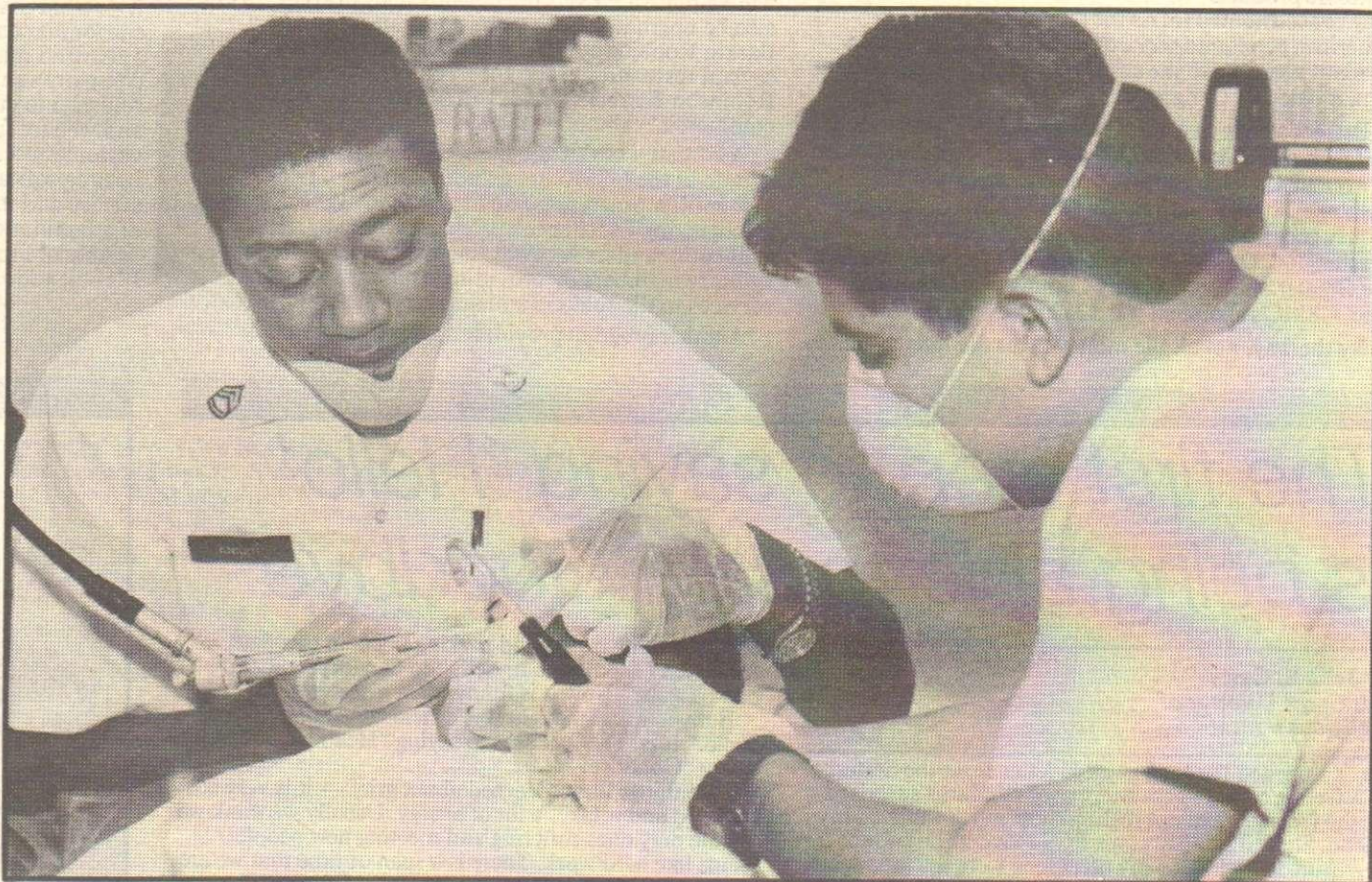
CMC update

Dental community volunteers services Pattonville children benefit at program's debut

Volunteer professionals from the community's dental activity (DENTAC) met at the Pattonville Dental Clinic Saturday to cater to children.

