Peak PCS season delays

Personnel preparing for a permanent change of station should anticipate delays in the scheduling of household goods moves, and should not try to move or store their household goods prior to receiving PCS orders. Individuals should contact the Fort Leonard Wood transportation office when orders

are received – any delay in contacting the transportation office may result in non-availability of Department of Defense-contracted moving companies. 



Volunteers from the 43rd Adjutant General Battalion's Fitness Training Unit visited the center on Wednesday to help supply this critical need.



I love going to work every day ... I love interacting with the students and the drill sergeants.



What do you like most about being a DA Civilian?

This is an amazing job, and I love it. I love going to work every day and can honestly say this is the first time I've ever been able to say that. I love interacting with the students and the drill sergeants, and everybody has been very kind and respectful to me.

What brought you to Fort Leonard Wood?

I have been in Missouri for about 17 years. I drove a truck over the road for a long time, and I wanted to be close to home. I live about 40 miles from here, so it was close enough that I could go home every night.

What are the benefits of being a DA Civilian?

I have the opportunity to do so many things. I got my license examiner testing done so I can test other drivers, and I get to be in dispatch and drive the buses – I'm kind of all over the place.

Who has inspired you throughout your career as a DA Civilian?

I look up to my current supervisor, who I've known for a long time. I know he's been all over the post working to get where he's at right now, and watching him grow and do so well here is what made me decide I wanted to try.
