Peak PCS season delays

HEROES THE BATTLEFIELD

Sgt. Michael Silbernagel, a medic with the 169th Engineer Battalion, responded to and provided expert medical care for a civilian involved in a vehicular accident on Fort Leonard Wood. He controlled bleeding, treated facial trauma and took cervical spine precautions while remaining with the injured person until emergency medical services arrived.

Rich Alker, a Force Modernization Department capability development specialist at the Homeland Defense/ Civil Support Office, has less than six months on the team but has been instrumental

in kicking off HD/CSO's internal new equipment fielding as-

sessment working group – designed through knowledge management best practices – to link knowledge of future equipment fieldings with their capability implications to domestic chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear response and the training domain. Under his leadership, this working group will mature, expand and better synchronize modernization and training domain development to better inform proponent decision making for routinely improving upon HD/CSO training activity at pace with modernization of the force.

the mail to the rightful owner. The recipient of the mail was grateful to have the

letter back in their possession and took the time to write a thank you letter to Dortch. This is one example of the care, compassion and drive to consistently go above and beyond to provide quality customer service found here. Dortch's commitment to the Soldiers, family members and the Fort Leonard Wood community is a testament to putting people first and the U.S. Army Installation Management Command mission.

Why did you choose to become a DA Civilian?

I first started firefighting in Crocker, Missouri, in 2000, while in high school and came to Fort Leonard Wood in 2006. Firefighting began as a way to get out of school, then 9/11 happened, and it became a way to both be a firefighter and support the Army mission.

What is your favorite part about your job as a DA Civilian?

I enjoy helping people, and it can sometimes be exciting. I also get to work with a great group of guys -Ispend a lot of time with them here. Those are the best parts of the job.

What has been your most memorable experience as a DA Civilian?

In this job, we are only hands-on with the person for a short time, and after that, we often don't know what happens. The most memorable moments are when people come back to the firehouse to thank us and tell us a little more about what happened and how we helped them.

Warrant Officer Christopher Garcia Company A, 84th Chemical Battalion

Why did you choose to become a warrant officer?

I decided to become a warrant officer because I had leaders who saw potential in me. My wife saw the same potential and pushed me toward it. I wouldn't be where I am without my wife and all the mentors I've come across, and I definitely wouldn't be a warrant officer.

How did your experience as an instructor prepare you for being a warrant officer?

Since my job now is to advise, being able to find and relay information, so I can continue to teach different kinds of people, will be helpful.

Who helped you develop as a leader? How did they help?

I've had a few influential leaders, many of whom were here at Fort Leonard Wood. One was my former first sergeant. He always let me take the reins and didn't micromanage me, but at the same time, he would mentor me on precisely what to do and how to do it. When I became a warrant officer, a former regimental warrant officer, did the same thing but for the warrant officer side.

What is your definition of a leader?

For me, a leader is confident, but also humble and shows humility. They genuinely care and work to inspire people.

What would you say to someone who is considering joining the Army?

Joining the Army is probably one of the best decisions you'll make. It's gratifying. I get to help many people along the way, and it develops me as a person because I meet so many people. The Army is very diverse, and meeting people from different backgrounds, talking to them and learning about their experience or knowledge makes you a better person.

Army warrant officers are highly-trained technical experts in their field. They are responsible for training Soldiers, organizing and advising on missions and serving as technical experts and trusted advisors.

Why did you join the Army?

It was something I always wanted to do. My dad served in the Army for eight years, and I wanted to make him and my family proud.
