



When did you start working for the U.S. Army?

What made you want to continue serving as an Army civilian?

I love law and helping others. I like helping Soldiers when they need it most. As a civilian, I am able to provide consistency for an office. I can remember cases from years ago that apply today, but new Soldiers in

the office don't have that knowledge.

What have you enjoyed about your time at Fort Leonard Wood?

We have such a great team here at Fort Leonard Wood. We work well together, and we get the job done. It is bittersweet to leave. The communities around post have a smalltown feel, and I am going to miss that. Our community here sticks together and helps one another.