Faced with the mission to serve its 4,500 active-duty members first, the dental staff was unable to meet the treatment needs of an additional 5,000 family members. Appointments for children's cleanings were not available.

"Unlike medical care, dental care is not an entitlement program, and as a result care is provided on a space-available as opposed to a space-required basis," said Dr (Maj) Michael Doran, officer in charge of the clinic.

The clinic NCOIC Staff Sgt. David Moser added, "Right now, we have one dental hygienist. In an average year, she can see 2,200 patients. So it's a resource problem."

To solve the problem, Dr. Doran suggested opening the clinic on Saturday for the sole purpose of cleaning children's teeth.

He was the first to volunteer to work. Little did he know his enthusiasm to serve the community would be contagious. Volunteer-dentists, dental hygienist and dental assistants, military and civilian, from Nellingen, Robinson Barracks and headquarters joined him.

In the first hour, 22 children were seen. By the end of the day, 108 children's teeth sparkled.

Jean VanVranken, Pattonville's only dental hygienist normally would have spent six-and-a-half days on the same number of patients.

"I always wanted to do kids," she said, "but this is a military clinic and active-duty have priority. My patients today have been very cooperative. Most of them have to go to soccer games, so they were very good."

"There should be more programs like this for kids," said parent Carla Hardison. "On a regular basis, it's crowded and the kids don't get seen. We're getting ready to PCS and my daughter needed her cleaning. I think the program is real good."

The children didn't mind it either, but most popular among them were the cartoons on the lobby TV.

"The atmosphere here — without adults around — is good for the kids," said Sgt. Conrad Liburd, training NCO for headquarters, 7th Engineer Brigade. "I've seen children's clinics like this back in the States, and I think it's super."

DENTAC Commander Dr. (Col.) Donald Campbell agreed "When you bring a child into this fun, happy-type atmosphere, it has a long term effect that goes beyond their teeth," he said. "It actually makes going to the dentist a pleasant experience. This means they won't develop a fear of dentists or den-

tal treatment, and this will be a lifetime benefit."

An additional side-effect for working parents can't be overlooked either, said Carolyn Rawlings. "This should make it convenient for parents that work all day. They won't have to worry about taking their kids out of school to come here."

Another Pattonville resident and parent, Lorna McAllister, said, "I hope the parents support the program by bringing their kids here, because they're the ones that always complain, and this is a good opportunity."

Dr. Doran feels Saturday's service proved that the demand for care is there. He estimates offering the service about every six weeks.

"Cleanings for children is more for prevention as opposed to treatment of disease as it is for adults. But there's no arguing the benefits of preventive dentistry so we think the Saturday program is a solution to the problem of having to concentrate more on treatment rather than prevention."

Sgt. 1st Class Reggie Knight, the DENTAC First Sergeant and a hygienist, said, "this is an excellent program for kids to get the treatment they deserve, but that we're frequently unable to provide during duty hours. It's good for the community because with its size, and the number of dental hygienists we have, it's a good chance to get people in. And it's free, too," he said. "This shows our commitment to help make this a Community of Excellence."

AAFES returns \$131 million to customers

Money talks. Maybe you don't feel that way when you go to an Army and Air Force Exchange Service store and you don't find what you need. To be sure, AAFES gets its share of cusses and complaints.

AAFES in Europe provides military members with the stateside products they're accustomed to. As the major supplier of American goods and services, AAFES provides those goods at a savings to the customer. That is their mission as mandated by Congress.

Besides saving customers money, AAFES gives exactly half their profits to the morale and welfare accounts of the Army and Air Force. Last year, that amount was \$131 million. Although that's for AAFES worldwide, and the money goes from AAFES headquarters in Dallas to Washington, D.C., some of the money eventually reaches the Greater Stuttgart Military Community. Last fiscal year, GSMC's allotment was \$252,000.

By the way, not all the money takes the long route.



