

Soldiers, Airmen gain skills at Fort Leonard Wood



Annually, an average of 600 Marine students attend one of the three basic Engineer Equipment Instruction Company courses – Engineer Equipment Repair, Engineer Equipment Operator and Technical Engineering - and Mackedanz is responsible for maintaining and updating the program of instruction for each course. And every three years, Mackedanz conducts a course content review board to make sure each course is meeting current Marine Corps doctrine.

Where are you from?

Peculiar, Missouri

When did you join the Marines and why?

I went to boot camp in 1982. A friend of mine joined the Marine Corps, and when he came back, he dared me to join. So, I did. He thought I wouldn't do it, but I did. I wanted to get out of my small town and do something different. I ended up serving for 20 years.

What made you decide to continue serving as a civilian?

It is what I was used to. The civilian world was different. There were more opportunities for my skillset on post. And the pay and benefits are better working for the military.

What do you like most about your job?

The people. I like being here to support the service members. I have met so many different people that have so many different stories and backgrounds. I like knowing I am passing my knowledge on to future

generations of Marines. It is drilled into your head in boot camp – once a Marine, always a Marine. When these Marines leave the schoolhouse, I know I played a part in their success. I take pride in making sure the information they are learning is correct.

Are there benefits to the different military branches training together?

A mechanic is a mechanic, whether you are a Soldier or a Marine. The equipment might be a little bit different, but your mission is the same. At some point, the branches end up serving or working together, and it is good to understand each other's similarities and differences. At the end of the day, we are doing the same thing, just in different uniforms.
