transition from a Soldier to a non-commissioned officer," said Gundolf. "It's a good feeling to know I am a leader and I can have a positive impact on Soldiers and guide them through life."

The crown jewel of the ceremony is when the inductees walk through the chevron laden arches and under the swords to cement the right of passage into the corps of the non-commissioned offi-

cers.

Once all the inductees walked through the arches, the ceremony was made official with the reciting of the Creed of the

Non-Commissioned Officer. This act formally welcomed them to the corps and affirmed that they are now officially part of the backbone of the Army.

Army makes big changes to centralized promotion board system

WASHINGTON -- The Army is revising its centralized promotion board processes to deliver "the right person, at the right job, at the right time," according to Army G-1 officials.

The Army will spend the next three to four years implementing an improved merit-based promotion system, said retired Sgt. Maj. Gerald Purcell, personnel policy integrator for NCO professional development with Army G-1.

The effort centers on a transition from time-based to merit-based policies and practices. Further, the change ensures that the best-qualified Soldier will be the first one eligible for promotion, Purcell said.

Soldiers in the active component and those serving in an Active Guard Reserve capacity will be impacted by the change.

"This is the first major overhaul to our enlisted centralized promotion board in the 50 years we've conducted them," said Sgt. Maj. of the Army Dan Dailey. "We will see a number of benefits with these changes, but the most important one will be the impact to readiness."

"We will retain our most talented NCOs, and better project force structure requirements by promoting the right people at the right time," he added.

Changing history

Two years ago, Sgt. Maj. of the Army Daniel A. Dailey sought to change the Army's centralized section board process, Purcell said.

"This change now truly rewards the most qualified Soldiers who are seeking advancement instead of simply promoting people based on seniority," Dailey said.

Dating back to 1969, centralization was designed to fill the Army's ranks with qualified Soldiers, provide guidelines for career progression, and attract and retain high-caliber personnel, according to Human Resources Command officials.

Under the current system, HRC could "forecast" the Army's force

structure by anticipating the number of Soldiers leaving the force in all grades and career fields -- sometimes 24 months in advance, Purcell added.

Long-range projections, however, failed to be an effective means to react to emerging requirements. The Army would have to wait for a new promotion cycle to identify and allocate additional personnel, he said.

Reductions or changes to the Army's force structure would result in a surplus of promotable Soldiers, Purcell added. Under the current system, if a Soldier was in good standing and identified as promotable -- annotated by a "P" status from HRC -- the force was required to promote.

"From a readiness perspective, we are creating a process that reacts to emerging requirements, and it stops us from creating skill and grade imbalances. It produces an environment where there is no promotion stagnation ... or we are forced to separate people because they are in excess to requirements," Purcell said.

Merit-based promotion

The original promotion system now generates an order of merit list, or OML, which is used to select Soldiers for promotion. The number of Soldiers promoted relied heavily on the Army's annually-projected force structure rate, Purcell said.

After the Army selected a Soldier for promotion, HRC would assign them a promotion-sequence number. The force would determine this number by a Soldier's seniority -- their time in grade, time in service, and date of birth, Purcell said.

"If the best candidate happens to be sequence No. 400 out of 500, based on time and grade -- that's not rewarding and recognizing talent," he said.

The transition to a new promotion system starts this fiscal year, with the master sergeant promotion board, he added, by changing how sequence numbers are informed by OML standings.

Eventually, under the revised system, the Army will conduct annual reviews of the NCO corps and maintain an OML for each grade and military occupational specialty, Purcell

said, adding the OML will no longer be used to generate an annual promotion list.

Instead, the OML will evaluate the force and determine Soldiers who are "fully-qualified" to promote. From there, the Army will employ a merit-based rating system to order the OML sequentially.

"The vast majority of the NCOs are, in fact, fully qualified to promote," Purcell said. "Fully qualified is a retention standard -- it's not about promotion."