The AAFES food concessions here provide half their profits directly to GSMC. This agreement creates a unique partnership between GSMC and AAFES.

You may wonder what happens to the other half of AAFES' earnings. That's used for the capital expenditure fund, on needs like new buildings and renovation. In the past eight months, AAFES has spent \$1.1 million on projects in GSMC. The new Four Seasons and Toyland store at Robinson Barracks, Anthony's Pizza at Nellingen, and the clothing sales store at Panzer are some examples of how money from the capital expenditure fund is spent.

In the future, the barber shop at Robinson Barracks will be renovated and the bowling alley at Kelley will also be upgraded. New to the community will be a Baskin Robbins at Patch, a flower shop at Nellingen, several restaurants at Panzer, and a company store at Robinson Barracks which will sell Jayhawk and commercial camouflage items.

As if that wasn't enough, AAFES employs 1,620 people in the GSMC area, and has in place two recognition programs. The first is the "AAFES Recognizing Excellence" program. Basically, it assists unit commanders in rewarding their outstanding military members by providing coupons for free services to the soldiers and airmen of the month/year.

Another program provides support to community

programs. For example, Special Olympics Fun Run participants received sun bands and caps, and the winners received running shoes. Every year in December, AAFES contributes gift wrapping materials to community groups to earn money wrapping gifts in the exchange.

A major project planned by AAFES is a car-care center at Pattonville run under a major U.S. franchise concept. This will complete the one-stop, car-care center which so far includes a garage, gas station and parts store. These are co-located with the registration/inspection station and inland POV reception station. The parts store will be a test-bed prototype for the company, and will include telecommunications parts ordering which will allow the receipt of mailable car parts in four to seven days. AAFES feels GSMC is special and has chosen it as the very first site for the concept in the world.

AAFES management considers its customers the company's shareholders. After all, all profits are returned to customers in the form of money to morale and welfare funds, or as new or improved facilities for customer use. Their operating policies and success insure profitable returns to the community — better service and improved facilities. Those are the precepts of a familiar concept — the community of excellence.

As shareholders, you can take pride in your stock. It's still your money talking.

chaplain's corner

The first step to saying 'Hello' is being able to say 'Goodbye'

As I opened the long awaited letter from the States, a feeling of loneliness swept over me. I was surprised by the feeling. I had not realized how much I missed my friend. She left Stuttgart on a PCS move in July. Her departure left a hole in my life. Gone were the tuna salad lunches, trips to old churches and someone who would listen. It was gratifying to learn that she was feeling the same loss. Her letter was full of adjustments and loneliness.

Moving to a new assignment means different things to each of us. It means new quarters, new schools, new office workers, new little league teams, new doctors, new teachers, new hair dressers and new chapels.

In most cases when we move we experience a loss. In fact moving is considered one of the ten most severe stressors one can experience. This experience can be felt as deeply as a death in the family. When new families arrive they are often in a state of grief both individual and corporate. Their adjustment to new surroundings is complicated by feelings of anger, loneliness, crying, shyness, confusion, disorientation and frustration.

Recently I visited a colleague of mine in another community. She was in country one month and had lost her keys four different times. On the day I visited her she again lost her keys. We searched for over an hour. "I am usually so organized," she exclaimed through her tears, "I get so angry with myself!" Never mind the fact she was living in a hotel out of suitcases with no car, no pay check in a foreign country. Her reaction was normal.

Adjusting to Germany is an additional burden. Families and singles try to cling to what they know. It is during this time that they are most vulnerable. Unfortunately it is also when important decisions have to be made. Will we live on the economy? Can I afford this rent? Is this car the best buy?

Six weeks after my arrival in Germany I put my head down on my new-used car's steering wheel and cried

after receiving my second parking ticket in two days. "Where," I shouted to myself, "do they expect me to park, Texas?" Now it is funny, then it was not.

But you ask, I thought this article was about "Saying Hello." It is. The first step to saying "Hello" is being able to say "Goodbye."

Two things I have learned about grief — it is very self-centered and it takes a lot of energy. Usually we think we are the only ones suffering and meeting new people seems like hard work. There is a span of time that we are not ready to meet new people. Be kind to yourself by allowing time to adjust.

