Location data advertises where you are, where you've been and potentially when you'll return.

To mitigate risk:

- turn off precise location settings when not needed for navigation, workouts or other activities, or when taking pictures, especially when on vacation;
- refrain from posting information online about your vacation or extended trips away from your residence until you have returned home; and
- always examine where a company is based when deciding to purchase a smart device or download an application. Understand the risk factors, and that your data could be stored by whatever country owns that technology.

# LEONARD WOOD JUSTICE

#### **Courts-Martial**

— At a general court-martial, a private first class was convicted by a military judge, pursuant to his pleas, of conspiracy to commit unlawful entry and robbery with a dangerous weapon, obstruction of justice, breaking and entering, larceny, robbery with a dangerous weapon (a firearm), and assault. The military judge sentenced him to confinement for 11 years, reduction to E-1, and a dishonorable discharge. He is serving his sentence at the U.S. Disciplinary Barracks at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

— At a general court-martial, a private first class was convicted by a military judge, pursuant to his pleas, of conspiracy to commit larceny and robbery with a dangerous weapon, obstruction of justice, breaking and entering, and robbery with a dangerous weapon (a firearm). The military judge sentenced him to confinement for 16.5 years, reduction to E-1, and a dishonorable discharge. He is serving his sentence at the U.S. Disciplinary Barracks at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

— A specialist received a general officer memorandum of reprimand for driving while under the influence of a high amount of over-the-counter medication (diphenhydramine) and leaving the scene of an accident.

#### **Other Misconduct**

— A private first class was separated from the Army for violating the Army's Equal Opportunity Policy by engaging in unlawful discrimination based on

— A private was separated from the Army with a characterization of other than honorable for misconduct including sexual harassment.


 A private received nonjudicial punishment under Article 15 by a field grade officer for sexual harassment. Forfeiture of \$916 for one month.

Reprimands

— A first lieutenant received a general officer memorandum of reprimand for driving while under the influence of alcohol.

- A sergeant first class received a general officer memorandum of reprimand for driving while under the influence of alcohol.

NOTE: Soldiers administratively separated receive one of three characterizations of service: Honorable, General, or Other Than Honorable. Anything less than Honorable may result in the loss of certain benefits and negatively impact employment and education opportunities.



Staff Sgt. CarrieLynn Snodgrass has been around the Army her entire life. Now on her second tour of service, she has spent more than 20 years serving her country and has no plans of stopping anytime soon. Originally enlisted as a combat medic in 1988, she now serves as the supply specialist for the Sapper Training Company at Fort Leonard Wood.

#### What is your hometown?

Fort Knox, Kentucky.

# Where did you complete Initial Entry Training?

The first time I joined the Army, I went to Basic Combat Training and Advanced Individual Training at Fort Sam Houston, Texas. The second time I joined in 1988, I completed BCT at Fort Jackson, South Carolina, and Advanced Individual Training at Fort Lee, Virginia.

#### Why did you join the Army?

I'm from an Army family with a lengthy military history. My parents were in the Army - my father was an engineer, and my mother was a quartermaster. Both served in Vietnam. My grandfather on my father's side was a Marine, and my mother's father was in the Army.

I joined for the first time in 1988 as a combat medic and got out because one of my children needed open heart surgery. I rejoined in 2008 because I hadn't achieved my goals the first time I was in, and I wanted to finish what I had set out to do. I was unable to be a medic then, so I picked Supply Specialist because I had 19 years of logistical experience with a Fortune 500 company from my time in the civilian world, and I'm good with numbers.

### What is your favorite part about your job?

I enjoy working with engineers. When I

came back in I spent most of my contract with Engineers. I was loaned out to other units, like field artillery, but I'm more comfortable with engineers.

# What advice would you give to others thinking about joining the Army?

Being in the Army, regardless of your MOS or duty station, is what you make of it. Research the military occupational specialties available, and don't be afraid to pick something you feel may be exclusionary to you because of your gender because it's not. If you allow yourself to dream big, you can be big.

# How do you define leadership, and what do you look for in a leader?

Competency and openness. Full disclosure and transparency. It matters because if you're not competent enough to be in a leadership position, you're going to lead someone down the wrong path in some way, shape or form.

#### What's next for you?

I am getting ready to PCS to Fort Bliss, Texas. I am immensely excited to go back to Texas. My sons are in San Antonio, one is in college, and the other works for the local school district.

Camp Humphreys, South Korea, Fort Bliss, Texas, Fort Riley, Kansas, Fort Knox, Kentucky and Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri.
