Building relationships, interoperability through exchange

WASHINGTON -- In April, the Army approved the first reciprocal exchange of general officers between France and the U.S.

In the coming months, Brig. Gen. Todd R. Wasmund and his family will relocate to Marseilles, France, where he will take on his new role as the deputy commander of the 3rd Division. Wasmund recently served as the deputy commanding general of the 1st Infantry Division at Fort Riley, Kansas.

French Brig. Gen. Hubert Cottereau has already relocated. He will move into his new position as the deputy commanding general with the 3rd Infantry Division at Fort Stewart.

The exchange between the U.S. and France was made possible

through the U.S. Army Military Personnel Exchange Program, or MPEP, said Jon Lee, MPEP and Schools of Other Nations branch chief with Army G-3/5/7.

"The relationship with France is longstanding, even if the exchange is new. We can optimize our partnership and strengthen our alliance to improve coalition operations," Wasmund said.

Building relationships is vital to the exchange program, Lee said, adding the Army is looking to improve the program to bolster interoperability with allies and partners.

As a Department of Defense security cooperation program, MPEP was designed to fully integrate an Army officer or noncommissioned officer into a foreign military's chain of command, Lee said. Further, it provides foreign military members a chance to

integrate with the U.S. Army, often serving in key positions throughout the force.

"Working with allies and partners is critical to understanding their culture and improving our language capabilities," Lee said. "The Army won't fully understand unless we send our Soldiers abroad and work with our allies and partners.

These Soldiers deal with some of those cultural differences, which leads to trust and confidence in working with our allies and partners."

Assignments are generally two years but can last up to three years, Lee said. During that time, Soldiers and families that are assigned to a foreign unit are separated from the typical range of support found at U.S. military installations and neighboring communities.

Can Do Battalion trains future leaders with team leader academy

The 3rd Battalion, 15th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, held a team leaders academy on Fort Stewart, July 16-19.

The team leaders academy used three events to teach Soldiers key leadership aspects within the structure of a platoon and how their role affects a battalion's mission.

Current and future 3-15 leaders attended the education center for instruction on administrative skills needed to lead Soldiers. Non-Commissioned Officers versed in administrative functions provided insight into their respective duties and tasks as leaders. Topics included a counseling overview, managing sup-plies and in-processing new Soldiers.

Sgt. 1st Class Mark Yorormad, team leader academy cadre, offered his perspective on leading junior Soldiers using a balance of intellect, strength and foresight.

"Besides infantry skills, it's important for them to know being a leader isn't always physical, it's not always about being tactical. It's about taking care of Soldiers by knowing how to take care of financial is-sues or medical issues so they know their Soldiers Family is taken care of," said Yoromad. "The biggest thing is to make sure they know how to handle administrative things so when it comes time to deploy, they know their Soldiers are good."

Additional direction included weapons maintenance and firing instruction. Junior leaders learned how to teach subordinates proper care and maintenance of their assigned weapons and demonstrating

proper firing technique. The instruction provides young leaders the skills to assist Soldiers with questions or safety concerns.

The final portion of the academy placed leader candidates in their garrison operational environmentthe field. There, cadre tested the leaders' skills, rating them on their ability to eliminate the enemy with minimal casualties.

An important portion of field training included identifying linear danger areas and leading a squad through them.

"In an infantry squad, being a team leader means being able to lead your squad effectively and without being seen by the enemy," said Sgt. Clement Gray, an infantry NCO assigned to 3-15 Inf. "This means you have to be able to cross all the roads, rivers and trails into enemy territory. A good leader will know how to do that and keep the team alive while eliminating the enemy."

3rd Infantry Division Artillery Soldiers re-create history.

Artillery Soldiers from the 1st Battalion, 41st Field Artillery Regiment, 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division re-created a historic photo dating back to the first world war at Fort Stewart, June 20.

The original photo shows artillery Soldiers from the 3rd Field Artillery Brigade, 3rd ID, standing in a formation that resembles the 3rd ID patch with all of the unit's canons in its arsenal. The photo captured an invaluable moment on German soil more than a century, and cemented their significance in history.

