Desert Rogues honor fallen Dogface Soldier

Soldiers and Families of the 1st Battalion, 64th Armored Regiment, 3rd Infantry Division, joined together to memorialize a fallen hero by dedicating the Staff Sgt. Stevon Booker Multipurpose Range Complex in his name Nov. 19 on Fort Stewart, to further ingrain his legacy in the history of the Speed and Power battalion, the Marne division, and the U.S. Army.

Booker was killed in action during the operation Thunder Run during Operation Iraqi Freedom. In the Thunder Run, Booker and his company, called the Wild Bunch, of 1-64 Armor, charged up Highway 8 into downtown Baghdad.

During this action, Booker covered his team's flank. He effectively suppressed the enemy and communicated their movements to his chain of command before being fatally wounded.

Sgt. 1st Class Roy Lee Silva, current 1st Sgt. of Company A's Wild Bunch said its an honor to be able to do something like this to remember him and continue to honor our fallen comrades.

"We are doing this to memorialize and honor him, as well as show junior and future generations of Soldiers that those who have come before us are not forgotten," said Silva. "Things like this create a living history so that Soldiers who have, and continue to serve, have examples to follow and opportunities to visualize the sacrifices that have been made by those who have passed."

Many people were in attendance for the range dedication ceremony, including Booker's mother, Freddie Jackson.

"I'm happy, I'm sad, I'm overjoyed, and I am honored. This is beautiful," said Jackson. "This should give Soldiers inspiration and can show them what they can accomplish as well as how much is already accomplished."

Lt. Col Alexis Perez-Cruz, 1-64AR commander, described the importance of remembering those that came before us and how great it is to have an active training complex dedicated to a great hero of the 3rd ID and the U.S. Army.

"Having a living memorial where Dogface Soldiers train for combat and hone their skills means the world to the Booker Family because they know that their son gave his life for a great cause and for what and who he loved and that every time a Soldier steps foot onto this range they honor Staff Sgt. Steve Booker," said Perez-Cruz "This dedication is the most beautiful memorial to the families by showing outwardly that we will not forget their Dog Face Soldiers."

The Booker Range Complex is and will continue to be used to train Soldiers and leaders to perfect their craft. Ranges like these are essential to building and maintaining lethality within our ranks in order to answer our nation's call.

Marne Air Soldiers prove Ready to Fight

Shortly after deploying in support of Atlantic Resolve, Marne Air Soldiers from the 3rd Combat Aviation Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division, conducted a training demonstration called "Ready to Fight" across several different European countries, Nov. 15-22.

The purpose of this training exercise is to demonstrate the brigade's ability to rapidly employ its capabilities after deploying to Europe in mid-October.

Ready to Fight took place across the European theater in Bulgaria, Germany and Greece. Over the course of this exercise, the brigade conducted air assaults with Bulgarian special forces, reconnaissance support, downed aircraft recovery team training, forward arming and refueling point operations, water purification, drivers training, convoy lanes, infiltration tactics and medical evacuation training with the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst.

Marne Air Soldiers were grateful for the opportunity to train alongside European allies.

"Working with the Bulgarian special forces was a unique privilege for the Soldiers and

leaders of our battalion," said 1st Lt. John Geiger, a Black Hawk pilot with 4-3 Assault Helicopter Battalion. "The disciplined professionals of the Bulgarian military gave our crew, staff and supporting elements the chance to build multinational relationships and showcase our proficiency during Ready to Fight."

Training with allies allows U.S. Army units to build interoperability with their European counterparts across the continent, while also deterring aggression. The Army's presence in Europe offers reassurance to its allies that it remains committed to NATO and the European defense.

Ready to Fight is the first of many planned training exercises in which 3CAB will train with European allies and partners, while flying in support of Atlantic Resolve.

By conducting this training, 3CAB is able to maintain readiness, proficiency and the ability to deploy on a moment's notice in support of global operations. The training also helps Marne Air Soldiers prepare for the upcoming exercise, Defender-Europe 20. Defender 20 is slated to be the largest deployment of Soldiers for a European exercise in 25 years, adding up to nearly 20,000 U.S. Soldiers.

This new restriction was put in place per change 1 to DoDI 1341.13, Post-9/11 GI Bill, dated Friday. As a result of this change, Army National Guard Soldiers are highly encouraged to transfer their Post-9/11 GI Bill benefits as soon as they become eligible (not flagged,

2019 hurricane season ends for Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield

The 2019 Atlantic hurricane season ended Nov. 30. The National Hurricane Center was accurate in their prediction of an active season.

The 2019 Atlantic hurricane season produced 18 named storms, six hurricanes; three being major storms of category 3, 4, and 5.