"I could have an OML of a thousand individuals, and 990 could be fully qualified," he added. "The promotion demand might be 40. In this case, the best 40 records ... would be identified [for] promotion."

In turn, the Army will now be able to manage its talent better, subsequently

improving professionalism and leadership development throughout the NCO corps, Purcell said. Further, the Army will use the OML to inform assignment decisions, such as crucial development and career broadening opportunities.

"We are calling this a talent management effort," he said.

Additionally, Soldiers will have access to their OML standing by grade, career progression, and MOS through the Army Career Tracker website, Purcell said. This change should be available in the next few months.

"It will be a private and secure automated link from the Army to the individual, and no one else will have access to it," Purcell said. "Soldiers can go into the Army Career Tracker and can share that information with a mentor or a leader if they so choose, but they're not required."

Army approves military general officer exchange, French Brig. Gen. Couttereau comes to Stewart

WASHINGTON -- The Department of the Army approved its first reciprocal General Officer military exchange with France, the Service announced today.

The exchange is part of the U.S. Army's Military Personnel Exchange Program. The program is designed to strengthen bonds of friendship, understanding, and interoperability between the countries and their respective military organizations.

Army Brig. Gen. Todd Wasmund and French Brig. Gen. Hubert Couttereau of France's Land Forces were selected to participate in this first Army reciprocal General Officer exchange between the two countries.

Wasmund's assignment will be as the Deputy Commanding General of France's 3rd Armoured Division, headquartered in Marseilles. The assignment will begin early 2020. Currently, Wasmund is

the Deputy Commanding General for Support of the U.S. 1st Infantry Division.

Couttereau will begin his assignment as Deputy Commanding General for Readiness of the U.S. 3rd Infantry Division at Fort Stewart, in the summer of 2019.

Typically, MPEP assignments will be from two to three years in length.

This MPEP with the French Army is only the second such reciprocal, General Officer for General Officer, exchange the U.S. Army currently has in place. The U.S. Army established its first reciprocal General Officer MPEP exchange with the United Kingdom in September 2015.

The MPEP program directly supports the Secretary of the Army priority "Allies and Partners." The goal of this priority is to optimize the Army's interoperability with our allies and partners to strengthen alliances and deliver more effective coalition operations.

WASHINGTON -- Soldiers with over 16 years of service who want to transfer their Post-9/11 GI Bill to a dependent must do so before July 12, or risk losing the ability to transfer education benefits.

Last year, the Department of Defense implemented a new Post-9/11 GI Bill Transfer of Education Benefits, or TEB, eligibility requirement, which instituted a "six- to 16-year cutoff rule," said Master Sgt. Gerardo T. Godinez, senior Army retention operations NCO with Army G-1.

Further, Soldiers who want to transfer their education entitlement must have at least six years of service, he said. All Soldiers must commit to an additional four years of service to transfer their GI Bill.

However, Soldiers who are currently going through the medical evaluation board process cannot transfer GI Bill benefits until they are found fit

for duty under the new DOD policy.

"For Purple Heart recipients, [all] these rules do not apply," Godinez said.

Prior to the new policy, there were no restrictions on when a Soldier could transfer their education benefits.

Since 2009, over 1 million Soldiers have transferred their GI Bill benefits, Godinez said.

"To transfer their GI Bill, Soldiers have to go into milConnect website, login with their common access card, then select the tab there that talks about the transfer education benefits," Godinez said.

If a Soldier needs additional help, they can visit their installation's service and career, or education counselors. In July, the new rules will be in effect and those Soldiers with more than 16 years of service will not be eligible to transfer education benefits.

"Soldiers need to [review this benefit] to make an educated decision," he said.

McPherson said, although people should be prepared for emergencies year-round, hurricane season is just around the corner, June through November.

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
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Army launches housing registry for health, safety concerns

ABERDEEN PROVING GROUND, Maryland -- The U.S. Army Medical Command is establishing a Housing Environmental Health Response Registry to address housing health or safety concerns of current or former Army housing residents.