The Soldiers of 1-41FA, along with their counter parts from the 3rd ID Artillery, and the 1st Battalion, 9th Field Artillery Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd ID, reproduced that moment in time by generating a resembling photograph in honor of the Soldiers who served before them.

Re-creating historic photos not only keeps traditions alive and honors past Soldiers, it can also show how much progress we have made.

"Recreating this picture that was taken 100 years ago shows how far the field artillery has advanced in both weapon systems and technology," says Staff Sgt. Juan Posadas, a gunnery sergeant with 1-41FA.

Although we can see the advancements in the equipment by comparing the old photo with the new one, Posadas believes the spirit of artillery Soldiers is still the same.

"Being an artillery Soldier takes a certain kind of person and looking at this photo, I can see that those Soldiers took pride in their craft just like we do today," said Posadas. "I love my job wouldn't want to be doing anything else."

Sgt. 1st Class Hector Ramos, the battalion operations sergeant of 1-41FA, believes it is very important to keep traditions alive and honor the brave Soldiers who came before them.

"100 years is a very long time, and to keep this tradition means everything as a show

of respect to those artillerymen, also known as Red Legs, of the past," says Ramos. "We need to remember those who came before us and all they did for us, this why we are the greatest Army in the world."

Ramos believes it is important that we remember traditions like this not only to honor past Soldiers but to also learn from our history and build on our experiences.

The new photo will serve as a reminder to keep the long legacy of all artillery Soldiers alive for many years to come.

All actively serving members of the armed forces who have 16 or more years of service will no longer be able to transfer their Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits to their dependents. This new restriction was put in place per change 1 to DoDI 1341.13, Post-9/11 GI Bill, dated Friday. As a result of this change, ARNG Soldiers are highly encouraged to transfer their Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits as soon as they become eligible (not flagged, have six or more years of service, and at least one eligible dependent in DEERS) to avoid missing out on this extremely generous family benefit. Combat cooks serve up field training

From the frying pan into the fire of Georgia's heat, culinary specialists with 287th Quartermaster Company, Special Troops Battalion, 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade, participated in a five-day field training exercise from July 15 to 19.

"The purpose of this exercise is base defense and get our brand new Soldiers comfortable with the basics, other than just our military occupational specialty," said Sgt. Ashley Gonzalez, an orderly room noncommissioned officer with 287th QM. "A lot of the time as cooks we don't get out of the dining facility to practice basic Soldier skills."

The company consists of various teams than are responsible for different aspects of culinary operations on Fort Stewart. The Soldiers that man the DFACs, operate in field feeding teams, kiosk and food trucks and the Hunter Army Airfield squads were able to participate in the exercise. Soldiers dug foxholes, set up a tactical operation center, established radio communication and built defensive fighting positions their first two days in the field. On the third day, they trained in engaging simulated enemies by firing their assigned weapons.

Sgt. 1st Class Andrew Plog, the headquarters platoon sergeant for 287th QM, said the Soldiers ran through these simulations multiple times during the day, constantly changing out teams, to prepare for the battalion's base defense exercise in October.

The company needed to validate in base defense tactics not only to defend themselves but to defend any unit they could be assigned to.

"Each team of [cooks] has the ability to be attached to any brigade in the division," said Plog. "They need to be able to operate and do anything that company, battalion or brigade needs to do. This is our chance to teach that portion of it."

After five days under the Georgia sun, the culinary specialists built camaraderie through mixing teams and are better trained to handle any mission they are assigned.

Elite gaming: Army engages youth in esports

FORT KNOX, Kentucky. -- A loud cadence of gunfire echoed throughout the compound as the enemy-attacking force -- a team of five operators -- breached through the second floor.

Unfazed by the commotion overhead, Sgt. David Blose maintained his composure as he crouched in a corner to hold his defensive position. Any "noob," or rookie, would have charged upstairs to engage the enemy -- but not Blose.

