Mass-vaccintation event

General Leonard Wood Army Community Hospital is hosting a mass-vaccination event from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday at Nutter Field House. Appointments may be scheduled here. The event is for service members, Tricare beneficiaries and Department of Defense employees and contractors. Anyone receiving a follow-up Pfizer vaccine must bring their COVID-19 Vaccination Record Card and 21 days must have passed since the initial vaccine. Attendees should wear a short sleeve or loose-fitting shirt. Visit GL-WACH's Facebook page for updates.

COVID-19 clinic move

cessing trainees. Pumphrey is always enthusiastic, respectful and willing to collaborate. To date, her efforts have influenced and been instrumental in on-boarding more than 17,000 trainees.

LEONARD WOOD JUSTICE

Courts-Martial

— A captain plead guilty at a General Court-Martial to two specifications of rape of a child, one specification of rape, and one specification of sexual assault. The officer was sentenced to 17 years confinement, forfeiture of all pay and allowances, and a dismissal from the Army.

Reprimands

- A second lieutenant received a permanently filed General Officer Memorandum of Reprimand for driving while intoxicated. Separation from the Army initiated.
- A staff sergeant received a permanently filed General Officer Memorandum of Reprimand for driving while intoxicated.
- A specialist received a permanently filed General Officer Memorandum of Reprimand for driving while intoxicated.

- A private received nonjudicial punishment pursuant to UCMJ, Article 15, for failure to follow a lawful order by failing to turn in a personal electronic device at the ordered time. The commander punished the Soldier with a forfeiture of pay.
- In July, 27 service members and civilians were convicted at Federal Magistrate Court for serious traffic offenses occurring on Fort Leonard Wood.

Other Misconduct

— A private first class received nonjudicial punishment pursuant to UCMJ, Article 15, for fighting with another Soldier. The commander punished the Soldier with extra duty for seven days.

NOTE: Soldiers administratively separated receive one of three characterizations of service: Honorable, General, or Other Than Honorable. Anything less than Honorable may result in the loss of certain benefits and negatively impact employment and education opportunities.