The registry will allow the Army Public Health Center to provide current or former residents information on environmental health hazards, assist them in seeking medical care for any housing related illnesses or concerns, and serve as a two-way exchange of information for all potential enrollees.

Initially the housing registry is intended for on-post residents who submitted work orders that met the life, health or safety conditions.

For example, call if you have a work-order for mold, lead-based paint, lead in your drinking water, asbestos or radon. To enroll in the registry, call the toll-free hotline at 1-800-984-8523. The registry will be manned 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Additionally you can

call 210-295-3700.

"We have a team of trained professionals standing by to assist all callers," said John Resta, director of the U.S. Army Public Health Center and acting deputy chief of staff of Public Health for the U.S. Army Medical Command. "They will document the caller's concerns and assist them with access to medical care if needed as well as referring any housing related concerns to the appropriate installation Department of Public Works. We want to hear all concerns so we can make sure they are properly addressed."

APHC provides continuously updated online health information and resources on mold and lead for service members, families, civilians, contractors and healthcare providers. The information includes background information on how these hazards can be introduced into the environment as well as strategies for prevention.

Fort Stewart opens Medical Simulation Training Center

The command teams for the 3rd Infantry Division, U.S. Army Garrison Fort Stewart and the U.S. Army Medical Department Activity-Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield, Winn Army Community Hospital held a ribbon cutting ceremony for the grand opening of the Medical Simulation Training Center at Fort Stewart, April 18.

The MSTC is a state-of-the-art facility equipped with high-definition medical training aids that will provide both medical and non-medical Soldiers across Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield with innovative and realistic life-saving techniques both on and off the battlefield.

Winn ACH Commander, Col. Michelle Munroe said that while the old location of the MSTC was sufficient enough, the new location and added space will afford instructors a more conducive environment for the training.

“Medical simulations have been a part of healthcare operations for a long time,” said Winn ACH Commander, Col. Michelle Munroe. “The opening of this new MSTC is incredible, because it’s in a 19,000 square-foot space.”

Munroe said the value the MSTC brings to Fort Stewart as a force multiplier on the battlefield.

The MSTC delivers comprehensive training in several formats – the classroom setting, practical hands-on training, simulation, distance learning and trauma

lanes.

While combat medics and other personnel in medical military occupational specialties will be the primary users for the MSTC, it will offer an advanced and unique training experience for non-medical Soldiers during basic and combat life-savers courses.

Classrooms in the MSTC are filled with dummies with art wound replicas, advanced technologies that allow the training aids to mirror that of the human body when an injury is sustained. This allows for optimal performance in military casualty lane training and battle drills.

Sgt. Natalia Howard, a combat medic with the 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team and recent Expert Field Medical Badge recipient, said the type of training offered at the MSTC is the exact reason she decided to enlist as a combat medic.

“As medics, we are here to make sure those on the frontline of battle – the infantry, the scouts, other combat arms – are taken care of,” said Howard. “Training like this keeps up prepared to take on that skill.”

Command Sgt. Major Michael Coffey, the 3rd Infantry Division command sergeant major, said facilities like the MSTC enhance unit readiness – the cornerstone of priority for the Marne Division.

Coffey said the real-world scenario based training

Dogface and Fort Stewart Soldiers will receive at the MSTC is like no other. He concluded that the Soldier is the most valuable asset of the 3rd ID and the Army and the MSTC will not only add to the overall readiness but more importantly, will help save lives.

Staff Sgt. Marc Stringer, the MSTC course coordinator, echoed Coffey’s sentiments.

“We give Soldiers, even if they are not medical personnel, quality training that simulates battlefield conditions so that they can save more lives and bring Soldiers back home to their Families,” said Stringer.