Blose's team was down two teammates as the enemy moved downstairs. It didn't take long for one to cut across Blose's line of sight. With a simple flick of his wrist, he clicked the trigger on his submachine gun and eliminated the adversary with deadly accuracy.

Now exposed, Blose moved to cover in the adjoining room as the enemy force ran toward him with guns blazing. Blose fought back and dispatched each enemy in rapid succession.

The virtual compound fell silent as Blose, who goes by "Pumpkin.USAE" in the video game Rainbow Six Siege, waited for the final enemy to make a mistake. With the slightest flutter of movement at the end of Blose's crosshairs, he opened fire.

"Orange Team: Round 3 Won -- Enemies Eliminated," read Blose's monitor, followed by several cheers from his teammates through the Discord voice-chat application. Blose had just "aced" the enemy team by successfully eliminating all five enemy operators.

As a representative of the Army Esports Team, Blose maintains his competitive edge with every game of Rainbow Six Siege, or "Siege" for short. Further, Blose does this all while maintaining his Army career.

"I never thought I would play video games for the Army," Blose said. "It is every [gamer's] dream."

ARMY ESPORTS

The esports program is an Army Recruiting Command outreach effort designed to connect the Army and American population through a shared passion for gaming, said Sgt. 1st Class Christopher Jones, the non-commissioned officer in charge of the program.

"Gaming as a medium has been growing consistently," Jones said. "Soldiers have grown up as gamers long before they joined the Army.

"We're actually putting a light on the gaming community itself, showing that it's not just a specific kind of person that plays video games," he added. "Everybody can enjoy this medium together, and it is a great way to grow the community at large."

One side of the program targets the completive gaming circuit for games like Counter-Strike: Global Offensive, Overwatch, League of Legends, and Siege.

More than 6,500 Soldiers applied to be part of the Army's esports program shortly after it launched in September 2018. The esports team is slated to announce the final team roster in October.

Soldiers who are identified as the most competitive in select gaming titles will be reassigned to Fort Knox for a three-year tour, Jones said.

While at Knox, competitors will spend most of their time practicing with their teammates to maintain their competitive edge, he added. Teams will then use their skills to represent the Army at regional or national tournaments, or at other gaming exhibitions and conventions.

OUTREACH

Interacting with the public is a core aspect of the esports program, Jones said. Esports representatives have participated in several events, to include their recent involvement at the Skills USA conference in Louisville, Kentucky.

Skills USA is a national-level competition for college and high school students in trade-based career fields. Some of these fields include welding, mechanic work, culinary arts, and cosmetology, Blose said. In addition to the competition, students get a chance to interact with possible employers from their respected trades.

During the event, Blose had many opportunities to engage with the students, often sharing his experience as an aviation power plant repairer.

"There was a number of kids that come up [and asked,] "How do you play games and do [your job] in the Army," Blose said. "It was fun just reaching out and sharing my stories with them." All in all, the competitive esports program is more than frags or wins. Soldiers participating in the program must be in good standing with the Army by maintaining their physical fitness standards, along with their career field-specific certifications, Jones said.

The team's training schedule will be similar to a traditional sporting environment. At the same time, program officials will help monitor the training requirements for each Soldier to ensure they remain proficient and competitive in respected career fields, Jones added.

The Soldier mindset will be the key moving forward, Jones said. A Soldier's mental endurance and their ability to handle stressful situations will give them a competitive advantage against other esports organizations.

"A lot of the tactics we use in Siege, we learned through basic training, whether it be different battle drills, tactics, [or] call outs," Blose said. "If we have a bad match, we're able to bounce back and adapt to the other team's tactics."

DISCORD

In addition to the competitive team, program officials are driven to bring the

Army's gaming community together through Discord, live streams, gaming videos, and social media.

There are about 8,000 gamers already connected through the Army's Discord server, which includes representatives from the active duty, Guard and Reserve, family members and veterans, Jones said.