The three major hurricanes developed; Dorian, Humberto, and Lorenzo. Dorian was tied with three other storms as the second strongest hurricane on record with winds up to 185mph.

Four storms made landfall this year; hurricanes Barry, Dorian, Imelda and Nestor.

Dorian devastated the Bahamas and then gave Fort Stewart and Hunter Army Airfield a scare following a path very similar to Hurricane Matthew (2016) as it moved north off the coast and making landfall in the Carolinas.

Even though Dorian closely followed Hurricane Matthew's path from 2016, he stalled, sped up, slowed down, lost and gained strength and perplexed forecasters and posed continual challenges to the installation's hurricane response planners. Dorian's actions led the governor to order coastal evacuations and the senior com-

mander the evacuation of Hunter Army Airfield.

Challenges from Dorian's unpredictability were captured in after-action reviews and provided an opportunity for leaders and planners to take away several lessons learned and have helped to make revisions to the installation's hurricane preparedness plan for 2020.

The 2020 hurricane season begins June 1. NOAA predictions for the 2020 will be announced late March-early May. As we head into the new year, the installation staff is already preparing for the 2020 season.

The Directorate Plans, Training, Mobilization and Security facilitates annual hurricane table top training in March-April and will exercise the revised plan. Participation will include the garrison staff, 18th Weather Squadron, select 3rd ID staff, tenant organizations and the surrounding counties emergency management agency directors and staff.

A severe weather preparedness day/expo is scheduled for April for installation Soldiers, Family members, civilian and contractors.

In July, the 3rd ID staff will conduct an internal staff tabletop exercise to ensure newly assigned staff members are familiar with the installation hurricane plan and installation staff / 3rd ID staff functions during hurricane operations. Organizations and Family readiness groups can

receive severe weather briefs by contacting DPTMS Plans and Operations Division at 767-4414 or 767-2583.

Community members, on and off-post are encouraged to begin preparing for the 2020 hurricane season now. You can check your ready-kit inventories, the expiration dates of canned goods, secure and verify accountability of your important documents, verify emergency contact numbers and make a family plan in the event the service member is away or deployed.

In fact, these same actions need to be taken as we head into the coastal Georgia winter season, Fort Stewart-Hunter Army Airfield and Coastal Georgia winters are always unpredictable. Early 2018 brought the region rain, snow and icy conditions that shut down local businesses and installation operations for four days. Many residents in surrounding communities and counties went without power for several days. Fort Stewart and surrounding county emergency management agency leaders continuously preach, "Being Weather Ready is a year round process, not only for hurricane season."

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

Behind the scenes of the Thanksgiving team

Every year, military dining facilities begin planning months in advance to provide a special meal and while seasoning the DFAC with themed decorations for the Thanksgiving competition to bring the best culinary experience to service members, veterans, Department of Defense civilians and their families.

Through the competition, culinary specialists with 287th Field Feeding Company, Special Troops Battalion, 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade; 1st Battalion, 9th Field Artillery Regiment, 2nd Armored Brigade Combat Team and 1st ABCT, were offered the opportunity to showcase their talents at the Marne Bistro dining facility on Fort Stewart, Nov. 26 with a "Thanksgiving in the Chocolate Factory" and Hunter-Army Airfield Consolidated Dining Facility on Hunter-Army Airfield, Nov. 27 with a Carnival themed meal.

"In my 15 years of serving in food service, Thanksgiving has always been our Super Bowl," said Chief Warrant Officer 2 Bernadette Smith, the food advisor for 287th FFC, STB, 3rd IDSB. "Thanksgiving meal is beyond the serving line and much of the work is done behind the scenes. It's showcasing of talents like culinary arts, sculpting, baking, building,

cooking and displaying an event that changes the entire dining facility overnight. The ambiance when the doors open should give commands, customers and culinarians something to talk about for many years."

The Thanksgiving process is broken down in three phases planning, preparation and execution. The planning begins with a collaborative creative process followed by establishing timelines, deadlines and constant communication through in-progress review meetings.

"It's vital that planning begins six months prior to execution of the meal and then the last 90 days we're getting the money and moving forward," said Smith, who also served as the overall project manager. "I would engage both dining facility managers at Marne Bistro and Hunter Army Airfield because as NCOs they're the executors. I know my NCOs have the serving line and can execute a meal, but what's next?"

During the preparation phase, the DFAC at Hunter faced challenges while executing their carnival themed dining facility experience.

"The biggest challenge for us was doing a large variety of edible displays in a short period of time, but with proper planning we got it done and it was successful," said Sgt. 1st. Class Quincy Spivey, Hunter Arm Airfield DFAC manager with 287th FFC,

STB, 3IDSB.

