Individuals should contact the Fort Leonard Wood transportation office when orders are received - any delay in contacting the transportation office may result in non-availability of Department of Defense-contracted moving companies. SOLDIER SPOTLIGHT FORT LEONARD WOOD



Hailing from Cortez, Colorado, Sgt. 1st Class Daniel Puls, a 399th Army Band vocalist, began his military career as a saxophonist straight out of college nearly 18 years ago. Since then, he has traveled the world, helping the Army connect with the rest of the world through the universal language of music.

Where did you complete initial military training?

I completed basic combat training at Fort Jackson, South Carolina, and advanced individual training at Naval Amphibious Base Little Creek, now known as Joint Expeditionary Base– Little Creek, in Little Creek, Virginia, which is home to the Army, Navy and Marine Corps schools of music.

When did you become a vocalist?

I originally joined as a saxophone player. When the vocal military occupational specialty was created in 2011, I was able to audition and switch over to vocals at that point.

Why did you choose to become a musician in the Army?

I graduated from Colorado Christian University in Lakewood, Colorado, in 2005, with a Bachelor of Arts in music with an emphasis in saxophone and voice. As I was getting into my junior and senior years, I was looking at career options, and the Army was advertising that they are the world's foremost hire of musicians – we hire more musicians than any other entity in the world. I felt it fit with my values, would provide for my family and allow me to do what I already love doing and what I'm already trained for, so it made a lot of sense to me.

What advice would you give to other vocalists who are considering joining the Army?

Develop a wide variety of vocal abilities instead of concentrating on one style or one genre. It's having a wide variety and execution of multiple styles that is really going to make you commercially viable, and that aspect is often lost in the academic sector, where one style is the focus of an entire degree plan.

What is your favorite part about your job?

My favorite part about my job is the variety of things that I get to do and experience that I wouldn't experience otherwise – even as a musician elsewhere. I've had the privilege to play in almost every conceivable live music context you can think of, from child development centers with 20 little kids running around with stuffed animals, to 8,-10,000 people in an arena in Norfolk, Virginia, to 1,200 monks in front of a Buddhist temple when I was in Korea. Every day still feels like a new adventure with music, and I really value that.

What is your favorite genre to sing?

I'm often utilized as a hard rock and pop vocalist because a lot of times that is what the audience enjoys listening to, especially from the Army, but my favorite to sing personally is jazz.