"The Discord server is a

hub where Soldiers congregate for scrimmages, tournaments, and fun play," Jones said. "It has channels for every game that's being played, along with rooms to chat to find new people to play. This Discord is open to the public and is the first and only verified military Discord server."

The Discord server also includes a section for Soldier support. Under this channel, gamers can speak to a recruiter to get more information about the Army. Further, Soldiers can ask questions about promotions, fitness, or even talk to a career counselor.

"The Army esports program is engaging with the younger generation, and I feel this opportunity is important to help build Army of tomorrow," Blose said.



EXCHANGE

"There could be some challenges with family if they don't speak the language and have to live on the economy," Lee said. "Army Service Component Commands perform the essential role in overseeing and providing administrative support for the MPEP personnel within their theater."

MPEP's long-standing history began in 1947, with the first and ongoing exchange between the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, New York, and Heroico Colegio Militar, the military academy in Mexico.

Over the years, the program has expanded to 17 countries, and includes longstanding exchange agreements with the United Kingdom, Canada, and Australia, to the more recent exchange agreements with France.

"We have the opportunity to join our partner nations and contribute to their operations," Wasmund said. "I'm grateful to the French government and the French army for entrusting me."

He said it gives the Army a great opportunity to achieve the objectives of the military exchange program.

DEFINING EXCHANGE AGREEMENTS

Exchange agreements between two counties are legally binding international agreements, which do not happen overnight, Lee said.

A change to the program in 2009 has allowed the Army to initiate both reciprocal and non-reciprocal exchanges with its allies and partners, Lee added. A non-reciprocal agreement allows foreign military personnel to operate as an exchange officer within the Army, without the mutual exchange of personnel.

Currently, there are several general officers holding deputy commanding general position throughout various ASCCs, corps and divisions, as well as interoperability staff officers on the Army staff, and instructors in multiple Centers of Excellence and schools.

While the numbers tend to fluctuate, the Army maintains around 46 non-reciprocal and close to 120 reciprocal exchanges, Lee said.

"Generally, there are two different ways to start the process," Lee said. "First, a partner nation initiates a request to exchange personnel within a certain organization. Second, a request for a partnership can come from Army command."

"The agreement process generally takes about one or two years," he said. "Then we go through the process of establishing the position, which requires a lot of coordination between the two countries and the units that will be affected."

Determining the correct rank, military occupational specialty, and qualifications for each MPEP position can also be a challenge, Lee added.

"Within an Army command, an exchange has to be feasible within their structure," Lee said. "This means a command will have to provide an officer or NCO to go overseas, in exchange for a member of a foreign military. The unit has to consider if this is possible."

To help, the MPEP team works closely with foreign

military officials, Army service component commands, Army commands that will host the foreign exchange personnel and United States Army Human Resources Command to define the requirements of each position. G-3/5/7 will then approve establishment of each exchange position for execution as well as changes and terminations based periodic assessments.

For officers, the distribution of ranks accepted into the exchange program range from captain up to brigadier general. For NCOs, MPEP tends to focus on senior NCOs from staff sergeants and sergeants first class up to sergeants major within specific career fields.

Soldiers that meet the requirements set for each position can apply to the program. If necessary, Human Resource Command will coordinate any additional language training before their departure.

A CHANCE OPPORTUNITY

From 2016 to 2018, Maj. Gen. Douglas Crissman, now the director of the Mission Command Center of Excellence in Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, was the second general officer to exchange with the United Kingdom. During that time, he served as the deputy commanding general of the 3rd UK Division.

"After spending 28 years in my own Army, it was a unique and rewarding experience to then go spend two years in someone else's army," Crissman said. "I took it

as a responsibility of mine to bring our armies closer together."

During his time with the U.K., Crissman helped make changes to their organizational structure and assisted in the development and implementation of new doctrine. While in his post, he brought the 3rd UK Division back to the U.S. for two major division-level warfighter exercises.

"It was a big deal," he said. "The British army had never participated in a U.S. warfighter exercise. The 3rd UK was assessed for their warfighting readiness in -- the same way our divisions are assessed."

