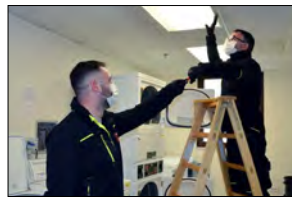

ANSBACH



STUTTGART



Aurora D. Tovar, the lead human resources technician in the Passports and SOFA/Military Personnel Division. From April 1-29, she conducted eight passport outreach sessions to meet the Department of Defense mandate for civilian employees and family members to hold a Special Issuance Passport. Aurora presented an information brief for the community to include a Q&A session. During the last month, she led an eight-person team to process 150 official passport applications and served approximately 375 customers. Her initiative, technical competence and leadership talents enhanced the support garrison provides to the Stuttgart Military Community.

Simultaneously, Veronica worked with the PAO to ensure water quality information was up-to-date on the garrison website and app, and to review draft public communications. Their swift, competent action kept residents informed, reassured and safe.

WIESBADEN



Dr. Mirko Grimm from DPW Environmental led the planning and execution of two significant events. He led Earth Day observance, coordinating with several external organizations to set up information booths and to provide the community with items such as bike repair kits, flower seeds, and reusable shopping bags. He also incorporated Wiesbaden Middle School by displaying art that the students created with recycled material. Mirko also took it upon himself to coordinate the support of Girl's Day for children of DPW employees. He provided the girls the opportunity to observe and receive briefings at the airfield, fire department, and maintenance shops within DPW. His efforts facilitated an extremely successful partnership event between the local community and USAG Wiesbaden.

Firefighter Sascha Schubert was driving home in the early hours of May 9. As he was nearing the Frankfurt airport area, he came across a mass-casualty event caused by multiple car accidents. Sascha used his training as a firefighter to triage over a dozen patients. He also directed multiple personnel on scene on providing medical attention to injured personnel. Ultimately, he personally saved the lives of three people by providing emergency medical care prior to the arrival of the German Emergency Services. For his distinguishing actions, Sascha will be nominated for a Civilian Award for Humanitarian Service, as well as for recognition from the State of Hessen.
