Celebrating 102 years of service

The 3rd Infantry Division's motto, Rock of the Marne, was earned near the banks of the Marne River near Chateau-Thierry on July 15, 1918 following a significant conflict with German forces. Then 3rd ID commander, Maj. Gen. Joseph Dickman told French allies "Nous Resterons La" letting the world know, "We shall remain here."

The reputation was earned shortly after the unit was formed at Camp Green, North Carolina, Nov. 21, 1917, and has been reflected by the unit's Soldiers, Families and civilians support ever since.

For their constant vigilance and stalwart service, the 3rd ID Soldiers came to be called Dogfaced Soldiers, with a song aptly named after them. Walt Disney also provided the unit with a mascot – Rocky the Bulldog.

56 Dogfaced Soldiers have been recognized with the Medal of Honor, the nation's highest award for valor in action against an enemy force. Many others have been recognized with the Distinguished Service Cross, such as Staff Sgt. Stevon A. Booker.

Booker served with the 1st Battalion, 64th Armor Regiment 3rd ID Soldier during the initial ground assault into Baghdad, Iraq, known as the Thunder Run. He was killed in action in Iraq in 2003, while returning fire during combat operations in the heart of the city.

A range in honor of Booker was dedicated to him Nov. 19 on Fort Stewart during the 3rd ID's Marne Week celebration – an event held each year to salute the legacy of the units, Soldiers and Families.

Other Marne week activities included sporting events such as dodgeball, soccer, volleyball, flag football, tug-o-war, basketball, ultimate Frisbee, swimming relay, Family kickball, the Marne Mudder, the functional fitness challenge, combatives and more. The week also features a Family Day at Newman Fitness Center, which starts today at noon on Cottrell Field. The day's events include interactive displays with games, food, music, fellowship and a movie on the lawn at 6 p.m. - Aladdin.

Ground fuelers learn top flight aviation fueling process

U.S. Army petroleum supply specialists, with 135th Quartermaster Company, 87th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion, 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade "Providers," conducted Forward Arming Refueling Point cross-training with 3rd Battalion 160th Special Operations Aviation Regiment Nov. 6 to Nov. 7 at Hunter Army Airfield.

The Soldiers with 135th QM, 87th CSSB, 3IDSB, traditionally conduct ground fuel missions in support of the armored brigades within the 3rd ID, but with their upcoming scheduled rotation to Honduras, the Soldiers are expected to train and understand how to properly fuel aircraft they may support.

"The training that we do on a regular basis is

more contained to ground fuel, not aviation and we use different types of vehicles for ground fuel and aviation fuel, and the Soldiers don't really get to work with the vehicles or train with aviation requirements," said Staff Sgt. Javarzeiya Walker, a petroleum supply specialist with 135 QM, 87th CSSB, 3IDSB. "Even though I've done this before my Soldiers haven't and it's training that they need prior to our deployment."

To prepare and familiarize themselves with FARP operations the 135th Soldiers conducted several training events prior to their cross-training with the 160th SOAR.

"About a month ago we conducted FARP classroom training as well as aviation testing of the fuel to learn the components, what the standard procedures are and identification of equipment," said 2nd Lt. Zachary Freiburg, the 135th QM executive officer. "With the notice of the mission we had all the personnel get trained on forklifts along with some sling load training at the motor pool. When we came out here they already had a baseline knowledge of what equipment pieces were but now they're getting to see how it's all put together."

The training they received from the 160th SOAR FARP teams focused on speed, procedure and safety. During their training the 135th team were instructed how to properly test and sample fuel for aviation use, how to establish a FARP and the safety considerations that come with conducting refueling operations for aircraft.

"This is good training preparation for deployment because we are going to be working with aviation," said Walker. "I hope the Soldiers retain the knowledge that they need to know how to Aqua Glo and Millipore these trucks to make sure that the fuel that we are issuing out to the aircraft are on grade and specification."

The unit leadership stressed the importance of their training prior to the mission in Honduras.

"It's important because we come from a bulk-fuel ground platoon company and we will be transitioning to aviation, which many of the new Soldiers have not participated in," said Freiburg. "Many of the NCOs are familiar with the aviation side and can provide great training as well as knowledge to the new Soldiers, but as far as hands on they need to become familiar and adaptive with the equipment and to take advice from the leadership."

