### FEVS Army window now open

The Federal Employee Viewpoint Survey window is now open and will close on July 22. This year, all eligible Army civilians – non-political, non-contractor employees on board with the Army as of Nov. 2021 – will receive an email invitation to complete the survey. The FEVS, administered by the Office of Personnel Management, is an annual government-wide survey that measures federal employees' perceptions of critical work-life areas driving employee engagement, satisfaction and retention across the workforce. The survey results help senior leaders gain valuable insights on the strengths of the civilian workforce, gauge areas for improvement and identify current challenges.

Personnel preparing for a permanent change of station should anticipate delays in the scheduling of their household goods move, and should not try to move or store their household goods prior to receiving PCS orders. Individuals should contact the Fort Leonard Wood transportation office when orders are received – any delay in contacting the transportation office may result in non-availability of Department of Defense-contracted moving companies. Call 573.596.0077, or visit in person in Bldg. 470, Room 1220. The transportation office is open from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. weekdays. Customers also have the option to start the process on-line through the Defense Personal Property System. To request access to DPS, click here. When at the DPS landing page, scroll down to the customer column and click on "Register as a Customer," and fill out the requested information. # LEONARD WOOD JUSTICE

### **Courts-Martial**

— A sergeant first class was convicted at a summary court-martial of one specification of wrongful appropriation. Forfeiture of two-thirds of one month's pay.

### Reprimands

— A captain received a permanently filed general officer memorandum of reprimand for driving while under the influence of alcohol.

— A master sergeant received a general officer memorandum of reprimand for sexually harassing a subordinate and creating a toxic work environment for others.

### **Other Misconduct**

— A specialist received a field grade article 15 for wrongful use of THC, a Schedule I controlled substance. Reduction to private first class (E3); separation initiated.

— A private first class received a field grade article 15 for larceny. Restriction for sixty days; oral reprimand.

 A private first class received a company grade article 15 for destruction of government property. Reduction to private (E-2).
A private received a field grade article 15 for wrongful use of cocaine, a Schedule II controlled substance. Reduction to private (E-1), forfeiture of \$1,832 of pay of per month for two months, and involuntary separation from the Army.

— A private received a summarized article 15 for provoking speech and gestures. Extra duty for one day.

— A private received a company grade article 15 for assault and disrespect. Reduction to private (E-1), and forfeiture of \$427 of pay for one month.

— A private received a company grade article 15 for destruction of government property. Extra duty and restriction for fourteen days.

NOTE: Soldiers administratively separated receive one of three characterizations of service: Honorable, General, or Other Than Honorable. Anything less than Honorable may result in the loss of certain benefits and negatively impact employment and education opportunities.
