## **Hospital Construction Update**

The new hospital construction is expected to be completed in early 2024, and should be open by early 2025.

Fort Leonard Wood's new 450,000square-foot hospital is taking shape. According to Mark French, a Quality Assurance Section chief with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, major site work is complete. Utilities are connected and operational, and landscaping is progressing well. The majority of parking lots, streets and sidewalks are ready for use. The clinic, hospital and five-bay ambulance garage exterior finishes are wrapping up and interior finishes are underway.

The new hospital is located on 52 acres just to the northeast of the existing hospital, which was built in 1965. Once the new hospital is complete, the existing hospital will be scheduled for demolition.

With the military occupational specialty of 31B – Military Police – Sgt. 1st Class John Marquis currently serves as a drill sergeant with Company A, 795th Military Police Battalion. There, he is responsible for transforming America's sons and daughters into Soldiers. In June, he was named winner of the Maneuver Support Center of Excellence Drill Sergeant of the Year Competition.

#### What is your hometown?

Klamath Falls, Oregon

### When did you join the Army? And why do you continue to serve?

I joined July 17, 2012. I needed a purpose, so I joined the Army to find one, and it worked out very well. I found the motivation and direction to continue serving, and it has instilled discipline into me to progress and go to college. It's been very beneficial for my life.

### What is your favorite thing about being a drill sergeant?

My favorite part is the training and watching the trainees grow, not only as Soldiers, but as people. Yes, there are times, where it can be frustrating and a struggle, but in the end, it all becomes worth it. Seeing their appreciation and watching them learn and grow gives you a great sense of pride knowing you helped them to achieve that.

### What does it take to become a Drill Sergeant of the Year?

I've always been very competitive, and when volunteering to be a drill sergeant, I was already striving to be the standard of excellence. So, how do you be the excellence of excellence? The moment I

showed up to my unit, I told them I wanted to be the Drill Sergeant of the Year. Whenever I go somewhere new, I always try to participate in whatever competitions are available. I was my battalion Drill Sergeant of the Quarter, then the MSCoE Drill Sergeant of the Quarter, and then from there, it was just waiting until the DSoY competition happened. There were some very, very good drill sergeants competing. It was very hard and very close.

### What do you hope to accomplish during your time as Drill Sergeant of the Year?

I'm hoping to find ways to improve the drill sergeant program and get into those places where I can make suggestions. I also hope to provide insight or input, and hopefully be a mentor and resource for the other drill sergeants on the installation, when it comes to training or regulation, or whatever they need help with.

### What would you say to Soldiers considering becoming a drill sergeant?

I would tell them they need to do it. Seeing the impact you have on the trainees, and their appreciation, is something you just can't get anywhere else. I've been in multiple leader positions and nowhere comes close to the amount of appreciation you get when these trainees graduate. So, if you want to be the standard of what an NCO is, be a drill sergeant.
