## UNIQUE CAPABILITIES

Fort Leonard Wood is a thriving, prosperous installation which evolved from a small WWII training site 80 years ago to a premier Army Training Center & Center of Excellence, training from 75-80,000 teammates each year in active component courses.

Fort Leonard Wood is home to three U.S. Army schools: the U.S. Army Engineer; Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear (CBRN); and Military Police schools.

In addition to training these three specialties for the Army, we are one of four Army Training Centers with reception operations and Basic Combat Training.

On top of the 75-80,000 trained in the active component courses, we train an additional 14,000 to 15,000 service members from 130 Reserve and other non-tenant units. We are also the proud home of the 102nd Training Division (Maneuver Support) and Missouri Army National Guard's 35th Engineer Brigade.

Fort Leonard Wood hosts and trains with the largest Marine Corps Detachment on an Army base; the Marine Corps' Civilian Policy Academy; the largest Air Force Squadron on an Army base; Air Force Heavy Weapons Gunnery course; and Navy Seabees and Facilities Engineering detachment.

We are home to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' Prime Power School and home of several deployable U.S. Army Forces Command units.

We are also home to a large international student detachment — approximately 475 international students are trained each year. We take care of and train international partners from over 70 nations annually.



## UNIQUE INSTALLATION

- 63,000 acres of land with four access control points, which experience more than 33,000 vehicles in and out daily.
- 45 percent of the installation borders federally owned property, and there are no encroachment, environmental, or noise concerns.
- 2,690 buildings, providing 16.8 million square feet of facilities for our unique and highly technical training and support activities.
- 35 ranges, 89 training sites, and 51 maneuver areas; we manage more than 42,000 pieces of equipment that support our training.
- 6,040 feet of available runway for commercial jet and military air service.
- General Leonard Wood Army Community Hospital provides a fully-accredited bedded hospital that accepts VA beneficiaries from Missouri and Arkansas hospitals.

On an average day, Fort Leonard Wood has over 11,000 service members in training; employs or hosts more than 13,000 military and civilian employees, including contractors, on post; and supports over 10,800 family members and about 60,200 retirees.

economic impact of over \$2 Billion.