The Marne Bistro dining facility also had challenges with executing their ideas with decorating.

"It was hard when we changed the theme from Aladdin to Willy Wonka," said Sgt. 1st class Sharon Mathis, Marne Bistro DFAC manger, with 287th FFC, STB, 3IDSB. "The Willy Wonka theme took a whole lot of time, it was really fun and the Soldiers really enjoyed doing it. So, I'm really happy and proud of the results."

The afternoon before the dining facility's Thanksgiving meal, the decorations team puts the final touches on the walls, tables and chairs and placement of props in the dining room while the cooking team worked in the kitchen prepping the food and began to slow roast meat items.

"I feel like Thanksgiving is that one time of the year that they can show out for their Super Bowl," said Smith. "Thanksgiving just gives you a different look at what a 92 Golf can do. It's important because as a 92 Golf we show them we do more than boil water. They don't just cook and fry and bake and things of that nature. They can actually sculpt, build and do a 5-star meal."

Thanksgiving also serves as more than a 'talent show' for the 92 Golf. The cooks also want to ensure that the holiday Soldiers spend in uniform may be away from their loved ones, but that they also eat together and enjoy their time with the Army family they work alongside with.

"I would like for the diners to feel like the DFAC is like a home away from home that's why we had a traditional theme as well as the Willy Wonka theme," said Mathis. "It's important to the Soldiers because we know a lot of them don't get to go home so, when they come in here we want them to feel like 'okay' I'm not at home with my Family, but I'm at home here with the Soldiers."

Senior leaders testify on progress to remedy military housing

WASHINGTON -- The Army's top leaders updated lawmakers Tuesday on progress being made to fix problems seen in privatized military housing.

In his opening statement, Secretary of the Army Ryan McCarthy restated the Army's "serious commitment" to offering quality housing to Soldiers, civil servants and their families.

"It is our responsibility to provide housing, not simply to code but also to quality," he testified before the Senate Armed Services Committee on Capitol Hill.

The current housing crisis, he said, must be fixed using a house-to-house approach, in addition to correcting the governance model and underlying issues to ensure systemic change.

WITHHOLDING INCENTIVES

Earlier this year, Army senior leaders placed housing as the No. 1 priority for quality of life, following complaints of health concerns inside homes and mismanagement of housing contractors.

In the past 10 months, the Army identified governance flaws, initiated commander-driven town halls and created 24-hour helplines to hear feedback directly from families, McCarthy said.

"We have empowered the chain of command as part of the solution, created transparency of the work order process, and ultimately, sought to regain the trust of the men and women in our ranks and their families," he said.

Backing these efforts, housing operations have now been assigned to the commander of Army Materiel Command, Gen. Gus Perna, who has delegated authority to slash incentive fees for housing contractors.

"We developed new incentive fee metrics measuring work order response times, work order repair quality, and resident satisfaction that will allow us to withhold fees for substandard performance," McCarthy said.

Incentives have already been cut for poor performance at Fort Benning, Georgia, and Joint Base Lewis-McChord, Washington, with possibly more to come across Army installations in the near future.

A new incentive fee award structure is also expected to be released Jan. 1, he added.

The average incentive fee now stands at 77%, with the lowest at 11%, said Army Chief of Staff Gen. James McConville, who also attended the hearing along with other military senior leaders.

"We see that making a difference in the performance of the contracts," McConville said.

BUDGET STANDSTILL

A tri-service Resident Bill of Rights is also awaiting to be published once Congress can pass the National Defense Authorization Act.

In it, there are 12 rights intended to protect residents of privatized military housing.

McCarthy highlighted dispute resolution as one of the rights that should greatly benefit residents.

"When the Bill of Rights is published, I think the dispute resolution is one, in particular, that we need to put in place as quickly as possible," he said. "It's why in many cases that the only mechanism that families have to get results is legal action. So the sooner we can have a dispute resolution in place, it will help improve matters dramatically."

About \$1.1 billion in budget requests to improve housing is also being held up while the government operates under a continuing resolution.

"We cannot start the projects, we cannot initiate the projects. We don't have the funding," McCarthy told lawmakers, adding in some cases it affects current projects.

NEED FOR NEW HOMES

Today, nearly half of the force lives on post.

Since February, over 2,200 families had to be temporarily displaced as a result of issues inside their homes. About 180 families are still in temporary housing while private-sector companies carry out work orders.

"To displaced families, days can feel like weeks. And weeks can feel like months," McCarthy said. "These aren't simply numbers; these are lives."

The Army has over 86,000 privatized homes. Of those, one-third need to be rebuilt and another one-third need minor repairs.

Some issues have involved lead paint, mold and other toxic hazards, especially in older homes found across installations.