British are now exploring ways to replicate the warfighter experience in their army, he said.

"These relationships are significant when you consider it is unlikely we will ever fight alone," he added.

Similarly, Col. Kevin Baird, director of transportation with the deputy assistant secretary of defense for logistics, had a unique opportunity to serve with the Canadian Joint Operations Command, from 2011 to 2014.

Baird, an Army major at the time, was assigned to the J-5 Strategy, Plans, and Policy Office, where he helped manage domestic and international operations and provide logistics support.

"The large French-speaking population was a bit of a challenge when we first got there," he said. "My kids came back speaking French. So, for my family, it was a great opportunity to experience a foreign culture."

Operating as a full member of the Canadian Army, Baird had the chance to participate in the Rim of the Pacific exercise and support NATO training missions in Afghanistan. He also deployed to Liberia during the Ebola outbreak to assist with humanitarian efforts.

"It was an incredible broadening opportunity," he said. "I was given jobs as if a Canadian officer sitting in that desk. The interoperability piece inherently contributes [to their operation]. As they are going through their planning process ... we are embedded in their headquarters and can convey how the U.S. operates.

"Everything we do, from now and into the future, will likely involve partner nations. These MPEP positions and other programs like this are absolutely critical to our success."



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CHAPLAIN'S CORNER Sharing thoughts regarding following the letter or spirit of the law

"The letter (of the law) kills, but the Spirit gives life." **2 Corinthians 3:6**

This week marks the thirty-sixth anniversary of the "pine tar incident" which occurred at Yankee Stadium. In the top of the ninth inning, with his team trailing 4-3, two out, and a runner on base, Kansas City's George Brett hit a lead-changing home run off of Yankees' closer Goose Gossage. After Brett had rounded the bases and headed back to the Royals' dugout, however, Yankee manager Billy Martin walked to home plate. Citing rule 1.10(c) of the Major League Baseball rule book, Martin asked the home plate umpire to inspect the bat used to hit the home run. The rule states that a bat cannot be covered by a substance more than eighteen inches from the tip of the handle. Using the seventeen inch wide home plate as a means of gauging how far the pine tar on Brett's bat extended from the knob, umpire Tim McClelland determined that the slugger had used an illegal bat. On that basis, he ruled the home run negated, Brett out, and the game over. A commentator quipped that Brett had become the first player in history to hit a game-losing home run. The letter of the law killed a Royals' victory.

But...the Royals protested the call. And, as it turns out, American League President Lee MacPhail was a bit less legalistic in his application of rules than McClelland. He argued that the rule existed to keep fewer baseballs from being ruined, not because anyone believed excessive pine tar offered an unfair advantage to the hitter. Brett, therefore, while perhaps wasteful, was not guilty of cheating. Hence, the ruling was overturned. Though he was officially ejected for his behavior in response to the umpire's call (a classic scene worthy of you-tubing if you haven't seen it), the spirit of the law had given life back to George Brett and the Royals. When the game was resumed a few weeks later, Dan Quisenberry, the best closer in baseball that year, shut the Yankees down in order in the bottom of the ninth, giving Kansas City a 5-4 victory.

I often wish the Army had more people like Lee MacPhail and fewer like Tim McClelland. We love to talk about standards, and so we should, because indiscipline undermines effectiveness. But, not all standards carry the same importance. Some have no connection to readiness at all, and efforts to artificially connect the dots simply call into question one's common sense, leaving one looking like Billy Martin at best, or Barney Fife at worst. The best leaders I have worked for during my military career are those who had the discernment to separate things that mattered a great deal from things that mattered very little. They didn't treat Soldiers like criminals for wearing the wrong color reflective belt, but they did demand excellence in the areas of core values and giving a full effort.

St Paul's words about the death of the letter and the life of the Spirit indicate he had learned the (albeit painful in his case) lesson regarding what does and doesn't matter in God's eyes. God isn't interested in us becoming world class rule followers. He is interested in us being faithful to a calling to do His work. This doesn't mean we become spiritual anarchists of some sort. It simply means we see the moral difference between a steroid-jacked player with a corked bat and a truly great hitter who just got a little sloppy with the pine tar.

