# What do you do for the U.S. Army Engineer School?

I take the training Soldiers receive at the Engineer School and match it to civilian engineer licenses and credentials, so the Soldier will not only be receiving military occupational training, but they will be also getting civilian certifications. I also manage the United Services Military Apprenticeship Program. Soldiers can earn apprenticeships, just by doing their job. They can build their military career, while building a civilian resume.

## Why did you join the military?

My grandfather served in the Army during World War I and World War II; my dad served in the Army during Vietnam; and my brother served as a Marine. I felt like it was my turn.

# What do you like most about being a Soldier?

I have met some outstanding and interesting individuals during my career. And I have visited so many different places. I have a better understanding of the world. I have seen it with my own eyes.

## Why do you continue to serve?

I like to help people better themselves and their careers. When I found about the United Services Military

Apprenticeship Program, I became a coordinator. I felt compelled to get this information out there. I can help direct any service member, even other branches, like the Marines and Navy.

# What is the most fulfilling part of your job?

Helping Soldiers earn civilian certifications and licenses while they are earning their Army Additional Skill Identifier. I like helping them add to their professional military education and prepare for their possible future civilian careers. It just makes them a more well-rounded Soldier.

## What advice would you give to people thinking about joining the Army?

If you don't join, you are going to be

missing out on a priceless opportunity. In one term or contract with the Army, you will be getting on-the-job training, have outstanding experiences and have the opportunity to set yourself up for career success in the civilian world. You could potentially get out at age 22 and go straight into a high-paying civilian career. There are no other programs like that out there.