With the cross-training the Soldiers received the 135th Soldiers will be better prepared for their mission ensuring they live up to the Provider name offering superior sustainment support to the forces in their area of operation.

Lady Bulldogs basketball compete with grit against NCAA team

Savannah State University women's basketball hosted the Fort Stewart Lady Bulldogs team, Nov. 8, as a tune-up for their upcoming season.

With just two bench players in reserve, the Lady Bulldogs showed a lot of grit against a very athletic Tigers squad.

For two elite basketball players from the Fort Stewart women's basketball team, it was an opportunity to not only compete, but also to share their knowledge and experience with their younger opponents.

"There were several situations when I gave advice to their players," said U.S. Air Force 2nd Lt. Charmaine Clark. "I wanted to do as much as I could to help them become better players and a better team."

Clark, a member of the All-Air Force women's basketball team, and Fort Stewart teammate, 1st Lt. Jala Harris, a member of the All-Army team, both have competed at the collegiate level and are drawn to developing the next generation of college athletes.

"It was fun to get out there with college kids and see if you still got it," said Harris, a maintenance platoon leader assigned to 3rd Brigade Support Battalion, 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division.

Harris, a native of Madison, Alabama,

played at Tennessee Tech for two years before joining the Army, and scored 20 points for the Lady Bulldogs.

Clark, a native of Hinesville, was born at Fort Stewart and earned a scholarship to play for the University of Miami while playing for nearby Bradwell Institute. After playing a year of professional ball overseas, she joined the USAF and has been a member of the All-Air Force team since 2016.

When Fort Stewart's coach Chief Warrant Officer 3 Aaron Bryant, who is also an assistant coach of the All-Army team, became aware that there was no team for which Clark could play at Robins Air Force Base, he invited her to play at Fort Stewart. Clark led the Lady Bulldogs with 23 points and 9 rebounds.

The game was fast-paced with a lot of scoring. There were seven lead changes in the first three periods before SSU extended their lead to 14 with 9 minutes left in the game. The Lady Bulldogs mounted a valiant comeback but came up short as SSU finished with a 95-91 victory.

This new restriction was put in place per change 1 to DoDI 1341.13, Post-9/11 GI Bill, dated Friday. As a result of this change, Army National Guard Soldiers are highly encouraged to transfer their Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits as soon as they become eligible (not flagged, have six or more years of service, and at least one eligible dependent in DEERS) to avoid missing out on this extremely generous family benefit. Use care, don't grease the pipes

Grease, oil, and fat clog pipes and sewer lines just as they block arteries. As with arteries, blocked sewer lines cause serious problems, eventually resulting in overflows and potentially causing health hazards, damage to home interiors, and adverse impacts to our environment. "Greaseclogged pipes continue to be a cause of sewer spills on Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield – most particularly during the winter months. Cooler weather makes the problem worse," states Tressa Rutland, the Directorate of Public Works' Prevention and Compliance Branch Chief.

Flushing grease down the drain can be disastrous! Clogged lines can cause raw sewage to overflow into your home or your neighbor's home, parks, yards, streets, ditches, streams, and other waterways. Cleaning up after such a mess is not how you want to spend your time! In mass, grease that makes it down the lines from several houses in a neighborhood can result in problems at the lift station once the grease hardens into large chunks. All this means problems for residents, and money for increased operation and maintenance of the sewer system and spill response teams.

The grease found in plumbing systems typically originates

as a cooking by-product that has been washed down the kitchen sink. Meat fats, cooking oil, shortening, butter/margarine, food scraps, baking goods, sauces, and dairy products all contain grease and add to the problem once washed down the drain. Use of home garbage disposal units only shreds solid material into smaller pieces, but does not remove grease. Like arteries, grease will stick to the inside of the sewer pipes and will build up and block the lines over time.

"A common mistake is to flush grease down the sink with hot water," Rutland said. "Because this will only push the grease farther down the lines where it will later re-solidify and clog lines. Commercial additives and chemicals, including soaps and detergents, that claim to dissolve grease may only do so temporarily and actually just push grease farther down the pipes. When the pipes get clogged it's only a matter of time before everything you put in them (bath water, dish water, and yes – sewage) backs up where it can cause problems both on and in your property and in the streets."

