DFAC closure

The Bldg. 3223 dining facility - commonly referred to as Tony's - will be closed from Tuesday through the end of January 2024, while improvements are made to the water and electrical systems, the heating, ventilation and air conditioning, and new floor tiles and ceiling are installed, along with new paint. While it's closed, during the week, the Bldg. 630 DFAC, located at 5323 Colorado Ave., will provide support, and a shuttle service will run approximately every 25 minutes between the north side of the parking lot outside Thurman Hall at the Maneuver Support Center of Excellence headquarters building and Bldg. 630, which will be open from 5:30 to 8 a.m. for breakfast, 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. for lunch, and 4 to 6:30 p.m. for dinner. On weekends and holidays, the Bldg. 1792 DFAC – located between Cooley and Oklahoma avenues - will provide support, though there will not be a shuttle service to Bldg. 1792. Hours will be 5:30 to 8 a.m. for breakfast, 11 a.m. to

Peak PCS season delays

Personnel preparing for a permanent change of station should anticipate delays in the scheduling of their household goods move, and should not try to move or store their household goods prior to receiving PCS orders. Individuals should contact the Fort Leonard Wood transportation office when orders are received - any delay in contacting the transportation office may result in non-availability of Department of Defense-contracted moving companies. Call 573.596.0077, or visit in person in Bldg. 470, Room 1220. The transportation office is open from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. weekdays. Customers also have the option to start the process on-line through the Defense Personal Property System. To request access to DPS, click here. Teen ID post access policy

Fort Leonard Wood's Directorate of Emergency Services has policies on checking teenager Department of Defense ID cards at installation access points. If a child is with a parent or guardian, then no ID is required unless the child looks close in appearance to an adult or if the child is driving. Additionally, DOD ID card holders under the age of 18 are not authorized to sponsor non-DOD personnel on post. Why did you decide to become an Army civilian?

After getting married and moving to an isolated Naval installation in Argentia, Newfoundland, Canada, I took a volunteer position in 1985, with the Directorate of Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation as a women's basketball coach. Since then, I've worked for the Navy, the Marine Corps, the Air Force and the Army.

What brought you to Fort Leonard Wood?

I'm originally from Houston, Missouri, so after moving every two years for so long, we came home.

What is the best part about your job?

The highest point, I think, has been seeing people enjoy growing. And as they grow, you grow, because when you have fulfilled your duty, then you see it through others. The impact we want to leave on someone is how we treated them. We never know how many lives we touch. Every day, you need to put your best foot forward, because you don't know whose life you're touching. They will remember it. I don't know how many lives I've touched, but I know I've touched a lot.

What has been your greatest accomplishment as an Army civilian?

My greatest accomplishment was building Information Tours and Travel and the volunteer program for Fort Leonard Wood, along with succeeding at becoming a certified personal financial counselor.

What advice would you give to someone considering a career as an Army civilian?

Do it because it's a calling for you,

and if you don't enjoy it, get out of it. If you don't enjoy helping others, then you will have a hard time moving forward. But if you enjoy helping others and serving people, who are serving you or your freedom, then you'll enjoy your job.