You can make adjustment easier for you and your family by offering stability through little things. One family I know has hung the same pictures in the same configuration on their dining room wall in seventeen different sets of quarters. The wife told me, "Since our children were toddlers this wall of pictures, wherever it is, has represented the love in our family which will never change."

Break out of your tendency to cling to comfortable things and people by greeting your new neighbors, signing up for craft classes, attending the local chapel, registering for Sunday School and volunteering in a service project. Be tenacious in having your family's needs met. Is there a soccer program, a ballet teacher or Jazzercise classes?

A special note for Germany: begin early making family outings. Do not allow your family to become reclusive and dependent on the local American community. Attend German/American functions, visit the local castle and take a class in German culture.

Finally, remember the person in the quarters next to you may not really be stuck-up. Perhaps they are new too! Take a risk.

My letter from my friend was welcomed with a initial feeling of loneliness. My next feeling was one of excitement and anticipation. I have been blessed in my life with wonderful friends and they get better all the time. As I fold her letter, I walk out of the post office looking into faces that are new to Stuttgart. Maybe one of them will be God's next blessing for me.

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General McCarthy named to USEUCOM post

Gen. James P. McCarthy, U.S. Air Force, became Deputy Commander-in-Chief of the U.S. European Command at a Sept. 13 ceremony at Patch Barracks. Gen. McCarthy will succeed Gen. Thomas C. Richards, U.S. Air Force, who has served nearly three years as the USEUCOM Deputy Commander-in-Chief. Gen. Richards and his wife, Meredyth, will retire to San Angelo, Texas, culminating a 38-year military career.

Gen. McCarthy was commissioned through the Reserve Officer Training Corps program in 1957. The early stages of his career include assignments as a pilot, operations officer, and as an officer training cadets at the U.S. Air Force Academy, Colorado Springs, Colorado.

Later at the Air Force Academy, he directed the academy's preparation for the initial admission of women in July 1976. He transferred to the 97th Bombardment Wing, Blytheville Air Force Base, Arkansas in March 1977 as Vice Commander and became Commander in September 1978. In March 1979, Gen. McCarthy was named Commander of the 93rd Bombardment Wing at Castle Air Force Base, California. He also served as special assistant for the MX missile program at Air Force Headquarters.

In October 1982, Gen. McCarthy became director of legislative liaison, Office of the Secretary of the Air Force. His next assignment was Deputy Chief of Staff for Plans, developing policies, programs and requirements for the Strategic Air Command, Offutt Air Force Base, Nebraska. In January 1987, he assumed command of 8th Air Force at Barksdale AFB, Louisiana. He became Deputy Chief of Staff for Programs and Resources at Air Force Headquarters in March 1988. Gen. McCarthy is a command pilot with more than 5,000 flying hours in 28 different aircraft.

He is married to the former Alice Marie Gartner of Canton, Ohio. They have five children: Kathleen, Susan, Michael, Mark and Ann.

President picks General Powell to head the Joint Chiefs of Staff

President George Bush has selected Army Gen. Colin L. Powell to replace retiring Navy Adm. William J. Crowe Jr. as the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. Bush made the White House announcement Aug. 10.

"The position of the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff has always been a special and important one," Bush said. "Our chairman today has unique responsibilities. He has a significant role in determining our military requirements and developing our defense budget."

"As we face the challenge of the '90s, it is important that the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff be a person of breadth, judgement, experience and total integrity. Colin Powell has all those qualities and more," he said. "He will bring leadership, insight and wisdom to our efforts to keep our military strong and ready, prepared to

defend our security and to safeguard the peace."

Before he told the audience gathered in the White House Rose Garden that he was "ready to go for it" and face the challenges ahead, Powell said, "I feel it is a special privilege to be the spokesman for the millions of great young men and women who are serving their nation voluntarily in uniform."