With your help, we can minimize the probability that you will be dealing with the unpleasant annoyance and inconvenience associated with sewage spills. Help us protect you, your property, and our environment. If you have any questions, please contact the DPW Environmental Division at 767-2010.

Some sewage spills can be prevented if grease, fats, and oils are kept out of the sewer system. You can help prevent future problems:

• Never pour fats, oils, or greases (especially bacon grease) down sink drains, toilets, street gutters, or storm drains.

• Pour into a container, seal, and place in the trash (or recycle).

• Wipe pots, pans, and dishes with dry paper towels before rinsing or washing them; then throw away the paper towels.

• Spread the word by speaking with your family, friends, and neighbors about how to keep fats, oils, and greases out of sewers.

Agents receive training at the USAMPS and advanced training in a wide range of specialized investigative disciplines.

DECA expands patronage

FORT LEE, Virginia – Starting Jan. 1, all service-connected disabled veterans, Purple Heart recipients, former prisoners of war and primary veteran caregivers will be eligible to shop at commissaries worldwide.

"I want to be one of the first to welcome home this group of veterans to their commissary," said retired Rear Adm. Robert J. Bianchi, DOD special assistant for commissary operations. "Whether they shopped at the commissary when they were on active duty, or are first-time shoppers, we are sure they will enjoy the savings and excellent customer experience associated with this benefit."

The newly eligible customers, about 3 million in all, will also be able to shop the military exchanges and use certain morale, welfare and recreation activities. The expanded privileges and access are the result of the 2019 National Defense Authorization Act.

The DoD, Veterans Affairs and Homeland Security (the expansion also applies to Coast Guard facilities) have partnered to make the expansion possible. Details of eligibility and military installation access follow:

• Disabled and other eligible veterans: The Veteran Health Identification card, with "Purple Heart," "Former POW" or "Service Connected" printed on the front, will be required for access to the stores.

• Caregivers: The benefit applies to the approved and designated primary family caregiver of service-connected disabled veterans who are registered in the Department of Veterans Affairs Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers to receive shopping privileges. Visit the VA's caregiver page for more information. The VA will send memos for caregivers to be used for access at the front gate, along with a REAL ID-compliant driver's license or other approved government-issued photo ID.

Winn touts flu drive-thru community success

On one of the coldest mornings this month, the U.S. Medical Department Activity-Fort Stewart, Winn Army Community Hospital's Installation Department of Public Health staff as well as a host of MEDDAC volunteers stood ready to immunize the Fort Stewart Soldiers, Family members, retirees and DOD Civilian population, during the two-day, 12th Annual Winn ACH Drive-Thru Flu Clinic Nov. 14 and 15.

Although pneumonia and influenza related deaths which typically occur this time year are down, so far this season, 30 states and one U.S. territory have reported flu activity. From a readiness standpoint the flu-drive thru clinic is one way Winn prepares the community.

"It's an exceptional way to get your flu vaccine, because very few installations do it this way," said Winn ACH Commander, Col. Michelle Munroe. "It allows us to vaccinate almost 2,500 people in one setting."

Major Atia Mbah, the IDPH chief said the flu clinic has far reaching affects.

"What we are doing here today is actually part of the annual pandemic exercise," Mbah said. "In case there was an outbreak of any infectious disease, and the hospital commander or the installation commander wanted us to do a mass vaccination, then we will be prepared. So this is part of what we do on an annual basis to prepare."

In less than two hours from the time the flu clinic opened, more than 500 beneficiaries had received the vaccine. Specialist Nickolas Stringer, 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division found the convenience of the flu clinic a great asset to the community.

"It should be very important to the entire army to make sure you're green on MEDPROS [Medical Protection] because the battlefield doesn't stop for sickness," Stringer explained. "Overall being healthy in general should be very important to everyone."

The CDC recommends everyone 6-months of age and older should get the flu vaccine each year.

Conversely, there are those with the rare exception to receiving the shot. However, the vaccine is important for people who are at high-risk if they were to get the flu.

Family member Sabrina Chandler was one of the first cars in line to get her and her 7-month old daughter vaccinated.

"Me and my husband made the decision to get her vaccinated for everything mainly because there's a lot of stuff that with their immune systems being so weak, they can get sick very easily," Chandler said. "We don't want her to have to deal with lifelong repercussions of not getting vaccinated."

