DFAC closure

The Bldg. 3223 dining facility near the Maneuver Support Center of Excellence NCO Academy - commonly referred to as Tony's - is closed through the end of January 2024, while improvements are made to the water and electrical systems, the heating, ventilation and air conditioning, and new floor tiles and ceiling are installed, along with new paint. While it's closed, during the week, the Bldg. 630 DFAC, located at 5323 Colorado Ave., is providing support, and a shuttle service runs approximately every 25 minutes between the north side of the parking lot outside Thurman Hall at the MSCoE headquarters building and Bldg. 630, which is open from 5:30 to 8 a.m. for breakfast, 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. for lunch, and 4 to 6:30 p.m. for dinner. On weekends and holidays, the Bldg. 1792 DFAC – located between Cooley and Oklahoma avenues - is providing support, though there is not a shuttle service to Bldg. 1792. New four-way stop on post

The view looking southwest, where Fort Leonard Wood's newest four-way-stop intersection at 4th Street and Louisiana Avenue, near Fire Station No. 3, is now in place. Based on comments sent to garrison leadership here through the Interactive Customer Evaluation website, commonly called ICE, the additional stop signs were added to alleviate safety concerns due to blind spots near the intersection.

Digital driver's licenses or identifications are not accepted and cannot be used as a form of identification for the purpose of identity vetting to gain escorted or unescorted access to Army installations. Driver's licenses and identification cards presented for gaining access to Army installations must be a valid state issued physical document or card.

Why do you continue to serve?

I still have goals and aspirations to achieve throughout my military career, but mostly, it takes care of my family, my children. But I get enjoyment out of the constant drive to always push and achieve different goals. I was having a conversation with a friend the other day about civilian jobs, where you just clock in, clock out, but in the military, there are always new goals and always new things to push for.

What are some personal highlights from your Army career so far?

Hightlights – for me, it's all the great people I've met. I've also been around the world three times. I was able to visit countries I never thought I would go to and experience a lot of different cultures.

What is your favorite thing about being a drill sergeant?

It was always a goal of mine to become a drill sergeant back when I was a junior enlisted Soldier. It's really cool to see – especially with the (split-training option, where certain individuals, usually high school students, attend basic combat training one summer, and advanced individual training the next summer) – you get some Soldiers who are unmolded, and I get to see what kind of Soldiers they turn into before they enter the Engineer Regiment.

What would you say to Soldiers considering becoming a drill sergeant?
