### What made you decide to have a career with the Army?

While completing dental school, my instructors encouraged me to pursue working as an Army civilian and shared all the potential benefits for me and my family. After two years of working in private practice in the Waynesville area, the opportunity presented itself.

### What are the benefits of working for the Army?

The benefits of working for the Army are definitely different from working in private practice. Working for the Army has given me the **opportunity to advance** in the dental field. I started out as a dental assistant, then became an X-ray technician, and now I'm a sterilization

technician. Another benefit is being able to **provide more for my family** while giving me the chance to **give back to my country** in some small way by **helping our Soldiers** with their dental health needs.