On the other hand, if Soldiers perform subpar and are unable to become fully qualified in their respected rank, the revised promotion system will provide them with a notice, Purcell said.

The first time a Soldier fails to become fully qualified, HRC will advise him or her that continued service may be at risk, he said.

Once a Soldier is found "not fully qualified" by a board a second time in the same grade, then the Army denies continued service. The Army will establish a mandatory separation, six months into the future.

If a Soldier is eligible for retirement, he or she will be allowed to retire, Purcell said. If ineligible for retirement, the Army will opt to separate the Soldier involuntarily.

This system is slated to be implemented by fiscal year 2021.

"There is a place for everybody in the Army as long as you are performing," he said. "At the point when it is determined that you are not contributing to the team and essentially drawing a paycheck, then we're going to inform you that your service is at risk. If it continues ... then we are going to tell you your tenure with the Army is over. This sets conditions to eliminate archaic time-based retention control points."

Monthly Promotions

Slated for fiscal 2021, the Army will post a 90-day promotion forecast for all NCO promotions, from sergeant to sergeant major, and implement a monthly-promotion selection process.

If a Soldier is fully qualified to promote by completing their mandatory professional military education -- and in good standing with the Army -- they can monitor these quarterly-promotion windows through the HRC website. Based on their OML standing, a Soldier can then estimate their date of promotion.

Further, HRC intends to announce the names of all Soldiers selected for promotion on the 15th of each month, with an "effective promotion date" on the first day of the following month,

Purcell said. Announcing on the 15th will give Soldiers a two-week notice of their promotion selection.

Likewise, the biggest challenge will stem from the cultural shift created by the revised promotion system.

"In the past, when a Soldier was selected they were considered 'promotable,' assigned a sequence number, and waited to get promoted," he said. "Now, a Soldier's promotion will be based on their OML standing and needs of the Army."

Distributed Leaders Course

To be eligible for promotion, Soldiers are required to complete the Distributed Leaders Course, Purcell said.

In the past, some Soldiers did not finish the online course before a board convenes. Currently, there is a Department of the Army policy to suspend promotion eligibility for specialists and sergeants who fail to complete this mandatory DLC training, he said.

By fiscal 2021, the Army will expand this policy to all applicable ranks through master sergeant.

Three-Phased Approach

Over the next three years, the Army is projected to implement its revised centralized promotion system. Below is a list of milestones the Army hopes to attain:

FY 2019

- Integrate merit-based promotion sequence numbers for all ranks.

- Use the OML to inform command sergeant major and sergeant major eligibility and slating.

- Under Army Career Tracker, NCOs will be able to access their OML standing.

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FY 2020

- Use the OML to assist with assignment and training decisions.

- Identify NCOs not fully qualified and notify them their continued service is at risk.

- Under Army Career Tracker, Soldiers receive board OML feedback and OML ranking.

FY 2021

- Revise all policies, eliminating the use of "P" status for all NCO ranks E-6 and above.

- HRC starts posting 90-day promotion forecast for NCO promotions.

- Army moves away from annual promotion selection system and implements monthly promotion selection process for all NCO ranks.

- Separation process started for Soldiers who fail to be "fully qualified" for second time in same grade.

- With implementation of merit-based promotion system, Army plans to eliminate retention control points.

"If you excel at what you do, we're going to promote you," Purcell said.

"Everything is predicated on everybody doing what they're expected to do -- leaders and Soldiers alike. We're trying to create an environment to facilitate all of that."

GaANG's 179th Military Police Company trains for National Training Center

The Georgia Army National Guard Fort Stewart-based, 179th Military Police Company trained an additional two weeks on combat readiness at Fort Stewart in preparation for their three-week rotation at the National Training Center on Fort Irwin, California, April 16-21.

The 179th trained on diverse tactical situations through missions which tested their knowledge of security and military police operations, reacting to direct and indirect fire, setting up entry control points, vehicle searches and more. The unit conducted classroom instruction on many subjects including mounted land navigation, civil security operations and detainee operations, as well as individual weapons qualification the week prior to their field training exercise.