As chairman, Powell will be the principal military adviser to the president, the National Security Council and Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney. Powell, 52, who was national security adviser to President Ronald Reagan, is the most junior Army four-star general and is currently commander of Forces Command, headquarters at Fort McPherson, Ga. Powell, who was promoted to his rank in April, is an infantry officer commissioned through the ROTC program in 1958 at City University of New York.

In his 31-year Army career, he has had a variety of assignments in Europe, Vietnam and Korea and throughout the United States. His joint-service assignments began in 1972 as a White House Fellow. His subsequent assignments include operations research systems analyst in the Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Manpower and Reserve Affairs, executive to the special assistant to the secretary and deputy secretary of defense and military assistant to the secretary of defense. Soldiers not eligible for 'old' GI Bill can benefit

Although the "old" GI Bill (also known as the Vietnam-era GI Bill) will expire on Dec. 31, many personnel who are not eligible for the "old" bill will still be able to receive educational benefits.

Active-duty service members and some veterans who qualify for the "old" GI Bill and who have not used all of their educational benefits can switch to the "new" Montgomery GI Bill. These individuals will not be required to make the \$1200 contribution normally required to participate in the Montgomery GI Bill.

To qualify for the "old" GI Bill, service members must have entered active duty before Jan. 1, 1977, or signed a delayed enlistment contract no later than Jan. 2, 1977. In addition, the following criteria must be met: One, they must have been on active duty on Oct. 19, 1984, the date the new GI Bill was enacted. Two, they must have remained on active duty without a break in service until July 1, 1985, the day the program actually began. And third, they then must have served three years of continuous active duty beyond that date or until July 1, 1988.

The Montgomery GI Bill provides a maximum of \$300 a month to up to 36 months of full-time schooling for single veterans. The "old" GI Bill provides a maximum of \$376 per month to up to 45 months of fulltime schooling for single veterans. Married veterans receive more money based on the number of family members.

However, service members who have not used any of their "old" GI Bill will be limited to 36 months of educational benefits. To compensate for the loss of nine months of benefits, they will also receive up to half of the money allowed under the "old" GI Bill. Those who have used some of the "old" GI Bill cannot receive more than 48 months of combined benefits under the two programs.

It is important to also note that anyone who is eligible for the "old" GI Bill but has not used any benefits, must have a high school diploma or an equivalent by Dec. 31 to be eligible to use benefits under the Montgomery GI Bill after that date.

Outdoor Rec ready to put skiers on the slopes

The skiing season is about to avalanche its way into Germany, and the Outdoor Recreation Branch at Robinson Barracks is ready.

"I foresee a good winter season," said Ralph Brecht, the Outdoor Recreation Branch director. "The snow went down to 1,200 meters in the Alps, and that is always a good sign."

Outdoor Rec will be offering one of their most popular programs, the one-day ski trip, every Saturday once the snow falls. This trip includes equipment, instruction, and transportation all for one price ranging from \$15 to \$35. If the whole family wants to go skiing for the day, family packages are offered for \$55. The bus usually leaves around 6:30 a.m. for beautiful regions in Germany such as Oberstorf and the Black Forest and returns about 7:30 p.m. Outdoor Rec also offers a snow report every morning. It's just a matter of calling them up.

Outdoor Rec has received new Alpine and Nordic ski equipment to make those one-day ski trips even nicer. However, the outings are geared more to the inexperienced skiers, and those who have never skied before.

"The idea behind the program," Brecht said, "is to get those who've

never skied before interested in skiing." However, skiing isn't the only thing that Outdoor Rec is offering to winter sports enthusiasts.

"We have new snowboards," Brecht said. "We will also offer special snowboard trips with instructors." The Mosski — a cross between a snowboard and a sled — will be available, Brecht said.

For cross-country skiers, there will be plenty to do. A special trip to the Black Forest, and a German-sponsored cross-country marathon is in store.

"Last year the marathon was 15,000 miles," Brecht said.

If you're not into the sports of winter, you can still take advantage of Outdoor Rec.

"They can attend the trips to do sightseeing and hiking," Brecht said. "We can even drop them off in town, so they can go shopping." He also said that sleds would be available.

