DOMAIN SPECIFIED IS NOT AVAILABLE

Ever been unable to login to your laptop or workstation due to the below error message?:

"The domain specified is not available. Please try again later."

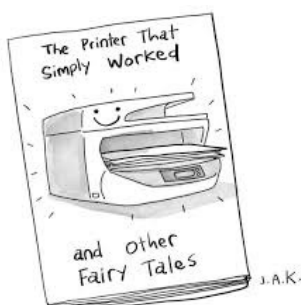
Though there are several reasons a user may receive this message, one reason is due to not having cached credentials on your machine. Our laptops/workstations are configured to cache the most recent credentials. "Cache" means it "remembers" you logged into the machine so that if you try to log in to it again when it's not on the network then it will assume you're still authorized to log into it and allows you to log in.

Otherwise, you would authenticate to the Domain Controller - meaning your login request would be sent to the Domain Controller and other servers, such as the OCSP server, which verifies the certificate on your CAC card is still valid.

However, when you use cached credentials, your machine doesn't/can't authenticate to the Domain Controllers/OCSP Server/etc. It remembers the certificate on your CAC card that you use for authenticating. However, if you get a new CAC card and haven't logged onto your laptop yet, the NEW certificate wasn't cached. Your computer sees the new certificate as a completely different user because the certificate is different. Thus, you are not allowed to log on to your laptop while off the network since the cached credentials would be looking for a different certificate (your OLD certificate).

Moral of the story: Log in to your machine at work after getting a new CAC before taking your machine home for telework.
