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Responsible for managing the official mail, Freedom of Information Act requests and Army Records Information Management System forms for DHR.



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How did you get your start as a DA Civilian?

I started as a GS-4 at the 43rd Adjutant General Reception Battalion in 2003, and have worked my way up in the years since. I've worked hard to get to different positions within my organization. I've always kind of wanted to be a division chief within the DHR, and so I decided to apply for the position I am in now.

What brought you to Fort Leonard Wood?

I'm originally from Alabama, and came here in 1999, as an Army dependent – my mom was in the service and retired in 2000. There wasn't much here when I got here.

Things have really changed since then. It's really grown, and there are many more opportunities available. My wife and I love it here in Missouri. We bought 70 acres of land and built our own home here, so we kind of put down roots. Both our families are here, so we have a great support system.