Outdoor Rec has recently opened another shop at Nellingen Barracks in bldg. 3704 "to give patrons the opportunity to check out equipment not only at Robinson Barracks," Brecht said you can sign up for all the programs that Outdoor Rec offers at the new Nellingen shop.

"If at least four individuals sign up for a program, the bus will go out and pick them up at Nellingen," Brecht added. Nellingen's shop has skiing



equipment and all of the other seasonal equipment that the Robinson Barracks facility offers.

"People can also drop off their personal skis for maintenance at Nellingen," Brecht said. "We are taking skiers to get fitted there, too."

The Nellingen shop is a pilot project, Brecht said, that will be operated by the present staff. However, whether the shop stays open depends on the participation of everyone involved in winter sports in GSMC.

"It's up to the folks to decide if they want it," Brecht stressed. "I also urge commanders to promote this program within their units because we offer special unit activities."

Outdoor Rec has other new equipment including canoes and sailboards. They have grass skis (used for practicing alpine skiing) and roller skis (used for practicing cross-country skiing). Both types are fast becoming popular throughout Europe.

"In the future, grass and roller skiing could become sports," Brecht said. "Europe's already doing this."

With skiing just around the corner, a ski team meeting is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Oct. 11 at the Robinson Barracks Outdoor Rec bldg. 121. This meeting will arrange a community championship to determine who will represent GSMC at the VII Corps level. There will also be a vote for alpine and cross-country team captains.

Upcoming programs at Outdoor Rec include an orienteering program geared toward units that uses the basics of map and compass. Also, the Hunting and Fishing Coordinator recently moved to Robinson Barracks, so if you want to get a license, she can set up classes to get you qualified to hunt and fish in Germany.

What winter sports all boils down to (pardon the expression) is having fun, and that's what Outdoor Rec is all about.

"We want to make outdoor activities cost-reasonable for those who can't afford a whole lot," Brecht said. "That way everybody can have fun — from the person who's never skied before to the experienced skier."

Bavarian AFRC facilities open to military retirees

Officials at the Armed Forces Recreation Center in West Germany recently announced that military retirees may now use AFRC facilities at Berchtesgaden, Chiemsee, and Garmisch without obtaining a German Customs certificate. This significant change in policy is a result of the July 1 change to U.S. Army Europe regulations regarding retirees' use of Army facilities in Europe.

Previously, retirees were required to register with German customs officials and could only use AFRC facilities 30 days after arrival in Germany.

"We're very happy to see an end to these restrictions," said AFRC Executive Director James McCrindle. "Military retirees can now enjoy their European vacation at our facilities in beautiful Southern Bavaria."

Retirees may use AFRC facilities and make reservations up to six months in advance. "However, I would encourage reservations for the spring and fall sea-

sons since historically those are the months when more hotel rooms are available."

The customs restrictions are still in effect for use of post exchange and commissary facilities, meaning a customs certificate is still required to make purchases in these facilities. "I would also suggest that retirees bring along their medical records and any prescription medicines if needed," McCrindle added. "Medical facilities are limited at all three AFRC area."