Chandler said the drive-thru flu clinic was "quick and easy."

"The only reason I had to get out of my car was help them with her," said Chandler. "It makes life just that much easier when you have a 7-month old to be able to just do something quick and easy to make sure she's safe."

The MEDDAC staff was partly driven indoors by the rain and wind second day of the clinic. Resiliently the whole team pulled together and carried out the contingency inclement weather plan. Everything was moved to the Army Wellness Center. Beneficiaries were rerouted via social media as well as physical presence at the prior location.

Although the bulk flu vaccine arrived late this year throughout the medical military region, Mbah said getting the community vaccinated before the winter travel season kicked off is important to him, and he is passionate about the clinic from a public health perspective.

"The more people you vaccinate you develop that heard immunity," Mbah explained. "From a public health standpoint you have a healthy community and it protects people from getting sick."

Munroe agrees, and said Winn's focus is on the readiness of the military community on and off the installation.

"This is not just about the active-duty force, but our installation as a whole," Munroe said.

At the end of the two-day flu clinic, more than 2,100 beneficiaries were vaccinated.

The Great American Smokeout-you can quit

Today, marks the day many have vowed to put down tobacco/nicotine related products for the Great American Smokeout.

The Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield Installation Public Health Nursing department at Winn Army Community Hospital developed the Nicotine Cessation Program and is here to help.

As one of the leading causes of preventable deaths in the U.S., the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports more 16 million Americans have at least one disease caused by smoking. If youths were prevented from starting to use nicotine products such as vapes and smokeless tobacco, CDC officials say about \$170 billion in direct medical costs could be saved yearly.

In addition to medical costs, two Soldiers currently in the cessation program said they already see the benefits of quitting the use of nicotine/tobacco products.

Staff Sargent David Hyde, Warrior Transition Unit, said he got started using nicotine products at the early age because he was influenced through his parents and sibling's usage of smokeless tobacco.

As a 31-year former user of tobacco related products, Hyde said he was prompted to seek assistance because he did not want his own children to begin using nicotine products.

"I didn't want to repeat the same mistakes my parents made with me," Hyde said. "I just wanted to break the chain and stop with me."

The program gave Hyde the right support and guidance he needs in order to quit he said.

"I quit at least a half-dozen times on my own and failed, and just went back to it," Hyde explained. "It's okay to fail as long as you keep trying."

Even though it may be hard to quit, Hyde said it is important to remember what tobacco is doing to your body, children, family, friends and career.

"Just make that conscience decision to quit," Hyde said. "There is nothing to be afraid of."

Spc. Oderi Duke, 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, used to smoke a pack of cigarettes a day for the past three years and sought help through the nicotine cessation program. Duke spent more than \$2,000 a year supporting his nicotine addiction. He said his commander recommended for him to enroll in the program, but Duke wanted to go it alone.

"I am pretty sure I can do it by myself," Duke said to his commander. "Which I did before, but I fell off. But after coming to the program, [it] made me understand that it's much easier when you have a purpose and direction and understand the reason why you are quitting ... it's a lot easier when you are in the program."

Duke said the organization of the program was beneficial for him to quit. Participants have to journal why they want to quit, be it family, career, children, when writing down his reasons, Duke was motivated to quit using nicotine products.

"They are actually going to give you a plan. So you are going to set up a date where you actually quit," Duke said. "They are not forcing you to quit, they slowly wean you off of it [nicotine]. If you need it [additional help], they give you medications."

Duke said he would tell others who were seeking solutions to kick the habit to get help and not be embarrassed.

"If you want to quit, it shouldn't matter," Duke advised. "Just go get help."

For those interested in setting a new healthy-habit goal, the Cessation Program has three locations available: Tuttle Army Health Clinic on Thursdays from 10-11 a.m. at Hunter Army Airfield; Richmond Hill Medical Home from Thursdays from 10-11 a.m.; and here at Winn ACH on Tuesdays from 10-11 a.m. or Wednesdays from 3-4 p.m.

To get into the program patients can visit their primary care provider or call the MEDDAC appointment line to schedule to be seen at one of the aforementioned locations. The process for getting into the program is as easy as calling 435-6633. The program is fourweeks long and follow-up is available for continued support.
