# SOLDIER SPOT LIGHT



Army Motor Transport Operator Sgt. 1st Class Kathryn Kidwell began her military career in 2012, when she attended training here. She now oversees operations for Fort Leonard Wood's 58th Transportation Battalion.

### What is your hometown?

My dad was in the Army, and I was born in Germany. He retired when I was 4 years old, so I pretty much grew up in Leavenworth, Kansas.

### Why did you join the military?

I just felt a calling. I wanted to serve my country. I have two older brothers, but neither of them had the desire. I just have a true passion for it. I never needed the Army; I wanted the Army.

### What do you enjoy about being an Army Motor Transport Operator?

Nothing happens until something moves. It may sound cliché, but it is true. We network a lot with the other military occupational specialties, because they need us to complete their mission. Here, we get daily phone calls for support — they need troops moved, or they need (Meals, Ready-to-Eat) and we are there to support.

## What is the best thing about being in the Army?

The opportunities it has given me. My first duty station was with the 10th Special Forces Group in Fort Carson, Colorado. They sent me to Airborne School and Jumpmaster School. My next duty station was Fort Campbell, Kentucky. They sent me to Pathfinder School and Air Assault School. My third duty station was Kaiserslautern, Germany, and now I am here.

## What did you think of Germany and getting to see where you were born?

It was so cool. My mom is German; she was born and raised there. We had never been back since then, so I got to meet all my family that was over there. It was great. My parents came over and my grandmother, my Oma, came over and visited us. We got to see the hospital I was born in and the house I came home to. I got to experience a little bit of my heritage while I was stationed there.

#### What advice do you have for people thinking about becoming an Army Motor Transport Operator?

Do it. As instructors and drill sergeants, we see so many trainees come from all walks of life. Here we teach life skills. Driving may seem common, but so many Soldiers in training come here and have never driven before. They rode the subways or are from a big city and never owned a car — or their parents drove them everywhere. Not only do they get to drive here, but they are diving tractor trailers and big trucks. They love it and it shows. It is exciting to see trainees succeed and feel proud of themselves.