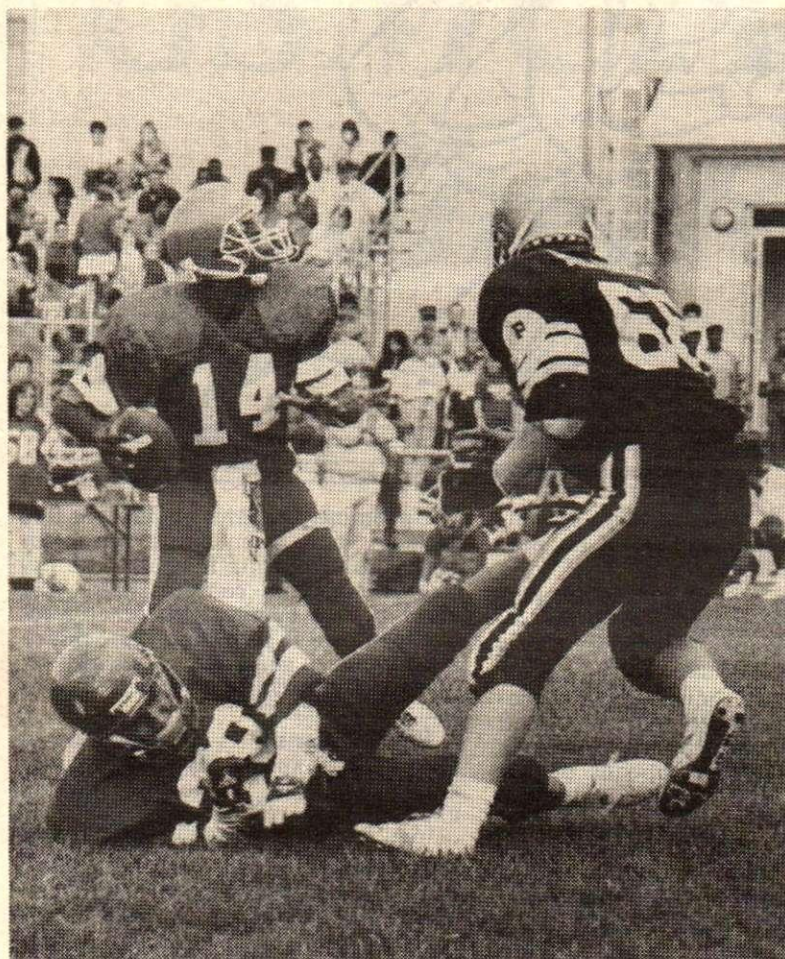

Stallions outlast Panthers 20-14 in overtime

Stuttgart 20, Patch 14 OT

A 20-yard pass from Stuttgart's Kevin Davis to Ron Blair in overtime and a disastrous second quarter for the Patch Panthers were the deciding factors in a 20-14 thriller Sept. 16 at the Stuttgart American High School football field.

In a battle for the bragging rights of the Greater Stuttgart Military Community, Coach Joe Brant's Stallions and Ted Davis' Panthers went to war in this non-conference game filled with intensity and gutsy determination.

The first quarter was scoreless with Patch blowing a key opportunity to score after Stuttgart fumbled on their own 3-yard line. The Stallions defense then tightened their belts and made a goal line stand that changed the momentum of the game.

Patch fumbled on the first play of the second quarter which was a sign of things to come as the Panthers would fumble twice more in the second quarter and throw an interception. Stuttgart only took advantage of one fumble, though. Steve Williams ramblled in from 24 yards out and Davis dove into the corner of the endzone for the two-point conversion to put the Stallions up 8-0 at halftime.

On the first play from scrimmage of the second half, Andre Peaker zipped 72 yards for the touchdown to give Stuttgart a comfortable 14-0 lead. But Patch would not die. The Panthers clawed back into the game on a 30-yard run by Pat Norman and the score was 14-7 after the extra point by Mike Barry.

In the fourth quarter, a streaking Leroy Dickson

caught a 59-yard pass from Mike Heason to stun Stuttgart's defense and tie the game at 14 apiece. The Stallions moved the ball down to the 5-yard line on a fake field goal with 9 seconds left, but could not punch it in on the last play of regulation.

The excitement continued in overtime with Stuttgart blocking a Patch field goal attempt on the opening drive. Stuttgart then took their second possession with a foot of the goal, but the Panther defense held the Stallions back from the victory. The next Stuttgart possession ended in Davis' 24-yard TD pass to Blair. Patch had one last chance but lost on downs.

Peaker led all rushers with 128 yards on 21 carries, with Patch's Norman leading the Patch ground game with 57 yards on 11 carries.

Defensively, Stuttgart was led by Jonathan Hill who had eight solo tackles, five assists, and two fumble recoveries. Nose guard Sean Powers had six solos, four assists, and two fumble recoveries. Williams also got in on the defensive action with two interceptions. Patch's defense was led by Norman who had seven tackles and 12 assists.