McConville said some older homes are difficult to refurbish and cannot be torn down since they are considered historical.

"We need to modernize them," he told lawmakers. "Lead is a huge issue and we're very, very concerned for our families."

Due to the historical standards of the homes, only about 10 of them can be remediated each week, he added.

"It's going to take us some time," he said. "It's going to take us two to three years with these homes to get them to the level that we want them to be."

While "significant strides" have been made to improve housing over the

past year, McCarthy noted the finish line is still not in sight.

An overall analysis of the Army's privatized housing requirements is currently underway, he said, and is slated to be completed by the spring.

"The Army is resolved in our commitment to providing safe, quality, and affordable housing to our Soldiers and their families," he said. "But much more work remains."

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New capabilities highlight critical protective eyewear

FORT BELVOIR, Virginia -- Lt. Col. Ginger Whitehead has seen the gruesome consequences when Soldiers chose to don eyewear that didn't appear on the Army's authorized list.

Deployed Soldiers have suffered severe damage to their eyes or lost their sight entirely.

"We have seen some really horrific injuries with roadside bombs," said Whitehead, the product manager for protective equipment at Program Executive Office Soldier.

Using eyewear approved from the list, which features 27 products that have undergone extensive testing, could mean the difference between saving a Soldier's vision or going blind, Whitehead said.

"The Soldier's face is all chewed up," Whitehead said. "But when they pull his glasses off, where the skin is intact around their eyes, where you know without a doubt that eyewear saved their eyes."

To help protect Soldiers from serious injuries during combat missions, PEO Soldier has tested several protective eyewear models in compiling the authorized protective eyewear list, or APEL.

The Army introduced a lens model on the APEL that adds a new capability to the Army's Soldier Protection System: an advanced transition protective lenses. The Transition Combat Eye Protection, or TCEP lens, features sensors with a greater sensibility than traditional transitional lenses, responding to visible light instead of UV rays.

The transition happens in milliseconds allowing Soldiers to go from sunlight to indoors quickly without loss of their situational awareness to see incoming projectiles or enemy attacks instantly. Typically, commercial transition lenses can take up to 5-10 minutes to transition and adjust to changing light levels. Often they will not darken in bright sunlight if a Soldier sits inside of a Humvee. The TCEP lenses will.

"It's a one-second button," said Capt. Michael McCown, assistant product manager of head protection at PEO Soldier. "It's not like your transition lenses that you get from your doctor that change as you go in and outdoors it's electronic." It can also be set to transition automatically.

PEO Soldier also unveiled a cold-weather goggle that can resist fogging in colder conditions. The new capability could help Soldiers at cold-weather installations or troops taking part in winter operations.

Soldiers can access the Army's APEL list online at <https://www.peosoldier.army.mil/equipment/eyewear/>. Each product on the APEL must meet the Military Performance Standard, titled Military Combat Eye Protection, or MCEP System. The APEL, updated about every two years, offers a wide range of brands and styles of protective sunglasses and

goggles.

Approved eyewear has an APEL logo and can be purchased online, and at post exchanges and AAFES stores.

PEO Soldier also took feedback directly from Soldiers, who responded in surveys, that having faster transition lens glasses along with high-quality sunglasses ranked atop their lists.

"They aren't forced into a particular set of eyewear," McCown said. "They're able to choose which ones they want for their preferences."

APEL-approved eyewear undergoes rigorous trials and a series of ballistic and non-ballistic testing at Aberdeen Proving Ground, Maryland, and at eyewear production facilities. Those tests include optical distortion, UV absorption and resistance to abrasion, and many more. The Army has placed a high priority on Soldier eyewear safety, bringing in ballistic experts and quality-assurance specialists to evaluate and witness the tests.

The Army requires each vendor to test their items every six months for conformance and have their items tested by a third-party laboratory every two years for recertification. Quality audits are also conducted annually at each facility to make sure they are in compliance with ISO 9001 - Quality management systems -- and ISO 17025 -- General requirements for the competence of testing and calibration laboratories.

McCown said Soldiers prioritize choice and style but he warns Soldiers and their commanders about the critical importance of APEL-approved eyewear.

McCown cautions Soldiers only to trust products with the APEL-approved logo or to refer to the APEL list when choosing protective eyewear. Products with an APEL logo marked March 2019 or earlier remain valid and can still be used for ballistics fragmentation protection.

Whitehead added that the Army keeps the list at 27 to encourage competition among vendors to deliver higher quality protects, as well as keep prices affordable for Soldiers of each rank.

The APEL is a part of the Army's Soldier Protection System, which guards Soldiers against threats using reduced-weight equipment in a modular, adjustable, next-generation protective system.
