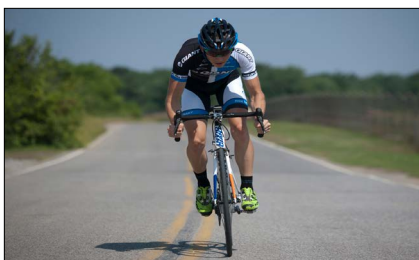
## Fort Leonard Wood leadership recognizes NCOs, spouses for excellence, volunteerism