The unit is mostly composed of newer Soldiers who have never trained together. The unit saw the importance of training these individuals in preparation for their evaluation at NTC.

"This platoon, that we have been running, is made up of entirely new soldiers and getting them up to speed has been easier than anticipated," said Sgt. 1st Class Lucas Heise, platoon sergeant. "They have pulled together

really well and should perform well with their active-duty component at NTC."

The unit will be on rotation at NTC in May. During the training rotation, the unit is attached to the active duty 139th Military Police Company, 3rd Infantry Division. The soldiers are tested on their combat readiness, tactical knowledge and unit lethality.

The training completed in the classroom and during the field training exercise prior to leaving for NTC served as development for new Soldiers and a refresher for the unit's older Soldiers. It ensures the squads work in the most efficient way to keep their unit safe at the combat training center.

"We don't get to do this every day like our active duty component, so it's important to be prepared before the unit leaves for NTC," said Spc. Jaslyn Foster, military policeman.

The unit faces diverse challenges while at NTC on simulated battlefield known as the box. So, preparation as a unit, is essential to the success of their mission. The unit is using subject matter experts to evaluate the unit during the field training exercise to gain a different perspective on areas of improvement.

"The National Training Center is one of the most intensive and challenging environments Soldiers

endure as part of mobilization preparation," said Cpt. Jerry Cram, battalion training officer, 170th Military Police Battalion. "They will be forced to think on their feet with little guidance while working through these challenges in one of the most realistic simulated combat environments they've ever faced."

"All of it was good," Jamie Deen said. "I wouldn't spit any of it out."



Soldier for life support Easter Sunrise Service

Despite the unseasonably cool weather, Marne Gardens was again the site of Fort Stewart's annual Sunrise Service on Easter, April 21.

A long standing tradition among nearly all Protestant denominations, worshipping at sunrise on Easter recalls the discovery of the empty tomb which provided the first evidence of Jesus' resurrection. This year around eighty members of the Fort Stewart community gathered to listen to a message by retired Col. Sam Boone, the former commandant of the U.S. Army Chaplain Center and School.

Other participants in the service included Fort Stewart Command Chaplain, Col. Greg Walker, Garrison Chaplain, Lt. Col. David Beavers, 3rd Infantry Division Chaplain, Lt. Col. Samuel Kim, and the 3rd ID Brass Quintet.

Boone took what he called a different approach to Easter, and focused on a scene in the life of Jesus the week prior to his death and resurrection. As recorded in *John 12*, the event was the occasion in which Mary anointed Jesus' feet with expensive perfume. Boone pointed out Mary gave the Lord what she had, and compared her act to those of Moses and others throughout scripture. His message was, "Give God what you have, give it now, and give with expectancy." Boone suggested that Easter is the perfect day for individuals to recognize the reality of what God has done and to devote their lives to Him.

Walker introduced Boone as the guest speaker, and noted how Boone' helped mentor him earlier in his career. He said Boone's mentorship impacted him in both his ministry and career. He cited the long biographical insert in the program as evidence of Boone' influence upon

countless others.

Sporting the bow-tie that has become his trademark in retirement, Boone mentioned it had been more than 35 years since his last visit to Fort Stewart.

He reflected upon his years of service both as a helicopter pilot and later as a chaplain. He shared anecdotes about his early relationship with then chaplain candidate, 2nd Lt. Greg Walker.

Boone opened his remarks by stating simply, "I am a chaplain and a Soldier for life."

A fellowship time followed the sunrise service in which many of Boone's acquaintances from the past expressed their appreciation.

A generous assortment of refreshments was provided by the chapel for all in attendance. Led by Staff Sgt. Seandarius Coleman, several religious affairs NCOs from Fort Stewart provided the logistical support for the entire event.