Futures Command showcases efforts ahead

JOINT BASE MYER-HENDERSON HALL, Virginia -- After being one of the first Soldiers to jump out of an aircraft with the new lightweight, easy-to-use Integrated Tactical Network, Staff Sgt. Jason Roseberry said it will be a game-changer.

A project headed by the Network Cross-Functional Team, the ITN incorporates upgraded communications technology, such as radios with advanced networking waveforms and a smartphone device for better situational awareness.

Donned in a full combat kit adorned with ITN components, Roseberry discussed the network Tuesday during Army Futures Command's media day here. The event displayed several of the command's projects that its CFTs are developing as AFC nears full-operational capability on July 31.

Roseberry, an intelligence analyst with the 82nd Airborne Division, tested the network at the Joint Readiness Training Center in Louisiana.

"I'm not someone they just grabbed as a test dummy to bring up here," he said. "I actually jumped with this kit into JRTC and used it. I absolutely didn't have to be here, but I believe in it."

Three Security Forces Assistance Brigades are now equipped with ITN, and there are plans to start fielding other brigade combat teams in 2021 after a 10-month assessment with 82nd Airborne Soldiers.

"We want to make sure we're not going to field them something that they're not going to use or it's going to be too complex," said Maj. Gen. Peter Gallagher, director of the Network CFT. "To the Soldier, simplicity matters."

For Roseberry, it fits the bill.

Before, the staff sergeant said his radio gear and batteries would weigh 20 to 30 pounds -- the ITN components weigh significantly less. The ITN also allows commanders to operate in both a secret or secured but unclassified network, which enables them to choose different communications options depending on their environment.

"For the first time, I was able to get an operations and intel net. That was huge for me," he said. "I actually had a voice channel dedicated to my warfighting function, which was pretty cool."

And if his Soldiers get separated after parachuting onto a drop zone, he can easily find them on the smartphone device attached to his chest that populates their locations.

"I know exactly where they're at and I can send them a text message or I can hit them up over the radio," he said.

FUTURE VERTICAL LIFT

A few feet from Roseberry in the same conference room, the director of the Future Vertical Lift CFT highlighted his team's efforts while standing next to a display model of a Spike anti-tank guided missile.

Brig. Gen. Walter Rugen said the non-line of sight missile is slated to be fired next month from an Apache AH-64E during a demonstration at Yuma Proving Ground, Arizona.

He also mentioned the Air-Launched, Tube-Integrated Unmanned System, or ALTIUS. The system has already been test fired from a UH-60 Black Hawk at Yakima Training Center in Washington, he said, and low-altitude shots are scheduled for this summer at Yuma.

The general foresees the system to carry different payloads, such as communications, electronic warfare or kinetic, that can penetrate through layers of anti-access/area denial capabilities being developed by near-peer threats. "Ultimately, we want to find, fix and finish our pacing threats for Army aviation," he said. "As we knock those down, we feel like we'll free up the freedom of maneuver that we need to fight and win."

LONG-RANGE PRECISION FIRES

At the next table over, Col. John Rafferty, director of the Long-Range Precision Fires CFT, spoke about the Extended Range Cannon Artillery prototype, which a vendor was recently awarded a \$45 million contract to develop.

The prototype plans to more than double the range of the current M109 Paladin self-propelled howitzer. Early technology demonstrations with a 30-foot-long gun tube recorded a 155 mm artillery round shot over 70 kilometers. The range of the current Paladin system's 20-foot-long tube is about 30 kilometers, he said.

"We're really getting some amazing results with our engineers," he said.

The first ERCA prototype is expected to be delivered in October for testing at Yuma. At that time, Soldiers will also get their hands on the howitzer to provide input.

"We want them there to climb around on it and get that initial feedback while we're still so early in the prototyping," he said. "If something doesn't make sense for them, then we ought to know."