Nobody does it better than 007

Melancholy strains of a funeral dirge hang in the air. A grieving widow enters the room. A man rises from his chair. He approaches the woman. "My condolences," he says, simultaneously slamming a straight right hand into her face. She's sent sprawling.

No way to treat a lady? But it's the perfect greeting for a SPECTRE (Special Executive for Counterintelligence, Terrorism, Revenge and Extortion) agent posing as one.

The scene is the socko opening from *Thunderball*, arguably the best of the James Bond films. There's been 15 of them since the series began in 1962 and next week the latest edition, *Licence To Kill*, opens in GSMC theaters. For 007 buffs, it's a chance to compare the film and its star, Timothy Dalton, with some illustrious predecessors. With the advent of VCRs, new fans can do likewise.

Ian Fleming wrote the Bond books with the ambition of grabbing readers "somewhere between the solar plexus and upper thigh." He conceived of his hero as a "blunt instrument" but the character soon gained a life of its own—particularly in its screen incarnations.

The most impressive of those was Sean Connery.

Connery struck one as the type of guy who, if he dated your sister, would have to be covered by two punks with heaters in the back seat. Tall, dark and mean, he starred in the first five 007 flicks—*Dr. No.* (1962), *From Russia With Love* (1963), *Goldfinger* (1964), *Thunderball* (1965), and *You Only Live Twice* (1967)—before taking a breather and returning for a comeback in *Diamonds Are Forever* (1971).

Bondophiles will never forget Connery mixing it up with late Robert Shaw, who played the psychotic Red Grant, on the Orient Express in *From Russia With Love*. Or being strapped to a table as Goldfinger methodically sliced ever closer with his laser beam. Or in *Thunderball* dancing with his would-be assassin who's just been shot, depositing her at another table and telling a gaping couple "Do you mind if my friend sits this one out. She's just dead." And she was.

The series almost died when wimpish George Lazenby replaced the retired Connery in *On Her Majesty's Secret Service* (1969). Fortunately, Roger Moore came on the scene. Though less rugged than Connery, he was smoother than silk on ice.

Moore brought 007 to life in *Live And Let Live*

(1973), *The Man With the Golden Gun* (1975), *The Spy Who Loved Me* (1977), *Moonraker* (1979), *For Your Eyes Only* (1981), *Octopussy* (1983) and *A View To A Kill* (1985). *Live And Let Die*, *The Spy Who Loved Me* and *Octopussy* were authentic classics. *Live And Let Die* featured wild speedboat races through Louisiana's bayous, alligators attacking Bond, and another suitably vicious fight aboard a train with Geoffrey Holder. The incredible hulk, Jaws (Richard Kiel), made his debut in *The Spy Who Loved Me*, menacing 007 from the pyramids to Sardinia. And *Octopussy* saw Bond take the place of a tiger on a tiger hunt in India.

Although the women in the Bond flicks were gorgeous and the locales exotic, what sticks in the mind is the high quality of villainy present. The bad guys never settle for just killing Bond, they want to make him suffer first. Only a Philistine could fail to appreciate the intellectually arrogant Dr. No. (Joseph Wiseman), the blond beast in *From Russia With Love* (Robert Shaw), Goldfinger or his mute henchman Oddjob, Donald Pleasance's maniacal Blofeld in *You Only Live Twice*, Christopher Lee's million-dollar hitman Scaramanga in *The Man With The Golden Gun*, Louis Jordan's debonair nefariousness in *Octopussy* or Grace Jones' chic malevolence in *A View To A Kill*.

Sweathearts, all.

Robert Davi takes up that tradition as a heavy in *Licence To Kill*. According to a book based on the screenplay, the film follows 007 on the path of a drug dealer who had fed Bond's best friend to the sharks. Sounds promising. Timothy Dalton returns for his second go-around as Bond. While he didn't do badly in 1987's *The Living Daylights*, the film itself lacked the larger-than-life quality which was so prevalent in some of the others. Anyway, it appears that 007 is here to stay—insuring that the world is made safe for dry martinis.

Nobody does it better.
